In this connection, definite ction was taken by the Office of Price Administration to en-courage poultrymen to meet the Food-For-Freedom goal of a reord production of chickens and urkeys, third to beef and pork American diet.

Specific price cellings at wholesale have been ssued on all types of domestic fewls at levels slightly higher than have prevailed at any time this year Fixed margins over net costs for poultry at retail will be provided soon, as has been done for turkeys at retail.

Dollars-and-cents price ceil-ings also were established on lamb and mutton when sold by packers and wholesalers, as part of a plan to encourage fair distribution of available civilian supplies of meats. The new order cuts lamb ceilings back slightly, but advances mutton about 3 cents a pound over the level at wholesale in the Sept.

28-Oct. 2 "freeze" period.
Adjustments to cover added costs of packaging and transportation also were authorized at some but not all, wholesle and retail levels, for rice, dried fruit and dry edible beans. December. While the OPA was coping with meat shortage in control over slaughtering, it should be pointed out that there are no restrictions on the amount of slaughtering done on farms for home consumption. Farmers also may continue to sell homekilled meat up to amounts equal

to such sales last year. In the process of adjustment to a strict wartime economy, details of what has nappened to the average family food bill are important. Although price control is effective over most home expenditures, the average family food cost rose by 1.2 per cent between Oct. 13 and Nov. 17. That means that on Nov. 17 every American family was paying \$1.31 for every dollar of average food expenditure for the

During this same month prices of foods directly under price control rose but half of one per cent, chiefly resulting from OPA price adjustments on the basis of increased costs. During the same time, however, prices of foods not directly under price control—mostly fresh fruits, fresh vegetables, and fresh fish—rose by an average of 6.6 per cent, and these foods were 21 per cent higher than in



Rabbits Good Food But Take Care In Handling and Cooking

AUSTIN, During the winter months hunting rabbits is a popular sport and a wild rabbit makes a very fine food, but according to the State Health Department, extreme care should be used in the handling of wild rabbits to prevent a possible infection with tularemia.

"Those little cottontail rabbits are not always as harmless as they look," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, "for some of them are infected with tularemia. This serious disease which is also known as rabbit fever usually is acquired by human beings through contact with infected rabbits or through contact with the infected insect that spreads it from animal to

Dr. Cox cautioned that hunters rabbits that run away. A rabbit without the energy to scamper away from the hunter a likely to be a sek one that can trans-mit tular mia to those who ham-

"It is necessary to handle unber gloves will protect your hands since the germs may enter the body through any cut or soratch however small if the rabbit is handled without gloves. "As a further safeguard, rabbit meat should be cooked very thoroughly so as to destroy any disease producing germs that may be present. This means that it should be cooked at a boiling temperature for at least 20 minutes before cooking it to
