Effective February 1, the regulation sets the maximum size of packages for overseas mailing at 42 inches in length, and combined length and breadth of not over 72 inches Maximum weight of each package is increased to

No request is necessary to mail packages to Naval personnel. This regulation governs all personnel overseas in Navy, Marines and Coast Guard.
