Hereford banks will be closed tomorrow, Feb. 19, for Robert E. Lee's birthday.

This is included mainly because a letter from Cpl. John A. Erdman, now stationed in Italy, conveys the definite idea that the GI's over there feel that the folks back home—especially the girls—are welcoming all POW's with open arms; and John is pretty indignant. But the reports he has received are evidently exaggerated and while POW's in this country are treated in accordance with the rules of the Geneva Convention, they are not—as John has been led to think—being made the honor guests at dances.

## Rain Amounts To .24 Inches

Total rainfall for the past 24 hours, as reported at the City Weather Station this morning at 8 o'clock, was .24 inches; and according to the forecast this morning more moisture in the form of light drizzle was predicted for the rest of the day. ## Powdered Eggs May Be Included in POW Food Packages

Powdered eggs, a food item which adds much nutritional value to scanty prison diets, are being supplied free by the Deaf Smith County Red Cross for inclusion in "next of kin packages" sent to local boys now prisoners of war in Germany.

Mrs. C. H. Dyar, chairman of the local P. O. W. committee, states that ten pounds of powdered eggs have already been given for the food packages and that another order has been sent in. She urges the parents of men listed as prisoners to take advantage of this Red Cross service.

The Deaf Smith County chapter, Mrs. Dyar states, is the first to offer this free service for the aid of boys from this territory who are in German prison camps.

## Fine Program Promised at Industry Show

Deaf Smith County will have one of the feature exhibits at the Panhandle Industrial Conference to be held in Amarillo at the Herring Hotel next Wednesday and Thursday, Jan. 24-25; and local citizens are urged to see the Hereford exhibit and hear the speakers who will take part in the Hereford program.

In addition to having one of the largest agricultural displays at the conference, the Hereford exhibit will feature the showing of the technicolor movie filmed here; and a commentary for the film will be furnished by A. W. Erickson, crop reporter, who will talk on the soil structure and unique advantages of Deaf Smith County.

County Agent A. R. Bateman will describe grain sorghum production in the territory and will point to the possibilities of expansion in this field; and Dr. Edward Taylor of the dental division of the Texas State Health Department will give a talk on the chemical properties of Deaf Smith County water and the resulting health advantages of the territory.

The Industrial Conference is sponsored by the Amarillo News Globe for the purpose of publicizing the agricultural and industrial possibilities of this region and leading industrialists from throughout the nation are expected to attend.

He graduated from Hereford High School in 1943 and enlisted in the Army soon after his graduation. He had been overseas only a short time and is thought to have been killed in his first battle engagement.

Young Foster visited in the E. E. Doak home in Ford Community while he was on furlough last summer. He would have been 20 years old in March.

## Veterans Recruit Workers for Pantex

A program consisting of war films and talks by veterans was presented here last Thursday afternoon in the drive to recruit war workers for the Pantex Ordnance Plant.

Army personnel in the party included Capt. J. E. Southworth, a veteran of the North African campaign, who received severe shrapnel wounds the day before the final battle ended in Tunisia; Pvt. James L. Corbean, who was wounded in action in Southern France; and Pvt. Clarence L. Barthelmy, who has received the Purple Heart for wounds received in combat on Munda Island.

The veteran's caravan was equipped with many items of army equipment and the soldier's talks pointed to the crying need for more such equipment and the civilian responsibility to get the war job done by getting into work which contributes directly to the war effort.

## Roger Hartman Missing in Action, December 21

Pfc. Roger W. Hartman, 20, son of G. C. Hartman of Hereford, has been reported by the War Department as missing in action in Germany since Dec. 21.

Young Hartman had been overseas only a short time and though his father knows that he was in an infantry division, he does not know to what Army his son was attached.

Roger was a graduate of Hereford High School and attended Texas A & M before reporting for Army duty. He is the second war casualty reported in the Hartman family within the past

## Two Hereford Men Receive Combat Medals

Two Hereford boys, both tall gunners on Eighth Air Force heavy bombers, have recently received the second Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal for "meritorious achievement" while participating in bombing attacks on targets in Germany. News of the awards was received here in official releases from Eighth Air Force Bomber Stations in England.

Staff Sgt. John T. Estes, 19, is a member of the 95th Bombardment Group. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Cliff Estes of Hereford.

Sgt. Otis W. Smith, 19, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. O. G. Smith of Rt. 1, Wildorado. His wife, Mrs. Molinda Smith, lives at Wildorado.

## Ford Wounded In German Counter Drive

The first local casualty reported as the result of the German counter-offensive in Belgium was listed when Mrs. Myrtle Ford received word that her son, Pfc. Henry C. Ford, was wounded in action with the First Army sometime before Dec. 31. His left arm was injured by shrapnel.

Ford has received the Purple Heart and is now in a General Hospital in France, recovering from his injuries.

He attended Hereford High School, where he made an outstanding record as an athlete, and had been in the Army college training program before being transferred to the 91st Division after the college program was drastically curtailed last year.

## Eberle Awarded Purple Heart

Lt. Commander Howard Eberle has been awarded the Purple Heart, his sisters Genevieve and Mary Virginia Eberle, were informed by the War Department yesterday.

Dr. Eberle suffered arm and leg injuries in the Battle of Leyte on November 18. He was evacuated to an overseas hospital and last week arrived in the United States. He is now in the Naval Hospital at Oakland, Calif., and in a phone call to his sisters Sunday stated that he is recovering satisfactorily but will be hospitalized for some time yet.

## Wiltshire to Open Dental Office Tuesday

Dr. B. M. Wiltshire, who recently received his discharge from the Army Medical Corps after two years of service in this country and overseas, announces the re-opening of his dentistry office here on Tuesday, Jan. 23.

## Forty-Two Service Discharges On-File at County Clerk's Office

A total of 42 military discharge papers have been put on record in the Deaf Smith County Clerk's office; and according to Clerk Robert L. Thompson this proves either that Deaf Smith County has had a much lower discharge rate than that reported in the surrounding territory or else the discharged servicemen have failed to put their military discharges on record.

"It's probably a case of failing to record the discharges," Thompson says, pointing out that veterans should take care of this business as the record may prove valuable in case original discharge papers are lost. Few Saw Combat

Now filed are 25 discharges from the Army, one from the Navy and six from the Marine Corps. Also on file are ten miscellaneous discharge records which could not be recorded on the regular forms.

By far the largest number of discharges are for men who did not see actual combat duty and four of the Army discharges were given to men over 38 years of age. Length of service varied from one month to almost four years, with a number of the records showing Pre-Pearl Harbor enlistments.

Included on the list are seven men whose records show participation in overseas service. They are:

Staff Sgt. Lester F. Wagner, enlisted in December, 1939; was discharged October 31, 1944. He arrived at Casablanca in November, 1942, and suffered shrapnel wounds in the arms and hands during the Battle of Maktassy, in Tunisia. His decorations include the European-African-Middle Eastern Medal

## More Overseas Workers Needed by Red Cross

Stating that 3,000 more men and women are needed immediately for overseas service with the American Red Cross, E. C. Eubanks, chairman of the Deaf Smith County Chapter, today announced that the local chapter will aid in the recruiting drive.

"We already know of some persons who are interested in this work," Eubanks said, "and we believe that there would be several eligible persons in the county who could qualify for this important war service."

Red Cross personnel are needed to operate overseas service clubs, to assist as hospital workers, field directors and clubmobile girls; and age limits are from 30 to 50 and from 25 to 45, depending upon the type of work.

Educational and professional background are not so important as individual ability and interest, Eubanks said, pointing out that a reputation for civic work and experience in directing recreational activities are strong recommendations for overseas Red Cross service.

Applications may be made at the local Red Cross office, from where they will be forwarded to midwestern area headquarters.

## Italian Prisoners Nabbed in California

Three Italian prisoners who escaped from the Hereford P. O. W. Camp had traveled far before they were apprehended by California police this week.

Two of the men, Capt. Alessandro Brighenti and Capt. Leo Masina, readily admitted their identity to Alhambra police officers Monday and seemed glad enough to be turned over to FBI agents for a return to custody.

Lt. Osborne Sponta gave himself up to San Bernardino officers Sunday after his feet had frozen and he was unable to walk.

It was the fourth escape for Captain Brighenti since he was brought to America.

Staff Sgt. Noel S. Higgins, enlisted Jan. 17, 1941 and was discharged Dec. 7, 1944. Serving as a New Caledonia on Aug. 11, 1942, and wears four overseas bars, the Good Conduct Medal, the Asiatic-Pacific Medal and the American Defense Service Ribbon.

T-5 Claud D. Goldston, enlisted Jan. 23, 1942 and was discharged Dec. 7, 1944. Serving as an Army cook, he saw duty in both the North Africa and European theatre and wears the African-Middle Eastern campaign ribbon, the European Theater ribbon.

Pvt. Cibola L. Goad, who served from Mar. 13, 1942 to Jan. 5, 1945, took part in the Aleutian campaign. He received the Asiatic Pacific Medal and the Good Conduct Medal.

T-5 Jessie R. Barrett, inducted Feb. 7, 1941, received his discharge this month, after three years and ten months of Army service as a tractor driver. He took part in the Algerian, Tunisian and Italian campaigns and wears three bronze battle stars and the American Defense Ribbon.

Cpl. Charles Weldon Poff, USMC, served as an aviation mechanic, taking part in the defense of Henderson Field on Guadalcanal from Sept. 3, 1942 to Nov. 2, 1942. Cpl. Poff enlisted in January, 1942, and received his discharge in March, 1944.

Pfc. Olen "J. P." McCutchen, enlisted in the Marine Corps in May, 1942 and was discharged in August, 1944 after seeing foreign service at Tulagi and Guadalcanal. He took part in the Battle of the Solomons from Nov. 29, 1942 to Jan. 4, 1943.

He graduated from West Texas State College in 1942 and served one year as grade school principal at Quail, Tex., prior to his induction into the Army in July, 1943.

He was married to Miss Lillian Chambers on Jan. 26, 1942, when both were seniors at West Texas State.

His overseas service dates from September of last year.

In addition to his wife and parents, Pfc. Brown is survived by a daughter, Bessie Jo, who was born in Hereford on Dec. 1, 1944.

# Farm Census for 18th District To Get Underway This Month

Agriculture in wartime will be measured by Uncle Sam in the five-year agricultural census which starts this month all over the nation, in the first such report ever to be made in wartime. The agricultural census is made in connection with the general census every ten years; and in the five-year periods between the farm count is taken separately.

The job of enumerating the

agricultural resources of the country is perhaps of more interest this year than ever before on account of the wartime need for accurate figures on food production. It is of special interest to the government in making lend lease commitments and future export plans, and it is valuable to farmers because the basis for future calculations in connection with farm pro-

grams will be very largely the result of census figures.

**To Inventory Resources**  
The food production resources of the nation will be inventoried and some valuable statistics will be assembled and tabulated. The long-time trends in volume of production and values of what farmers produce will be established by the census figures. In this connection it is of interest to note that the total dollar value of the 1919 production of all farms in the country which was reported in the 1920 census was nearly three times the total value of all production in the year 1939 which was reported in the 1940 census.

Also likely to be startling is the comparison of the total value of 1944's record production with that of the previous record boom year of 1920.

**Seven Regions Made**  
To simplify the task of enumerating each farm in each state the country is divided by the Census Bureau into seven regions. States are grouped with other states producing similar crops and livestock products.

Texas is grouped with Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana and New Mexico, because of the wide range of crops grown in these five states, a great many of the questions on the schedule used by the enumerators will not apply to farms in Deaf Smith county.

Entries for each farm during the 1945 census will be listed in book or ledger form rather than on individual schedules as in former years. This change in practice will facilitate the review and the transcription of final information by the Census Bureau as well as handling of the schedule in the field.

**Farm Size Given**  
A farm, or what is considered a farm for census purposes, is any producing unit of three acres or more or any unit producing agricultural products worth \$250 or more in 1944. This includes all town lots or small tracts of land or any place meeting the above specifications such as green houses, victory gardens, nurseries, livestock feed lots and the like.

In the earlier censuses, it is probable that many of the smaller tracts in Deaf Smith County were missed; the number of farms in Deaf Smith County is therefore listed considerably below the correct figure. The interest of all citizens of the county will be best served by an ac-



curate report.  
There should be no hesitancy in giving information to the farm census taker, it is pointed out, as the information is strictly confidential and cannot be reviewed by any other department of the government. Special stress is laid on the fact that the census report cannot be used in connection with any tax collecting agency.

Supervisor for the farm census in the 18th Congressional District is W. L. Boyles, whose address is Court House, Panhandle, Texas; and any persons interested in taking a job with the Farm Census may get in touch with Mr. Boyles or leave their names with their local County agent.

Payment will be made on a piece work basis, and the enumerator must furnish his own transportation. Either men or women may be employed and they can take the work on a part-time basis.

## Keep Mileage Ration Record

All operators of passenger cars with basic "A" rations must have "Mileage Rationing Records" to be eligible to apply for any gasoline rations. R. C. Woolridge, District Gasoline Rationing Officer for OPA, pointed out today.

In the recent re-registration of the nation's 23,000,000 basic "A" ration holders, each registrant was issued one of these mileage record forms. The form replaced the old tire rationing record, on which was kept a list of all gasoline rations issued to the vehicle.

Without this important record form, no motorist may be issued a "B" or "C" supplemental ration, he emphasized. Information has been received from local War Price and Rationing Boards that many motorists did not understand the use of the record form and lost or destroyed theirs. No supplemental rations or special or furlough rations for cars with basic "A" rations may be issued to an applicant who does not present his mileage rationing record with his supplemental gasoline application. Woolridge emphasized. In cases where a motorist was not issued a mileage rationing record, or it was lost or destroyed, he should immediately apply to his local Board for a duplicate.

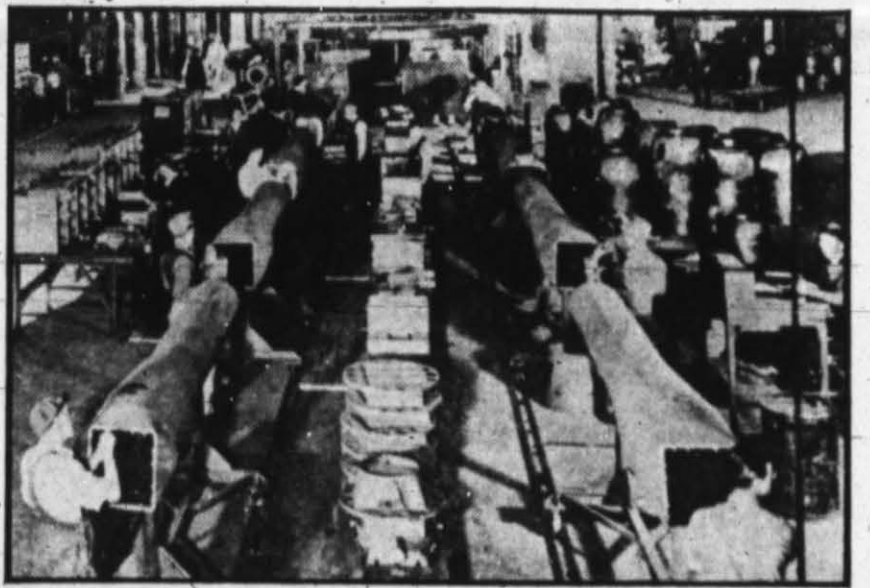

### SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

#### Like the Earthly Kingdoms, Jesus Demands Loyalty

The International Sunday School Lesson for Jan. 28  
Text: Matthew 6:19; 7:29

THE text of this lesson takes the remaining portion, not quite one-half, of the Sermon on the Mount, the former part of which constituted the text of last week's lesson.

Jesus said that His Kingdom is not of this world; but it is like worldly kingdoms in at least one respect. The loyalty demanded of its citizens, or disciples, is complete.

And in at least one respect the Kingdom of Christ is not like earthly kingdoms. The citizen of an earthly kingdom is such by the accident of his birth and location. If he remains in the country of his birth he cannot forswear his allegiance, much as he might wish to do so.

In the Kingdom of Christ there is no compulsion. One becomes a citizen of that Kingdom by exercise of free choice, and one can renounce his citizenship if he is ever perverse or foolish enough to do so. Judas renounced his place in the Kingdom and betrayed his Master.

The Kingdom of Christ is an exacting Kingdom, but it is also a kingdom of love and mercy. It means so much to be a good citizen of that Kingdom that we might well be discouraged over our failure to live up to its standards; but the Master was tempted like as we are; He knows our weakness; and He does not require of any of us more than we have to give.

The essence of practical conduct is in the Golden Rule, and this is the focussing center of our lesson. "Whatever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them."

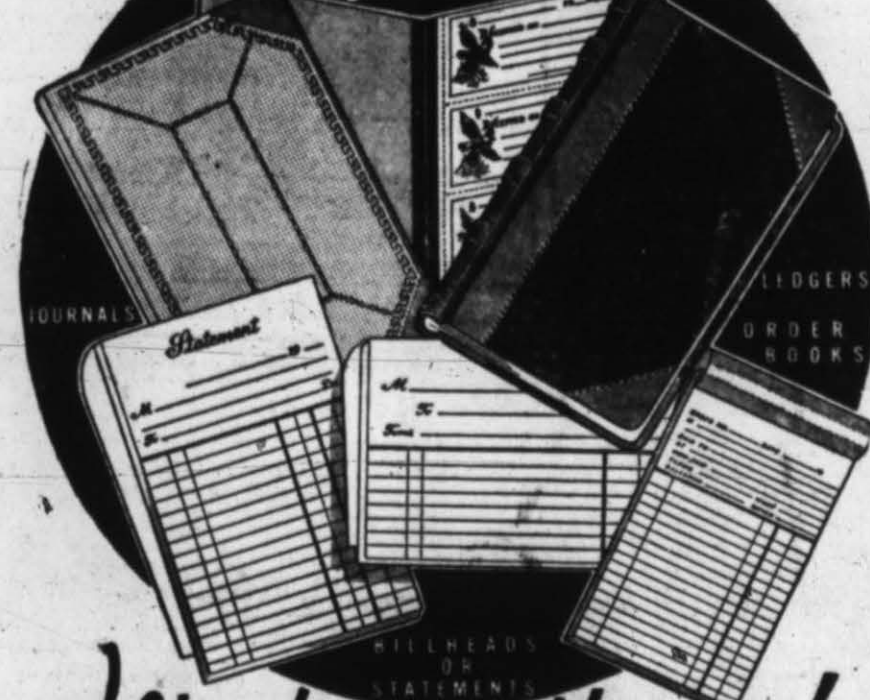

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### War Fund Goal Raised From Early Estimate

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The goal of the Red Cross War Fund campaign in March has been increased to \$200,000,000 from \$180,000,000 as a result of mounting demands for Red Cross services in the European and Pacific theaters of war, Chairman Basil O'Connor announced today after conferring with Colby M. Chester, national chairman of the campaign.

The decision to increase the goal has been telegraphed to the chapter following a meeting of the Red Cross central committee, governing body of the organization, O'Connor said.

"It is obvious that the estimates we made last fall for our War Fund campaign in March are now inadequate," O'Connor said. "Accordingly we have revised our goal to meet this new situation. I am confident the American public will respond generously to this emergency when the campaign opens on March 1."

### Texas Marine Fights Mourners For Jap Body

Tales of fighting Texans continue to come back from all fronts where Americans are battling the Nazis and Nips. One of the best is that of Sgt. W. C. Gray, the Texarkana, Texas, boy who had to fight his way through a whole crowd of Japs in order to bury a Nipponese general.

Gray was given the task of bringing in the body of a Jap general from a cave, where he had been killed, so that it might be given proper burial under the rules of war. When he got to the cave, however, he found a large group of Japanese mourners on hand.

With a couple of other Marines, Gray waded in. When the fight was over, seven more Nip officers were dead around the general's body. Sergeant Gray removed the body of the Jap general, delivered it to the burial detail and quietly reported "mission accomplished as ordered."

A Dallas pilot was one of several who celebrated the new year with plenty of noise, dropping bombs on Tokyo. He was Lt. Col. H. N. Brandon, who piloted a B-29 that bombed the Nipponese capital on New Year's eve night.

His mission helped a bit to repay the Japs for the tortures they inflicted on so many American prisoners. Lt. Roy Russell of Fort Worth and Lt. Harvey Denson of Granger are two of the few men who escaped from an enemy prison ship when it was torpedoed by a Yank sub in the South Pacific. Both are now patients at the army's great McCloskey General Hospital at Temple, recovering from effects of Japanese mistreatment.

Two other Texas fighting men who have written relatives recently from enemy prison camps are T-Sgt. Douglas Behrens of San Saba and Sgt. Cliff Jones of Lampasas. Both are in German prison camps, where they receive help sent by War Prisoners Aid, the National War

### SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

### Practicality Urged In Interpreting 'Turn Other Cheek'

The International Sunday School Lesson for Jan. 21  
Text: Matthew 4:23 to 6:18

THE text indicated for the study of this lesson takes in more than half of St. Matthew's report of the Sermon on the Mount. It includes the Beatitudes, and the Lord's Prayer, and the famous passage about loving one's enemies, turning the other cheek.

Men at the present time are in prison here in America, because they have taken the passage literally, and as applying in every time and circumstance.

My own contention is that we must interpret and practice the "caching of Jesus with the common sense and realism with which He gave and practiced it, if one takes too literally His teaching about non-resistance. let him read the 23rd chapter of Matthew, with its accusations against the "generation of vipers," and its pronouncement of woes against evil-doers and hypocrites. There one sees a grim picture of a fighting Christ, to be set alongside the "gentle Jesus, meek and mild."

The title of our lesson properly stresses "the standards of the Kingdom." What we must grasp is that in the Sermon on the Mount Jesus was expounding the principles of a Kingdom different in nature and purpose from the kingdoms of this world—a Kingdom in which love and unselfishness and helpfulness toward others was the rule of life, and not the business of getting all possible for one's self. Set that down as the basic law of the Kingdom, and you will see how naturally everything else follows—turning the other cheek, giving up your second coat, etc.

The ideal Kingdom is to be realized in a world that is far from it, and for each of us perhaps the most difficult thing is to determine how we can live in the world, and yet not be of the world, never losing sight of the goal and standards of the Kingdom, even in the inevitable adjustments of daily living in a world largely un-Christian.

### NEWS IN THE WORLD OF RELIGION BY W.W. REID

Dr. Harry B. Bardwell, missionary of the Methodist Church to Cuba, and founder and principal of Candler College, Havana, Cuba, has been awarded one of the highest civilian honors in the gift of Cuba—the National Order of Merit Carlos Manuel de Cespedes, with the rank of Knight. This award, made by Dr. Miguel Angel Campa, on behalf of the Ministry of State, is in recognition of Dr. Bardwell's thirty-five years of educational service to Cuba, including thirty years of association with Candler College. A native of Talbotton, Ga., Dr. Bardwell was educated at Emory University, and earned his Doctor of Pedagogy degree at Havana University.

From the Netherlands comes this comment, published by the underground paper "Katholiek Kompas", on the arrest of Catholic priests suspected of hiding firearms. "The Church has certainly arms but they are very different from what these authorities suppose. Guns and pistols are not to be found in our churches, for the weapons which the Catholic Church possesses are not hidden under the floor—Are Bibles and libraries perhaps also arms? Perhaps! In any case these gentlemen may be certain that we have in the Bible the best artillery and antitank weapons that are conceivable; that we have in the Catholic episcopate and in the Protestant synod strategic leaders who with the ordnance map of eternity in hand can survey every situation and can act efficiently, as has been shown; that the armies of Dutch Protestants and Catholics have an iron discipline in obedience to their spiritual leaders; and that we have in the God of Christendom a General on whom we can count for ever."

Dr. Conrad Bergendoff, president of Augustana College, Rock Island, Ill., contends that the emphasis in teaching Christianity to children has been too much on the intellectual side and that the emotional nature of the child has been neglected. The tendency, says Dr. Bergendoff, has been to teach children "about" religion instead of implanting its essence in their hearts. Too often, he adds, children derive their impression of Christianity from gloomy and unattractive Sunday School rooms in a church basement instead of from a beautiful and inspiring sanctuary.

In West China, on last year's World Day of Prayer, a refugee farmer prayed: "Now, Lord, this has been a hard harvest—to have had to scorch the good earth behind us. But ahead of us isn't there thy new farm? We travel toward it, trusting in thy sun and rain outside us, and thy big new spirit inside us." This year in China and fifty other countries, and in 10,000 communities of the United States, millions of Christians will join together on February 16 in this annual observance, sponsored by the United Council of Church Women. Programs, prepared by four British members of the Woman's World Day of Prayer Committee against a background of blitz and blackout, are developed around the theme, "That we should show forth the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light."

G. I. Doane Michie, of Caruthersville, Mo., wrote home from Rome, Italy: "At the Catacombs, the burial and meeting place of the early Christians, you get quite a peculiar feeling walking up the same steps Peter and Paul once walked, and looking at

some of the burial places of the early martyrs; standing in the dark, damp meeting places of the early Christians. Makes you wonder about most of its modern-day Christians who can't decide whether to spend Sunday in bed or in a fishing boat."

There are some 8,000 foreign students enrolled in the colleges and universities of the United States this year, despite the disruptions and changes in student life made by the war, according to the Committee on Friendly Relations Among Foreign Students, an organization maintained by the Protestant churches and mission agencies of this country. Because of the war, there has been a falling off in students from all Oriental countries, but the number has been about compensated for by the influx of students from South and Central America. Among the students are 2,241 from Latin America, 2,065 from Europe (many of them being refugees), 817 from Canada, 33 from Africa, 82 from Iceland (most of whom would in peace times have gone to Europe) 19 from Australia, 704 from China, 213 from elsewhere in Asia, 142 from Turkey. The Committee attempts to counsel them in personal and educational problems, and to relate them to normal American Christian life. It is expected by many that the post-war influx of foreign students will reach 20,000 per year.
