Wheat Sells For

Deaf Smith County wheat, advertised as "the best wheat in the world" is selling for 35 cents a pound in Miami, Fla., and an article in the Mlami Herald for Sunday, May 13, describes the enterprise, "Health Food Shop," operated by Mrs. Nettle G. Allison, which is making big capital of the publicity received by Deaf Smith County high-mineral-content products.

Figured in terms of bushels, Deaf Smith County wheat is drawing the colossal price of \$21 a bushel in Miami, as compared to \$1.50 in Hereford.

The Health Food Shop, equipped with a mill in its display window, grinds the wheat while thecustomer waits, then sells the cracked cereal in one and two-pound packages. Mrs. Allison has been receiving weekly shipments of fresh-milled flour ground from Deaf Smith County wheat and has been selling whole-wheat bread for 35 cents a loaf, prior to starting the ce-(Continued on Page 12)

Beef Subsidy AAA Direction

Aimed at increasing the sale of good and choice cattle and at easing the severe meat shortage which has now become general throughout the nation, the War Food Administration this week announced a beef production payment which will be handled by local AAA offices in the same manner as the dairy subsidy program which has been in effect for some time.

According to instructions reaching the Deaf Smith County AAA office, the payment will be 50 cents per hundredweight, effective on sales beginning May 19 on good and choice cat-

Regulations include the following points: (1) The cattle must have been owned and fed by the applicant for at least 30 days; (2) They must be sold to a licensed slaughterer; (3) Payment will be made only on cattle weighing 800 pounds liveweight or more; (4) Sale price must be at least the amount




