Canning of Beans And Peas Starts At New Plant

The Deaf Smith County Food Products Company began canning operations at the new plant west of Hereford last Friday night when the first cans of green beans rolled off the production line.

The plant is still hampered by damaged equipment, and part of the work is being done by hand labor in the early runs, but some 1500 cases of green beans had been canned by mid-week.

Harvesting of peas and beans is getting well underway this week, according to Fred Owen, field manager for the plant, and additional laborers are needed for the harvest.

A call was sent out to the Plainview office of the Texas Farm Employment Service for additional laborers Wednesday by County Agent Hugh Clearman.

Average stands of black-eyed peas are very satisfactory, Owen reported this week after early harvesting operations were underway. Bean crops are well above average, he said.

Veterans Warned of Penalties For Taking Checks After Leaving Job

Veterans who fail to notify the Veterans Administration when they interrupt their training or education and continue to accept Government allowances are subject to severe penalties, VA warned today.

Eldon F. Fuller, Chief, Vocational Rehabilitation and Education, Lubbock VA Regional Office, cautioned veterans that VA training officers are making regular investigations to prevent such practices.

Beginning September 1, a blank form will be with each check mailed to veterans in training. Those forms must be returned

to the Disbursement Office that mailed the check, whenever the veteran's training or education is interrupted.

This notification will enable VA to discontinue payments. Veterans who accept checks under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act to which they are not entitled will be ineligible to receive any further benefits under the act. They also may be punished by a fine of not more than \$1,000 or by imprisonment for not more than one year, or both.

Most schools are prompt to notify VA of withdrawals, but some business firms approved for on-the-job training have neglected to report the withdrawal of veterans from training.

In both cases, however, Fuller emphasized, the responsibility rests on the veteran.

VA investigators who made a recent three-day check in one Texas community found 38 veterans receiving allowances to which they were not entitled. Some of the veterans had discontinued training as long ago as October, 1945.

The veteran should take careful note of the month for which his subsistence check is issued as shown by the date of the

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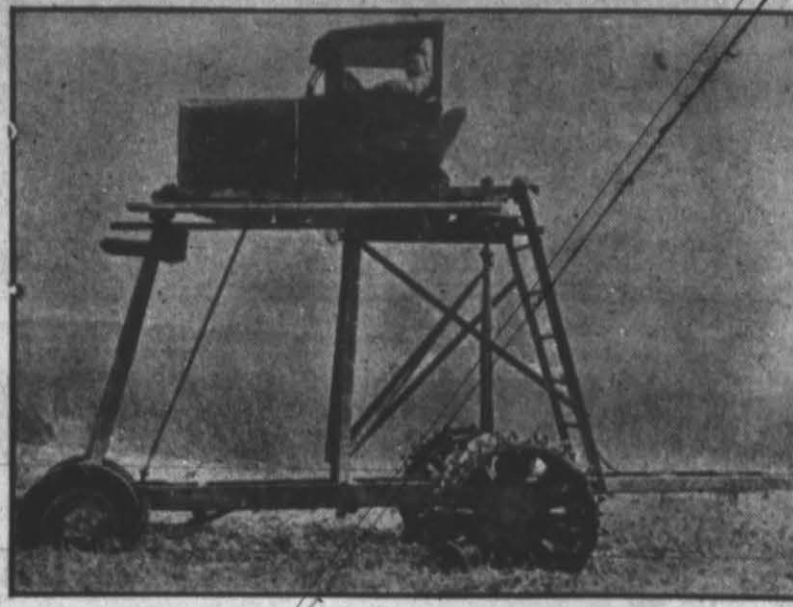

check. If he has discontinued education or training for any reason during the month prior to the month for which the subsistence check was issued, he should not cash the check under penalty of the laws.

The check should be returned without endorsement to the Disbursement Office shown on the envelope. The blank form in the envelope should be filled out and returned with the check.

Before another issue of The Brand is printed, a County Judge and Ex-Officio School Superintendent will have been chosen by the people to succeed our present one, Mr. Fred W. Baird. Whether Mr. Russell or myself will be accorded that honor and privilege rests now in the hands of the voters. Regardless of who is successful, however, to do as good a job as Mr. Baird has done, will, as an old saying runs, "have to go some!" I do believe, and say it with all sincerity, that either of us can, and will, with the cooperation of everyone concerned with the management of the affairs of the county, make just such an officer that all will be proud of. To be sure, I am hoping that I can "out-rustle Russell" in the vote-getting angle, thus having that honor bestowed on me.

My announcement for this office appeared in the March 28, 1946 issue of The Brand, and since that time have conducted my campaign on as high a standard as anyone could. Not one word of criticism was uttered against any who opposed me in the first primary, nor have I up to this good date in the second primary, in which Mr. Russell and myself are opponents. I have endeavored to present my candidacy, my qualifications and my past record in such a manner that could possibly offend no one. 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Civic Improvement Committee Now Permanent Organization; Block System Is Retained

At the first called meeting of the Civic Improvement Committee since the clean-up campaign early in the summer, the committee was set up as a permanent organization Friday night, and the temporary officers appointed by the Mayor were elected to head the organization on a permanent basis.

The meeting was held at the county courtroom, and Mayor W. E. Dameron addressed the organization, which was formed at his request on the eve of the city-wide clean-up campaign in June.

Mrs. Homer Brumley was elected permanent president; Mrs. Bill Hromas, vice president; and Mrs. Lyle Blanton, secretary. All section and block chairmen who served during the

clean-up campaign are being asked to retain their posts and responsibilities on a permanent basis, Mrs. Brumley said, in order to effect a continuous organization for keeping the city cleaned up.

No name has yet been chosen for the permanent organization, and Mrs. Brumley issued an appeal this week for suggestions for a name. All suggestions should be reported to Mrs. Blanton, secretary of the group.

"The principal aim of the new organization will be to sponsor a continuing program of clean-up and beautification in the city," Mrs. Brumley said, "through the block-system of organization set up during the clean-up campaign."

The War, Navy, and Treasury departments have outlined procedure for former enlisted men in all branches of the service to obtain the terminal leave pay.

1. The government form entitled "claim for settlement of unused leave" must be obtained. These are not available in Hereford now, but steps have been taken by the American Legion to hurry their delivery, and announcement will be made as soon as they arrive.

2. Fill out the form. Help will be provided by the County Veterans office and local veterans organizations.

3. Swear on affirm the statements made in the form before a notary public.

4. Mail the completed form with discharge certificate (a photostatic copy or certified copy may be substituted for the original).

5. The paying officer will examine the papers and return them to the veteran. Payment will be made as soon as possible.

6. If the amount is less than \$50, the claimant will get a check for the full amount. For claims exceeding \$50, payment will be in bonds in multiples of \$25, with any odd amount by check.

7. All payments are to be made at the rate of pay in effect on separation from service. All claims must be filed before Sept. 1, 1947.

Maturity date of the bonds is determined by the date of separation from service. They mature in 5 years, and bear 2 1/2 per cent interest.

The bonds will be non-negotiable, but may be used in paying the premiums on National Service Life Insurance policies.
