Barringer kept busy with special Desert Storm duty

Norfolk, Va.--During Desert Storm the officers of squadron VAW-125 called Navy Ensign Greg Barringer "the Bull" and it wasn't because he hails from Hereford. The 32-year-old naval officer was the senior junior officer attached to the E-2C Hawkeye squadron, but no longer.

Barringer, the son of Roy and

Wenonah Barringer, came back from the war in March and stepped into a promotion in May. Barringer is now a lieutenant junior grade.

Formerly of Dimmitt, Barringer joined the Navy in 1981, five years after high school graduation. He remembers wanting to "get away from what everybody else does" and he (See BARRINGER, Page 2A)

Chiropractor using new techniques, computers

Since the invention of the personal computer, almost every industry has been revitalized and revamped to include the computer. The medical field is no exception. Computers are being used as diagnostic tools and to monitor treatment progression.

Dr. Gerald Glasscock, chiropractor, has one of 75 computers worldwide designed to read X-rays off the light board and make immediate diagnosis.

"The light board is connected to the computer," said Glasscock. "The computer memory has an image of a perfect spine. When the computer reads the X-rays, it compares the spines and immediately makes a diagnosis and pinpoints the problem areas. You can see it on the screen and make adjustments."

Glasscock's high tech office also has a machine hooked up to the

computer that measures muscle strength. The machine looks like a weight machine. Patients do a series of tests involving all the muscles and the computer makes a diagnosis on muscle strength.

"We are using this machine for pre-employment evaluations," he said. "People who are entering jobs that require a lot of lifting come in to be tested to make sure they can handle the job. Some employers are starting to require endurance tests prior to employment."

The machine also helps in rehabilitation. It can be turned into a weight machine to strength and recondition the weakened area.

Nutrition is a hot topic of these days and it is a vital part of Glasscock's business.

"We do nutritional counseling to help people get their diets right," said the chiropractor who has been in

private practice for four years. "We use a computer to measure fat and muscle mass. We enter information about the person's height, weight and habits. The computer makes a diagnosis of the physical fitness of an individual."

Glasscock uses a Futrex 5000 the muscle mass evaluation. A similar model was first used by the FDA to test leanness of beef.

Other fitness relation equipment Glasscock has available includes a computer read EKG machine and a spirometer.

"Before the computer read EKG, a cardiologist had to analyze the results, now the computer reads the data and we can have the results right then. The spirometer measures lung capacity. This is the strongest indicator of life expectancy.

"I see a trend in computers in general," said Glasscock. The (See GLASSCOCK, Page 2A)

Guerrero chosen to give special musical program

Raul Guerrero was blessed with the special talent of making music and expressing his beliefs through song.

Guerrero will be sharing his skills with others as he will help Sister Anita DeLuna, Superior General of the Missionary at the Mexican-American Cultural Center Summer program. The 1991 year marks the 100th Anniversary of "Rerum Novarum," which teaches modern Catholicism.

His program will be entitled, "Hispanic Spirituality: Hunger for Justice Expressed in Prayer and Song."

"Being asked to do this is a big honor," Guerrero said. "MACC is a nation wide program. They have their own publications. Hopefully they will help me publish my songs."

Music has always been of interest to Guerrero.

"When I was seven years old, I realized I could sing," he said. "I also play guitar and harmonica."

"Even though I've always loved music, I didn't start taking it seriously until five years ago. I started out writing for other people, but I didn't get much out of it."

Guerrero's songs have been distributed all over the U.S. He has

received compliments from California to Michigan. Guerrero has been asked to speak in Michigan, but says he doesn't have time for speaking engagements.

"My album (titled "Ya Eres Una Mujer, You Are Now a Lady") did better in my hometown (Hereford) than I expected," said the singer-composer. "Hereford supported me and helped me out. The response was tremendous."

During the MACC program, most of Guerrero's songs off the album will be played and incorporated into the program.

"I made the album two years ago," he said. "It (the album) has taken longer to make it than I thought. I'm getting more response now. People are starting to recognize me as a composer."

Guerrero's songs cover a wide range of topics.

"I have songs to a daughter, son, friend, family, a Christmas song and even a ballad," Guerrero said. "All my songs have different messages. The album covers a wide range of areas."

Ideas for songs come to Guerrero in different ways.

"Most of my inspiration comes from happenings. It starts out like sort of a wave that flows through my head. I take the idea and grab it. Some

ideas have got away and some I have captured.

"The melody and words flow through my head. I repeat them over and over until they are recorded there."

Guerrero said his personal favorite song is "Un Mejor Amigo, A Best Friend."

"When I have a song that I have written and I need criticism, I sing it for about five or six people. I can tell by the way they are reacting with their hands and feet, whether it is good or not."

"I want people to feel a little meditation and relaxation from my music," Guerrero said. "We need more listening music where we can relax. That's what I'm looking for."

Guerrero has spent a lot of time recently getting ready for MACC.

"Getting ready for the conference involves lots of practice. I have also been getting speeches together," he said.

In January, Sister DeLuna was in Hereford and met Guerrero at San Jose Catholic Church.

"When Sister came here she wanted to meet me," Guerrero said with excitement. "She complimented me on my songs and asked if I would like to do the program with her. It was a really great honor. She said she believes in me. She told me 'Raul, I don't know if you know this, but you've got it.'"

Throw out all old medications

If you're like most Americans, cleaning out your medicine chest is probably not at the top of your list of things to do. A recent survey, sponsored by the Council on Family Health, revealed that one in 3,000 households (35 percent) have never or can't recall the last time they discarded out-of-date medicines.

Like many other products, medicines have expiration dates. Once the expiration date has passed, that medicine should be discarded. It is no longer of any use and could become an extra hazard to a child's safety. Other medicines that should be discarded include:

- prescription medicines which, according to doctor's advice, no longer need to be taken.

- any medicine which has a noticeable change in color or odor.

- medicines for which the label or package instructions are missing or cannot be read clearly.

In light of continued product tampering incidents, the Council on Family Health advises consumers to examine all product packaging carefully. Do not purchase any medicine whose packaging has been tampered with or broken.

When disposing of medicines, pour the contents down the sink,

Utility companies improve education in America

Training tomorrow's workforce today: That's the goal of America's utility companies, who are working with educators to develop a skilled workforce that can meet the competitive challenges of the world marketplace of the '90s -- and beyond.





Dallas Morning News on Medicaid financing:

Medicaid, which pays for the health care of poor people, today accounts for about 13 percent of a state's budget. Only several years ago, it was just 4 percent. The quantum leap in spending is no mystery. Congressional mandates in recent years have required states to expand their Medicaid programs and provide coverage to millions more of the impoverished.

As welcome as the program expansions have been to the disadvantaged, they have placed a tremendous burden on state coffers. . . Faced with those additional requirements and fiscal pressures, eight states, including Texas, have resorted to a creative fund-raising technique to extract more money from the federal government.

Essentially, states collect donations from hospitals, count those contributions as part of the state share of Medicaid, then receive federal matching money for every dollar donated. . .

The states' fund raising is in jeopardy, however. Even though the federal courts have upheld the legitimacy of the financing technique and Congress explicitly has permitted it to continue, Bush administration officials complain that the matching payments are costing the federal treasury \$1 billion a year. The budget watchers are writing rules to end the practice.

Sooner or later, Congress and the administration will have to come up with some comprehensive answers for escalating health care costs. But in the meantime, the administration should take a more charitable view of the matching payments. . .

If the Bush administration persists with its hard-nosed approach, it could end up hurting millions of America's poor.

At last, the Texas Legislature has come up with a proposal so ingenious—nay, brilliant—that we can bestow upon it our wholehearted endorsement and perhaps even enhance it with a few innovations of our own.

We are referring, of course, to a bill introduced by Rep. Tom Craddick, R-Midland, that would give Texas motorists the opportunity to purchase, for a mere \$5, a coupon that would allow them to travel up to 70 mph on most interstate highways. . .

And here's the really great news: The incident would not go on their driving record or affect their insurance premiums.

Editor zaps Wal-Mart

Editor's Note: Snyder publisher Roy McQueen, in a letter to Sam Walton, head of Wal-Mart Corp., used the occasion of a visit to Snyder to editorially comment on a subject that afflicts most small towns across America. It's a message that bears repeating:

Dear Mr. Walton:

Last week, you visited Snyder and your store here. Since your store has chosen not to advertise with us since December, I was surprised that we were called to take a picture of your visit. Our staff, as trained, took the picture. I had to wonder why the U.S. Postal Service or your national mailer was not called, and the obvious answer is they are not in the readership business.

There has been no newspaper advertising since Christmas, yet we are expected as a newspaper to do our civic duty in promoting your store through our news department. We are frequently asked to take pictures of your contributions, etc.

I believe that a newspaper is an important and vital part of a small town. For the past four years, I have been personally involved and have used the resources of our newspaper to help attract the 1,000-bed prison unit and its \$7 million payroll to Snyder. We are continuing to work to have that unit expanded by 1,000 beds. I have made numerous trips to Huntsville, Austin and other places at my own expense with the purpose of improving the economy of Snyder.

When we raised \$1 million in just three weeks to pay for prison incentives, our newspaper contributed \$30,000. Wal-Mart has yet to make a financial contribution. That's your business, but it would seem you would choose to do business with firms that help improve your market. We had no contributions from the post office or your national mailer.

You mentioned being impressed with our airport. It was at my own expense that a group of citizens went to Fort Worth to appear before the FAA to seek funds for airport improvements. Nobody from the post office or your national mailer helped with this project.

We are good corporate citizens and use our newspaper to promote the betterment of Snyder and Scurry County. Cooperation is a two-way street, and it seems that consideration of the Snyder Daily News as the medium for both your inserts and ads makes good economic sense.

Your national advertising likes to promote real America, and nothing is more real than the local newspaper that promotes the betterment of its town in rural America. You are the largest retailer in Snyder, and some help from you and your associates would be greatly appreciated. In return, you'll get more than your money's worth.

The state would sell the coupons in books of five and pocket the money.

According to Craddick, if one-third of the licensed drivers in Texas bought just one book each, the state could raise about \$100 million in a year.

So why limit a clever revenue-producing scheme like that to such piddling transgressions as speeding along the state's highways? . . .

The attorney general's office could establish a sliding price scale under which a variety of state-sanctioned indulgences could be purchased, ranging from \$100 for simple assault to as much as \$1,000 or more for shooting holes in people. Given the popularity of such sport in these parts, Texas could turn a tidy profit overnight - and solve prison overcrowding. . .

Now, aren't all of you out there sorry for thinking the Legislature does only dumb things?

San Antonio Light on state ethics bill:

The Texas House of Representatives last week came out with an ethics bill that amounted to half a loaf - and on this issue, half a loaf is not better than none.

Months ago the Senate came out with its own ethics bill, which is different from but necessarily much better than the House version. If the two chambers do not combine the best elements of each bill in creating the final version, Gov. Ann Richards should make them start all over again. . .

Some lawmakers have complained that the public doesn't care about the ethics issue, claiming that only the news media are harping on the subject. But the people do care about ethics - it's just that too many have already decided that the political system is corrupt, and that the elected officials cannot be trusted to do anything to clean it up. . .

A strong ethics bill will help win back the voters' trust in the political system. The Legislature should settle for nothing less.



Kevin Reimer's two-out RBI single gave Texas the lead in the first and the Rangers broke the game open in the third. Holman hit Rafael Palmeiro with a pitch and Ruben Sierra hit into a fielder's choice. Julio Franco singled, Reimer hit a comebacker and Sierra beat Holman's throw home.

After a flyout, Geno Petralli singled and Buechele followed with his seventh home run of the season.

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Chris Perry leads, 4 tied at one shot back in Colonial

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - Chris Perry says he's spent seven fun-filled years on the PGA Tour, earning a fair share of money and flirting with a victory or two.

Now he's ready to win one and he is determined to do so.

"I may not win this week but I'm sure going to try," said Perry, 29, who took a 1-shot lead into today's third round of the \$1.2 million Colonial.

The former Ohio State All-American fired a 5-under-par 65 Friday after an opening 66 and was at

9-under 131, one stroke ahead of a veteran quartet that included 1987 Colonial champion Keith Clearwater.

Clearwater and Stan Utley attacked the rain-soaked Colonial greens with a vengeance, shooting 6-under-par 64s and sharing second place with Gene Sauers and Wayne Levi,

the reigning PGA player of the year. Sauers shot his second straight 66, while Levi had a 65 to go with an opening-round 67.

Mark Calcavecchia and Fred Funk, co-leaders after the first round with 65s, shot 68s and reached the midway

point tied at 133 with Loren Roberts, who had a 66 on Friday.

Perry, whose best finish was a tie for second last year at Hartford, said he's been struggling to overcome "self doubts" with a more confident, aggressive approach.

Almost to a man, the leaders joked that they needed psychiatric help more than professional instructions to cure their various golfing ills.

"It was an exciting round," sighed Tom Watson, who spliced 68 onto an opening 68 and was only three shots back at 134. "I missed the short putts and made the long ones, typical of what I've been doing all year. I've accepted the fact that I'm not perfect."

Asked if he turned a 64 into a 66, he said, "No. I turned a 70 into a 66. I got away with something."

Among the name players who failed to make the cut was Ben Crenshaw, the defending champion whose 145 missed by three shots. Others at 143 or above were Payne Stewart, Peter Jacobsen and Mark O'Meara.

Lakers rebound

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP) - Vlade Divac didn't play very well in the first two games of the Western Conference final, but he made up for it with an inspired six minutes in Game 3.

"Vlade was very active; he was a spark on both ends of the court," the Lakers' Magic Johnson said. "He was very aggressive."

The Trail Blazers, who had trouble getting good shots because of the Lakers' tenacious defense, were led by Jerome Kersey with 19 points and Clyde Drexler with 18.

Los Angeles, outrebounded 51-28 in losing Game 2, were closer this time, although Portland still held a 48-40 edge on the boards.

Los Angeles won the opening game 111-106 at Portland, with the Trail Blazers taking the second 109-98.

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

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Star emerges at A&M

DALLAS (AP) - Spring football training has ended at Southwest Conference schools and perhaps the single biggest star to emerge was at College Station.

If you missed it, here are redshirt freshman Greg Hill's numbers from Texas A&M's final intrasquad scrimmage: 24 carries for 165 yards, including a long run of 66 yards.

The Aggies lost Darren Lewis, the leading rusher in SWC history, but they have waiting in the wings a running back from Dallas who runs a legitimate 4.4 in the 40. They also return Randy Simmons, who had 14 carries for 73 yards, not to mention a celebrated crop of recruits that

includes Rodney Thomas.

"Greg has the ability to break one all the way for a touchdown from any place on the field and we haven't had that kind of speed in a longtime," said Texas A&M coach R.C. Slocum.

Defending champion Texas got a long, strong look at its quarterback cadre after Peter Gardere suffered a knee injury. Steve Clements showed a strong arm. And so did the Longhorns defense, which could rate right up there with some of the very best in the burnt orange helmet-rattling tradition.

Baylor welcomed back quarterback J.J. Joe from injury as did Texas Christian and Leon Clay. Both were lost for the season after injuries last year. Also, Baylor coach Grant Teaff

greeted a defense that will be the envy of every school from the Atlantic to the Pacific next year.

Texas Tech's Robert Hall, another quarterback injured last fall campaign, was back on duty and coach Spike Dykes put in a 3-4 defense to replace the 4-3 setup to be able to defend the pass easier.

"I thought we adapted very well to the new defense," said Dykes. "We are unknown on defense but I do know we will be faster. On offense, we have a chance to be outstanding."

Houston spent spring training trying to find a running back to replace Chuck Weatherspoon while new Southern Methodist new coach Tom Rossie was busy getting his offense installed on the Hilltop.

Also, did you hear about David Klinger's spring scrimmage at Houston where he passed for over 1,000 yards and threw 22 touchdown passes? Obviously, the Cougars still have plenty of receiving talent to complement Klinger's golden arm.

At Rice, the fast-improving Rice Owls were grooming Greg Willig to replace Donald Hollas and over in Fayetteville, Ark., the devastated Razorbacks were trying to piece together a team and find a replacement for quarterback Quinn Grove after winning just one conference game.

Arkansas will play one more year in the SWC before leaving for the Southeastern Conference, which the Hogs consider more competitive.

"If our players report back hungry and in good condition and if we keep everyone academically, there is no reason we shouldn't be an improved football team," coach Jack Crowe

said.

After last year's 3-8 disaster, it wouldn't take much.

The SWC shook up its schedule for 1991 to promote interest and there are some interesting changes.

Baylor got the biggest blow because it lost a bye before playing Arkansas and the Aggies gained a bye before playing Baylor in what traditionally is a physical matchup.

Arkansas must play Houston and Texas back-to-back. The Cougars have to play A&M and Texas back-to-back but get a week off in-between.

Texas has only one change. The Longhorns must open against Jackie Sherrill's Mississippi state team on Sept. 7.

Texas Tech gets TCU as an SWC opener instead of Baylor which has opened the Raiders SWC schedule for 13 years.

National magazines are touting Texas, A&M, Houston and Baylor as Top 25 teams.

Houston, of course, returns Klinger, who is sure to be at the top of the Heisman Trophy lists.

Texas has a wealth of talent on hand from its Cotton Bowl team but the Longhorns will have to somehow get over the fearful beating they took from the Miami Hurricanes.

The Aggies are loaded again with veteran quarterback Bucky Richardson, MVP of the Holiday Bowl, guiding a run-oriented offense.

Baylor will be dangerous if the offense will keep its defense off the field.

The big surprise could be at Lubbock if the Red Raiders develop their offensive line and the new defense catches on.

Cats at risk from FIP

Feline infectious peritonitis (FIP) is a viral disease that kills at least half a million cats a year in the U.S. This makes FIP the most serious disease of cats for which there is no effective treatment. However, cat owners can now protect their cats from FIP with a new vaccine.

Since its discovery 25 years ago, FIP has been one of the most frustrating diseases facing veterinarians and cat owners. Among the frustrations, FIP cannot be cured. Once a cat shows clinical signs of the disease, death is virtually certain. Treatments can only ease the cat's suffering somewhat and prolong life briefly.

Experts also don't know exactly how it spreads. And there is no way to specifically diagnose FIP in its early stages. Signs of the disease include everything from loss of appetite, lethargy and weight loss to excessive thirst and urination, fever, vomiting, diarrhea, liver failure, paralysis, eye inflammation, seizures, loss of balance, and blindness.

The new vaccine, Primucell FIP, enables veterinarians to protect against FIP for the first time. Developed by SmithKline Beecham Animal Health, the intranasal vaccine is given in two doses, three to four weeks apart. Then, annual boosters are recommended.

Pet owners, concerned about FIP, should visit their veterinarian to determine the level of risk faced by their cats and whether vaccination is appropriate. For cats at risk from FIP, prevention is the best medicine.

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
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



MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

Communication and Leadership

Great leaders are almost always great communicators. Studies show that those who rise to the top in their professions express themselves well. They are the movers and shakers who get things done. They persuade others by speaking fluently and writing convincingly.

Several years ago, Harvard University studied the success characteristics of a large group of corporate leaders. The group was comprised of board chairmen, presidents and chief executive officers of Fortune 500 companies. These men and women listed the top three reasons they had risen to leadership roles.

Their responses may surprise you. The No. 1 reason for success was the ability to get along well with people. Second, they listed the ability to communicate effectively. In third place was enthusiasm.

As I considered these answers, I wondered, "How can we get along with people if we don't communicate effectively?" Perhaps, the most important success factor is the ability to commu-

nicate well.

All Fluff, No Stuff

Good communication skills are a part of good leadership. However, they are not a substitute for leadership. I know several talented talkers who can excite an audience. Unfortunately, their words hold no lasting message. They are like cotton candy -- all fluff and no stuff.

These charismatic characters accomplish little. They often bounce from cause to cause and from project to project. When the false excitement dies, they move on.

True leadership is hard work. We are not born as leaders. Neither are we born as great communicators. Most of us were born as babies, lacking leadership skills and nearly devoid of communication abilities. My daughter's early cries of "wet diaper" and "I'm starved" sounded the same to me.

Good communication is more than fluff. Speaking and writing skills must be developed. Like good leadership, communication is hard work.

Tips for Better Speaking

1) Be prepared. Gather information well in advance. Collect more information than you can possibly use. Then, prioritize until only the best remains.

2) Practice. Go over your presentation again and again. Practice in front of a mirror. Use a tape recorder. Eliminate difficult words and phrases.

3) Be brief. A good 30-minute speech should last about 15 minutes. Former President Roosevelt said, "Be sincere, be brief, be seated."

4) Don't worry about being nervous. Mark Twain once comforted a friend by saying, "Just remember, they don't expect much." Everyone experiences some pre-speech anxiety. Good preparation and practice will help you relax.

5) Don't read your speech. That is "public reading," not public speaking. Condense it into an outline so that you work from key phrases and words.

And Better Writing

1) Before you write, ask four questions: To whom are you writing? Why are you writing? What do you wish to accomplish? When do you want the action to occur?

2) Get right to the point. If you are writing a letter, make sure the person's name, title and address are correct. In the first paragraph, tell your reader why you are writing.

3) Identify key information. Give your reader precise details. If you are referring to an order, use the invoice, order and check number. If you refer to a third party, give the full name.

4) Keep it short and simple. Write like you talk. Avoid big words and pompous phrases. Use short sentences and paragraphs.

5) Edit until your hand cramps. We usually revise this column four or five times before sending it to the publisher. We check spelling and grammar and eliminate unnecessary words.

I encourage you to use these tips in your speeches and letters to continually build your communication skills. The world needs your leadership!



Penny likes challenge of 'Jake' role

The predictability trap. That's probably Joe Penny's biggest complaint with his district attorney series *Jake and the Fatman*. The CBS criminal catcher is now in its fourth season and looking toward its fifth. But after 90-odd episodes, what can you do differently, asks Penny?

"The show is kind of its own entity. Now it's got its own rhythm and its own format: Bad guy kills the girl. OK, second act — good guys try to find out who did it. Third act — we know the good guys are chasing the bad guys. Fourth act — the good guys get the bad guys. Fifth act — the crime is over, boom, smile and we're out."

Whether he wants to or not, Penny's under contract to do a fifth season of the show. "If my boss Mr. Jeff Sagansky decides to pick it up a fifth year, then I'll do a fifth, and if they decide to end it right now, then I'll end it right now. It's quite OK with me."

Penny's *Fatman* co-star William Conrad, also under contract for five years, says he'll definitely retire after next year. "This time I'm going to make it stick," says Conrad, whose career spans over 50 years and 350 movies and telefilms.

Both Conrad and Penny have expressed, at one time or another, unhappiness with the show's scripts. "Basically, what I'm always yelling about is for better scripts and better ideas," says Penny. "The actor is only as good as the written word. You can't do Shakespeare if you've got 'See spot run.'"

But Penny is quick to point out the show's writers have only about five to 10 days to crank out script after script after script. "You say 'OK, how can I go on and make this fresh everyday?' Sometimes you want to get away from that format, and the producers and executives who are making millions on

this package say, 'Don't screw with it, kid. If it ain't broke don't fix it. Just do it.'"

And they would definitely like to see the drama keep on doing it. *Jake and the Fatman* is the sixth-highest-rated drama on TV behind *Murder, She Wrote; Matlock; In the Heat of the Night; L.A. Law and Knots Landing*. Andy Griffith has signed for one last season of *Matlock*, and Angela Lansbury has more than once said, "Murder, She Don't." CBS has not yet officially announced it will pick up *Jake and the Fatman*, however.

If the show's not picked up, what will Penny do? "A lot of people have the attitude, 'Well, you should have something else on the air besides your series. Meanwhile, that's gonna be hard to enjoy from a hospital bed,' says Penny. "There is a thing called rest."

And after spending two years shooting the series in Hawaii, Penny still spends a lot of time on the road shooting the series.

The comedy, which replaced *ALF* on NBC last fall, centers on a young man who holds on to his upbeat, hip-hop lifestyle despite being transplanted from the ghettos of Philadelphia to the home of his uppercrust aunt and uncle in California.

Besides having input into the dialogue to keep it realistic, Grammy-winning rap artist Smith says he likes the show because he can simply be himself. "That's what's so good for me, is that the same person that you see now and the same person that my fans will see on stage and hear on the records is the same person that they'll see on television Monday nights at 8:00."

Despite the fun, Smith takes his role as the nephew of a wealthy, powerful Bel Air attorney seriously. "What really makes me happy about this show is ... there's black people on television that are articulate, you know, strong, powerful black men and women. And, you know, they would," he says.

Evidently he's right. The series became the highest-rated new situation comedy of the 1990-91 season and ranks 38th among all prime-time shows. It was among the first shows NBC confirmed would be returning next fall.

Kids apparently relate to the show because it represents the new slang, the new clothes and the new perspectives that set them apart from their parents' generation. "Fresh" in the name, for example, is what an earlier generation referred to as "cool."

"Hip-hop is a sub-culture," Smith explains. "And that's what a lot of people don't realize. When they say rap they think rap is everything. But no, it's a subculture... We can be proud of ourselves and proud of our own."

ABC hits the road for Indy 500

The greatest one-day event in sports celebrates its 75th anniversary Sunday, May 26, when the top names in auto racing line up for the running of the Indianapolis 500.

More than 300,000 fans are expected to converge on the fabled brickyard to watch the field of 33 drivers burn rubber for \$4.5 million in prize money. Millions more will be tuning in to ABC Sports for live race coverage complete with commentary by three-time Indy-winner Bobby Unser and racing experts Paul Page and Sam Posey.

This will be the sixth consecutive year that ABC Sports, which has earned four Emmys for its Indy specials, has presented live coverage of auto racing's most prestigious event. From 1971 through 1985 ABC provided exclusive same-day network coverage, and prior to that the race was carried on a delayed basis on ABC's *Wide World of Sports*. This year, ABC will be in the pits, the hospital area and the garage to bring up-to-the-minute reports in addition to the live telecast of the race.







LET'S TALK**James Stacy made comeback despite motorcycle accident**

Q: What movies did James Stacy appear in after his accident? Could you also tell me his age? —Natalie Croom, Abilene, Texas

A: James Stacy was born on Dec. 23, 1936, in Burbank, Calif. A few years after his 1973 motorcycle accident, in which he lost an arm and a leg, he returned to acting in the TV films *Just a Little Inconvenience* (playing a Vietnam double amputee), *Posse* and *My Kidnapper, My Love*. His *Lancer* series has been syndicated since 1971.

Q: Would you please tell me how many movies John Wayne performed in? If not, would you please tell me where I might find this out? —Doris Conner, Lamar, Colo.

A: I have in my possession the *Los Angeles Times* June 29, 1979, edition that carried a full section on John Wayne when he passed away. I quote from his obituary: "In terms of longevity and popular appeal, both in the United States and elsewhere, there simply never was an actor like him. He appeared in at least 154 films (some experts estimate as many as 217, but not even Wayne himself knew for sure)." I hope this answers your question.

Q: My husband and I were avid fans of Nelson Eddy and Jeanette MacDonald years ago. We are wondering if they are still active and what they have been doing? They were great! —Lorraine Ellsworth, Park Rapids, Minn.

A: Videotapes of some of their movies are available, but that is the only way you can enjoy their music now. MacDonald died in 1965, and Nelson Eddy passed on in 1967.

Q: I am a real big fan of Avery Brooks, and I have been wondering what he has been doing lately. I have been watching the reruns of *Spenser: For Hire* and really love Avery as Hawk. Can you please give me some information on him? How old is he, is he married, and has he done any other TV programs? Also, an address where I could write him. —Diane Baley, Massapequa, N.Y.

A: Avery Brooks was born Oct. 2 in Evansville, Ind. (There is no year of birth listed.) He attended both Oberlin College in Ohio and the University of Indiana, where teaching and music were his prime interests. After earning his master's degree in fine arts from Rutgers University in New Jersey, he stayed on for more than 13 years as a professor of theater arts. He then took a leave of absence to film the series. He is also a stage director and musician. He sings opera and plays keyboard in a jazz band. A very private person, he and his wife, Vicki (also a professor), reside in New Jersey with their three children. Brooks' credits include a rave review for his performance on Broadway in the one-man show *Paul Robeson, Roots: The Gift*, host of the series *Trackdown* and star of the ABC series *A Man Called Hawk*. Q: Could you please tell me who the two men were who were in the movie *Sabrina with Audrey Hepburn*? I think one of them might be Humphrey Bogart. I would love to see this movie again but can't seem to find it at video stores. Is it ever shown on TV? —Marilyn McNamara, Goodhue, Minn.

A: You are right about Humphrey Bogart; he was the older brother who ended up with Sabrina (Audrey). William Holden was the younger brother with whom Sabrina was first infatuated. AVALON: (1990) Starring Armin Mueller-Stahl, Aidan Quinn, Elizabeth Perkins and Joan Plowright.

Writer/director, Barry Levinson's Academy Award nominated film chronicles the lives and evolution of the Krinchinskys, an immigrant Jewish family in Baltimore, from the arrival of the patriarch, Sam, on July 4, 1914, through the marriages and parting of off-spring in the 1950s.

Levinson, the writer, uses multi-generational experiences that broadly span several lifetimes. In contrast, Levinson, the director, uses his camera on a more intimate scale. The two techniques produce a generous and touching film; a film whose story is essentially smaller than its own crowded and skillfully drawn landscape. It isn't, however, a sentimental tale of love and

resiliency. Rather, it is more a thoughtful examination of how modern American has torn apart the extended family.

Avalon, with brilliant direction and superb ensemble acting, is touching, funny and insightful. Rated a mild PG. This is a family film.

Four Boxes

THREE MEN AND A LITTLE LADY: (1990) Starring Tom Selleck, Ted Danson, and Steve Guttenberg.

Emile Ardolino's film picks up about five years after its predecessor, *Three Men And A Baby*. Though the child (Robin Weisman) has aged, her three caretakers still live in a child's paradise of self-centered obliviousness, and the baby's mom (Nancy Travis) still lives with the rich and carefree bachelors.

When mom's wedding bells threaten to break up the gang, the guys are off to England, to attend, or prevent, the nuptials. The journey to England does allow some entertaining antics, and overall the movie has a gentler,

more sweetly old-fashioned style than its predecessor. Rated a mild PG. Another family film.

Two Boxes

HAVANA: (1990) Starring Robert Redford.

There is romance in Sydney Pollack's sprawling, atmospheric film, but it has more to do with the city of Havana on the eve of a revolution that it does with its stars. The story is a grand epic set against the fiery backdrop of the Cuban Revolution. Playing an over-the-hill playboy gambler, Robert Redford is drawn into the country's turmoil by the beautiful revolutionary, Lean Olin.

The film's very slow pacing works against any real excitement the story could generate. It's rated R for mild violence, and mild mature themes. Get a very, very big bowl of popcorn before you roll the tape and you'll make it to the end just fine.





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Power of attorney benefits those mentally incompetent

POWER OF ATTORNEY FOR HEALTH CARE

We are daily bombarded with advertisements and suggestions that a "Living Will" will satisfy all concerns regarding medical decisions concerning your ability to experience a natural death without long term medical procedures prolonging life in a manner that many would not want to endure. Whether this document takes the form of a "Living Will" (which in most circumstances is unenforceable in Texas) or a Directive to Physicians (as provided in the Texas statutes) the total problem is not addressed.

The U.S. Supreme Court, in a case entitled *Cruzan vs. Missouri*, recognized that we have a fundamental right under the U.S. constitution to refuse unwanted medical treatment; however, the court was also clear that when a state has enacted procedures which control this decision, these statutes must be followed or your decision cannot be implemented. This is even more important when you need someone else to make these decisions for you after you have become unable to do so yourself.

In the Supreme Court case, Justice O'Connor wrote a concurring opinion which strongly urged people to use durable health care powers of attorney. She also strongly urged states to enact legislation to help implement this legal decision by those concerned with their future health care.

Last month in this column, we discussed the Texas Directive to Physicians under the Natural Death Act. The directives only apply to

procedures which the act defines as a "life-sustaining procedure." The definition is narrowly drafted and does not apply to all decisions which might cause a patient to be placed upon life support machinery for extended periods of time.

Did you know that in Texas a husband and wife may not automatically consent to the treatment of each other and that the only other person who could consent to such treatment would be a legal guardian? Did you know that in the event you are facing a life-threatening trauma, the state law presumes that doctors can use any and all procedures necessary to save and prolong your life?

The State of Texas has enacted legislation which, when used together with the Directive to Physicians, can address these concerns. A durable Power of Attorney for Health Care Purposes, if executed according to the

provisions and procedures provided in the statute, allows someone you trust to make decisions concerning your health care. This person which can implement your wishes in the event you are unable to make the decision yourself. As Justice O'Connor of the Supreme Court pointed out, this is a very powerful tool in exercising an individual's freedom to control medical treatment of his body.

Nutrition labeling revised

The Nutrition Labeling and Education Act of 1990 (NLEA), approved and signed into law in the waning days of the 101st Congress, mandates the first major changes in food labeling in almost 20 years.

Virtually all packaged foods are required to contain nutrition information on the label.

The required nutrition information must focus more on macronutrient data (calories, fat, protein, etc.) than current emphasis on micro-nutrient information (vitamins, mineral, etc.).

Nutrition information for fresh produce must be available at the point of sale under guidelines—not regulations-issued by the FDA.

Descriptors, such as "free," "low" and "light" may be used only according to FDA-regulated definitions.

Cholesterol information on labels must conform to detailed requirements spelled out in the law.

No health message may be on the label unless it fits the message approved by FDA.

All packaged products, including products for which there is a standard of identity, must contain full ingredient labeling.

States now have the right to enforce the new federal law while being pre-empted from adopting their own food labeling laws.

Earlier last year, FDA had initiated rulemaking proceedings on most of the issues included in the new law. Despite request from both industry and consumer organizations to withdraw those proposals in view of the legislation, FDA steadfastly refuses to do so.

Nevertheless, agency officials have candidly observed that most, if not all, the proposals will have to be significantly revised to conform to the new law's requirements. The revisions will require additional public comment.

Under FDA regulations prior to the NLEA, nutrition labeling was voluntary unless a nutritional claim was made for the food. If a product contained nutrition labeling, however, it had to follow the format and contain only the information prescribed in the regulations.

The NLEA makes nutrition labeling mandatory for virtually all packaged foods, changes to the content of nutrition labeling and directs FDA to adopt new regulations regarding format.

The new law calls for a label to contain a statement of serving size, number of servings, total calories, total calories from fat, amount of total fat, saturated fat, cholesterol, sodium, total carbohydrates, complex carbohydrates, sugars, dietary fiber and total protein in each serving.

FDA has the authority to require additional information. If a food contains "insignificant amounts," as determined by FDA, of all the required nutrient, nutrition labeling is not required unless a nutritional claim is made.

There also is an exemption for small business (\$500,000 or less in annual gross sales to consumers or \$50,000 or less of sales of food to consumers), and for products to restaurants or institutions.

The NLEA, as reported from the House Energy and Commerce Committee, extended mandatory nutrition labeling to the 20 varieties of fresh fruit, 20 varieties of fresh vegetables and 20 varieties of raw fish most frequently consumed annually in a given region, as determined by FDA. The retail grocery industry launched a massive lobbying effort against this provision and was at least partially successful.

As approved by Congress, the new law provides that within 12 months, FDA, after an opportunity for public comment, will issue guidelines for retail establishments selling fresh produce or seafood. FDA also must issue a regulation defining what constitutes "substantial compliance" by retailers with the guidelines.

Eighteen months later, FDA must report on whether or not there has been substantial compliance with the guidelines by retailers. If so, reports must be issued every two years; if not, FDA must issue regulations governing the provision of the required nutrition information for the 20 most consumed varieties of fresh fruits, vegetables and fish.

The regulations are to allow nutrition information to be provided at a single location and permit the

information to be expressed as an average or range per serving.

Using the terms that characterize the level of any nutrient is forbidden by the new law unless the term has been defined by an FDA regulation. FDA is specifically directed to issue regulation. FDA is specifically directed to issue regulations defining the terms "free," "low," "light or lite," "reduced," "less" and "high."

This means once the law is in effect, no word or phrase characterizing a nutrient level may be used until there is a specific FDA regulation defining the term.

High fiber claims are prohibited unless the food is also low in total fat. The law expressly forbids a claim that a nutrient is not present in the food unless the nutrient usually is present in the food.

No claim may be made on cholesterol if the food contains fat or saturated fat in an amount that increases the risk of disease, unless FDA finds, by regulation, that the level of cholesterol is "substantially less" than the level usually present in the food.

FDA may allow a statement regarding the absence of cholesterol but only if such a statement would assist consumers in maintaining healthy dietary practices and if the label also discloses that cholesterol is not usually present.

The label also must disclose with "appropriate prominence" the level of saturated fat in the food.

No health claims for food will be allowed unless the claim is specifically authorized by FDA regulation. The regulation must be based on "significant scientific, agreement" supporting the claim. For the first time, the law introduces the concept of pre-clearance of food label claims by FDA.

The law appears to differ from the Federal Trade Commissioner's policy that, before making an advertising claim, an advertiser must provide "substantiation" of the claim being made.

Historically, the food label has had to contain a list of all ingredients in descending order of predominance except for foods subject to standards of identity.

We encourage anyone who enjoys music and good fellowship to come join us. A knowledge of music is not necessary. Just come and have a good time with us.

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


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Golden Line Dancers

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Eye Openers

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The surgical removal of a cataract is one of the most frequently performed operations in the United States.

Removing a cataract means removing a cloudy lens from inside the eye. Prior to 20 years ago, the cataractous lens was removed in toto and the patient was fitted with thick glasses or contact lenses.

Around 1975, a new technique utilizing phacoemulsification came along. A phacoemulsifier is a rapidly vibrating ultrasound device which breaks up a cataract and allows it to be removed by suction through a small incision.

This technique was often mistaken for laser and many patients believe they have had their cataract removed with a laser. A true laser is not used to remove cataracts from the eye.

Intracocular lenses then made their appearance. These are small plastic

lenses which are implanted in the eye. They require a larger incision and therefore phacoemulsification, being a small incision technique, fell from favor.

In the last few years, small plastic lenses and foldable lenses have been developed and phacoemulsification is once again becoming a preferred technique. At this time, approximately half the cataracts in the United States are removed using the phacoemulsifier.

With this small incision and new techniques of fashioning a smaller wound, patients are now hearing about one-stitch procedures and no-stitch procedures. These procedures both have a smaller wound size. It is an advantage to have a smaller wound, as the eye heals more rapidly, there is less distortion of the cornea and a better visual result. Most ophthalmologists now use the small wound techniques, unless there is a contraindication.

Angel Food Cake

In 2 medium bowls, sift flour and 1/2 cup sugar together 3 times.

Gradually add remaining sugar and continue beating at high speed until volume increases and stiff peaks form. By hand, gently fold in sifted flour-sugar mixture only until all flour is moistened.

Pour into 9-inch tube pan. Cut through batter carefully with a thin spatula to break up large air pockets. Bake 40 to 45 minutes.

Remove from oven and invert pan for 1 1/2 hours or until cold.

Remove cake from pan before storing.

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Depression is common

PORTRLAND, Ore. (AP) - Depression often is misdiagnosed or not taken seriously among older Americans, and many of them never will receive proper treatment, a gerontology specialist says.

Vicki Schmall emphasizes in a brochure she helped write that depression is highly treatable. More than 80 percent of its victims can be treated effectively and their symptoms alleviated within weeks.

The 34-page brochure, "Depression in Later Life," is available nationwide through county extension service offices. It's published by the Oregon State University Extension Service in Corvallis.

Without treatment, depression can last for weeks, months, even years, and suicide is disturbingly common in the older population, Schmall said.

Men over 65 have the highest incidence of suicide in the population, three to four times that of the general population.

"Overall, they attempt fewer suicides, but are the most successful when they attempt it," Schmall said. "For the older person in general, it is an actual intent to die, not a cry for help."

The prevalence of depression among older Americans is about the same as among younger Americans,

affecting about 25 percent of the population.

One problem in recognizing depression is that people often think its symptoms are normal signs of aging, Schmall said. Symptoms include stooped posture, physical inactivity, sleep problems and a loss of appetite.

"They simply assume it's related to the fact that Mom is 82 or that she has a certain chronic disease," Schmall said.

And some people figure Mom or Dad ought to be depressed: They're old.

Older people are more likely to express emotional distress in physical terms: complaints of vague aches and pains or health problems for which there is no medical basis, Schmall said.

"An older person is less likely to say yes, they're depressed," she said. "They grew up in a time when to be depressed is to be a weakness."

And depressed people, regardless of age, "may appear to change in their personality. The person who is outgoing may become withdrawn," she said. Depressed people may also be agitated, suspicious, irritable or anxious.

"You may see hostility and anger

that are actually part of the depression, but we don't recognize them as depression-related," she said. "We may just label them as difficult to get along with."

The critical first step is encouraging the person to get a medical examination, Schmall said.

"There are two things you initially want to rule out: whether there is a physical cause, for example, a chronic illness or some change in endocrine activity; you also want to rule out any cause from medicines."

"In later life, depression is more commonly caused by illness or medication than it is early in life," she said.

"One of the things that tends to be more characteristic in later life is loss: loss in terms of a loved one, in terms of a home because they may not be able to keep it, loss of health," she said.

"Often as they become more frail, their losses come closer together. Before they get over one loss, they may have another loss piled upon it."

"Depression in Later Life" is among 17 booklets published at Oregon State University covering topics affecting the elderly. Some are distributed nationally, others only in Oregon, Washington and Idaho. All are available at cost.

New approaches aid diagnosis in elderly

NEW YORK (AP) - Doctors may be able to better diagnose disease in the elderly by adding four special approaches to standard diagnostic strategy, a study suggests.

"The diagnostic process when people get older really is a lot more complicated than it is with younger people," said Dr. Linda Fried, director of the Johns Hopkins Geriatric Assessment Center in Baltimore.

She and colleagues at Hopkins and George Washington University in Washington developed the new approaches by analyzing records of 86 patients evaluated at her center. They then tested the approaches in 56 other patients at the center.

Many good doctors use the approaches already, but formally describing the strategies could help in medical training, Fried said.

The standard approach is that symptoms and signs in a patient correspond to a specific disease, the authors wrote in the February issue of the Journal of the American Geriatrics Society.

But in elderly patients, they said, doctors should also be aware of four other possible situations:

- Multiple chronic diseases combine to reduce a patient's functioning to a level the patient finds intolerable.

In one case, a 79-year-old woman complained of urinary incontinence that affected her social life. It turned out that a medicine she had been taking for a heart condition increased her need to urinate, but that she was slow to reach the toilet because of arthritis in her knees and hips. Treatment was aimed at better managing the heart disease and

arthritis that teamed up to cause her incontinence.

- A patient senses a decline in health and falsely blames it on a previously diagnosed chronic problem. The real trouble can be a new, unrecognized condition.

One 74-year-old man said he felt unwell and blamed it on a worsening of his long-standing constipation. But it turned out there was no significant change in his bowel habits. Evaluation showed his uneasiness was due to a new disorder of paranoia, in which he felt persecuted by neighbors. Psychiatric medication rapidly made him feel better.

A variant of this situation occurs when the patients cite not their real problem, but rather one they think will get them help. A 68-year-old woman was brought in by her daughter for evaluation of asthma and arthritis. But the real concern turned out to be mild memory loss.

Another variant involves caretakers who bring in a patient for a medical complaint when the real issue is the caretaker's own burnout, the researchers said.

- One illness causes another as well as producing an impairment.

A 76-year-old woman complained of weight loss and abdominal pain when she ate. Evaluation showed that some time before, a detached retina had destroyed almost all the vision in one eye. That made her give up activity in many community organizations in which she had been a leader.

She became increasingly unhappy and socially isolated, losing appetite and weight. Several months later she started having the abdominal pain when she ate. Evaluation showed that

major depression had caused a stomach inflammation called gastritis.

- A stressful event unmasks a hidden medical condition that was stable or slowly progressing.





Pasta for Everyone

Pasta can be prepared in dozens of different ways to add variety and interest to your meals. You can choose from 40 different shapes and sizes of dried pasta. Pasta is also available in whole grain, spinach or tomato. These varieties add color to your pasta dish.

More variety can be added to pasta by varying the cheese or the sauce. Some types of cheese that are frequently used in pasta dishes are cream cheese, mozzarella, provolone, cottage cheese, parmesan, romano and gruyere.

Sauces can be purchased with different vegetables and either thick, chunky or smooth varieties. The sauce can become quite different from the product in the jar simply by adding spices and seasonings.

The addition of minced garlic, and vegetables such as fresh tomatoes, onions, olives, parsley and cilantro add a different flavor. No two sauces turn out quite the same.

Cooked seafood, meat, chicken or eggs can also be added to either hot or cold pasta. Cold pasta salads have grown in popularity the past few years. The taste of a pasta salad can be varied by using different salad dressings. Try a pasta salad for your Memorial Day.


