Twenty members of the Hereford Chapter of the Order of Eastern Star attended the annual School of Instruction held in Amarillo Friday.

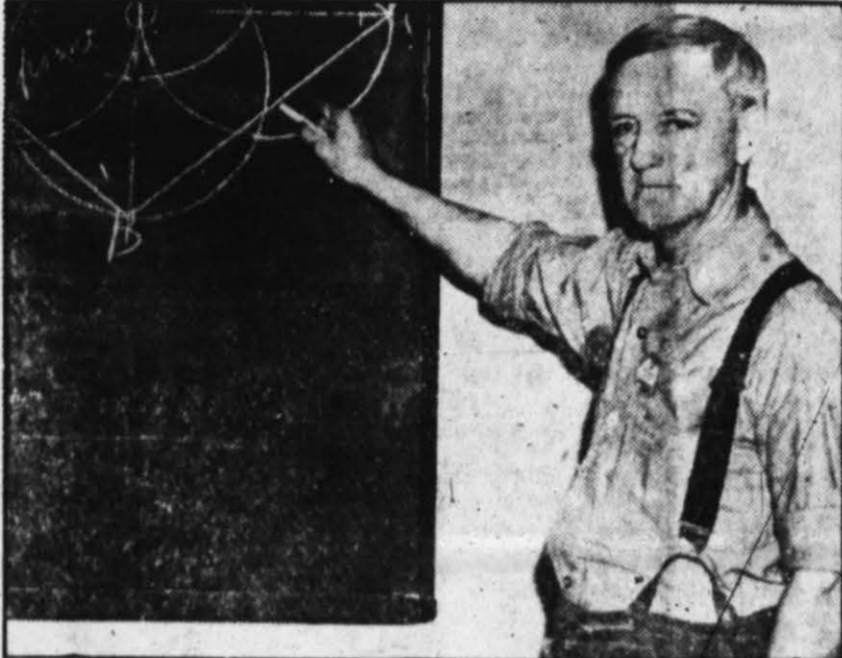

Meeting Monday To Discuss Processing Plant

Assurance of a market for a big commercial tomato crop in the Hereford territory next year was offered today by S. Leonard Wadler of New York who is in Hereford to get definite information on the prospect of locating a food processing plant here; and a meeting of interested farmers and businessmen has been called for Monday night at 9 o'clock at the courthouse, where full particulars of the plan will be presented.

With the backing of eastern capital, Mr. Wadler states that he is able to offer an assured market for 1,000 acres of tomatoes in this territory. Mr. Wadler states that he will contract to buy in Hereford, at ceiling prices and to process here, tomatoes grown in this area. While desiring an assurance of 1,000 acres of tomatoes, Mr. Wadler says that the plant can operate on a minimum of four to five hundred contracted acres.

Contracts will be drawn up by local attorneys, states Mr. Wadler, and he will put up a forfeit in case the contract should not be fulfilled. While backers of the project would like to get started this year, they do not actually anticipate putting in their plant until next year, but Mr. Wadler is eager to secure promise of definite (Continued on Page 12)

All Under-26 Farmers To Report for Physical

All 2-C registrants (agricultural workers) under 26 years of age, have been ordered to report for pre-induction physical examination within the near future, it was announced today by F. E. Givan of the Deaf Smith County selective service board, who says that the order is being made in compliance with instructions from state selective service headquarters.

The order does not necessarily mean that the men will be reclassified, Mr. Givan said, but since state headquarters has ordered pre-induction physicals for all farmers under 26 years of age, the local board is carrying out the order immediately in order that farmers can dispose of this matter before the beginning of harvest season.

Local Delegates Attend Chemurgy Meeting Today

Four local delegates will be included in the Hereford delegation which planned to attend the Southwest Chemurgy Clinic in Oklahoma City today and tomorrow.

Chemurgy is the rapidly-developing science of the increased use of agricultural and livestock products through chemistry; and national leaders of the industry will be present in Oklahoma City to get first hand information on the agricultural products and livestock of the southwest and possible new uses of these products in chemurgy.

Local delegates plan to show motion pictures showing agricultural operations in the Hereford area, and they will distribute copies of a recent Chamber of Commerce pamphlet describing the particular advantages enjoyed by this territory.

Hereford Benefit Ass'n. Chartered By State Insurance Commission

Having received their charter from the State Board of Insurance Commissioners, the Hereford Benefit Association is now authorized to operate as a mutual aid association in Deaf Smith and surrounding Texas counties, it was announced this week by officers of the association, who state that an active drive will now be underway to bring the association's membership up to its full authorized strength of 1,600.

A special called meeting of the directors was held recently to revise the constitution and by-laws and approval by the state board has been granted to the revised orders.

The beginning of the invasion will be announced by a series of short blasts on the fire whistle, according to Mayor Ireland's announcement.

On "D" Day all citizens of the community who desire are invited to attend a community prayer service from 8:30 to 9 o'clock p. m. at the First Christian Church. The ministers also announce that the Christian Church will be open every night except Wednesday and Sunday, from 7 to 9 o'clock, and any persons wishing to use this time for prayer and meditation are invited to come to the church.

Major Bill Cherry Buys Land in County

Major William T. Cherry, who piloted the famous Eddie Rickenbacker on the mission in which they were forced to make a crash landing in the Pacific, and then spent weeks afloat in rubber life rafts before rescue came, may be a Hereford resident in the post-war era.

At any rate, Major Cherry is already a Deaf Smith County landowner; for on Sunday he completed arrangements for the purchase of the Grady Hightower quarter, four miles southeast of Hereford.

Changes Made In Sugar Application Set-Up

Changes affecting procurement of sugar for home canning were announced today by the Foods Division of the District Office of Price Administration.

Two periods have been designated during which consumers may apply for canning sugar. The first issuance will be from May 15 to July 1, and the issuance for this period will not be over 10 pounds per person. The second period will be announced later.

This change in procedure is in line with the request made earlier that consumers not apply for home canning sugar until some home grown fruit was available in this territory.

Rationing officials also point out that spare stamp No. 37 in Book IV is good for identification only and is not valid for ration payment for sugar. When application is made for canning sugar this spare stamp (No. 37) is to be taken from the ration book of each person for whom application is made and attached to the application when it is sent to the board.

Because so many persons have tried to use sugar stamp 37 instead of spare stamp 37, sugar stamp 37 has been cancelled and will have no ration value in the future.

SHOES—Stamp No. 15 in book 1 good thru Apr. 26, and Stamp No. 1 on airplane sheet of book 3 is good indefinitely. Airplane Stamp 2 will be valid May 1.

Blue 16-point stamps A8, thru Q8, valid indefinitely.
MEATS AND FATS
Red 16-point stamps A8, thru T8, good indefinitely.

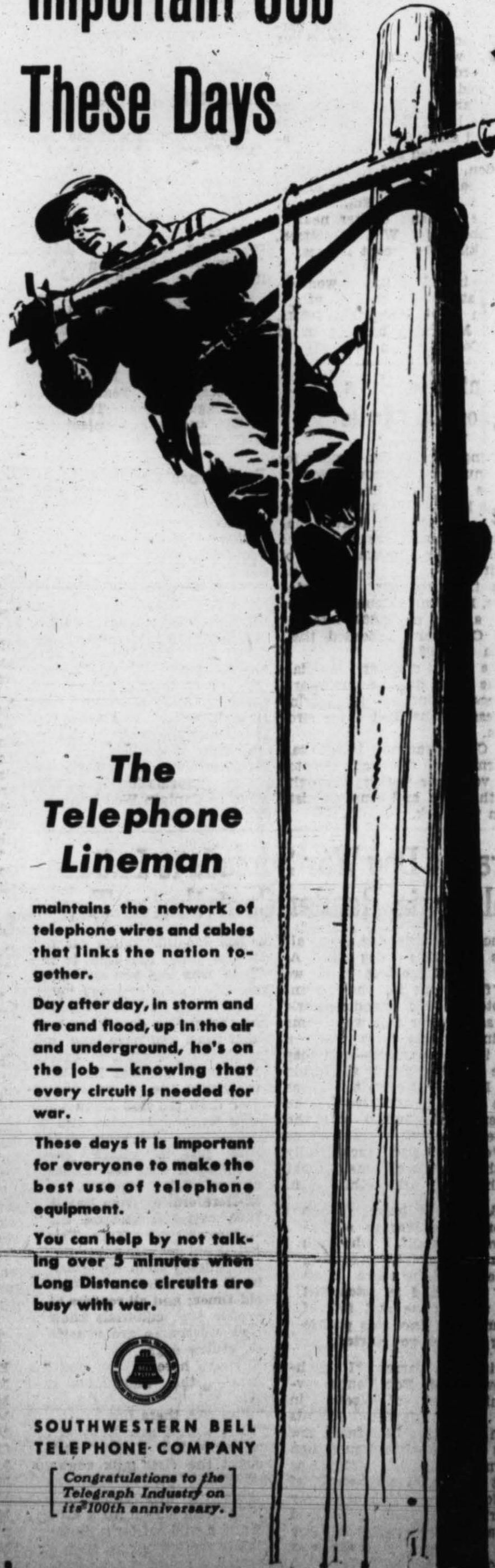

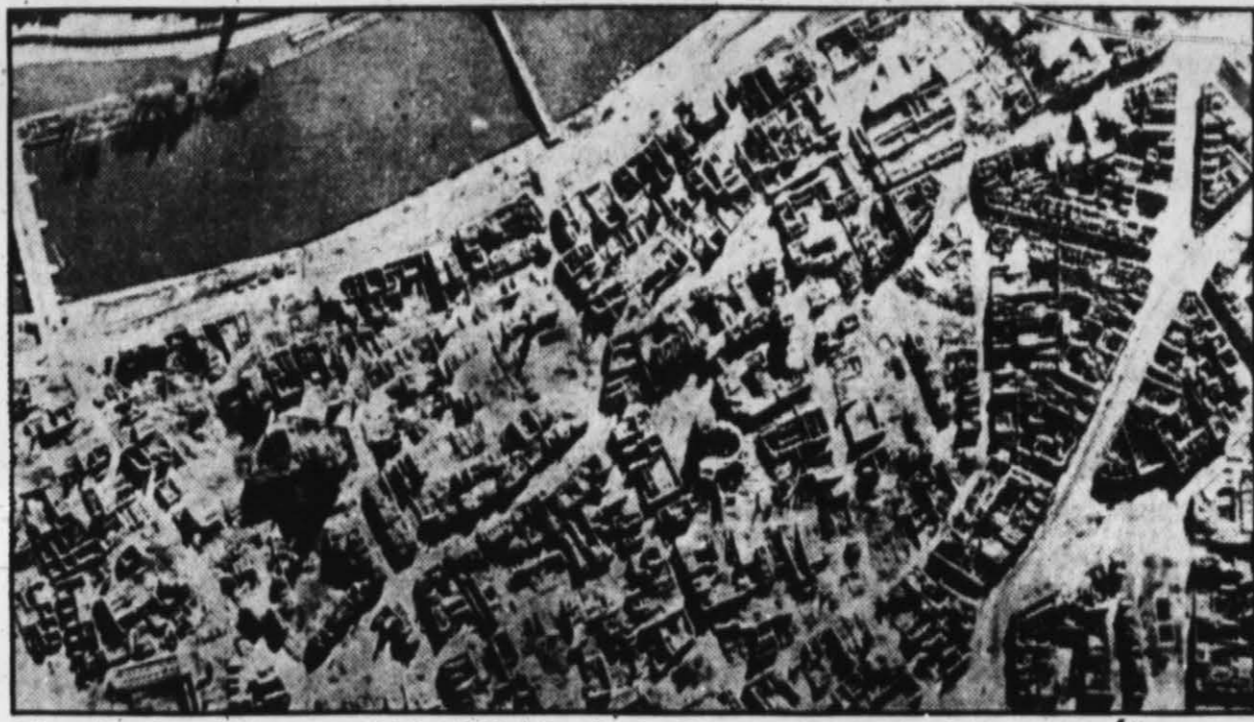

CHDA Lists Instructions For Pineapple Canning

The high point value on most canned fruits has convinced many housewives of the desirability of doing more home canning of fruits this year. It is pointed out by Miss Sadie Lee Oliver, county home demonstration agent, who says that fresh pineapple will soon be available for canning and gives the following instructions for preparing and canning the fruit.

Select ripe orange-colored fruit from which spines may be pulled out readily. Cut off stem end and twist out top. Wash with brush in running water. Cut one-half inch slices. Peel each slice. Remove core and

eyes. Cook core and trimmings with water, and strain and make syrup with this juice. Pre-cook from 5 to 8 minutes. If the pineapple is packed in quarts or pints, process in water bath for 20 minutes, in half-gallons 25 minutes, or No. 2 and 3 plain tin cans, 15 minutes.

For altitude over 1000 feet the time of processing should be increased four minutes for each 1,000 feet above sea level. The altitude at Hereford is almost 4,000 feet.

One cup of syrup usually covers one quart of fruit when it is well-packed. White corn syrup may be substituted for all or part of the sugar; and a light syrup may be made by mixing one-half to one-third cup of

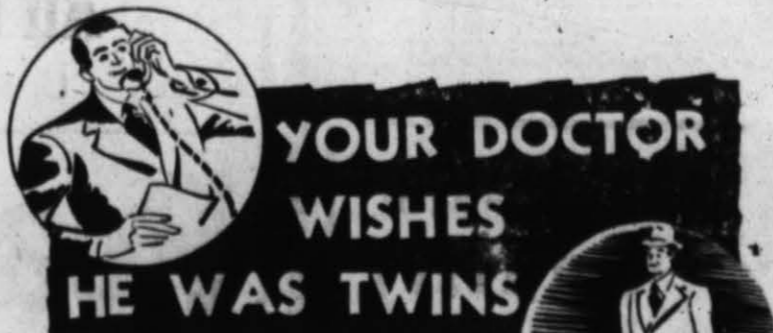

Band Plays Final Concert of Year Friday

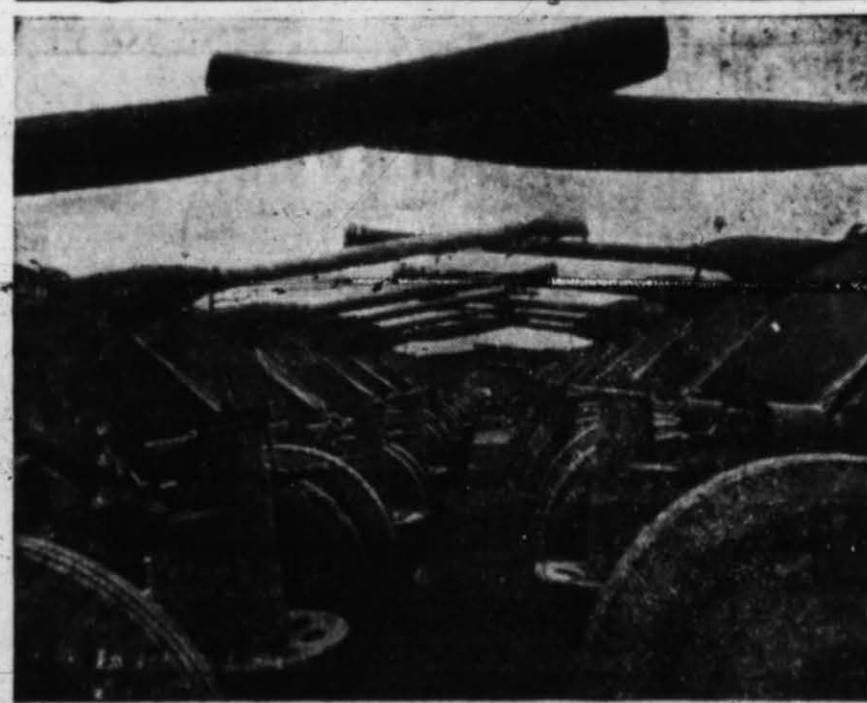

That constitutes the first admission by the British that they themselves actually have dirty linen.

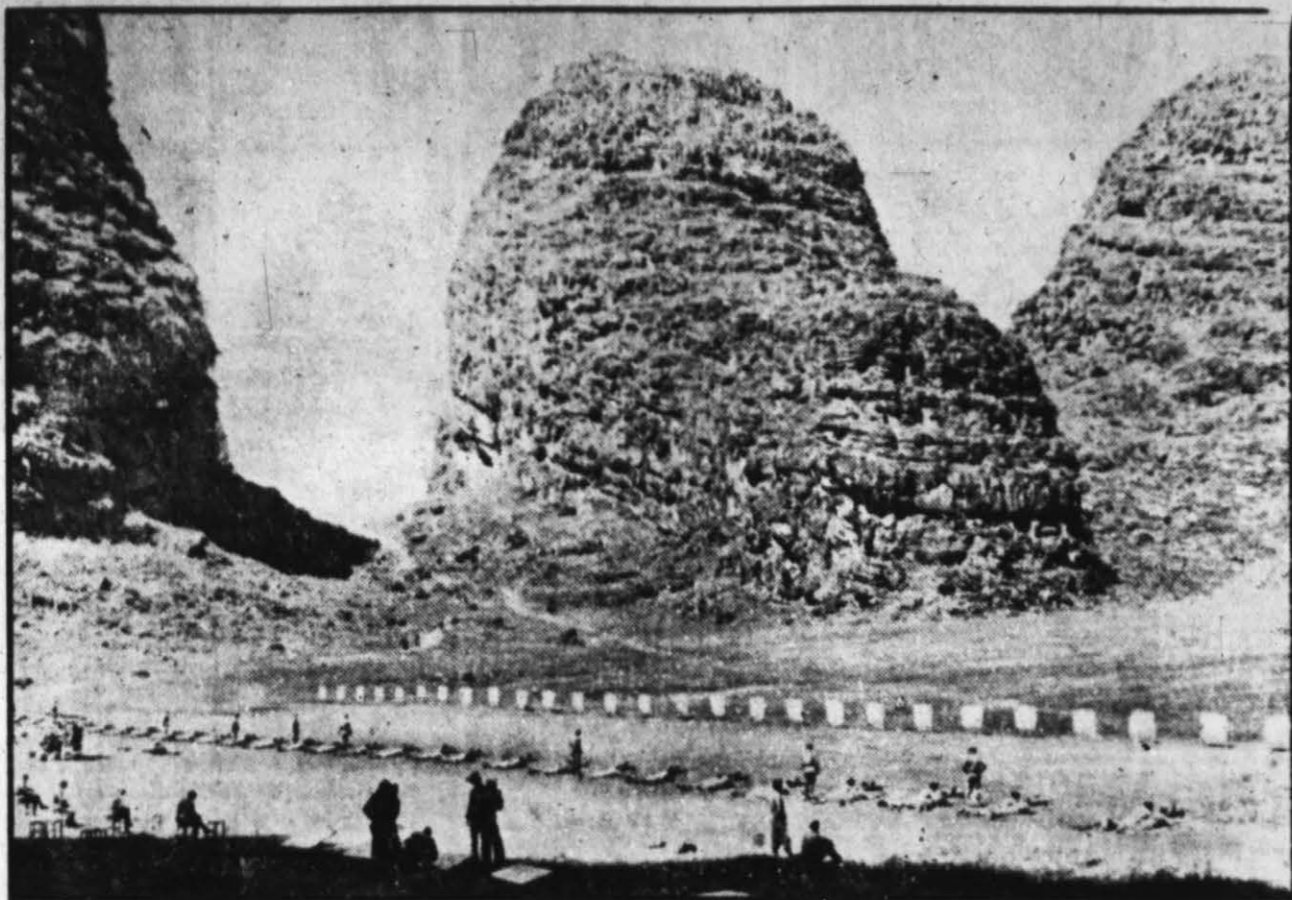
Clothing manufacturers report a black market in work clothes. Apparently the overall price does not cover all.

Describes Italian Scene

Pfc. Allen G. Plummer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Plummer, writes a description of scenes somewhere in Italy, where he says spring is showing promise of a good summer not far away.

"Outside the camp area," Plummer writes, "a bunch of kids are playing and as it is near sundown their yells and speech in general sound much like a bunch of kids in the states who have had a big day, and their voices sound good in the night air . . . as if a war had never been. It is true that their living conditions are pretty low . . . but they have had a poor living standard for years. Very likely northern Italy is more modern, and the people have suffered more from the war."

"Everyone lives in town and drives a cart and donkey to work each morning. Early in the morning and late in the evenings I have seen the roads lined mile after mile with these people going to or coming from their work. Their equipment is ancient and crude, usually consisting of a hoe and a hooked knife. . . No evidence that they have ever had 'anything better.'"

Pvt. Plummer concludes that there is no big in Southern Italy that he would ever care to see again and is hoping that he won't have to stay around much longer.
