## AROUND ATown

Sights and Faces Seen

Low water pressure in the city could be a serious danger in case of a big fire, it was pointed out this week by Mayor E. S. Ireland, who requested citizens to stop all irrigation in case of a fire so that the pressure can be built up at times when it is vitally needed.

### Speaker Describes Adequate Airport As Vital to Hereford

After the war, a city without an airport will be in the same position as a town without a railroad is in today, it was pointed out yesterday by Judge Byron Singleton of Amarillo, executive vice-president of the Texas-New Mexico Airlines, who addressed the Hereford Lions Club.

Declaring that Hereford must have an airport if it is to continue to make progress, Judge Singleton recommended that such a project be sponsored by the city, as it would thus be eligible for State and Federal grants which would help greatly in the financing of adequate airport facilities.

First step toward an airport, the speaker said, would be to make contact with the Civil Aeronautics Authority and receive their report on needed facilities and their choice of an airport site.

That the task of winning and keeping the peace will fall on the shoulders of the youth of the world, especially the high school graduates was the idea presented last Friday night to the Hereford High School graduates at the commencement exercises by Mrs. J. W. Walker, speaker for the occasion. Mrs. Walker believes that the peace depends on attitudes of the people all over the world. Lonidene Martin Edmonson, valedictorian of the class of '45, impressed upon the minds of the graduates that it would be their task to preserve the democracy of our country. She expressed her appreciation for the background that the youth of America has had and gave several examples showing the ways that a good background is the safeguard of all the things important in the American way of life.

### Bond Issue Again Carries In Light Vote

With only about five percent of the qualified voters taking part in the election, but with an overwhelming majority favoring the proposed bond issue, Hereford property holders again endorsed the \$40,000 water and sewer improvement bond issue at the election held Monday. The vote was 51 to one.

The bonds carried in an earlier vote, which was held illegal because of a technicality in the wording of the proposal as submitted to voters.

Because of difficulty in getting materials, work on the improvements to the city water system is progressing slowly. Mayor E. S. Ireland reported this week. According to present plans, the new city well will be drilled in Evans Addition, between 10th and 11th Streets.

### Freight Rate Equalization Drive Started in Hereford Chamber of Com.

Winding up an investigation which it launched in July, 1939, the Interstate Commerce Commission Saturday ordered a complete overhaul of the present jigsaw "class" rate structure of the railroads, and pending this a sweeping ten percent reduction in all parts of the country except the East and the Far West, effective Aug. 30—thus bringing a result which (Continued on Page 12)

End result of the rate revisions will be a saving of hundreds of thousands of dollars to local farmers, who have been severely penalized by discriminatory freight rates; and it was this discrimination and the resulting loss of income to farmers, ranchers and businessmen which started the Hereford Chamber of Commerce on their campaign for rate revision nearly seven years ago. A brief, prepared by the local chamber and worked out by D. E. Alexander, then secretary, was incorporated, almost entirely in the brief prepared in October, 1938 by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce when it started its fight for rate revision; and the efforts of the West Texas Chamber, which got its idea from Hereford, have been important in bringing about the new rate reductions.

### Frye Died In Jap Prison Camp

Pfc. Walter A. Frye, who has been listed as missing in action since May 7, 1942 after the fall of the Philippines, died in a Japanese prison camp at an unknown date, according to news received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Adolph Frye of Dawn, on Friday.

Pvt. Frye, an infantryman, was 21 years old when he joined the Army on Feb. 26, 1941 and had been in the Philippines since June of that year. The last letter received by his parents was dated Feb. 15, 1942.

General Douglas MacArthur, in a letter of condolence to the Frys, praised the magnificent courage of the men of Bataan and Corregidor, stating that it was largely the sacrifices of these men which "gave us time to arm ourselves for our return to the Philippines and the final defeat of Japan. . . . Their names will be enshrined in our country's glory forever."

General MacArthur concluded: "In your son's death I have lost a gallant comrade and mourn with you." (Continued on Page 12)

### War Dept. Film Answers Questions on Post-V-E Day Set-Up in War

Urging that Americans attend the official army picture, "Two Down and One to Go," General George C. Marshall, chief of staff, points out that the picture is vital to our continued war effort and to a public understanding of the story of shifting of personnel from Europe to the Pacific and of the changing war picture.

The picture, which will show at the Texas Theatre in Hereford next Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, is General Marshall's report to the nation on the question, "Where do the boys go from here?"

### Williamson First Hereford Boy To Get Point Discharge

Howard Williamson, who has been in the Army for four and one-half years and overseas for 34 months, is the first Hereford man to be discharged on the point system.

Williamson, who has served in the Southwest Pacific, was last stationed in the Philippines before his return to the States. He called his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. V. Williamson, from San Antonio Saturday night to give them the news of his discharge and say that he would be home in a few days.

### \$100,000 Budget Set

The first year's budget for the Foundation has been set at \$100,000, and plans call for an experimental farm well-staffed with experienced farmers, chemists and laboratory workers who will carry out detailed tests of soils and foods in this territory. Feeding tests will be made with rats and guinea pigs and later with groups of people to obtain necessary facts, with the ultimate aim, according to Dr. Butler, of demonstrating that "children may be raised to maturity with both good teeth and good health."

Dr. Heard's original discovery, later confirmed by a two-year survey by the Dental Department of the Texas State Board of Health under the direction of Dr. Edward Taylor, early caught the interest of Dr. Butler, who for more than 20 years has worked with diet, vitamins and ultra-violet ray lamps to achieve a marked degree of success in arresting and controlling dental decay.

Because of the fact that Deaf Smith County people have a tooth decay rate only about one-tenth of that of the average (Continued on Page 12)

### Deaf Smith County Wheat Sells For \$21 a Bushel

Deaf Smith County wheat, advertised as "the best wheat in the world" is selling for 35 cents a pound in Miami, Fla., and an article in the Miami Herald for Sunday, May 13, describes the enterprise, "Health Food Shop," operated by Mrs. Nettie G. Allison, which is making big capital of the publicity received by Deaf Smith County high-mineral-content products.

Figured in terms of bushels, Deaf Smith County wheat is drawing the colossal price of \$21 a bushel in Miami, as compared to \$1.50 in Hereford.

The Health Food Shop, equipped with a mill in its display window, grinds the wheat while the customer waits, then sells the cracked cereal in one and two-pound packages. Mrs. Allison has been receiving weekly shipments of fresh-milled flour ground from Deaf Smith County wheat and has been selling whole-wheat bread for 35 cents a loaf, prior to starting the (Continued on Page 12)

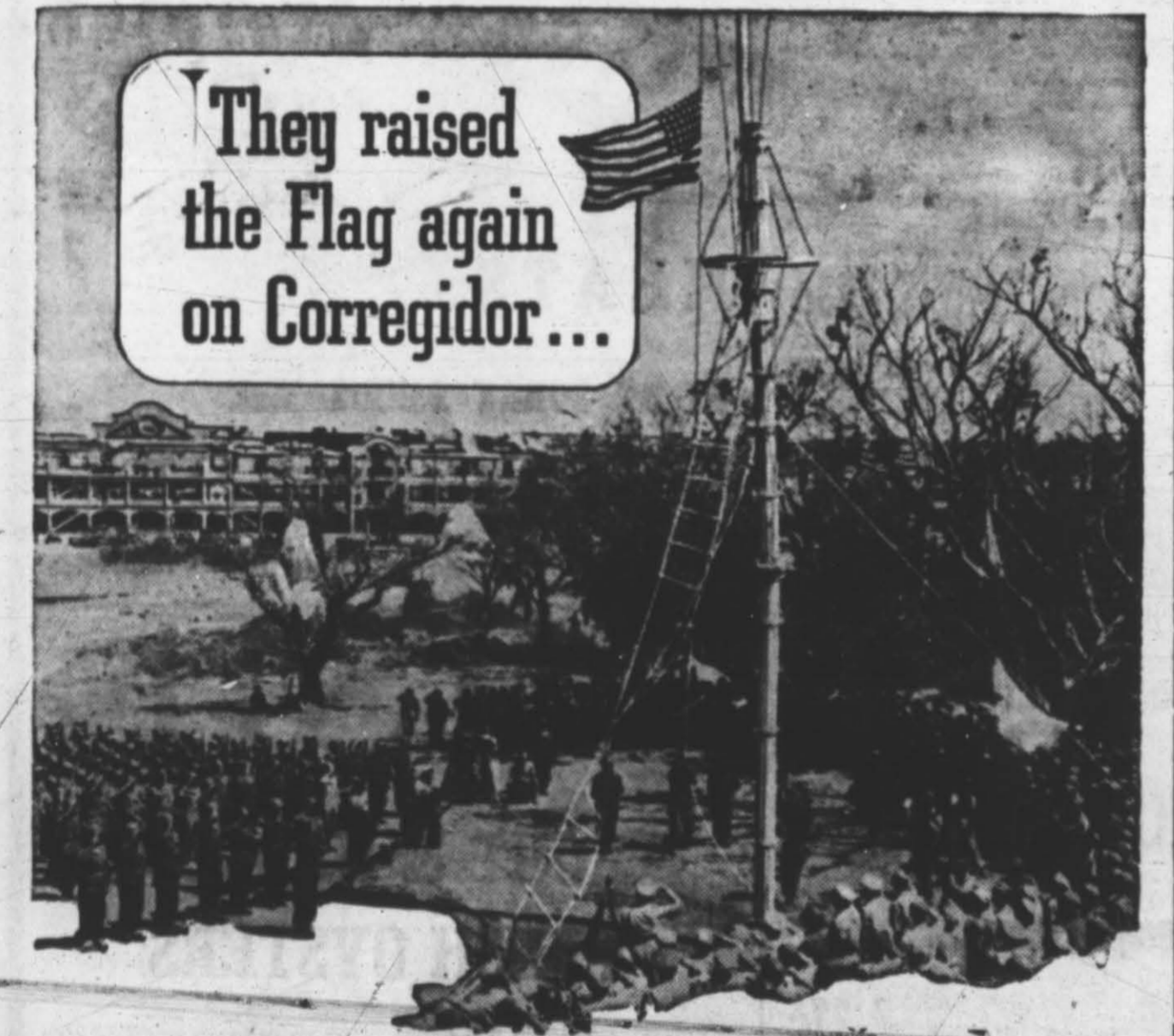

### LEGAL NOTICE

H. J. R. No. 13  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51a, 51b, 51c and 51d of Article III so that the same shall consist of one section to be known as Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such assistance; providing that the payments of such assistance from State funds shall never exceed either the payments from Federal funds or a total of more than Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication, and making an appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication, and holding the election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
 Section 1. That Sections 51a, 51b, 51c, and 51d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended and the same are hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter consist of one section to be numbered 51a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature, to provide for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum

payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over One (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal Funds; and, provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year."

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 25th day of August, 1945, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"For the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

"Against the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided

that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the Laws of the State of Texas.

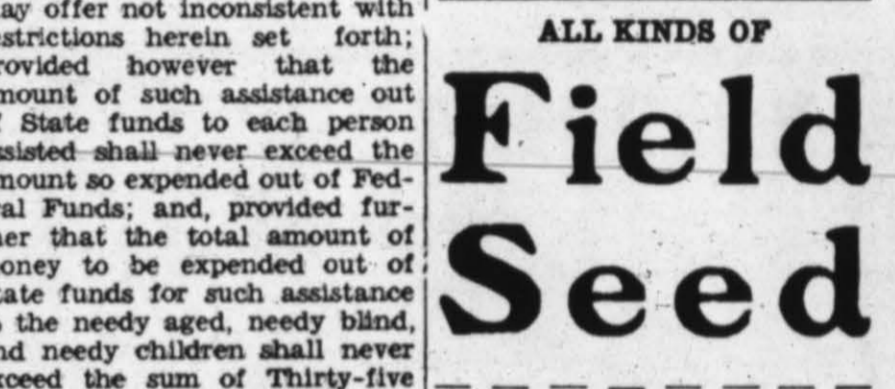

PROPOSING an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter; providing that members of the regular Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States shall not be permitted to vote; providing that other members of the armed forces shall be entitled to vote under certain conditions; providing the form of the ballot for voting on said proposed amendment; fixing the time for holding an election; directing the Governor to issue the nec-

essary proclamations; and making an appropriation.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. There shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas the matter of amending Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new section which will modify the present restrictions concerning voting. This new section shall be inserted between Section 2 and Section 3 of said Article VI, and shall be known as Section 2a, and shall read as follows:

"SECTION 2A. Nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to require any person, who at the time of the holding of an election hereinafter referred to is, or who, within eighteen months immediately prior to the time of holding any such election was, a member of the armed forces of the United States or of the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part of such armed forces or Armed Force Reserve, or the United States Maritime Service or the United States Merchant Marine, and who is otherwise a qualified voter under the laws

and Constitution of this state, to pay a poll tax or to hold a receipt for any poll tax assessed against him, as a condition precedent to his right to vote in any election held under the authority of the laws of this state, during the time the United States is engaged in fighting a war, or within one year after the close of the calendar year in which said war is terminated.

"PROVIDED, however, that the foregoing provisions of this section do not confer the right to vote upon any person who is a member of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps; and provided further, that all persons in the armed forces of the United States, or the component branches thereof, not members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps, are hereby declared not to be disqualified from voting by reason of any provision of subsection "Fifth" of Section 1, of this Article."

SEC. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state on August 25, 1945, at which

election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following:

"FOR the amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter."

THOSE OPPOSED to such amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

"AGAINST THE amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the

United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter."

SEC. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamations relating to the publication of the foregoing Resolution, in the various counties of the state, and shall cause the same to be published as required by the statutes and the Constitution in connection with the submission of proposed amendments to the Constitution, to the people for their action at a statewide election. If it shall appear from the returns of the election at which the foregoing amendment to the Constitution is voted upon that a majority of the qualified voters have voted for said amendment, same shall then become a part of the

Constitution of Texas.

SEC. 4. There is hereby appropriated out of the General Fund of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the expenses of advertising said Resolution in each county in the state and for such other purposes as may be necessary, or required by law, or by the Constitution.

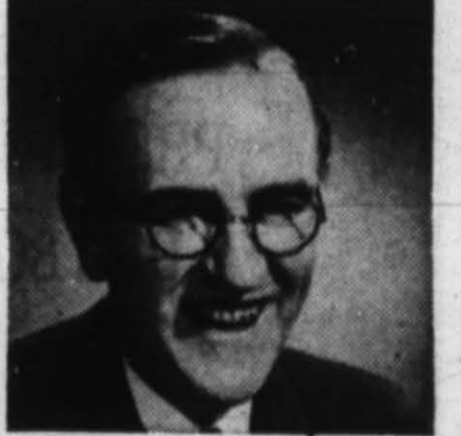

## LEGAL NOTICE

S. J. R. No. 8  
A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members; prescribing their qualifications; and providing for their election, tenure of office and compensation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"ARTICLE 5. SECTION 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; provided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court to hear argument of causes and to consider applications for writs of error or other preliminary matters. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of

thirty-five years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer, or a lawyer and judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by the qualified voters of the state at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified; and shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of any Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for state officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the state. The Justices of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Judges of the Commission of Appeals who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall become Associate Justices of the Supreme Court and each shall continue in office as such Associate Justice of the Supreme Court until January 1st next preceding the expiration of the term to which he has been ap-

pointed and until his successor shall be elected and qualified." SEC. 2. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1945, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members;" and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

SEC. 3 The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

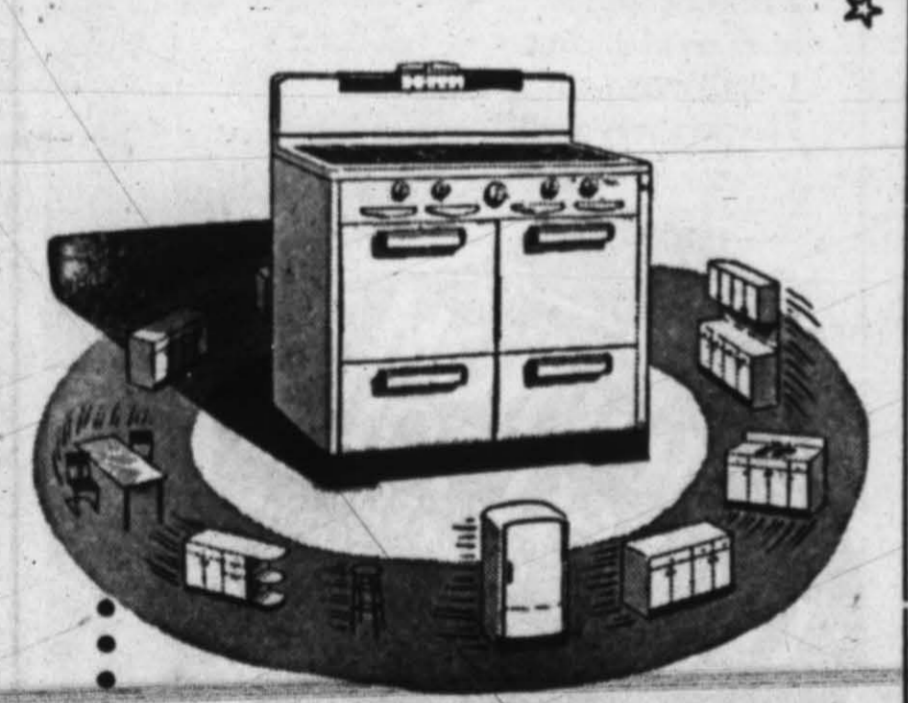

**Seek Food Formula**

When the factors responsible for this "immunity to decay" are discovered, the doctors hope to be able to perfect a concentrated food formula from food grown in the Hereford district that may be used anywhere to help in the battle against the age-old and most prevalent of human ailments—dental caries. It may also be possible later to find a way to introduce the "immunity factors" into other communities to bring about similar results.

**Non-Profit Organization**

The Foundation is set up as a non-profit organization to be financed by contributions and donations similar to other benevolent and philanthropic institutions, and the founders report that several large donations have already been received, making a good start toward the raising of the first year's budget.

### Beef Subsidy Program Under AAA Direction

Aimed at increasing the sale of good and choice cattle and at easing the severe meat shortage which has now become general throughout the nation, the War Food Administration this week announced a beef production payment which will be handled by local AAA offices in the same manner as the dairy subsidy program which has been in effect for some time.

According to instructions reaching the Deaf Smith County AAA office, the payment will be 50 cents per hundredweight, effective on sales beginning May 19 on good and choice cattle.

Regulations include the following points: (1) The cattle must have been owned and fed by the applicant for at least 30 days; (2) They must be sold to a licensed slaughterer; (3) Payment will be made only on cattle weighing 800 pounds live-weight or more; (4) Sale price must be at least the amount

listed for minimum stabilization range for good grade cattle. Cattlemen should start immediately to retain evidence of sales showing the above information in order to collect the subsidy payment.

The program should ease the price squeeze on cattle feeders, who say that there has not been enough range between ceiling prices for range cattle and the ceiling price allowed for finished cattle from the feeders pens.

### Hereford Boy in First Squad to Meet Russians

Pvt. C. E. Parlier, son of Mrs. Edna Cranford of Hereford, was a member of the first squad to make contact with the Russians on April 27. It was learned this week, when Mrs. Cranford received an official account of the historic meeting.

The two squads which made the original contact were members of the Third Battalion of the 60th Regiment "Go Devils," of the 9th Division.

According to the official report the Americans were "amazed with the appearance of the Russian soldiers. They were well-disciplined and from their actions one could see why they have made a name for the Soviet Army."

The American officer, Lieutenant Gronseth, came up and exchanged toasts and greetings, later arranging a meeting at which Pvt. Parlier's squad was privileged to be the guards. The Russians served a meal, which according to Pvt. Parlier's re-

port "lasted like a banquet" after the short field rations which the GI's had been getting.

The official report concluded: "Every one of us are proud that we had the honor of meeting the Russians for this famed 9th Division which has fought all the way from the beaches of Morocco to meet the gallant Reds in their drive from Stalingrad."

Pvt. Parlier has been in the service for four and one-half years, serving more than two years overseas before being returned to the States prior to his second overseas assignment. He holds the Purple Heart in addition to combat ribbons.
