Trio Who Bilked Local Citizens Released by Law

Three men who bilked local citizens out of several hundred dollars in a fraudulent collection "to aid war veterans" here two months ago were released from Potter County Jail in Amarillo Tuesday after Governor Coke Stevenson had refused a request for extradition to the State of New Mexico.

The three were Paul Cramer, Howard O. Chase, and Ted Rathbone. They were arrested in Amarillo after a successful run with their "souvenir display" from Clovis through Hereford and Canyon. Driving a truck on which an exhibit of "Japanese War Souvenirs" was displayed, the trio had appealed to citizens of those towns during brief stops for contributions "to buy wheel chairs for war veterans."

Earl Wood, commander of the Hereford post of Veterans of Foreign Wars, estimated that the men had collected several hundred dollars in Hereford during a two-hour stop on Main street. They had claimed here to be working under VFW auspices. New Mexico officers had requested their return to that state to face charges of swindling in Clovis, but Governor Stevenson refused extradition on grounds of "insufficient evidence."

Amarillo police said the men were released from bond after the Governor's refusal to extradite them, and said they did not know what the status of a complaint filed against them at Canyon for misdemeanor swindling might be. No charges were filed in this county.

Elmore Nunn Held For Grand Jury Action on Wreck

Elmore Nunn has been bound over for action of the Grand Jury after a hearing before Judge Fred W. Baird Monday on charges of operating a vehicle without a driver's license, during a period when his license had been suspended.

He was arrested last Friday night following an accident in which the car which he was driving crashed into a telephone pole on Highway 60 near the County Livestock Pavilion. Neither he nor his companion in the wreck was seriously injured.

Cagle, pastor of the First Baptist Church, will be in charge of the services, assisted by Rev. Marvin Boyd, pastor of the Methodist Church.

Members of the Hereford chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star will be in charge of floral offerings. Fall bearers are Elmer Dameron, Ky Lawrence, H. E. Henalee, Ezra Norton, H. D. Cuipepper, and Glenn Snyder.

Interment will be in West Park Cemetery, under direction of E. B. Black Funeral Home. Phillip Jackson Rose was born on March 9, 1891, in Leon County, Texas, near Centerville. He moved to Abilene with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Rose, in 1905.

He was preceded in death by his first wife, Hattie Ogburn Rose, and son, Jack Jr. On December 5, 1925, he was married to Miss Bruce Brady of Hereford, and most of their married life has been spent in this city.

Mr. Rose was one of the first men in this county to promote what is now the extensive Deaf Smith Potato industry. Starting in 1938, he served six years as county commissioner. In recent years, he has been in the real estate business.

He was, for a number of years, an active member of the Hereford Lions club, and is the only Master Key member of the local club. Because of illness, he has not been active in the organization lately.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Bruce Rose; eight brothers, Walter and Franklin Rose of Goldboro, Texas; Aaron and Leon Rose of Kermit; George Rose of Quitaque; Henry Rose of California; Leonard Rose of Crane; and Edward Rose of Gutrine; and two sisters, Mrs. H. S. Cheek of Roseburg, Oregon, and Mrs. Geo. O'Dell Rowden, Tex.

Bond Companies Contract to Buy Hospital Bonds

The Deaf Smith County Commissioners Court on Monday entered into an agreement with two bonding companies to sell a proposed \$250,000 in hospital bonds, if and when the bond issue is voted.

Contract with A. R. Underwood Company of Dallas and H. L. Shaffer Company of Amarillo, the two companies acting jointly, was signed at the regular meeting of the Commissioners Court Monday, Judge Fred W. Baird announced.

The contract calls for immediate purchase by the two companies of \$175,000 in county tax bonds, with interest at 2 percent for the one to 10 year maturities, and 2½ percent for the 16 to 20 year maturities. The companies also agreed to handle an additional \$75,000 in bonds if it becomes necessary for the county to float that amount.

A petition is now being circulated by members of the Deaf Smith County Hospital board of directors asking the Commissioners Court to call a special bond election to vote on the issuance of \$250,000 in bonds for additions and improvements to the present hospital building.

The petition will be formally presented to the court within a few days.

A previous petition, asking for a \$350,000 bond issue, was withdrawn by the board of directors after a conference with county commissioners, and the decision was made to lower the requested bond issue to the present \$250,000 figure.

The Commissioners Court, in the meantime, has gone ahead with arrangements for sale of the bonds if the issue is voted at a special election.

Proposed additions to the hospital would greatly increase its facilities, and provide a hospital of sufficient capacity to serve Hereford for several years at the present rate of growth.

State Taxes Cut By Nearly Fifty Percent Monday

The Texas automatic tax board, for the first time in the history of state taxation, wiped out the state general fund and ad valorem tax levies this year, effecting a saving of \$14,000,000 to the taxpayers of Texas.

The board's action reduced the state property tax rate to the constitutional minimum of 37 cents on the \$100 valuation, lowest tax rate since 1912.

The state tax rate last year was 72 cents on the \$100. The 35 cent reduction cuts out for the current tax year all taxes levied for the general fund and the ad valorem tax.

The reduction in state taxes will mean a saving of approximately \$21,000 to tax payers in Deaf Smith county.

Reason given for the unprecedented slash in taxes was the state's excellent financial condition. A surplus in the general fund has accumulated for the past two years.

The 37-cent tax levy which will be collected is set by the constitution, and is made up of 35 cents on the \$100 for the available school fund and 2 cents for the Confederate Veterans pension fund.

The reduction will affect 1946 taxes only.

Deaf Smith county war veterans interested in purchasing buildings from the Hereford Prisoner of War Camp for construction of homes were told, in effect, "to go jump in the lake" by officials of the War Assets Administration, the government agency which is now disposing of the property.

In reply to a telegram from Ralph Smith, county Veterans Service officer, G. D. Jackson, acting chief of the "Non-Industrial Division for Real Property" section of the WAA, wired yesterday:

"VETERANS EXCLUDED FROM PURCHASE OF STRUCTURES INTACT AT HEREFORD PRISONER OF WAR CAMP. CLARIFICATION OF VETERANS PREFERENCE WITH REGARD TO MATERIALS AFTER DEMOLITION NOT YET RECEIVED. SUGGEST YOU REFER TO NEWSPAPERS AT LATER DATE."

Smith, after receiving no reply to several letters addressed to the agency, and others in regard to Veterans right to purchase, had sent a point blank telegram demanding an answer.

"Please advise," Smith wired, "if veterans may purchase any of the buildings or materials to construct homes from Hereford Prisoner of War Camp."

Priority bidding on units at the camp, from which veterans were also excluded, was closed at Dallas last Saturday, but the War Assets Administration has not yet disclosed who were the successful bidders.

Priorities, in order, went to Federal, state, and local government agencies, and to non-profit institutions. Bids on this basis were received for a period of ten days.

Opening of bidding was not advertised locally, in spite of repeated promises by representatives of the various government agencies which have been in charge of disposal of the camp at one time or another since it was declared surplus last January, that any sale would be advertised in advance in HEREFORD.

Presumably, if any buildings are left at the camp after the priority bidding last week, they will be razed and sold for lumber.

Some buildings have already been moved from the camp intact to the campus of West Texas State College at Canyon.

Local veterans organizations, individually and through the office of Veterans Service officer Smith, have made repeated applications for use of buildings from the property for veterans housing in Hereford, without success and frequently without the courtesy of reply from the government agency involved.

Smith said yesterday that he was mailing letters, with copies of the telegram from Jackson, to Senators Tom Connally and W. Lee O'Daniel and Congressman Gene Woney, and to the state commanders of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars, together with full explanation of the entire situation.

District Court to Open Fall Term Here on Monday

Several criminal cases, however, may come up after action by the grand jury, as several arrests have been made recently and those cases are now pending.

Write-In Vote Is Legal Says State Ruling

The political pot came to a full boil in this county this week as candidates entered the home stretch, and a record vote appeared likely in Saturday's democratic primary election.

Hottest issue in the county as election draws close is the race for county judge. The names of three candidates, Mrs. Bess Werner, L. H. Foster, and W. H. Russell, will appear on the official ballot, but a first-class controversy was started last week when friends of County Judge Fred W. Baird, through the columns of The Brand, launched a write-in campaign to return him to office.

Arguments began immediately over the legality of a write-in ballot in the primary election, and voters and candidates alike have called on party officials for a decision.

County Democratic Chairman C. C. Acker moved this week to spike rumors and arguments that a write-in vote would mutilate the ballot by writing the State's Attorney General for a ruling.

From the Attorney General's office yesterday came a definite statement that write-in votes are legal.

In opinion No. 9-3478, the attorney general's office wired, this department held that "the qualified voters in the Primary Election can write in the name of any person for whom they desire to vote and mark out all the printed names under the particular office in the Primary Election; and that votes would be legal and would be counted; and of course if the person whose name was written in received a sufficient number of votes as required by law, such person would be nominated."

Candidates for offices other than County Judge, Acker reported, had been concerned about the possibility that write-in votes would mutilate the entire ballot and cost votes in other races.

Acker had previously stated that, in his opinion, any voter could legally write in the name

Among the pictures, all of which are in Technicolor with sound, will be "Hunger Signs," a photographic story of the effect of lack of fertilization on plants needing food; "Putting Plant Food to Work," and "DDT."

Other features will be shown if the audience is interested, Armstrong said.

PRUNING CLIMBING ROSES

(NOTE—This article was prepared and presented to the Garden Club by Mrs. E. Ramey, member of the club.)
Pruning simply means to trim off superfluous branches, the cutting portions of a plant such as stems, shorts or roots, for the purpose of checking growth in one direction and assisting it in another. While the immediate effect is to reduce the growth of the plant, it ultimately tends to produce a large and stronger plant, or to increase the size and brilliancy of man prunes to aid the plant in perfecting its fruit.

do justice to itself or to its planter if a large portion of its growth is removed each year. Some roses left unpruned may grow into magnificent bushes and produce enormous numbers of flowers, but they do it at the expense of their life. Their glory is brief for they soon become choked with dead and decadent wood through which new shoots struggle to the light. The only remedy then is to cut down the plant, dig out and put in a new one.

Two methods of pruning are recommended—one is to thin or remove the old wood and the other is called the "snip-snip" method. The gardener must be guided by what he wants from his roses. The "snip-snip" method can be used for the Tea, Hybrid Tea, Noisette, Bourbon and other such tender types which bloom sparingly on new wood, by removing surplus dangling ends which threaten to grow in the wrong place. The hardier types can stand the thinning and cutting method without any ill effects.

Most pruning should be done immediately after flowering. On the true rambler type, remove

all flowering canes, cutting to the soil as soon as they have finished blooming, saving 8 on 8 more vigorous canes to stimulate the plant for the next year. If the plant does not send up great numbers of new canes each year—merely removing the flower clusters is sufficient. Every amateur gardener has to do a little experimenting on his own in order to learn just how to go about pruning and a few mistakes may be expected, but by following these general principles the plant itself may be saved and it may be able to reach its maximum in growth and beauty.

U. S. Bond Sales Up During July Says Treasury

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 24—Americans bought \$139,057,000 more of U. S. Savings Bonds during the first half of July than in the first half of June, National Savings Bonds Director Vernon L. Clark reported today. Sales surged up 45.7 per cent above the mid-June figure to reach \$443,514,000, the best half-month's volume since January.

"This marked increase resulted from the Treasury's 'Back Your Future' June-July Savings Bonds Promotion which stressed investment in bonds as security for the future and their purchase as a check against inflation," Mr. Clark said.

While sales were increasing, redemptions were holding steady at the new 1946 low achieved in June, according to Mr. Clark's report.

"It does not take an economist to figure out from these facts that Americans are convinced savings bonds are both profitable and safe and not to be sacrificed except in a real emergency," said Mr. Clark.

The director took the occasion on behalf of the Treasury Department to thank newspapers, radio and other publicity and advertising media and their advertisers for tremendous support in space and time devoted to urging Americans to buy and hold savings bonds.

Texas U Graduate Winner of Safety Award for Safe Driving Editorial

A series of editorials on Texas highway traffic deaths embracing suggestions designed to lessen the death toll, won the annual Clarence E. Gilmore Safety Contest this year for Bo Byers, University of Texas graduate student and journalism tutor.

Byers who formerly worked on newspapers at Tyler and Marshall proposed more common-sense practices by drivers and an increase in the state highway patrol force as methods of reducing the number of traffic deaths which are increasing.

The safety contest award—\$40 this year—is financed from interest on a fund left to the university and named in honor of the late Clarence E. Gilmore, former member of the Railroad Commission, and an early worker in the Texas Safety Association. The editorials are written on assignment in a journalism course. Committeemen who judged the 16 entries were Paul J. Thompson, DeWitt Reddick and Granville Price, all of the university's department of journalism.

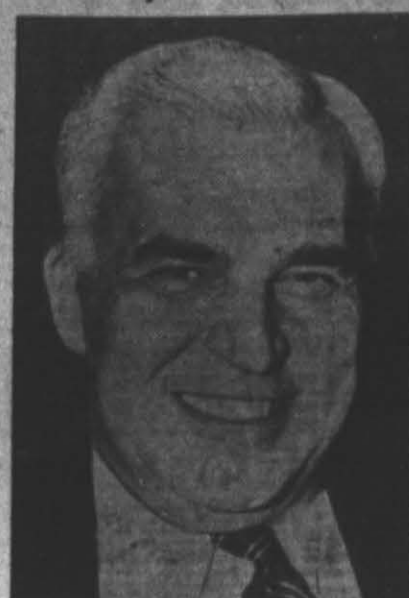

A serious situation exists at the Plainview Polio Center, however, because of the lack of co-operation on the part of many county chapters in paying their portion of the funds needed to provide necessary equipment and trained personnel.

In his letter to the county chairmen, Cook wrote, in part: "Since the 2nd day of July when our 5-year old daughter was taken ill with polio, we have done nothing but think, talk, and investigate Polio.

"We were sent to Plainview Clinic for isolation period of about three weeks, and the clinical work which would follow. Our doctor told us this was the new "Polio Center" for Northwest Texas, and we were much relieved to know that we could find treatment so close. However, on further investigation, we find that although the new annex to the hospital at Plainview is completed, the clinic is not in operation and children who should have treatment under the direction of a registered Physical Therapist are returning home to restore their paralyzed muscles."

In closing his letter, Cook made a heart-stirring appeal to all county Foundation chapters to contribute to the Plainview Center.

"Last week," he pointed out, "the Clinic had polio patients from Pampa, McLean, Amarillo, Vega, Littlefield, Olney, Hereford, Lubbock, Hobbs, N. M., and Magdalena, N. M.

"At present, there is no place in the Panhandle for a polio patient. If you have not made your own contribution, do so now. Children come to Plainview every day, stay during the isolation period, and are turned out for lack of clinical treatment because you boys are holding the purse strings on the money that all the people have contributed."

The letter was sent out at the request of the Committee for Underprivileged Children of the Vega Kiwanis Club.

of any candidate in any election. The attorney general's ruling upheld this opinion that write-in votes would be counted and would not constitute mutilation of the ballot.

Judge Baird, who had previously announced that he would not be a candidate for re-election, in a statement to the voters this week in reply to the advertisement published by his supporters last week stated that he did not intend to be a candidate, but would accept the nomination only if a majority of voters in the county wanted him to return to office and signified their desire by polling for him a majority vote on the first ballot.

"I will not take part in a runoff election," Baird said, "and if I do not receive a clear majority in the primary, but should receive enough votes to place me in the run-off, I will ask the Democratic party officials to certify the names of the other two leading candidates for the run-off ballot."

Another county race which appears to be "hot" is that for the office of sheriff, with four candidates, Horace W. Balise, Leland W. Robbs, J. C. Reese and H. N. (Joe) Bishop on the ticket.

In the district races, two offices are hotly contested. John Aldridge, the incumbent, and Harry Schultz are candidates for District Judge; and King Fike, candidate for re-election, and Floyd H. Richards are in the race for District Attorney.

An election board will be set up at the City Drug Store Saturday night, and returns in all races will be posted as soon as they are available.
