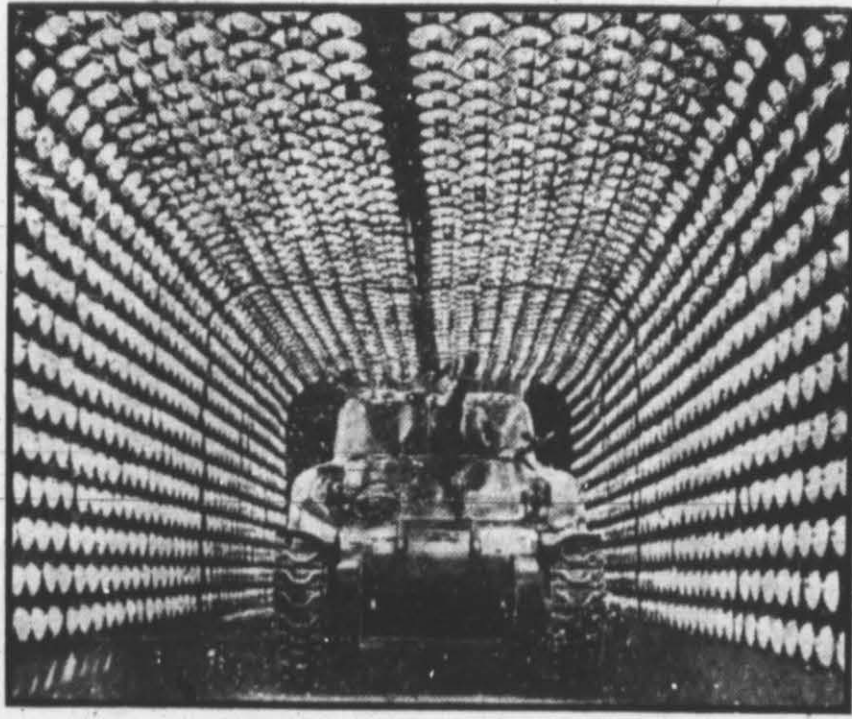
No War Department message has been received and the information received by Mrs. Gaetz gave no details as to the extent of Donald's injuries.

Feb. 15 Deadline for Sudan Harvest Under Govt. Payment Plans

Band Concert To Benefit Polio Victims

As part of the Hereford program in support of the fight against infantile paralysis, the Hereford High School Band will give a concert tonight at 8 o'clock at the high school auditorium, and the public is urged to attend and to make donations to the crippled children's fund. No admission to the concert will be charged, but every person attending will be given an opportunity to make a donation. All the money raised will be sent directly to the treasurer of the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation for Crippled Children, an institution which has helped hundreds of crippled children to learn to walk again. Texas schools have a goal of one million dollars in this campaign and the Hereford music department hopes to turn in an outstanding report.

Ralph Smith, high school band director, states that the local program will consist of both popular and classical numbers and various members of the band will be featured in solo parts.

Stepped-up War Needs Force Cut In Construction

Because of the manpower needs of the war program in this area, in addition to the restriction of critical building materials, construction projects not related to the war have practically no chance of being approved in the near future, according to C. A. Stoldt, district manager of the War Production Board. The WPB announcement was received this week by the Hereford Chamber of Commerce, which presents the information to local citizens as an explanation of WPB policy on civilian building projects.

This WPB district, which takes in the western half of Oklahoma and all of the Texas Panhandle is "one of the hottest spots in the country" in the present production offensive for additional high octane gasoline, carbon black and ordnance facilities; and in the last two weeks alone, additional war construction valued at more than \$15,000,000 has been approved for the district. As a result of this, it has become necessary for the Manpower Commission to tighten its control in this area. And because additional war construction has been approved, it has been necessary to turn down applications for a large amount of civilian construction.

The press release contains no information on the status of civilian projects already granted WPB approval, but it is presumed that completion of these projects will be allowed.

Cagle Accepts Pastorate of Baptist Church

Rev. R. H. Cagle of Dallas has accepted the pastorate of the First Baptist Church of Hereford and is expected to arrive here in time to hold regular services on the first Sunday in February.

Rev. Cagle, who now serves as pastor of the Ervay Street Church in Dallas, preached in Hereford on Jan. 7 and has already met many members of the local church.

The new pastor was reared in Wellington and received his theological training at Southwestern Baptist Seminary at Fort-Worth.

Attempted Robbery At S. Hereford Home

Sheriff J. O. Newell this week is looking for the two men who entered the home of William Manuel in East Hereford about three o'clock Monday morning and held Manuel at the point of a gun while they searched the house for money. No money was taken and Manuel himself was not harmed, but the would-be burglars hit Mrs. Manuel over the head with a six shooter when she attempted to interfere with their activities.

According to Manuel's report, he was awakened at about three o'clock by two men at the door. The men called Manuel by name and shouted something about seeing his brother at Littlefield. When he opened the door one of the intruders stuck a gun in his stomach and ordered him into the corner while they searched for his money; and when Mrs. Manuel entered the room and attacked the burglars they hit her over the head with a gun and fired one shot, which lodged in the wall, doing no damage.

In the excitement, Manuel made a break for the door and rushed to the home of a neighbor, Pat Wederbrook; and by the time Wederbrook and Manuel returned, the burglars were gone.

WHEREAS, in serving the men and women of the armed forces, the three great religious faiths of our American people, working together through USO, have provided a stirring example of Democracy, now

THEREFORE, I, E. S. IRELAND, do hereby declare the Fourth Anniversary of USO to be a day of public observance, and do invite all citizens of Hereford to visit USO centers on February 2-3 to take part in such ceremonies signifying the occasion.

Pfc. Whitaker Listed Missing Since Jan. 2nd

Pfc. Clyde Whitaker, 24, has been reported missing in Belgium since Jan. 2, according to a message received here Saturday by his wife, the former Miss Mary Ann Thompson.

Pfc. Whitaker, who attended Hereford schools, was engaged in the farming and trucking business prior to his induction into the Army on Feb. 6, 1944. He landed overseas on Nov. 26 and was serving with a First Army infantry division when he was reported missing.

Mrs. Whitaker and two children are making their home here with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Thompson.

Pfc. Whitaker is a son of Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Whitaker of Hereford and has two brothers, G. H. and Woodrow, who are also serving in the European Theatre of Operations.

Goldstons Receive Citation for Son, Killed in Action

Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Goldston have received the Citation of Honor from the Army Air Forces for their son, Staff Sgt. Wade C. Goldston, who was killed in action over Ceram, Dutch New Guinea, on Oct. 22, 1944. The Goldstons have also recently received their son's Purple Heart medal.

The citation, which is signed by H. H. Arnold, commanding general of the U. S. Army Air Forces, is in recognition of Sgt. Goldston's distinguished service as an engineer-gunner on an AAF bomber.

Young Goldston, who had been overseas since Feb. 1, 1944, had taken part in numerous combat missions over Jap-held territory in the Southwest Pacific.

O. W. Camp. Interment was at West Park Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Anna Sue Robbs, a son, Larry Drew, and a step-son, Talbert Lee Allen, all of Hereford; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. S. Robbs of Bovina, a sister, Mrs. Irvin Reeves of Hereford, and two brothers, Lynn Dean and Leland, both of whom are serving in the armed forces overseas.

Welfare Department Wishes to Hire Old Age Assistance Worker

The State Department of Public Welfare is badly in need of a worker to administer the old-age assistance program in the Hereford territory; and according to a letter received by County Judge Fred W. Bales this week, the department is eager to hire someone living in Hereford to carry on the work.

The territory has been without an old-age assistance worker for more than a month.

Requirements include two years of college training, and the applicant must take a state merit system examination. Starting pay for the job is \$100. Further particulars may be secured from Judge Bales or from the county welfare office in the county house.

Marine Veteran Talks to Lions

Sgt. Major Streit, a veteran of eight years service in the Marine Corps, described campaigns on Wake, Guadalcanal and Tarawa to members of the Hereford Lions Club yesterday when he was guest speaker at the regular luncheon meeting.

Streit was in Canton, China, when war was declared and said that he was one of the few in his outfit who was able to escape. Forced to parachute from the plane which was taking him out of China, Streit was rescued and later took part in some of the heaviest action experienced by the famous Marine First Division.

Of all his combat experience, he described Tarawa as the toughest; and in response to questions from the audience he outlined the basic softening up process carried out by Naval guns and Navy planes prior to a landing on any enemy held island.

Streit, a nephew of Dr. A. J. Streit of Amarillo, is now continuing a high school education which was interrupted when he joined the Marine Corps.

Half Inch of Rain Fell Here

Total rainfall in Hereford last week amounted to .56 of an inch, with .32 of the total falling in a slow drizzle on Friday and Saturday to add to the .24 which fell on Wednesday. Moisture reports from rural communities in the area revealed a slightly higher average in some sections, as much as an inch of rain having fallen at some points during the week.

Colder temperatures also moved into the area during the week to bring an end to the unseasonably warm weather which had prevailed.

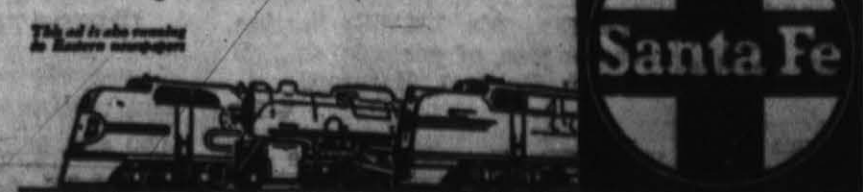

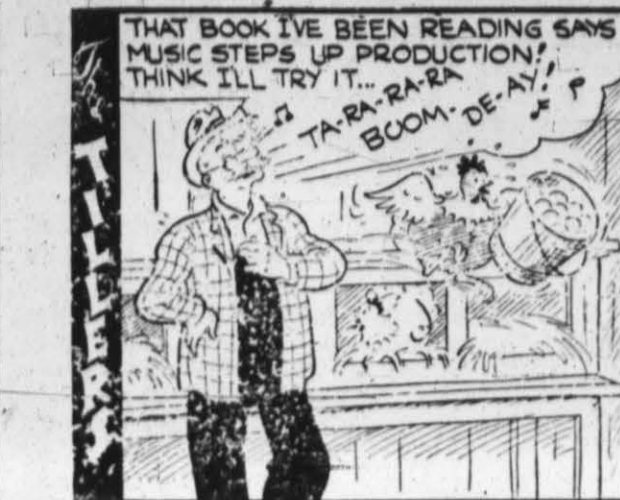

Beverly Hills, Calif.
Dec. 17, 1934.

I ain't smart enough to figure out yet whether you did me a favor or not. He has seen lots of movie stars since he got here, but no corn or bran. I have applied for government relief. If it don't come you are liable to get him back. Next time send me five little ones. Henry Ford wanted to give me a Lincoln one time and I said, 'No, send me ten Fords instead.' I am not thanking you until I see how much he dresses out."

WILL ROGERS 433P

Pete Ingle drove the truck out and delivered the steer and says that Will Rogers just kept scratching his head and looking at the animal. Finally, he told Pete: "If I don't go broke getting him fat, me and the rest of the poor folks are gonna make barbecue outa him if they'll furnish the firewood and cow chips to cook with." However, Will never did barbecue the animal. He would spend hour upon hour roping him and even once introduced Geronimo to Mae West, hoping the steer would try to imitate some of the ladies' curves. Geronimo, or Big Jim, was billed in the Texas Centennial at Dallas in 1936 as "The Biggest Steer in the World," and thousands of people paid a dime each just to look at the animal. Maybe you saw him. When Will Rogers died Big Jim was given to the Salvation Army and was later auctioned off for a little over \$700.

Of course, Mrs. Patterson, we don't have any figures to stand on and maybe this critter wasn't up to par with the Kokomo animal, but he was billed as "THE BIGGEST STEER IN THE WORLD"—and even the people of Ohio will have to admit "That ain't no bull."

He was born in Calcutta forty-seven years ago, trained as a sufi and hafiz, but was early converted to Christianity. Educated at St. Paul's (Anglican) College and at Bareilly Theological Seminary (Methodist), he was a professor in the

Henry Martyn School of Islamics, Allgarh, India, and more recently principal of Bareilly Seminary. While teaching at the Seminary, he was ordained a minister of the Methodist Church, and has served as pastor and district superintendent in Delhi. Bishop Subhan is proficient in English, Urdu, Arabic and Persian.
