



So the Taxpayers May Know:

An important election is coming up on Saturday, September 7th; this election and the matter to be voted on by the property tax payers is by far more important than, perhaps, many of us have thought of and seriously considered. THIS ELECTION WILL AFFECT PROPERTY TAX PAYERS; and we are speaking of the bond election for the enlargement of the Deaf Smith County Hospital. A bond issue of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars is to be voted on, together with a tax levy to pay 3% interest on these bonds, as well as to create a sinking fund, the bonds running over a period of forty years. The interest on the bonds per annum will amount to \$7,500.00. The sinking fund, one fortieth per annum will amount to \$6,250.00, making a total annual tax to be raised of \$13,750.00. Over a period of 40 years you will have paid \$300,000.00 in interest.

The assessed valuation for Deaf Smith County for 1945 was slightly less than seven million six hundred thousand dollars, hence it will require 2 cents per hundred dollars on the valuation to pay this interest and sinking fund. On \$10,000 you will pay \$20 additional taxes. On a section of land valued at \$20.00 per acre you will pay an additional tax of \$25.60. The property tax payers must pay this.

We have been informed, and so understand the facts to be that the Hospital has acquired one of the prisoner of war buildings which will be used for a nurses' home; this will make seven (7) additional beds available in the present hospital building; it now has 19 available beds, and with the additional 7 will make 26 beds.

The figures for the past year, beginning with August 1945 and through July 1946, show that only, on the average, slightly less than 39% of the 19 beds now available were occupied; thus, leaving, on the average for the year 61% of the beds unused.

During the year above mentioned the hospital operated at a deficit, save and except the month of June 1946, when a profit of \$79.91 was made, but for the whole year the deficit was \$6,672.83.

If the present small unit cannot be operated at a profit, or at least pay expenses, then you may well imagine what the deficit will be on a larger unit.

However, while the above is a serious matter and food for thought, it is not the vital issue in this bond election; the real and most serious objection to voting a debt of this size on ourselves at this time, is inflation; that is, everything, labor, material and equipment is now much above what we would call normal; and it is a well known fact that a dollar now will not purchase over 40% to 50% of what the same dollar purchased before these high prices hit; and we know that prices must come down, so if we vote this bond issue we will now be getting about a \$125,000 building for the \$300,000 in interest . . . plus \$250,000 bond issue, and we and our children will have to pay this debt with 100% dollars instead of 50% dollars.

We sincerely believe that now is no time to build anything we can do without; and is especially no time to vote a heavy bond indebtedness upon ourselves; and with the building the hospital will acquire for a nurses' home, we feel that the present building will serve all necessary needs until times and conditions level off and we become thus able to obtain something like full value for our dollars.

Dimmitt now has a hospital, and Friona is establishing one, so we understand, all of which will relieve the Deaf Smith County Hospital of any congestion we may have had, or may expect from these territories.
