wastes. SECTION 2. Accumulation of dar month, as follows: rbage and Refuse: No Owner or lessee of any public or pri-vate premises shall permit to

accumulate upon the premises owned or leased by him, any garbage or refuse, except covered containers approved by the City Superintendent of the Garbage Department. Such containers shall be constructed of metal in such a manner to be strong, not easily corrodible, rodent proof, and shall be kept covered at all times except

when garbage or refuse is being deposited therein on removed therefrom. All kitchen or wet garbage shall be drained of all water and other liquids and securely wrapped and tied in paper or paper sacks and placed in containers.

SECTION 3. Collection ' and Disposal of Garbage and Refuse: (A.) Collection of Garbage and Refuse shall be done by The City Garbage Department, or under the direction of the Superintendent of the Garbage Department. No Person, Firm on Corporation shall collect garbage or refuse without a permit. (b). Placing of Containers:

Containers shall be placed at some convenient place to be de-signated by the Superintendent of the Garbage Department, no garbage or refuse shall be collected unless it is deposited in an approved contained and placed as designated by such Superintendent. (c). The burning of trash on

other waste on the premises, is hereby prohibited, unless it is burned in an approved Con-tainer, constructed of metal or heavy meshed wire to prevent the spreading of fire. Such containers to be separate and apart from containers used for depositing garbage and trash, and under no circumstances shall the contents of a Garbage Containen be set on fire. (d). 
Davis Stars As Track Team Wins site, provided some basis Third in Neel


