J. G. Fortenberry says he hopes they will not put a government program on rattlesnakes, because he cannot keep his crop down. He says it is conservative to estimate 12 snakes to the mile of fence row around his place and that they are very careful about reaching under a pile of tumble weeds or trash. Similar reports are also coming in from other extreme north and west parts of the county and several people have killed some unusually large rattlers.
