SIGHTS, FACES SEEN

Most business firms in Hereford will be closed Monday, September 2, in observance of Labor Day. Grocery stores and garages, however, have already agreed to close—and most other firms were expected to follow the example. The bank will also close, despite the fact that it remained open on VJ Day and again last Saturday, Election Day.

Rainfall in Hereford totaled seven-tenths of an inch during the past week, according to reports from the City of Hereford gauges. All readings are taken at 8 o'clock each morning as follows: Monday 31, Wednesday 23, Thursday, 16—total 70. Reports indicate that rainfall is general over the entire area with increased amounts west and northwest; Friona reported 1.75 inches.

Appointment of J. C. McCracken as a Board of Education member for the Hereford Independent School District was made today by Leo Forrest, president. McCracken succeeds H.E. Henslee, who resigned the post in order that his daughter, Mary, might apply for a teaching position in Hereford schools.

Nolan Grady and Charles Sanders are back with treasured items—their discharge papers from the Navy.

Little Rita Albracht, one and one-half year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Albracht narrowly escaped drowning when she fell into a stock tank on the Albracht farm, Weyche community, Monday afternoon, August 26.

Rita and her sister, Gail, were playing near the tank when Rita fell in and was unable to climb out. When her efforts to rescue her sister failed, Gail ran to the house for her mother, who returned to find Rita already unconscious.

The little girl was rushed to a physician in Hereford where she regained consciousness. Her condition was reported as improved Tuesday afternoon.

Couple Held On Theft Charges

A man and woman, giving their names as Mr. and Mrs. Marvin James, are being held in connection with a series of robberies in this area. Mrs. James is held in the County Jail in Hereford and Mr. James is held in Clovis, according to Sheriff J. O. Newell.

Plans Outlined For Opening Of Hereford Schools September 9

Expressing a determination to begin operation of Hereford Schools on a full day basis Monday, September 9, Superintendent George Graham today said that temporary housing will be necessary for approximately 60 days until buildings from the Hereford P. O. W. Camp can be released, moved into Hereford and prepared for classes.

In answer to numerous questions by patrons, Mr. Graham also said that first year students who have not been vaccinated against smallpox will be permitted to enroll, but will be expected to be vaccinated as soon as convenient.

Mr. Graham also announced that first year classes in woodwork will be reinstated. The course will be open to junior boys with the probability of a few sophomores, or freshmen boys in case the classes are not filled by juniors. Work has already started toward redecorating the home economics rooms and installation of fluorescent lights in the sewing room.

According to present plans, eighth grade students will again attend classes in the high school building. The seventh grade will be housed temporarily until camp buildings can be secured, and remaining elementary students will attend classes in Central School. Seventh grade will enroll at Central School.

Enrollment Plans
High School enrollment will be handled as follows: Seniors, Monday morning; eighth grade, Monday; Juniors, Monday afternoon; Sophomores, Tuesday morning; Freshmen, Tuesday afternoon. Classes will begin on Wednesday, September 11.

Central School enrollment, including the Seventh Grade, will be held Monday morning, and there will be no need to bring lunches as students will be released by noon. Classes will begin at Central School Tuesday and the cafeteria will also open this day.

Teachers Named
Mr. Graham reported that the schools are short four teachers, science and commerce in high school, and two elementary teachers. However, he expected to fill all four positions before schools open.

In Central School five new faces will be seen this year: Mr. and Mrs. Byron Durham who come here from the Tucuman area; Miss Vida Hicks, who taught at Dawn last year; Miss Mona McMaster, who comes here from Garden City, Texas; and Miss Della Stagner, who is well known here. Other Central teachers are: Miss Ella Alkman, second; Mrs. Cleo Forson, second; Miss Mary Brady, third; Mrs. J. M. Hutchinson, third; Mrs. Grace Thomas, substitute last year; Mrs. F. G. Collier, fourth; Miss Alta Mae Fortenberry, fourth; Mrs. R. D. Ford, fourth; Miss Madeline Bell, fifth; Miss Phyllis Radovich, elementary; Mrs. W. C. Thomas, Miss Ethel Womble and Frank Jones, upper elementary. R. D. Ford will continue as Central school principal.

Hereford Fair Exhibit To Be Outstanding

Plans to raise \$2,000 for the Hereford exhibit in the State Fair at Dallas, October 5, were discussed by Chamber of Commerce directors Monday night and announcement was made that a Fair Committee will be selected and meet Tuesday, September 3, to complete details for the drive.

The Chamber of Commerce reported preliminary work on the exhibit which will feature an irrigation well in the center of the booth to afford a continuous flow of "Hereford Water." Products will be displayed around the walls of the booth with placards carrying analysis of all products as made by the State Health Department, Austin. Other placards will list basic figures on irrigation, crops, yields, etc. Foods which are now being analyzed include wheat, all vegetables, meats and water.

State Fair officials told Hereford representatives that they are expecting the Hereford booth to draw an additional 225,000 persons to the fair this year and that Hereford is being given every advantage to make the exhibit a success.

Beryl Elliston and Sank Rainey will be in charge of the display, assisted by Elmer Patterson, who has new moving pictures.

Rotarians Hear Dist. Governor Friday Night

"Rotary Ethics in Business" was the topic discussed for Hereford Rotarians at their meeting at the Methodist church Friday night, August 23, by W. Aubrey Stephenson, governor of the 127th Rotary district. Mr. Stephenson is professor of political science in Hardin-Simmons university, Abilene.

The district governor reviewed some of the happenings of Rotary International convention which was held in Atlantic City in June with representatives from Rotary clubs in 73 different countries in attendance. Mr. Stephenson reminded the local chapter that if the quarter million Rotarians in the 5800 clubs throughout the world would carry the Rotary ethics into practice, they could do much toward laying a basis for world peace.

The speaker pointed out that the Rotary Code of Ethics was the first such code ever to be written. He also told the Hereford group that new Rotary clubs are being organized on the average of one every two days. Following the address, the Rotarians went into club assembly to review plans for the year's activities. In charge of the business session was Herman Ford, local club president.

C. L. Whitehead Victim of Heart Attack Aug. 28

Funeral services for C. L. Whitehead, 63, were held from the First Baptist Church in Hereford this afternoon, Thursday, August 29, at 4 o'clock. Mr. Whitehead was born January 31, 1883, at Crossroads, Alabama, and died in the Deaf Smith County hospital at 4 o'clock Wednesday morning as the result of a heart attack.

"Charley" as Mr. Whitehead was known to hundreds of friends in this section, came to Texas in 1900, and in 1917 he came to Deaf Smith County and accepted a place in the Pearl Long Barber Shop. He left for a brief period to work on the Tandy Ranch, but soon went back to barbering; this time he accepted a chair in the Walter Orr shop, located beneath the IOOF hall on Main Street, and began a record of tenure seldom equaled, for he remained in this same shop from 1917 until March, 1944—a period of 27 years in one shop. During this time the shop changed hands several times and Mr. Whitehead worked as an employee, partner and full owner of the business. In 1944, he left the location to join Abe Martin in the City Barber Shop.

One of his hobbies was giving the sons of his customers their first haircut free of charge, and hundreds of men in Hereford today can attest for this fact. Charlie Whitehead was considered one of the best all around athletes ever in this area; he sincerely loved baseball and held positions on an army regimental team and professional teams before coming to Hereford. He played shortstop and pitched during his active days. While in Hereford he managed a ball team which set records over this entire section. He was also interested in boxing and in sports of all kinds.

Mr. Whitehead is survived by his widow, two daughters, Mrs. Madlynne Faughn and Mrs. Mary V. Watts, his mother, Mrs. M. V. Laney, and two grandchildren, all of Hereford.

Funeral services will be conducted at the church by Rev. R. H. Cagle, pastor, and the Hereford Masonic Lodge, of which he was a member, will have charge of services at the grave.

General Plans

The hospital would be enlarged by almost four times under the proposed plan, increasing from 17 beds to 67 beds. This would be accomplished by a large two-story annex east of the present building. The board proposes to continue using the present building while the annex is being constructed, and to then use the annex while the present building is being remodeled. When both units are completed, board members feel that the community would boast a modern hospital which should be self-sustaining.

Upon completion, the proposed expansion program would offer three distinct divisions with the present building (completely remodeled) serving as a separate unit for obstetrical cases, the ground floor for medical cases. In addition, all nurses' quarters would be removed from the hospital proper and placed in an additional building which the hospital has been allocated from the Hereford Prisoner of War Camp.

The board members, who have devoted much time and interest toward giving the county a practical, adequate hospital service, indicated a belief that a hospital (Continued on Page 10)

Failure To Transfer Students Is "Nothing To Get Excited About"

"There's nothing to get excited about," says Judge Fred Baird in reply to scores of inquiries from residents of common school districts who failed to transfer students into the Hereford District for the 1946-47 terms.

"It is actually six of one and half-a-dozen of the other," he continued. "The Hereford District has announced a charge of \$108 per student to be paid by your district. If you failed to transfer, your district will receive the \$35 state apportionment and will pay the Hereford (Continued on Page 7)

Vote Runs Near 70 Percent Of First Primary

Casting a total of 1506 ballots in the Second Primary Saturday, voters selected Leonard Foster for County Judge and Ex-Officio School Superintendent by a margin of 184 votes over his run-off opponent, Judge W. H. Russell. The total number of ballots cast in this race was 472 less than the 1978 recorded in the first primary.

The only other local race was that for Commissioner in Precinct 4 in which John I. Morris polled 116 votes to win by a margin of 18 over E. T. Allred, incumbent, who polled 98.

As state-wide returns continue to trickle in this week, it was apparent that Deaf Smith County had literally "gone overboard" for Jester, giving him well over a 4-to-1 margin with 1,211 votes to 291 for Rainey. This county also gave two losers a nice majority in their vote for Boyce House for Lieutenant governor and for Jesse Owens for Justice of Court of Criminal Appeals. See table at left for complete figures.

State Returns

Texas Election Bureau returns, substantially complete, gave the following counts Tuesday:

Beauford Jester, 684,899 votes to Homer Rainey's 356,115 in the governor's race.

The tabulation accounted for 1,041,014 votes from 253 reporting, 148 were complete.

There were no changes in leaders. Closest race still was for commissioner of agriculture. The late count gave J. E. McDonald, the incumbent, a 28,000-vote lead. He polled 498,968 to R. E. McDonald's 470,834.

Allan Shivers led Boyce House 563,124 to 438,829 for Lieutenant governor.

Tom Beauchamp led Jesse Owens 502,812 to 444,976 for Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Service Officer To Aid With GI Terminal Leaves

Application blanks for Veteran's Terminal Leave pay have arrived and may be secured in the Courthouse from County Service Officer Ralph Smith. Smith, assisted by representatives of the V. F. W. and American Legion, will be glad to assist in filling out the forms and mailing them for the applicant.

"All the veteran needs to have is his discharge papers (both sides) or a photostatic copy thereof," Smith said. "He should also figure the amount of leave he had accrued exclusive of sickness, convalescence, temporary duty or rehabilitation. Any veteran who has served in any branch of the armed services since September 8, 1939, is eligible for terminal leave pay, and practically every veteran in this area can draw some additional pay."

In making the announcement, Smith pointed out that the set up is made to handle applications for veterans of this county, but said, "We will be glad to fill out and mail applications for any veteran who applies—and no matter where he lives."

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court has found, and hereby finds and determines that said petition is signed by more than ten per cent of the legally qualified electors who own taxable property in Deaf Smith County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and that said petition is in all respects in conformity with law, and the said Court is of the opinion that said petition should be granted and said election is hereby ordered.

BE IT ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF DEAF SMITH COUNTY, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held in said Deaf Smith County, Texas, on the 7th day of September, 1946, at which election in accordance with said petition the following proposition shall be submitted to the legally qualified electors who own taxable property within Deaf Smith County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation for their action thereupon:
"Shall the Commissioners' Court of Deaf Smith County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said County in the amount of \$250,000.00, to become due and payable serially in not exceeding forty (40) years, bearing interest at a rate of not exceeding 3% per annum, payable semi-annually, as may be determined and fixed by the Commissioners' Court of Deaf Smith County, Texas, for the purpose of providing funds for enlarging and equipping the existing County Hospital in and for said county and for all other necessary permanent improvements in connection therewith; and shall the Commissioners' Court of Deaf Smith County, Texas, be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually while said bonds or any of them are outstanding a tax upon all taxable property in said County sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for their redemption at maturity.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1 of Titles 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, including the provisions of Article 704, as amended by Chapter 382, passed at the First Called Session of the Forty Fourth Legislature and only legally qualified electors who own taxable property in the County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qual-

ified to vote.

5. A substantial copy of this order signed by the County Judge and attested by the County Clerk shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice shall be given in accordance with the provisions of Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended by Chapter 382 passed at the First Called Session of the Forty Fourth Legislature, supra. The County Judge is authorized and directed to have a copy of said notice posted at the Courthouse door and in each of the election precincts in Deaf Smith County, not less than fifteen days prior to the date fixed for holding said election and the said election shall be held not less than fifteen days nor more than thirty days from the date of this order. He shall also cause said notice to be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within Deaf Smith County, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided in said Article 704, as amended, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws governing general elections.

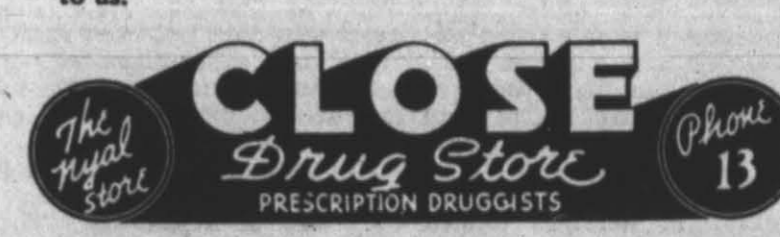

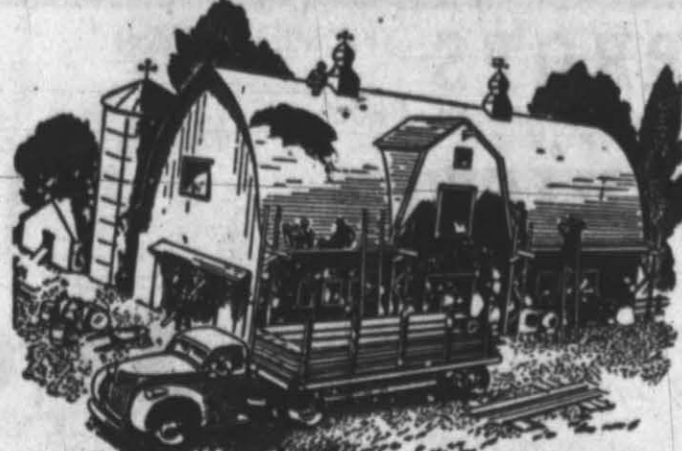

Texas Crime Rate Nearly Doubles In Two Years

Austin, Aug. 18.—(Sp)—Criminals are preying upon the rural population of Texas at nearly double the rate of two and a half years ago, Director Homer Garrison of the Department of Public Safety declared today.

Garrison said rural crime increased 85.27 per cent from the first six months of 1944 to the first six months of 1946.

Biggest gain was in robbery, up 158 per cent. Another staggering gain was shown in burglary, up 121 per cent. Auto theft jumped 96 per cent; felony theft 61 per cent; murder and homicide 55 per cent; and rape 48 per cent.

During the same period crime increased 42 per cent in the cities. The overall gain for both rural and urban jurisdictions was 54.54 per cent.

Garrison said law enforcement officers are "holding their own against long odds," for arrests have increased in direct proportion to the gain in crime.

Convictions, however, are lagging behind. The penitentiary system received 930 new prisoners in the first half of 1944; 862 in the first half of 1945; and 1221 in the first half of 1946, Garrison said. This represented an increase of 31 per cent from the 1944 to the 1946 period.

Stretch Wheat Flour With Other Grains for New Taste and Texture

College Station, August 10 — Stretching wheat flour in home baking can bring a variety in taste and texture to home baking. Possible extenders include rye flour, oatmeal or cornmeal, potatoes and sweet potatoes. But Edith Lawrence, specialist in food preparation for the A. and M. College Extension Service, caution housewives that for good results they must know the correct amounts to use and the best method of mixing.

meal as wheat flour is recommended. Oatmeal bread is slightly coarser and darker than white bread but excellent in flavor. These flours or meals are sifted or mixed with the wheat flour and then the bread is made by the standard method for white bread offered in any reliable cookbook. In using potatoes in bread, both the proportions and the method of mixing are different. Only a small quantity of potato can be used—about one cup of mashed potatoes to five or six cups of flour. The mashed potato is thinned with potato water, then mixed with the softened yeast cake before the flour is stirred in to make a dough or sponge. Mashed sweet potatoes may be added to the sponge with the flour.

"Prize Stories of 1946," edited by Herschel Brickell includes 22 of the best recent short stories. "This collection covers the period following the cease-fire order of World War II."

P. G. Wodehouse comes back to the reading public with his first novel since the war. Titled "Joy in the Morning," Mr. Wodehouse's latest work includes the same absurd situations, deftly dialogued, and gentle satire which characterized the early "Jeeves" books.

Ruby Frazier Frey dug down into family records, state papers and personal journals for her first novel, "Red Morning." With the French and Indian War—Braddock's defeat and Colonel Washington's difficulties—as a background, Mrs. Frey tells the story of her forefathers, of Jane McClain and John Frazier—pioneers.

In "Wilderness Adventure," Elizabeth Page has "presented a vivid and authentic picture of America as it was seen by our ancestors in 1742." This story is based on the actual diary of John Peter Salling.

Invite in Haste, Repent at Leisure

Because of the extreme midday heat in the Philippines, most affairs are scheduled for early morning, consequently we were on hand at 8 o'clock the next morning, July 4. Among the speakers was Senator Tydings of Maryland, Commissioner McNutt, President Roxas and General Douglas MacArthur, who occupies a very high place in the hearts of the Filipinos. The square was packed and jammed with Filipino people and despite rain during the middle of the ceremony, the Philippines became a living Republic that morning.

There was a State Dinner that night which was attended by ambassadors and other dignitaries from Russia, England, France and nearly all other countries.

The next day we saw at first hand Bataan, ruined Corregidor, Subic Bay, and other U. S. installations which gave mute testimony to the bloody battles which were fought there.

The Islands themselves are most impressive in their tropical productivity but they could do with the know-how which the American farmer could supply. Incidentally, Mr. Roxas also said they welcomed with open arms any and all Americans who could provide such know-how and industry.

From the Philippines, we left for Shanghai—a distance of 250 miles, arriving there late in the afternoon, flying along the edge of Formosa which had been in Japanese hands during the occupation. In order to get a better look at the rice paddies and crops and people living along this shore, we dropped to an altitude of 200 or 250 feet. While airplanes are not exactly a novelty out there, one native who saw the giant four-engine plane skimming over his head, threw up his hands in consternation and began running toward us and then turned and started the other way. When we passed over him he was still running. Although we dipped one wing in friendly salute he must have thought it was the enemy coming back.

Texas Tech Is Selected for Air Corps Base Unit

Lubbock, August 18. — Texas Technological College has been selected as the site of an advanced unit of the air corps, beginning Sept. 1, President W. M. Whyburn has been notified by the War Department.

The unit, one of 99 being set up in the country at schools with ROTC work, was requested by President Whyburn last spring. The War Department has indicated it will assign three veteran air corps officers at Tech, each with a superior rating and holding a rank between Lieutenant and Colonel. Each officer will have at least 12 months overseas service and will be a Texan, if possible.

Texas Tech will have advanced units in air, Signal corps and the corps of engineers, as well as basic ROTC. The War department has announced it will establish no new ground units this fall, because of officer shortage. Tech has made application for an infantry unit.

Lt. Col. Ludlow C. Adams, commandant of the Tech ROTC, has been notified students majoring in textile and petroleum engineering will be eligible for advanced corps of engineering courses at Tech. Previously these students had been exempted. Colonel Adams requested the change.

COMMUNITY BUILDERS: "Uncle Andy" Thomas Early Settler Followed Wagon Trails Across Indian Territory to Establish Home in Deaf Smith County

A Deaf Smith county pioneer who did not know he was coming to Hereford but knew he was staying when he got here is A. L. Thomas, Justice of Peace, better known to friends as "Uncle Andy."

Andrew Lee Thomas was born the third child of Mr. and Mrs. John Thomas, March 9, 1876, in

Cooke county, Texas. Andy grew to manhood on his father's farm near Dexter.

In December, 1898, Andrew married Miss Lula Florence Clegg, the daughter of a neighbor farmer. The young couple remained at Dexter for three years.

Then in 1901, John Thomas came to the Panhandle. He returned with such a favorable report of this country that Andy decided to "come and see for himself." Accordingly, the same year, Andrew Thomas, George Caperton, Charlie Williams and John Vaughn, all of Cooke county, set out in a wagon for the Plains. If the men had a destination, it was the historic town of Adobe Walls.

All four of the East Texans went back home eager to return to this country. "I knew I

was coming back," says Uncle Andy, "when I first saw it. I told my wife that this was going to make a great country some day, and I wanted to get here while it was new." Of the four, Mr. Thomas was the only one to leave "the sticks" to make his home here.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas loaded what they could of their belongings on two wagons and sold the remainder. Each took the reins of one wagon, and the couple with their two children started for the Panhandle.

"We didn't know," says Mr. Thomas, "exactly where we were going. We just knew we were going West—we landed here."

The couple crossed Red River at Love's Valley, rolled across the Oklahoma Indian Territory to Ardmore. From there, they trudged west to Duncan, Oklahoma, where they were forced to remain four weeks by continued rains. But Andy was not idle during the delay; he secured an old sod plow, went over on Beaver Creek in the Comanche nation and plowed sod.

They found Lawton only a tent town. Uncle Andy remarked, "There were 400 billion files there, and then I quit countin'. You couldn't drive a team through town for the files!"

Arriving at the North Fork of Red River, the Thomases found the stream on rampage. The banks were covered with people camped on either side waiting to cross. Mr. and Mrs. Thomas unloaded their materials into a canoe which carried them to the other side. They all four horses were hitched to one wagon at a time to bring the little party safely over into Texas.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas report only one Indian scare throughout the entire journey. While they were camped "down the draw" from Quannah Parker's village, the Indians kept the Thomas family awake all night at one time. The Red Men, drunk and cursing, travelled all night along the road near the Thomas camp, evidently going to sleep. Mrs. Thomas says she sat up all night.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas intended to file on land near Dosier, Texas. They arrived in Gray county, where the land lay, the day that county was organized. However, when they began looking for the strip of land they were to have, it could not be found. In that vast, unfenced territory, the land had simply been lost!

So they moved on to Deaf Smith county, arriving at the ranch of Uncle Summy Higgins northeast of Hereford on June 6. The family had been on the road since April 1. And the roads, according to Mr. Thomas, were mere wagon trails. At the time they moved here, there was not a bridge between Dexter and Hereford on the route they travelled.

Uncle Andy and Bill Hill each bought a quarter-section of land from Tom McBroom, this sale constituting the second land transaction in this county to include as little as one-half section. Mr. and Mrs. Thomas lived for some time in a dugout on this land. "And," says Uncle Andy, "every rattlesnake in the country came to our house—we killed 14 of them around the dugout in one summer."

Hereford at the time the Thomases arrived consisted of a few frame offices, one brick building and some residences behind the lot where the jail now stands. There were no roads from the ranch to Hereford. "We would just leave home, driving across the prairie in the direction of town. And," says Mr. Thomas, "the worst trail or road we had in to town was Main Street which was full of chug holes!"

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas moved to House, New Mexico, in 1917, living there seven years before moving back to Hereford. While in New Mexico, Uncle Andy

learned something about geology and mineralogy. He constructed his own machine for locating minerals and followed this business throughout Arkansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado and Utah.

Mr. Thomas was elected Justice of Peace in 1940 and has filled that office continuously since then. Besides looking after any misdemeanor cases, Uncle Andy is frequently called upon to perform weddings. He recently read the ceremony for his first double wedding—"with the assistance of Robert Thompson," he laughingly adds.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas have two daughters, Mrs. Bertha Kemper, Liberal, Kansas; and Mrs. Viola Griswold, Hereford; and three sons, Paul Thomas, Phoenix, Arizona; Clyde Amarrillo; and Marvin, Sunnyvale, California. They have 15 grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

A man whose hobby is staying at home, Uncle Andy may nevertheless be found every

morning on the job in the office of the Justice of Peace—second floor, court house.

Field inspectors from this office report the following unsafe practices being prevalent throughout the state. These practices are extremely hazardous and must cease immediately.

1. Installing underground systems aboveground. There have been a number of such instances come to the attention of this division. In nearly all cases the excuse is made that it is only a temporary installation. In no case will an underground system be installed aboveground.
2. Filling ICC bottles not equipped with relief valves. No vessel may be filled with liquefied petroleum gas which is not equipped with the proper relief valve in operating condition. No vessel is approved nor may any vessel be installed which is not equipped with a relief valve of an approved type and adequate area.
3. Filling ICC bottles not equipped with liquid level gauging devices. Vessels not equipped with such devices but otherwise filled in accordance with the provisions of Gas Utilities Docket No. 141 may be filled only by weighing. Extreme care must be taken to prevent overfilling.
4. Filling so called "Rock Gas or California Bottles". These containers have reversed heads and are not approved for use in Texas. No dealer will fill any such container at any time.
5. The practice of selling systems to unlicensed individuals to be installed by them. The statutes require that all installations be made by a licensed and bonded installer and reported by him to this division. Any system not so installed is not an approved installation and must not be filled with liquefied petroleum gas.

In order to save time and avoid confusion in inspecting public building installations all licensees submitting plans covering such proposed installations must give the location in such a manner that the inspector can locate the installation without delay.

Veterans Warned Not to Accept Unearned Checks

Veterans who fail to notify the Veterans Administration when they interrupt their training or education and continue to accept Government allowances are subject to severe penalties, VA warned today.

Eldon F. Fuller, Chief, Vocational Rehabilitation and Education, Lubbock VA Regional office, cautioned veterans that VA training officers are making regular investigations to prevent such practices.

Beginning September 1, a blank form will be with each check mailed to veterans in training.

These forms must be returned to the Disbursement Office that mailed the check, whenever the veteran's training or education is interrupted.

This notification will enable VA to discontinue payments.

Veterans who accept checks under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act to which they are not entitled will be ineligible to receive any further benefits under the act.

Most schools are prompt to notify VA of withdrawals, but some business firms approved for on-the-job training have neglected to report the withdrawal of veterans from training.

VA investigators who made a recent three-day check in one Texas community found 38 veterans receiving allowances to which they were not entitled.

The veteran should take care-

ful note of the month for which his subsistence check is used as shown by the date of the check. If he has discontinued education or training for any reason during the month prior to the month for which the subsistence check was issued, he should not cash the check under penalty of the laws.

The check should be returned without endorsement to the Disbursement Office shown on the envelope. The blank form in the envelope should be filled out and returned with the check.

Hospitalization Plan Offered on Community Basis

Plans are now underway for providing Hereford with the Blue Cross Hospital service on a community basis. This announcement comes from Fred W. Baird, who was elected chairman of the advisory council for the local chapter at a meeting of community representatives at the Deaf Smith County Hospital Friday evening, August 23.

Other members of the council include Dyalthis Bradley, secretary; B. C. Roberson, Bob Wilson, H. E. Henslee, Miss Sadie Oliver, N. E. Cass, J. M. Gillentine, the Rev. Marvin Boyd, Dr. Lewis Barnett, W. E. Dameron, Wayne Evans, Elizabeth Womble, V. E. Hennen, George Gram, S. B. McCallen, and Mrs. German Ford.

W. R. Derr, Ablene, regional director and speaker at the meeting Friday outlined the new community plan of the Blue Cross Comprehensive service as slightly different from the original industrial group set-up. According to the latter, only employees in groups of five or more from any one firm could qualify for membership in this hospitalization plan.

The community organization will make it possible for individuals, not members of any industrial group to be served, according to Mr. Baird. The hospital benefits, he points out, will include room accommodations, meals, general nursing, x-ray examinations, all drugs and medicines and many other services which will be available in full to each member for thirty days and up to one-half for an additional ninety days in each contract year.

A second meeting of the advisory council has been called for Tuesday night, September 3, at 8 o'clock in the county court room. The purpose of the session will be the laying of plans for the opening date. This date, at which time applications will be taken by Blue Cross representatives, will be announced later. Chairman Baird reminds prospective members that following the opening date, applications for membership will only be accepted at the end of the year or in groups of 50. After enrollment, the benefits begin each first and fifteenth of every month.

bock and the bridegroom's mother's dress was black, and both gave color and accent to their dresses with white gladioli corsages.

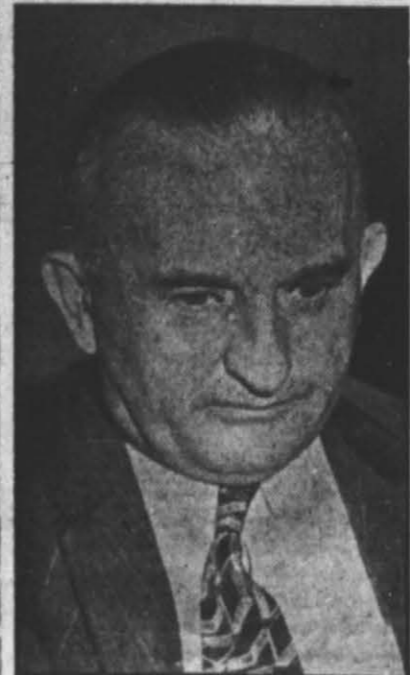

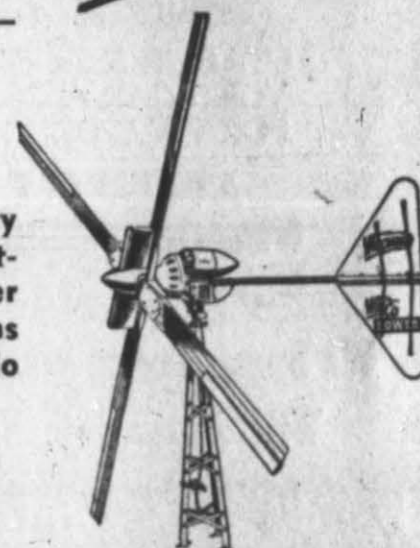

Tech Now Has Growing Pains

LUBBOCK, August 27.—Seeking further to meet its obligations in educating veterans, Texas Technological College has requested the government to allot it a sizable amount of aid in setting up additional non-housing facilities on the campus.

President W. M. Whyburn, acting for the college, made application for a share of the \$100,000,000 recently made available through the Bureau of Community Facilities, Federal Works Agency, to provide needed buildings.

Tech's application pointed out the college, with an expected enrollment this fall over 50 per cent higher than last spring, needs additional classrooms,

laboratories, ROTC space, a dispensary clinic, repair shops, faculty offices, lecture auditorium, physical education building and veterans guidance center if the College is to care for veterans adequately.

Under the program the Works Agency would put up buildings for educational institutions for emergency use, the colleges providing ground, sidewalks, streets, utilities, and other adjuncts.

Tech, Dr. Whyburn said, has received formal notice of meetings at which the program will be discussed and at which progress toward allotment will be made.

Dr. Whyburn praised the program, stating thousands of veterans will secure educations more quickly as a result. Tech and other schools, he added, have been unable to erect needed structures, partly because of building restrictions.
