



Before another issue of The Brand is printed, a County Judge and Ex-Officio School Superintendent will have been chosen by the people to succeed our present one, Mr. Fred W. Baird. Whether Mr. Russell or myself will be accorded that honor and privilege rests now in the hands of the voters. Regardless of who is successful, however, to do as good a job as Mr. Baird has done, will, as an old saying runs, "have to go some!" I do believe, and say it with all sincerity, that either of us can, and will, with the cooperation of everyone concerned with the management of the affairs of the county, make just such an officer that all will be proud of. To be sure, I am hoping that I can "out-rustle Russell" in the vote-getting angle, thus having that honor bestowed on me.

My announcement for this office appeared in the March 28, 1946 issue of The Brand, and since that time have conducted my campaign on as high a standard as anyone could. Not one word of criticism was uttered against any who opposed me in the first primary, nor have I up to this good date in the second primary, in which Mr. Russell and myself are opponents. I have endeavored to present my candidacy, my qualifications and my past record in such a manner that could possibly offend no one. In my humble effort I have tried to push my own merits to the fore, but in doing so have made no effort whatsoever to minimize the ability of others to fill the same position that I am now asking the electorate for.

At this time I wish to submit to the voters some of the experiences I have had in the past in various offices of the county; experiences which I feel have enhanced my qualifications to fill the office to which I am aspiring. First, as your county and district clerk I dealt with and handled many matters that had direct bearing and connection with the office of County Judge, and even now as deputy Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector, which position I have held under Mr. Newell for the past two years, has also afforded intimate relations connected with it. As many of you know, I made the race for this office four years ago. In the runoff, or second primary, Mr. Baird, the present incumbent, was successful, but by a majority not too large to discourage me from making the race this time, inasmuch as he made public long before I announced, that he no longer desired the office. So now, Mr. and Mrs., or Miss Voter of Deaf Smith County, if you can see your way clear to vote for, or aid me in any manner at Saturday's primary, please allow me to be Mr. Baird's successor.
