The Right to Vote

(An Editorial)

Who can vote in bond elections? This question became important last Saturday when voters of Deaf Smith County went to the polls to decide the fate of the Hospital Bond issue. Criticism, apparently justified, has been aimed at election officials, and at members of the Commissioner's Court who select election judges.

Saturday morning several persons were denied the right to vote in the election, "because they did not own real estate." The group excluded from the polls included war veterans, along with other citizens, many leaving under protest, The protests became so insistent that one official took the trouble to look up the law regarding the situation and reversed his opinion, allowing "property tax payers" to voteeven though the property was not real estate.

Although we doubt that the small number turned away from the polls would have made any difference in the vote, it is certainly possible that such action could disqualify the entire election. If protests should be lodged, it would be necessary to hold the election again-at considerable cost.

In our own minds, we feel certain that no election was influenced by political opinion or malice. It is our opinion that the error came as the result of a lack of information. We furthermore grant that election officials are performing a public duty - and it would be a poor election official who served purely for the money involved. On the other hand, we feel that when a citizen accepts the responsibility of serving as an election official that he should definitely inform himself as regards the laws and duties concerning his position and the election at hand. Furthermore, we feel that it is the sworn duty of the Commissioner's Court to select judges who are capable and willing to fulfill the duties of their of-

The American people are peculiar in that they will fight and die for the right to vote - but will also frequently fail through carelessness to exercise the same franchise. On the other hand, when an American citizen is qualified as a voter, goes to the polls with the intention of voting, but is denied the privilege, his wrath knows no equal,

With these things in mind, we feel sure that our Commissioners and other Political Sub-Division groups will exercise care in selection of election judges who are not only qualified, but interested enough in good government to inform themselves regarding their duties.

Farmers were warned today to guard against the danger of outbreaks of hog cholera in the hazardous months of early fall. This is one of the seasons of greatest danger from hog cholera, the American Foundation for Animal Health declared, and livestock men were advised to keep a close watch on their swine droves and have all pigs

vaccinated early. Vaccination, along with sound sanitation practices and proper feeding, constitute the best safeguards for a sure pig crop, the

Foundation pointed out.

Because infection can be spread by a hog coming down with cholera, even before pronounced symptoms appear, hog raisers were urged to keep a close watch on their droves for

signs of fever, loss of appetite, 40-tfe or weakness. "If evidence of illness appears, cholera first," the Foundation statement said, "and have a


