## Delayed Christmas Weather In Territory Brings Snow, Cold

### War On Paralysis A Big Part of The Home Front Battle

Organizing to wage war on the home front against the dread disease, infantile paralysis, is a Texas-wide effort which will culminate January 30th, in the celebration of President Roosevelt's 61st birthday. The celebration this year will extend to every County in the State, according to W. L. Clayton, Houston, President Roosevelt's deputy Federal Farm Loan Administrator, who has established offices in the Cotton Exchange Building, Dallas, for the purposes of conducting the fund raising campaign. Again, George Warvelley Briggs, Dallas banker, as vice chairman, will direct the campaign.

On the staff of the Texas State Committee for the celebration of the President's birthday, in addition to Clayton and Briggs, is Mrs. George H. Pittman, vice chairman, in charge of women's activities; W. Marion Newman, secretary; John E. Owens, treasurer and Frank N. Watson, director of publicity. State offices have been established at 221 Cotton Exchange Building.

Already polio (infantile paralysis) is striking in numerous localities throughout the Southwest and drastic steps are now being taken and will continue to be taken to prevent further spread of the crippling and maiming disease. Funds raised in Texas will be divided between the authorized polio agencies within the State and the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. As in previous years, the campaign and celebration is extended to every state, territory and possession of the Nation.

A slightly delayed White Christmas and the first real blizzard of the winter marked the Christmas weather celebration in Hereford last week-end as cloudy skies brought driving snow and low temperatures on Saturday and Sunday.

Snow, which began falling Saturday, was drifted by a hard north wind and some east-west roads were reported still impassable early this week. Because of the drifts, the snow did not bring much beneficial moisture to fields and the cold brought loss of livestock in some communities, it was reported.

Temperature reached a low of 26 degrees on Saturday with a high of 40 degrees. On Sunday, the low was 14 degrees and a high of 32 degrees. The storm did greater damage below the caprock where the fall was heavier and drifts made many highways impassable on Sunday and Monday, with bus traffic to Oklahoma City and Denver stopped for the two days and some damage reported to telephone and telegraph lines by the high winds.

Skies cleared Sunday and by Monday the temperature had begun to climb out of the freezing bracket.

## May Hold Spare For Farm Trailers And Similar Equipment

Stating that many inquiries have been received at his office regarding the status of spare tires for trailers in the ruling on the number of tires which passenger car owners may have, County Agent A. R. Bateman this week announced a ruling that extra tires held by a farmer as spares for a farm trailer or other equipment are exempt from the restrictions against issuing gasoline rations to passenger cars for which there are more than five tires.

However, only one spare can be held for each piece of equipment, according to the ruling, and the county war price and rationing board must judge whether the spares for such equipment are really necessary.

## Vital Statistics Of County Show 118 Births In '42

Deaf Smith County is "out in front" so far as vital statistics for 1942 are concerned with births for the year totaling 118 as compared with 28 deaths.

Marriages also far outweigh the number of divorces granted during the year with records at the county clerk's office showing 47 marriage licenses granted and only nine divorces. The divorce calendar in district court was the lightest on record in several years, according to County Clerk Bob Thompson.

Statistics reveal that, contrary to tradition, June is not the month of brides, at least not in Deaf Smith County, where December and March, with a total of six marriage licenses each, topped the four licenses issued in June.

Both marriages and births are up from 1941 and the death total took a decided downward curve during the past year.

## Soy Beans Are Likely War Crop In This Region

With peanuts and soy beans at the head of the list of farm crops designated as warcrops for Texas, extension service and AAA officials now anticipate a big jump in soy bean acreage in Deaf Smith County next year. Soil here is not well suited to the cultivation of peanuts, but the growth of soy beans in 1942 showed the climate and soil well adapted to cultivation of this warcrop.

Other warcrops which can be grown in the Hereford territory are tomatoes for canning, peas for tanning and dry edible beans. Other crops may be designated warcrops later, N. E. Gass of the county AAA committee said.

Production goals for these warcrops will be set up for individual farms. Failure to reach at least 90 per cent of goals will result in deductions from AAA production adjustment (commodity) payments at the rate of \$15 for each acre by which the warcrop goal for the farm is not reached.

Although the AAA requires that at least 90 per cent of the allotments of basic crops (cotton, wheat, rice and peanuts) be planted for the farm to earn full production payments, either warcrops or essential crops over and above normal acreage may be substituted acre for acre for the basic crops to earn the payments. The full list of essential crops has not been announced but it will include corn, oats, grain sorghums, barley and other crops.

Rates of payments, based on normal yield of allotted acres, include cotton, 1.1 cents per pound, and wheat, 9.2 cents per bushel.

In addition to the crop production adjustment payments, farmers will also be able to earn a production practice payment by carrying out specified agricultural practices which improve soil, help prevent erosion and increase yields of needed war crops.

## Farm Plans For 1943 Considered By Local Leaders At Amarillo Agricultural Meeting

N. E. Gass, Joe Ellis, A. R. Bateman, Billy Clutter, George B. Muse, T. L. Sparkman, L. A. Hudson, Paul Mathers and Jeff Gilbreath attended a meeting of War Board Committeemen and representatives of various farm agencies in Amarillo Tuesday and Wednesday to map plans for 1943 war production in agriculture in the Panhandle district.

At the meeting discussions were held on means of contacting every farmer in the territory to get information for an accurate report on planned production of war crops and livestock for the coming year. The proposed farm mobilization will also reveal probable needs in the form of new machinery and other equipment as well as manpower needs on the farm.

The check-up of all farms in the county is scheduled to be complete by Jan. 31, Joe Ellis of the AAA stated this week, adding that the reports from all farms in the nation are supposed to have a direct bearing on machinery production and the allocating of manpower for the next year.

January 12 has been proclaimed national Farm Mobilization Day by President Roosevelt with community meetings scheduled to lay plans for the 1943 production program. New national plans, farm leaders state, recognize the fact that food is just as essential to the war effort as are munitions, and some policies may be changed to insure better cooperation of government and industry with the effort to increase production of badly needed crops and livestock.

## Point Rationing, Scheduled for Early Enforcement, Unlike Coupon System

Point rationing which will begin some time after the first of the year, will not replace straight coupon rationing of sugar, gasoline and coffee, it was emphasized this week by district OPA managers, who state that a new war rationing book will be issued sometime after the first of the year. The new book will be used to secure goods under a "new point" system, with rationed items to include: dried foods, canned fruits and vegetables and other items as they become scarce, according to radio speeches made Sunday night by Food Director Claude Office of War Information.

Coupon Values Vary  
There are three chief differences between point rationing and coupon rationing which is in effect for sugar and coffee. The first important difference is that under straight coupon rationing one coupon entitles the consumer to buy a specific amount of a single commodity—one sugar coupon, for instance, entitling him to buy three pounds of sugar—while in point rationing, one set of coupons covers a whole group of commodities. For instance, a week's meat ration coupons would enable a person to choose his rations between pork, beef, lamb or mutton.

The second difference is that coupons in point rationing are of different denominations. Those to be spent in one week, for example, will include a one-point coupon, a two-point coupon, a five-point coupon and an eight-point coupon.

The third chief difference is that the various items will have different point values. For example, tenderloin steak, being relatively scarce, might have a high point value and require a larger number of coupons, while hamburger, being available in greater quantities, would have a lower value. Thus, in exchange for one ration coupon worth eight points, the housewife might be able to obtain one pound of tenderloin steak or four pounds of hamburger. Those point values serve only for illustration as point values have not yet been set and will vary from time to time as supplies of particular items increase or decrease.

Must Have Book 1  
War Ration Book Two, will contain four pages of blue stamps and four pages of red stamps. Each page will contain 24 stamps, lettered and numbered, the letters running from A to Z. The numbers will be 8, 5, 2 or 1. The number will designate the value of the stamp in points and will indicate the period in which it may be used.

Possession of War Ration Book One (The Sugar Book) will be necessary to obtain War Ration Book Two. Local ration board officials urge that everyone who has not already done so register promptly for book one to insure getting book two. The final date for obtaining book one was recently postponed to Jan. 15. Weather conditions, transportation problems and heavy work loads at local board offices contributed to the difficulty of completing registration by Dec. 15, the deadline originally set.

Stony Comer, in charge of the new service, states that deliveries will be made each afternoon except Sunday, starting at about one o'clock from the Cream O' Plains Dairy barns and orders should not be phoned in after 1 p. m.

The regular price of 12 cents per quart for pasteurized milk will continue and a monthly charge of 35 cents for delivery service will be made.

# Impact of War on Smalltown Life Big Local News Story of 1942

The "hottest" city election campaign in ten years, the decidedly lukewarm interest in state and county politics, the remarkable rise of the Hereford Whitefaces to a regional football title, the construction of a \$3,000,000 government project near Hereford—any one of these in an ordinary year would have been sufficiently newsworthy to be deemed the local story of the year. In 1942 the big news of the year was in no one story—it was in the many ways in which America's entry into war affected the lives of ordinary people. And the story of how the war came to Hereford could be told in almost every small town in America.

"And watch it get done." As the year wore on, we delivered on a lot of those good intentions. We bought bonds, going over the quota nearly every month in the year. We delivered one of the best scrap collection records in the state. With the co-operation of Nations we produced one of the best harvests in years, with the result that storage space became a big problem of the 1942 wheat harvest. Like the rest of America, we were unhappy about gas rationing, raising the question of whether all that talk of eager sacrifices was really sincere. And some of us, unfortunately, indulged in a little chitchat on rationing regulations of all sorts, obviously under the impression that the highest purpose of an American is to take care of himself first. But in January, 1942, there

were still many young men on the streets of Hereford. By December, almost any young man seen in the county was likely to be wearing his country's uniform and just home on a brief furlough. And to get the real effect of war, and to find the people who are really willing to sacrifice that it may never happen again, one had to talk to those parents who have already received the impersonal war department announcements—"Missing in Action" or "Killed in line of duty." Some of those messages had been received in Deaf Smith County. Perhaps 1943 will see more of them as the war gets closer home, and the year 1942 may look like the year in which we did, in truth, wade just ankle deep in war.

### Let's Cook Something

**LADY BALTIMORE CAKE**

3 cups sifted flour  
 3 teaspoons baking powder  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 cup Crisco  
 1 cup sugar  
 1 cup white Karo  
 3-4 cup milk  
 1/2 cup water  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 3 drops almond flavoring  
 3 egg whites beaten stiff but not dry

Sift flour, measure and add baking powder and salt and three times. Cream shortening, add sugar gradually. Then add Karo. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with the milk at water beating until smooth after each addition. Add flavoring and fold in egg whites. Bake in moderate oven until it shrinks from sides of pan. Do not overbake.

**Lady Baltimore Cake Icing**

2 egg whites  
 1 cup white Karo  
 Pinch of salt  
 A few drops vanilla

Beat in electric mixer until very stiff and will hold shape. Spread evenly on cake and sprinkle with shredded coconut.
