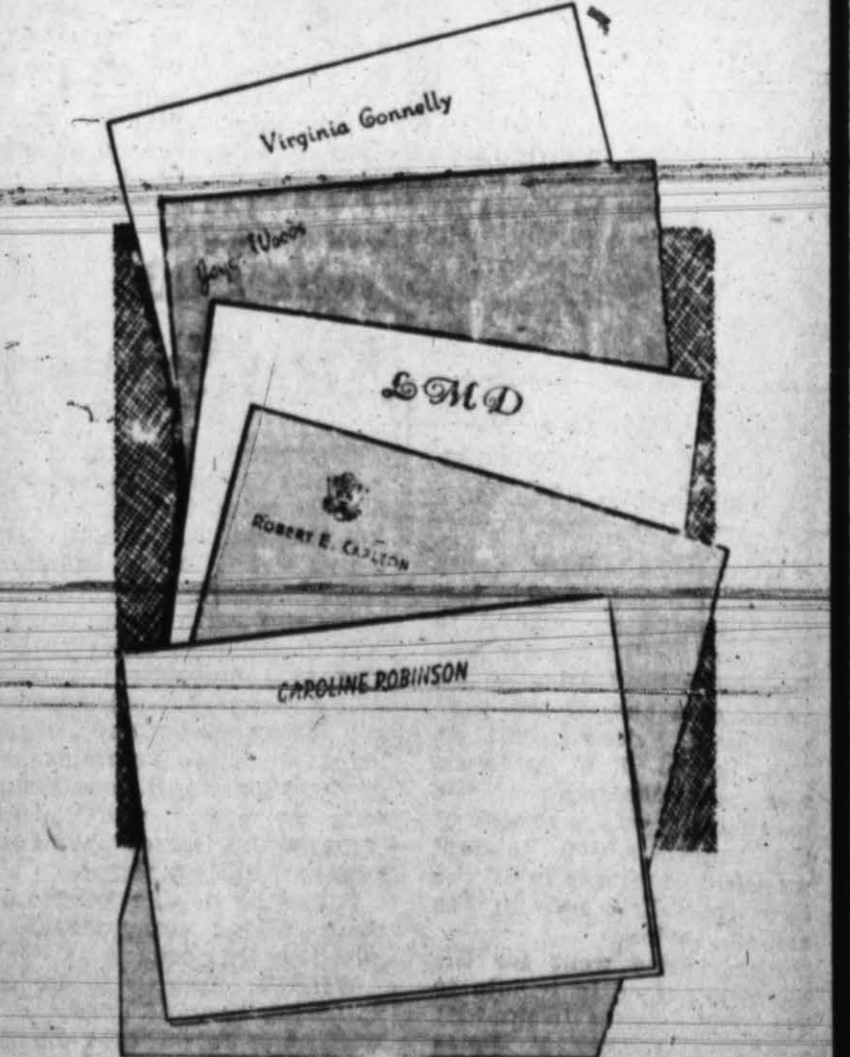

type of world compact. "Germany already knows she has lost this war," Judge Witherspoon stated, "and she is already preparing to win the next one."

The main task of the United Nations, the speaker stated, is to be as well prepared for the peace as the enemy is, and to be prepared, either by the use of international force or by the use of economic pressure, to keep in check a recurrence of the aggressiveness of nations which adhere to the doctrine that might makes right.

Judge Witherspoon pointed out that in the long run, economic controls, which will in turn mean the loss of some so-called national "economic rights" may prove better checks on aggression than the use of international force.

Both speakers agreed that education in Christian ideals, both at home and abroad, will prove the determining factors in making a lasting peace.

pointed out that Americans will have to give up the idea of absolute sovereignty in the field of international relations.

"The price of peace," said Mr. Condon, "is the recognition by national law of a higher law."

Describing America as a "Semi-Christian nation," the speaker declared that the spirit of Christianity must be revived and made to play a part in every phase of our national and international life.

Mr. Condon recommended, first, that the victorious nations in the world conflict, from some type of compact, with world judicial bodies to settle international disputes. Eventually, he pointed out, the other nations of the world might be educated to a place in this "world court." An implement of force, perhaps the much-discussed "international police force" will be necessary to enforce the rulings of the court, Mr. Condon believes.

Economic Control Necessary

Judge Witherspoon emphasized that better national citizenship should lead to better participation in the coming world order, and urged that decisions be made now. "A sort of moral let down will inevitably follow this war," he prophesied, adding however that the present force of public opinion is such as to guide leaders to enter into some
