Block Ice Goes Thru Hot Fire: Half Remains!

You can hear of lots of things that are "durable," but how about a chunk of that went through the hottest kind of a fire, with the refrigerator burned completely away from it, and still retains nearly half of its original weight?

That's no fairy story. It actually happened in Hereford, and the remaining ice is still preserved in the vaults of the Texas Utility Company as a curiosity.

On July 8 fire completely destroyed the house occupied by P. C. Anderson, telephone lineman here, together with all its contents. There just simply wasn't anything left. With one exception. After the blaze died away there was a chunk of ice, sitting the area where the kitchen used to be, visible for a hundred yards.

The Texas Utility men rescued the ice and are preserving it. It originally was a fifty-pound order, placed in the box only a short titme before the fire. There was nearly half of it left after one of the flercest conflagrations ever witnessed here.

The fact that aforesaid work has progresseed to such an extent that it is now advisable to make immediate arrangements for the hearing required by law creates an emergency and imperative public necessity that the rule requiring ordinances to be read at three several meetings be suspended, and that this ordinance take effect from and after its passage, and it is so ordained.

All ordinances or resolutions, or parts of ordinances or resolu tions in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed in so far as they are in conflict herewith, but no further.
