L. F. Shannon Is Purchaser in WAA Mail Order Sale

FORT WORTH, (Special) — Among the successful purchasers in the first "mail order" catalog sale of surplus used motor vehicles conducted by the Veterans' Division of the War Assets Administration office in Fort Worth was Lea F. Shannon of Hereford, Texas.

Shannon, who is a veteran of World War II, was awarded a 1-2 ton 1941 Dodge Command Reconnaissance truck for \$400. The sale was unique in that it offered in excess of 12,000 certified veterans an opportunity to inspect the vehicles at any of the 16 Army Camp locations through North and West Texas and make their purchase by mail, with alternate choices given, since the oldest dated certificate holders sending in an order awarded their choices in strict chronological order. The sale resulted in the disposal of 457 out of the 648 vehicles of all types, including passenger cars, jeeps, station wagons, motorcycles, scooters, trucks, trailers and truck tractors, WAA officials announced.

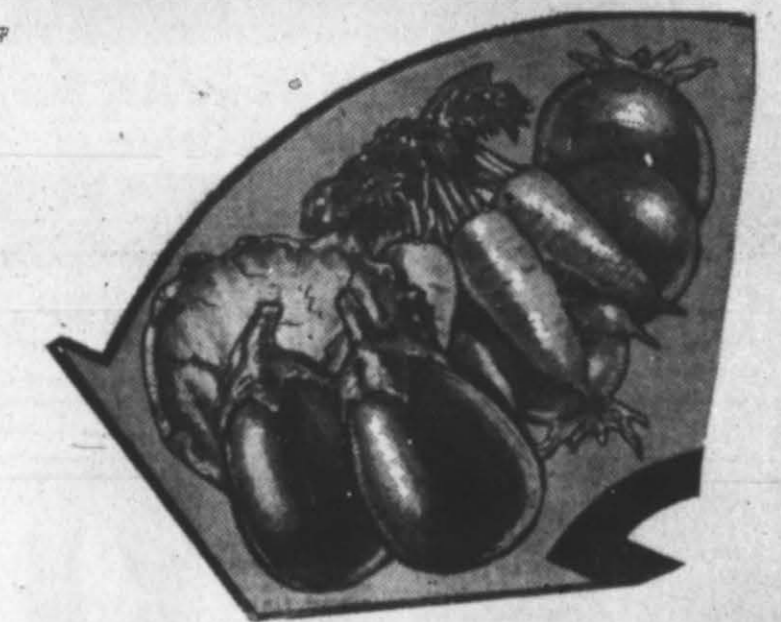

when secured, will complete the entire right-of-way from Hereford to Vega.

"The Highway department has the money and is ready to go ahead with the paving project," the local committee was told Tuesday.

Rights-of-way on 9 miles of the highway from Hereford north has finally been completed with the filing of condemnation proceedings against property owned by James R. Higgins, who had refused to grant right-of-way easements.

The condemnation proceeding was filed on September 3, setting forth "claim to Deaf Smith County for sale of land for right-of-way for Highway 51 along the East side of Section 71 in Block K-3." Five hundred dollars was allowed for a 60 foot strip of land along and off the east side of the section.

Clearing of title to this bit of right-of-way has held up construction of paving on this section of highway for several months.

The 14 miles of highway for which right-of-way easements are now being secured connects 9 miles of right-of-way immediately north of Hereford with a 5-mile stretch in Oldham county south of Vega for which rights-of-way are now complete.

for the same purpose.

"The Deaf Smith County Hospital Board wishes to thank the people who took the time to vote on the bond election last Saturday," the statement said. "This is your hospital and county, and your wishes are to be carried out.

"A number of people have discussed the following since the election.

"1. That they would vote for a \$175,000 bond issue but felt that \$250,000 was too much.

"2. That they had never realized until now how inadequate the present hospital is.

"If you want \$150,000 to \$175,000 invested in a modern hospital which will pay its own way and save the county \$10,000 a year on operating expenses, let your commissioners or board members know your desire now while the low interest rates are still available."

A contract to sell the bonds, if voted, at interest rates ranging from one and three-quarters to two and one-half percent, was entered by the Commissioners Court a month ago, but according to County Judge Fred W. Baird, the contracts call for delivery of the bonds within 60 days after the date on which the contract was signed.

New Benefits for Families of Post War Dead Offered

Many survivors of World War II veterans who have died since leaving the service will benefit from one of the provisions of the Social Security Act Amendments of 1946, John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Social Security Administration field office said today.

Mr. Sanderson explained that the new section of the act provides for the payment of monthly benefits to qualified survivors of veterans who died within 3 years of their discharge and those dependents are not qualified to receive compensation or pensions from the Veterans Administration. National Service Life Insurance is not considered as compensation on a pension.

In the case of such veterans who died before the enactment of the new amendment, the measure provides for monthly benefits retroactive to the date of the veteran's death if the survivors file their benefit

the new measure will provide greater benefits than those earned by the veteran. These survivors are included in the immediate potential beneficiaries, Mr. Sanderson said, and should apply to the field office of the Social Security Administration.

The same applies, Mr. Sanderson added, to survivors who have filed claim for lump-sum benefits under the old-age and survivors insurance program on a qualified veteran's account. The new amendment may make them eligible for monthly bene-

fit payment, or it may increase the amount of the lump-sum benefit. In the latter case, they will receive the difference between the lump sum they received and the larger amount they are eligible for under the amendment, if they apply at the office of the Social Security Administration.

"As in the case of all persons qualified for social security benefits, families of deceased veterans to whom this new section of the law has immediate application should come or write

to our office to file their benefit claims as soon as possible," Mr. Sanderson said.
