Post-War Plans Discussed for Club

Continuing a group of three programs on "Post-War Planning," Bay View Study Club heard four discussions of current topics at the meeting held Thursday afternoon.

Tire Firms to Be Checked by OPA

Tire and tire repairing firms will be visited during the period from Apr. 11 to 20 by volunteer workers of local War Price and Rationing Boards who will check dealers' prices for tires and services and inspect their records and postings the District Office of Price Administration has announced.

This is part of a nationwide compliance survey which has three major objectives: to determine the degree of compliance with regulations, to explain

and clarify requirements for dealers, and to correct any instances of non-compliance.

The volunteer assistants will check to see that the seller's selling prices are posted in his shop, that he is giving sales slips to each purchaser, and that he is keeping records of each sale. They will also check the prices he charged on the last few scales of specific items, from his records.

Dealers who are found in violation of any requirement will be asked to come in for a compliance conference with the price panel of their local board. Those who are selling above ceiling price will be asked to make refunds to buyers who

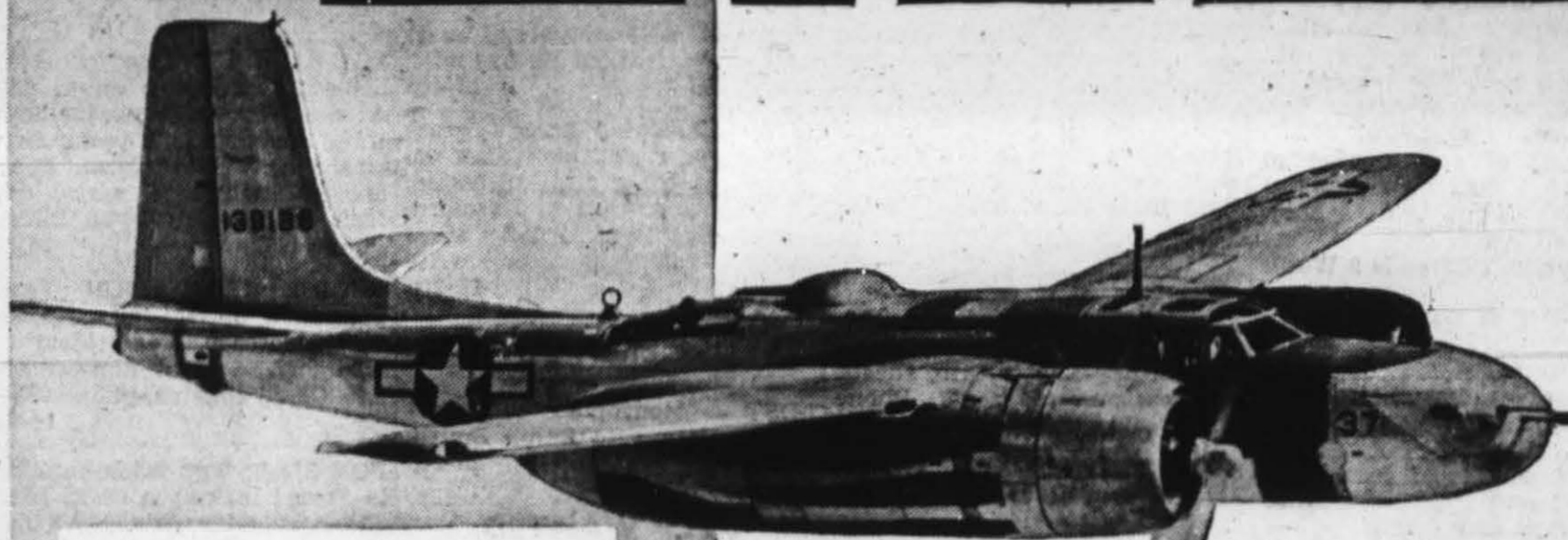

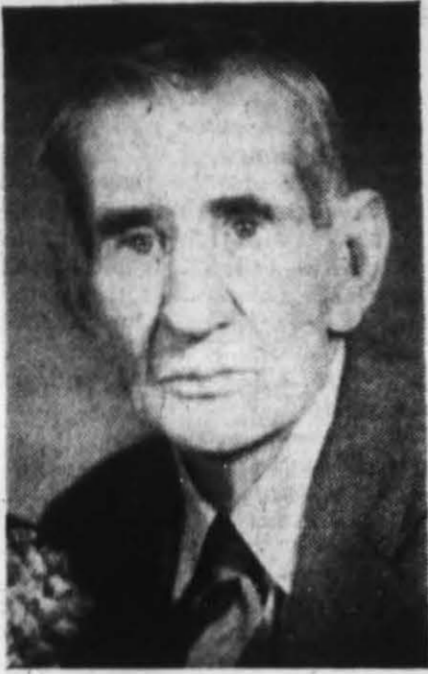

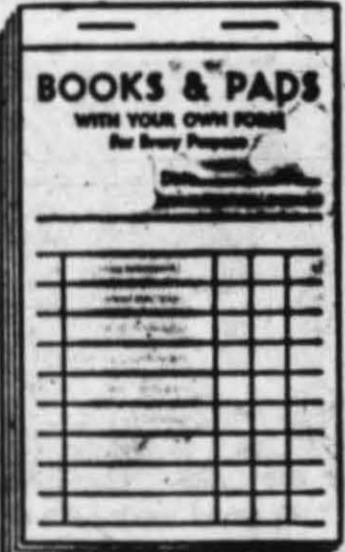

Telephone high lights of 1944
 Our annual report, issued in March, showed 1944 was a busy year. There were more long distance calls than ever before, including thousands of war calls to rush through each day for the army, the navy, and the scores of war industries in our territory.
 The demand for telephones was heavy. Service qualifying as essential under government requirements was installed promptly. Other new telephones were installed where instruments, lines, and central office equipment were available.

office. Precautions listed by ration clerks are as follows:

Be sure to attach a spare stamp 13 for each person listed on the application.

Be sure to answer all questions; then sign the application and mail to your own local rationing board.

Not more than one application per person can be made and not more than two applications for each family unit. For example, if there are six persons in the family and you wish to apply for only half of the sugar due you, make application now for three members of the family and attach three spare stamps from their ration books. Then, later if and when you need the remainder of the sugar, apply for the ration for the other three members of the family.
