## Hundred Farmers To Lose Money If Papers Un-Signed

According to F. C. Collier, secretary of the Deaf Smith County ACA, there are more than 100 farmers in the county who are about to lose several thousand dollars in conservation payments unless they come in to the local office not later than Monday to sign up.

Deadline for signing for 1945 conservation program practices was originally set for June 30, but farmers who come to the office on Monday will still be permitted to sign, Collier says. Several thousand dollars in payments for conservation practices performed under the '45 program will be lost unless the papers are signed up.

Notices have been mailed to all farmers entitled to the payments, Collier said, but some of the cards may have been lost and others may have been overlooked. The ACA is anxious to make all payments due.

## COMMUNITY BUILDERS: J. E. BEYER, Railroader Joe Beyer Retiring After Over 50 Years of Working on the Railroad

Joe Beyer, Hereford's popular general agent for the Santa Fe, is going to retire next Monday after more than a half century of "working on the railroad."

Joe Beyer has been with the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe for more years than most Santa Fe officials can remember. Despite the fact that he is top man in seniority among Santa Fe agents and could have had his choice of jobs for a number of years, he's stayed in Hereford for nearly a quarter of a century because he likes it here.

Eligible for retirement when the war began, he voluntarily stayed with the job until younger men came back from the service. Now with nearly 53 years of railroading behind him (exactly 52 years, 9 months, and 15 days, says Joe Beyer) he's ready to call it a day.

But he's not ready to leave Hereford. "I never was at a place I liked as well as Hereford," he laughs, when asked about his future plans. "Why should I leave it?"

Mr. and Mrs. Beyer have their home here, among people whom they describe as "the best friends in the world," and have no intention of living anywhere else. They like the climate, they like the people, and they don't like moving.

Since 1897, when he took over his first job as agent, Mr. Beyer has lived in only three cities. "I stayed at Garfield, Kansas, for seven years," he says. "When



I left there, I told them I'd stay 14 years at the next station, and 28 years at the third, doubling every time." He did. After 14 years at Mooreland, Oklahoma, as agent, the Beyers came to Hereford. They've been here 24 years and fully intend to stay the remaining four and as many more as the Lord may provide.

Born a Hoosier, Joe Beyer was transplanted to Kansas, and became a Texan by adoption.

He was born in Plymouth, Indiana, on February 8, 1877, which makes him a surprisingly young 69. His family moved to Western Kansas a year later, and

## Castro County Votes Bonds For Paving 25-Mile Avenue

Voters in Castro county's precinct 2, in the southwest quarter of the county, voted last Saturday to issue \$200,000 in bonds to finance the paving of a lateral road to cover all of 25-Mile avenue in that precinct.

The project includes approximately 16 miles of the avenue, beginning at a point on Highway 86 about four miles west of Dimmitt and running due south to the Castro-Lamb county line.

This is the first of a series of proposed lateral farm-to-market roads which Castro county has marked for paving on a long range plan. The remainder of 25-mile avenue in Castro county, running north from High-

## Woman Injured In Leap From Burning Car

Mrs. Bill McReynolds is in Deaf Smith County Hospital recovering from injuries received when she jumped with her baby in her arms from a burning car on 25-Mile avenue Tuesday night.

The child was uninjured except for minor bruises. Mrs. McReynolds is suffering from severe bruises, and x-rays have been made to check against more serious injury.

The car, a 1934 Ford coach, caught fire as Mr. and Mrs. McReynolds were driving on 25-Mile avenue a short distance south of Hereford at about 10 o'clock Tuesday night. Mrs. McReynolds became excited when flames burst from the engine, and leaped from the car with the baby. McReynolds, who was driving, brought the car to a stop and was not injured.

McReynolds believed that the blaze was caused by a faulty carburetor.

The Hereford Fire Department was called, but the dispatcher at the city hall misunderstood the location and sent the fire department out on south Main street, instead of 25-Mile avenue. The firemen, unable to locate a fire, returned to the station, thinking it had been a false alarm.

The car was almost completely destroyed by the flames.

## False Alarms and Wrong Addresses Plague Firemen

One false alarm and two wrong addresses kept the Hereford Volunteer Fire Department on the run this week.

Firemen were alerted at 11 o'clock Sunday night by a telephoned report of a fire at Fraser elevators, but quickly returned to home base after finding no fire and no trace of the alarmist.

Tuesday night at about 10 o'clock, the Firemen were interrupted in the middle of a ball game by a reported fire on South Main street, and finding no fires to fight after a quick run to the scene, returned to the ball park to finish shelling out the VFW by a 12 to 6 score.

It was no false alarm, however, but a bum steer because a car was blazing merrily on south 25-Mile avenue (not South Main as reported) and burned to the rims while the ball game went on.

A third alarm early Wednesday morning sent the Firemen rushing to Ike's Cafe on another bum steer, while a coast (could that be a "bum steer" too?) blazed merrily in the oven at Florence's Cafe a block down the street. The roast was a total loss, but the cafe suffered nothing but smoke and the firemen lost nothing but sleep.

## How Ships Will Lie in Target Zone

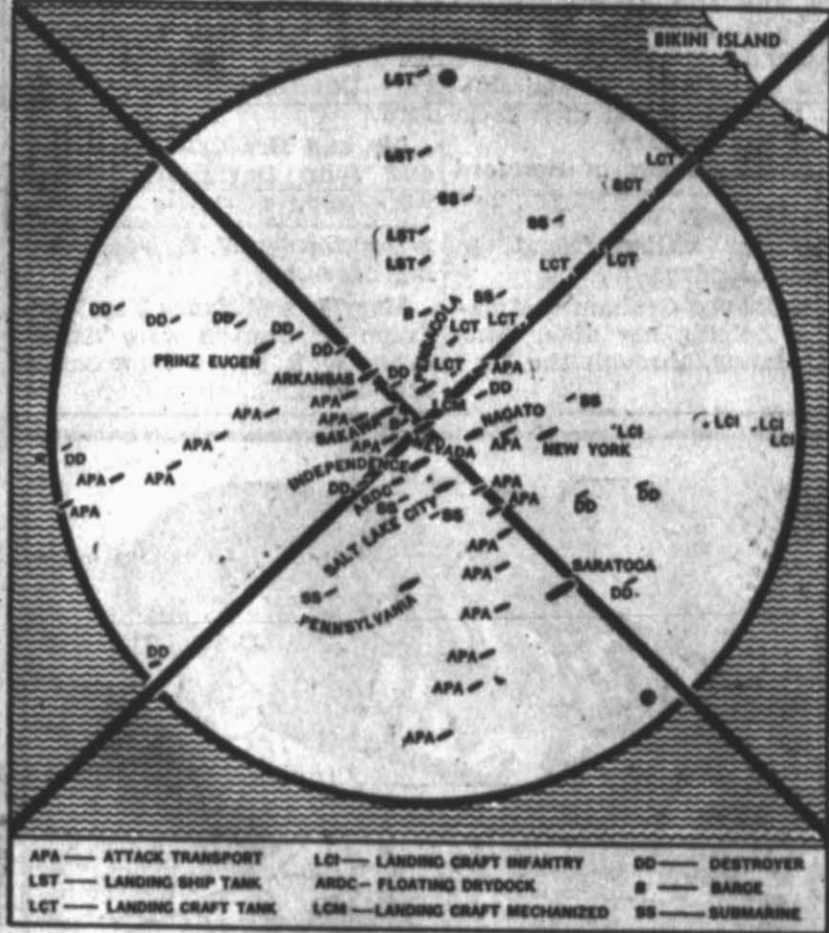

ing. Miss Sadie Lee Oliver, county Home Demonstration agent, discussed the Blue Cross Hospitalization plan and the clubs which have enrolled as members; and reminded the club representatives present about the current drive to collect food to be sent abroad for famine relief.

## Urges Program Of Progress For Hereford

"If Hereford is going to have progress, Hereford is going to have higher taxes," Mayor W. E. Dameron bluntly told members of the Hereford Lions Club Wednesday noon.

In talks before both Lions and Rotary clubs during the past week, Mayor Dameron outlined plans of the present city administration for growth and improvement of Hereford, and made a powerful appeal for public support in carrying out the program.

"Hereford is at least eight or ten years behind in the progress it should have made," Dameron told the club groups.

Pointing out that city revenues, cut to the bone during depression years, are now far too small to support the growth and progress demanded by the city, Dameron stated flatly that taxes must go up if Hereford is to keep pace.

"How many businesses," he asked, "are operating today with the same overhead which they required ten years ago?"

The city administration is ready with long-range plans for a progressive program for Hereford, and is doing everything in its power to carry them out, but city revenues are going to have to be increased before very much can be done, he said.

The city, in conjunction with county and school district officials, has already employed a firm of tax engineers to make a complete survey of city property and make fair and equitable property valuations. Present valuations of city property, it is estimated, are at least 50 percent below actual values.

As one of the first steps in the program, Mayor Dameron advocates the formation of a Board of City Development, to be composed of representatives from the Chamber of Commerce and all civic clubs. Such a board would act in an advisory (Continued on Page 8)

having no voice in the matter at the time, young Joe went along.

He got his first job with the Santa Fe at Sterling, Kansas, in 1893, when he was 16. "I got in trouble with a school teacher and quit school," Joe recalls with a grin. A neighbor offered him a job with the railroad. "How old are you," he asked. "Sixteen," was the reply. "But you have to be 18 to take the job." "O. K., I'm 18," said Joe airily, and became baggage agent for the Sterling station.

That was in September of 1893, and he held the job for three years, meanwhile learning telegraphy. His first job as an operator came in 1896.

"It was the custom in those days," Joe recalls, "to put a new operator on a 'hot' line for a test. My first message nearly knocked me off the key. It was an order assigning me to a job as relief operator. Somehow I got the message . . . and the job!"

Beyer worked during 1896 and '97 as a telegraph operator, went on his first job as station agent in 1897 at Garfield, Kansas. He was, and still is, a fast operator. "You had to be good in those days," he recalls. "There weren't any telephones, and

Jr. started out with the railroad, but switched to electrical engineering and now has his own business in Hutchinson, Kansas. Their only daughter is the wife of Rev. W. H. Hicks, former Hereford boy, now living in Little Rock, Arkansas.

The Beyers came to Hereford in 1922. This was one of the biggest livestock shipping points on the Santa Fe at that time, Beyer recalls. Not much wheat was shipped then. Since that time, wheat has topped livestock in freight loadings, and potatoes and vegetable crops are now threatening to top both.

Mr. Beyer has been a member of the Hereford Chamber of Commerce since his first year in the city. He is a member of the First Methodist Church, and of the Hereford Masonic Lodge. A Mason since 1908, he went through the Consistory and became a 32nd degree mason (highest order of the craft) in 1911 and a Shriner in 1915. He is a member of Khiva Temple of Amarillo.

He is proudest of his record with the railroad. After more than a half century of railroading, there's not a black mark against it, and he says with pride that "As far as I know, I haven't an enemy on the road."

capacity to the city administration in planning long range improvements for Hereford.

Some of the improvements which Mayor Dameron advocated include:

Major extension of City Sewage and Water Systems. Many city lots, he pointed out, which would provide desirable building sites, are being passed up by home builders because they cannot get water and sewer service.

Parks and playgrounds. Work is already being carried out in improving and cleaning up the present parks. The park system needs to be extended. The swimming pool, for which bonds were voted in April, will be built as soon as the bonds can be sold and materials obtained, and playground equipment will be provided. Swimming pool bonds cannot be sold at the present time because city revenues are too low to support the issue.

"I'm all for Hereford's children," Dameron said. "My own children are grown up now," he added, "but I'd like to see the kids of Hereford have a better place to live than mine had."

City Paving. "A great many people have asked about paving of major streets. Other cities in the Panhandle are going ahead with such projects now, and the property owners are paying for the job themselves. The cities are providing the caliche base, hiring the engineers and paving the intersections. Property owners are paying for the paving, each property owner paying for his half of the street. Why can't we do that in Hereford?"

Beautification of Homes and Public Buildings. "I can remember a time," Dameron said, "when our courthouse square was one of the beauty spots of the Panhandle. There was a time when Hereford was known as the cleanest little city in West Texas. It's not any more. It's ratty." If every home owner would spend time planting and beautifying his lawn, Dameron suggested, Hereford could be improved immeasurably.

A Cleaner City. The City administration is already negotiating for street sweeping equipment, the Mayor said. He paid high tribute to the people of Hereford for their whole-hearted co-operation in the recent clean-up campaign, and advocated continued vigilance on the part of everyone to keep the town cleaned up. "That's a 365-day a year project," Dameron told of many persons who came to him after the clean-up campaign proudly ex-

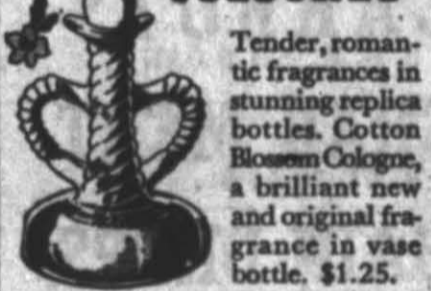
