New City Ordinance Governs Disposal of Garbage, Trash

Garbage Cans to Be Sold by City At Low Prices

Garbage cans suitable for the new city garbage collection system have been obtained by the city and are available for sale at the city hall, Mayor E. S. Ireland announced this week.

The cans will be sold to residents of the city at \$1.50 each. They are of heavy steel with tight fitting lids, and of 30-gallon capacity.

Payment for the cans can be made at the city clerk's office when the water bills are paid. Delivery will be made free of charge on all cans paid for before April 10. Cans purchased at a later date will not be delivered at this price.

C. A. Purcell, city sanitarian, points out that the new city ordinance regulating the handling and disposal of garbage explicitly prohibits burning of trash and garbage in these cans. "Burning will destroy the paint and cause them to rust," Purcell points out, "and will also destroy the DDT with which they will be treated all through the fly season."

Tight fitting lids make the cans virtually fly-proof and rat-proof.

"The city was fortunate in securing these cans from Government surplus," Mayor Ireland said. "Otherwise it might have been months before enough could have been obtained, and the price would have been three times as much for the same quality, weight, and capacity."

"Until the necessary equipment can be obtained," he added, "collection of waste and garbage will necessarily be inadequate." (Continued on Page 12)

A new city ordinance, setting up regulations for the handling and disposal of garbage, and setting up a schedule of service charges, was passed last week by the City Commission.

Complete text of the ordinance appears in this issue of The Brand.

The ordinance provides that collection of garbage and refuse shall be done by the City Garbage Department, under direction of the Superintendent of the garbage department and no person or firm shall collect garbage without a permit from the city.

Disposal of garbage by any individual within the city limits or within 1,000 feet of the city limits, is prohibited; and burning of trash or other waste on the premises is prohibited unless it is burned in an approved container, constructed of metal or heavy mesh wire to prevent spreading of fire.

Such containers must be separate from containers used for depositing garbage, and the burning of the contents of a garbage container is prohibited.

Service charges to be collected by the City Clerk as a separate item on each water bill were ordered to cover the expense of garbage collection. These charges will not go into effect, Mayor Ireland said, until a regular schedule of collection is set up by the City Sanitary Department.

Monthly fees for service in the residential section will be 75 cents for single family residences; \$1.00 for duplex apartments, 50 cents for garage apartments, and 50 cents for each apartment in buildings housing three or more families.

Ten classes and charges for commercial establishments are set up, and provision made that such charges shall be based as nearly as possible on the actual cost of the service to the city.

Saturday is Last Day to Get 1946 License Tags

Saturday is the last day to get 1946 auto license tags before the April 1 deadline on Monday, the local sheriff's office advises.

Tags may still be purchased after April 1, but no car can be legally operated after March 31 without the new license plates.

Sale of tags have been going well to date, and no last-minute rush is anticipated. Sales at mid-week had totaled 1025 passenger licenses, as compared with 1412 sold by April 1 last year; 90 commercial tags, as compared with 122 last year; and 365 farm tags, compared with 589 last year.

There were still 565 passenger, 160 commercial, and 384 farm tags on hand for 1946 sales.

Learning to Fly at 70 No Trick Says Dr. Kester Who's Done It

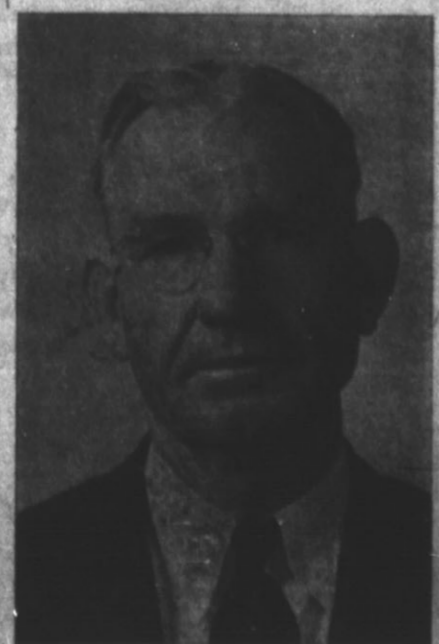

Farm Payments For Irrigation Offered by ACA

Conservation assistance for Deaf Smith County farmers for the reorganization of farm irrigation systems has been adopted by the County ACA committee, and the committee is in position to accept applications now, according to F. C. Collier, local secretary.

Application blanks are available at the AAA office in the courthouse.

Payments are available at the rate of 8 cents per cubic yard, not to exceed \$3 per 100 linear feet, for construction or enlargement of permanent ditches, laterals, or dikes.

Construction or installation of siphons, flumes, drop boxes, chutes, or weirs are allowed at \$9 per cubic yard for concrete, \$6 for rubble-masonry, or 7 and 1-2 cents per board foot for commercially treated lumber construction.

Other payments include curvilinear metal culvert, \$1 per linear foot of 24-inch diameter (proportionate payments for smaller culvert), \$1.25 per linear foot for concrete pipe of 24 inch diameter; \$1.50 per cubic yard for installation of log or rock cribbing, and 15 cents per linear foot for small pipe (1 1/2 to 2 inch diameter).

The total payment under this practice is limited to \$20 per acre of land improved under this plan.

Alfalfa Dehydration Plant to Be Ready for Operation This Summer

One of Hereford's newest industries, an alfalfa mill and dehydration plant, will be ready for operation in time for this year's harvest.

George Heard, who is opening the new plant, said this week that all equipment has been ordered and delivery has been promised for April and early May.

Construction on a railroad spur to the plant site, 2 miles east of town and south of Highway 60, was scheduled to get under way this week, and Heard hopes to have everything in readiness for processing alfalfa by the time the first crop is ready to cut.

"Our principal problem this

year," he said, "will be getting enough alfalfa to keep the plant in operation." Heard has appealed to the farmers of this section to plant larger acreage in alfalfa in order to supply the demands, both for the dehydration plant and for users of baled alfalfa.

"We expect to more than double the present market for alfalfa in this section," he said.

The plant will employ between 25 and 30 workers when it is in full operation, and with the present set-up, can handle the yield from as much as 1,000 acres of alfalfa.

All harvesting will be done by the plant, Heard says, adding (Continued on Page 12)

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO 316

AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS, DEFINING GARBAGE AND REFUSE, DESIGNATING AND REGULATING THE KIND OF CONTAINERS IN WHICH THE SAME IS TO BE COLLECTED AND DEPOSITED, AND THE PLACING OF SAME AT SOME CONVENIENT PLACE FOR COLLECTION OF GARBAGE AND REFUSE BY THE CITY GARBAGE DEPARTMENT, PROHIBITING THE DISPOSAL OF SUCH MATERIALS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS, OR WITHIN

1000 FEET THEREOF, REQUIRING AN APPROVED METHOD OF GARBAGE AND REFUSE DISPOSAL, STATING OWNERSHIP AND PROHIBITING REMOVAL FROM DUMP GROUND, PROVIDING FOR SERVICE CHARGES, DECLARING UNCOLLECTED GARBAGE AND REFUSE A NUISANCE, AND PRESCRIBING A PENALTY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS: (a). The term "Garbage" shall be interpreted to mean all putrescible wastes, except sewage and body wastes, including vegetable and animal offals and carcasses of dead animals, but

excluding recognized industrial by-products, and shall include all such substances from all public and private establishments and from all residences; and (b). The term "refuse" shall include all non-putrescible wastes.

SECTION 2. Accumulation of Garbage and Refuse: No Owner or lessee of any public or private premises shall permit to accumulate upon the premises owned or leased by him, any garbage or refuse, except in covered containers approved by the City Superintendent of the Garbage Department. Such containers shall be constructed of metal in such a manner to be strong, not easily corroded, rodent proof, and shall be kept covered at all times except when garbage or refuse is being deposited thereon or removed therefrom. All kitchen or wet garbage shall be drained of all water and other liquids and securely wrapped and tied in paper or paper sacks and placed in containers.

SECTION 3. Collection and Disposal of Garbage and Refuse: (A). Collection of Garbage and Refuse shall be done by The City Garbage Department, or under the direction of the Superintendent of the Garbage Department. No Person, Firm or Corporation shall collect garbage or refuse without a permit.

(b). Placing of Containers: Containers shall be placed at some convenient place to be designated by the Superintendent of the Garbage Department, no garbage or refuse shall be collected unless it is deposited in an approved container and placed as designated by such Superintendent.

(c). The burning of trash on other waste on the premises, is hereby prohibited, unless it is burned in an approved container, constructed of metal or heavy meshed wire to prevent the spreading of fire. Such containers to be separate and apart from containers used for depositing garbage and trash, and under no circumstances shall the contents of a Garbage Container be set on fire.

(d). Individual Disposal: The disposal of garbage and refuse by any individual in any place within the city limits, or within 1000 feet thereof, except at the designated City Dump Ground on place of disposal, is hereby prohibited.

SECTION 4. Disposal of Garbage and Refuse:

(a). Approved method of disposal: All disposal of garbage and refuse shall be by one of the following methods: Incineration, Land fill, and cover, Sanitary land fill, or by dumping ground designated by the city or its authorized representative, and approved by the City and County Health Officers, provided that such methods shall include the maximum practicable rodent, insect, and nuisance control at the place or places of disposal, and provided further, that animal and carcasses of dead animals shall be buried on cremated as directed by the Sanitary Superintendent, or shall be rendered at 40 pounds per square inch pressure, or higher, or heated by equivalent method of cooking. Kitchen slops and other garbage fed to hogs should be cooked and the hog feeding places kept in such a manner as to cause no nuisance to adjoining property owners.

(b). Ownership of refuse: All junk and other material of the dump ground is the property of the city of Hereford, and no person is allowed to separate and collect, carry off, or dispose of same except under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent.

SECTION 5. SERVICE CHARGES AND NON-COLLECTION.

(a). Residential: The collection of garbage and refuse from houses, buildings and premises used for residential purposes shall be divided into six (6) classes according to the family unit therein. The City Clerk

shall collect these garbage fees either through the Water Department as a separate item on each water bill, or by other practicable means of collection. Fair and reasonable charges for residential service shall be and are shown in terms of dollars and cents in each class for a calendar month, as follows:

- Class 1. Single Family residences75
- Class 2. Duplex Apartment 1.00
- Class 3. Garage Apartments50
- Class 4. Group Housing, three, (3) or more Houses on same Meter, Per House50
- Class 5. Three, (3) Family Apartment, 1.50
- Class 6. Four, (4) or more Family Apartments, each Apartment50

(b). Commercial: The collection of garbage and refuse from Commercial establishments shall be divided into ten, (10) classes. The collection of fees for the service to Commercial establishments shall be in the same manner as for residential service as outlined above. Fair and reasonable charges for commercial service shall be as shown in terms of dollars and cents under each class, for each calendar month, as follows: and shall be based as near as practicable on the actual cost of the service rendered.

- Class 1. Retail Food establishments, (large) \$5.00-15.00
- Class 2. Retail Food establishments, (small) 3.00-5.00
- Class 3. Cafes, (large) 5.00-15.00
- Class 4. Cafes, (small) 2.50-7.50
- Class 5. Mercantile establishments 2.50-10.00
- Class 6. Drug Stores 3.00-10.00
- Class 7. Tourist Courts and Trailer Camps 3.00-10.00
- Class 8. Industrial Plants 5.00-20.00
- Class 9. Filling Stations 1.00-2.50
- Class 10. Barber Shops and Beauty Shops 1.00-2.50

The Sanitary Superintendent, with the advice and consent of the Mayor and City Commission, shall have the power and authority to set a fair and reasonable charge to cover the service rendered, or to be rendered at any place, in any class covered by the above schedule, and—in groups not covered. In cases where an agreement cannot be reached between the person, firm, corporation, his, its or their Agent or Manager and the Sanitary Superintendent as to what is a fair and reasonable fee to be paid by any such person, firm or corporation for the service to be rendered, then said Sanitary Superintendent shall submit the matter to the Mayor and City Commission, and after a hearing and due consideration of the matter, the City Commission shall fix what in its judgment it considers is a fair and reasonable fee to be paid by any such person, firm or corporation for such service, and the proprietor or manager in control of the premises to be served shall be notified of such decision; provided, however, that any such person, firm or corporation shall have the privilege of rejecting the decision of the City Commission, and shall have the right and privilege of performing such service themselves, on by private contract, at their own cost and expense.

SECTION 6. Responsibility: It is hereby declared to be the duty and responsibility of each and every person, firm or corporation, or his, its or their Agent or Manager, operating or having operated a Commercial establishment or business of any kind or nature, within the City of Hereford, to keep his, its or their premises and place of

business in a clean and sanitary condition, and the accumulation of garbage, trash or refuse matter upon the premises, or in any alley adjoining the premises of any person, firm or corporation is hereby declared to be a nuisance, and it is made the duty of every person, firm or corporation, his, its or their Agent or Manager of any Commercial establishment, to dispose of or have disposed of at his, their or its own cost and expense, in such manner and at such place of disposal as may be designated by the Sanitary Superintendent, all such accumulation of garbage, trash and refuse, such disposal to be made each week day, or as often as may be necessary to keep the premises in a clean and sanitary condition, and the failure or refusal of any Agent, Manager or other person charged with the responsibility fixed herein, to do so shall subject such Agent,

Manager or other person to the penalty hereinafter provided for a violation of this Ordinance.

SECTION 7. Uncollected Garbage declared a Nuisance: No garbage or refuse shall be collected from any premises where the owner or lessee has refused to pay the fee fixed or is in arrears for a period of one (1) month in the payment of the same. Fermenting, putrefying, or odiferous garbage in containers not disposed of or uncollected due to failure of the owner or lessee of any premises to pay the fees, or not placed in proper containers as required in Section 2, of this Ordinance, is and shall be declared a nuisance, and the owner, lessee or other person allowing or permitting such condition to exist shall be subject to the penalty for violation of this Ordinance.

SECTION 8. Penalty: Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance, and—

or provision of the Sanitary Code of the State of Texas, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum of not less than \$1.00 or more than \$100.00, and each day any such person shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall constitute a separate offense and to be punishable as such.

that, for the purposes of the processing plant, four or five cuttings can be made from each crop.

In the future, Heard predicts, alfalfa can become as impor-

tant a cash crop to local farmers as the potato industry. Estimated annual revenue from potatoes in Deaf Smith county is one million dollars. The wheat crop produces an annual revenue of between two and three million, and cattle sales probably total one and one-half million. Heard believes that alfalfa growers can add another million dollars to the annual revenue of this county.

He points out that alfalfa is a soil building crop, and can be planted in rotation with potato crops to keep up the strength of the soil. One planting of alfalfa, says Heard, will produce a crop for four or five seasons.

With the dehydration plant in operation, he points out, farmers will be guaranteed a ready market for their alfalfa crop which will be in addition to the present market for baled alfalfa and should more than double the demand.

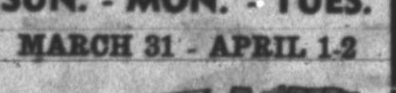

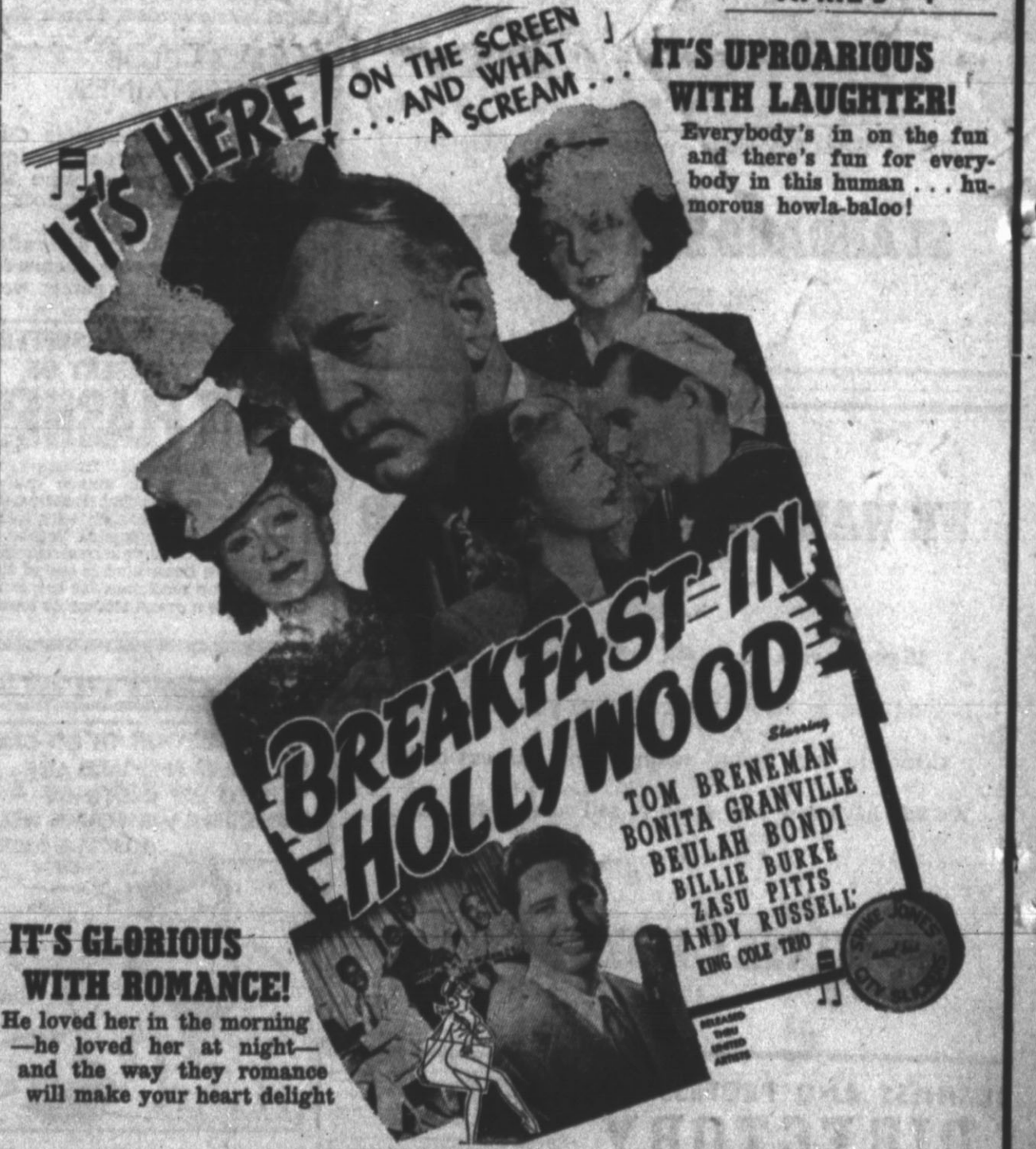
