Suit for Damages Goes to Trial in District Court

A jury panel has been called to appear in District Court this morning (Thursday) for trial of a suit for damages in which Elbert Kesler is the plaintiff and the Fort Dodge Laboratories of Fort Dodge, Iowa, and Jack Miller of Fort Worth are the defendants.

Kesler is suing for damage incurred when his herd of several hundred hogs became sick and died, allegedly as the result of the use of cholera vaccine made by the Fort Dodge Laboratories and sold by Miller.

The plaintiff alleges that the vaccine was defective and was responsible for loss of the hogs.

Jurots were ordered to appear in court at ten o'clock this morning.

Attorneys in the case are James W. Witherspoon of Hereford and Manning and Singleton of Amarillo for the plaintiff; and Adkins, Pipkin, Madden and Keffer of Amarillo for the Fort Dodge Laboratories, and Simpson, Clayton, and Fulginiti of Amarillo for Jack Miller, defendants.

VFW Post Will Elect Officers Here Tonight

Annual election of officers for the Hereford post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars will be held tonight, (Thursday) at eight o'clock at the county courtroom, Roy Smith, post commander announced this week.

E. R. Bruce of Amarillo, District Commander of the VFW, will be in Hereford tonight to attend the meeting, Smith said. All members of the Post are urged to be present, the commander said. Important business will be transacted in addition to the annual elections.

Leland W. Robbs Is Candidate for Sheriff Office

Leland W. Robbs this week has authorized The Brand to announce his candidacy for the office of Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector for Deaf Smith County, subject to the action of the Democratic Primary in July.

Prior to the war, Robbs had served as deputy sheriff in Lincoln and Socorro counties in New Mexico for a total of five years, and had 18 months experience on guard duty at the New Mexico State Penitentiary at Santa Fe.

"I believe that I am thoroughly familiar with the duties of the office of sheriff," he said in making his announcement, "and I have had the experience in law enforcement work to qualify me for this office."

Robbs was discharged on October 18 from the United States Navy, where he served overseas at bases in Bermuda and the Azores and other tropic zones for 17 months. He held the rating of Fireman, 1st class. He has lived in Castro and Deaf Smith counties since 1923, except for a short period in New Mexico, and attended school at Dimmitt.

"I intend to see every voter in the county between now and election time," Robbs said. "I will appreciate your consideration of my record and experience for this office, and will do my best to deserve your vote in the coming election."

Lab Technician Is Employed By County Hospital

Henry Stahl of Warren, Ohio, has been employed by the Deaf Smith County Sanitarium as a laboratory technician, and a complete hospital laboratory is being set up, Bob Wilson, manager of the sanitarium, announced this week.

A temporary laboratory has already been set up at the hospital, Wilson said, and equipment has been ordered and is now on the way to set up a first class technical laboratory. "We will be able to make all necessary hospital tests," Stahl said.

Stahl received his discharge on February 16 from the U. S. Navy, where he has served during the war as Pharmacist Mate 2-c at U. S. Navy hospitals at the Great Lakes Training Station, San Diego Naval Base, Camp Wallace, Texas, and Oceanside Naval Base.

He received his laboratory training at the Naval Medical Center at Bethesda, Maryland. Before the war, he was employed as a chemist in the steel industry in Ohio.

Mrs. Stahl and their three-year old son will join him here as soon as housing accommodations are available.

He was born in Hereford on April 27, 1905, and was married to Dyalitha Stovall here on June 10, 1928.

He is survived by his wife, one son, William Lewis Bradley; his mother, Mrs. L. R. Bradley, one brother, Wes Bradley; and three sisters, Mrs. Lan Shore, Mrs. Doyl Rose, and Mrs. Jack Rose, all of Hereford.

Full bearers at the services Tuesday were Troy Moore, Donald Wyatt, J. Wallace Robinson, G. T. Higgins, Robert Thompson, and J. C. McCracken.

Mr. Bradley was a Past Master of the Hereford Masonic Lodge, No. 849 AF & AM, and served as secretary of the lodge for a number of years. Until his health forced his retirement, he was one of the most faithful members of the local lodge.

He held a certificate from the Grand Lodge of Texas for proficiency in Masonic work, and a large number of local members had received their lectures in the Masonic degrees from him.

He was a member of one of Deaf Smith County's pioneer families. His father, the late L. R. Bradley, brought the first herd of Hereford cattle to this county in 1893 from Emporia, Kansas.

Three Injured In Auto Accident at Bovina Friday

Three persons were injured, one seriously, in an automobile accident three miles west of Bovina early Friday morning, when a Dodge sedan overturned on Highway 60 after a blow-out.

Vall O. Smith of Dallas, driver of the car, and his wife were brought to the Deaf Smith County hospital in Hereford, both suffering from cuts and bruises; and Johnny Drake of Georgia, one of three sailors who had hitched a ride with the Smiths, was taken to the Memorial Hospital in Clovis suffering from severe head injuries.

The other two sailors were uninjured, and had left the scene by the time State Highway patrolmen arrived. Their names are not known.

Highway patrolmen J. C. Reese and Bill Fowler investigated the accident, and reported that, according to Smith, the car swerved off the road and overturned when he applied the brakes too suddenly after a rear tire had gone flat.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith were enroute to their home in Dallas from California; and the three sailors were "thumbing" their way home from the coast and had been given a ride by the Dallas couple.

A large trailer-truck hauling vegetables from Phoenix, Arizona, was wrecked on the highway a short distance west of Hereford Thursday afternoon when the driver, Thomas S. Frost, failed to make a curve and ran off the highway.

Neither Frost or his relief driver, who was asleep in the cab when the accident occurred, were injured.

The truck belonged to Dickey-Davis of Phoenix, and was hauling a load of fresh vegetables. Damage was estimated at \$2,000.

Dimmitt Track Team Wins Dual Meet on Friday

In the first track and field meet of the season on Friday afternoon at Whiteface Field, the Dimmitt Bobcats edged out a 2 point win over the Hereford thins-cids in the dual meet, running up a score of 63 1-3 points to 61 1-3 for the Whitefaces.

The meet was the first of a series of practice sessions which Coaches H. V. Stanton and Earl Stagner of the Whitefaces and Velton Sorges of the Bobcats plan to stage for their teams in preparation for the annual District meet which will be held at Canyon on March 30.

First place winners in Friday's meet included Bob Davis of Hereford in the 100-yard dash at 10.5 seconds; Bobby Millard of Hereford in the 800-yard run; Bill Stevenson of Dimmitt in the 220-yard dash at 23.8 seconds; Bob Davis of Hereford in the 440 yard dash at 64.3 seconds; and Raymond Leub of Hereford in the mile run at 4 minutes, 57 seconds.

In the relays, the Dimmitt team won the quarter-mile relay; and the Whiteface team, with Joe Bishop, Bob Millard, Raymond Leub, and Fred Close, took the mile event.

Dimmitt walked away with all but two of the field events. Joe Bishop of Hereford and Harris of Dimmitt tied at 10 feet, 6 inches in the pole vault; and Freddie Close of Hereford snared the broad jump at 19 feet, 3 inches.

Henry Howell of Dimmitt took the high jump at 5 feet, 5 inches; James of Dimmitt won the shot put at 35 feet, 6 inches; and Sparkman of Dimmitt took the discus throw at 92 feet, 1 inch.

Coaches Stanton and Stagner are planning to take a 15-man squad from Hereford to the Invitation Track and Field Meet at Panhandle Saturday, when fifteen teams are expected to compete.

Garage and Wash House Destroyed

A fire, believed to have been caused from defective wiring, destroyed the garage and wash-house at the Felix Urbanczyk home two and a half miles southwest of Hereford Tuesday morning.

The fire was discovered at 9:30 Tuesday morning, and started in the wash house. Neighbors rushed to the scene to help get the blaze under control, and saved the house from damage.

As The Brand goes to press, there are still no candidates for the offices of Mayor and City Commission. Mayor and two commissioners must be named at the city elections on April 2.

Next Thursday March 28 will be the last date for candidates for city offices to get their names placed on the ballot for the city election April 2, Mayor E. S. Ireland has announced.

Ballots will go to the printers next week-end, and any candidates who decide to make the race after next Thursday will have to wage a write-in campaign.

Names of 18 to 20 qualified voters on a petition will be sufficient to place the name of any candidate on the official ballot, provided the petitions are filed in time, Mr. Ireland said. The law requires that petitions be signed by 5 per cent of the number voting in the last city election.

Hereford citizens will be required to name a mayor and two city commissioners at the city elections, which have been set for Tuesday, April 2.

Both Mayor Ireland and Commissioners Nestor Gass and J. C. McCracken have announced their intention to retire from office at the end of their current term, and Hereford is faced with the selection of a complete new municipal government.

Tuesday Deadline For Placing Name On School Ballot

Nominations for candidates for election to the Board of Trustees of the Hereford Independent School District must be filed no later than next Tuesday, March 26, if the names are to appear on the ballot for the April 6 election, Supt. Chester Strickland said this week.

The law requires that petitions to place names on the ballot be presented at least 10 days before the election. In this case, the board has determined that any and all petitions must be in by March 26.

Only five signers are required on any petition, Strickland said. Any five qualified voters may petition the board to have the name of any candidate placed on the ballot. Petitions should be turned in to Homer Henalee, secretary of the board.

Three trustees must be elected this year, D. H. Alexander, Cliff Hicks, and Louie LeGrand are the retiring board members.

The election has been ordered for April 6. Claud Ricketts, John Patton, and W. R. Schelhaugen have been appointed election judges to hold the board election by Jesse Stanford, president of the board.

The election order appears in this issue of The Brand.
