Heavy Fog Is Blamed in Fatal Crash on Amarillo Highway

J. O. Lytle Jr., 19, was killed instantly, and Joy Seale Jennings, 27, died in a Canyon Hospital as the result of an automobile crash on fog-shrouded Highway 60 three miles north of Canvon last Saturday night.

Five other persons and two children escaped with minor injuries in the two-car crash, ocurred on a stretch of the recently completed four-lane highway near the Canyon airport, three miles north of the city, at 9:50 o'clock Saturday night.

The injured were Tom and Jesse Barrett and Mabel Gilbertson, all of Hereford, who were riding in the car with Lytle and Miss Jennings; and Robert E. McLoughlin, driver of the other car, his wife and two small boys of Quitaque

Miss Gilbertson remained in the Canyon hospital overnight, receiving treatment for head lacerations. The others were released from the hospital shortly after the accident after receiving emergency treatment for minor injuries.

Miss Jennings died in the Canyon hospital an hour after the accident.

The accident occurred, according to highway patrolmen, when the 1936 Ford convertible, driven by Lytle, crashed head-on into a 1938 Chevrolet sedan driven by McLoughlin. The Lytle car was heading north toward Amarillo, and patrolmen said Lytle apparently became confused in the fog, and swung into the wrong lane on the highway. Patrolmen said that Lytle, Miss Jennings, the two Barretts and Miss Gilbertson were all riding in the front seat of the
