Bill Bowman Is Killed in Plane Crash Near Here

Bill Bowman was killed and Elza Collier, seriously injured when their plane, a light Piper Cub, crashed early this morning on the Alton Biggers farm northwest of Hereford.

Bowman was pilot of the plane. The crash occurred at about 7:30 o'clock this morning (Thursday). The two men had taken off from Cover Field an hour before to hunt coyotes.

Biggers, who witnessed the crash, rushed Collier to the Deaf Smith County Hospital, where the extent of his injuries had not been definitely determined this morning.

Bowman died shortly after reaching the hospital. Bowmen is survived by his wife and two children.

Attendants at Clover Field had not determined the cause of the crash, but said that Frank Casier of Amarillo, Civil Aeronautics inspector, would be here this afternoon.

Farmers Offered Gamble on Future Wheat Prices

Wheat farmers who were required to sell half of their wheat under the government's forced-sale order between May 23 and the lapsing of OPA on June 30 will be given a chance to "take advantage of future price increases, the Department of Agriculture has announced.

About 30,000,000 bushels of wheat bought by the government under the requisitioning program during that period will be affected.

Farmers who sold wheat between those dates under the force-sale order may now pay to the Commodity Credit Corporation the amount for which the wheat was sold, and receive a certificate instead.

The certificate will require the CCC to pay the market price of wheat sold as of any date the producer elects before next April 1, except that the producer may not select a date prior to the time he receives the certificate.

Foster and Russell Are in Run-off Race for County Judge

Schultz Defeats Aldridge by 26-Vote Margin; Fike Beaten

District Winners



Harry Schultz, Dalhart war veteran, nosed out incumbent John Aldridge of Farwell by 26 votes in the race for District Judge of the 69th Judicial district, according to compete but still unofficial election returns from Saturday's primary.

The unofficial count, with all counties complete Sunday, gave Schultz 3,813 votes to 3,787 for Aldridge.

In the closely contested race, Aldridge held a slight lead through most of the tabulation until late returns from Moore County Sunday night gave Schultz his majority.

Aldridge carried the three southern counties of the district, Parmer, Oldham and Deaf Smith, rolling up a big majority in Parmer, while Schultz carried Dallam county by almost as big a margin. The decision in the other five counties was close.

District Attorney King Fike of Dalhart was decisively defeated for re-election by Floyd H. Richards, also of Dalhart. Fike carried Parmer county by 99 votes, but lost heavily in Dallam and Deaf Smith.

Both Schultz and Richards are World War II veterans, and both are former county attorneys in Dallam county. Schultz was a Lieutenant Colonel and the Staff Judge Advocate with the 2nd Infantry Division in the European Theater during the war. Richards spent four and a half years in the AAF, serving as Trial Judge Advocate.

Schultz is a graduate of Cumberland University Law School at Lebanon, Tennessee; and Richards graduated from Texas Tech at Lubbock and from the law school of the University of Texas at Austin.

Grand Jury in Session Monday Indicts Three

Deaf Smith County Grand Jury convened Monday morning as District Court opened for the fall term, and returned three indictments before recessing Monday afternoon.

Indictments were returned against Charlie Stan Harrell for bribery, Robert Jennings for embezzlement, and Elmore Nunn for second offense driving while intoxicated, a felony.

Dates for trial in these cases had not been set.

After calling a number of witnesses during a long day session, the grand jury recessed at 6:30 Monday afternoon and will not re-convene unless ordered into session by the court.

Members of the new grand jury, which will serve during the next six-month term of court, are Homer Brumley, L.W. Carlyle, Charles W. Cogdell, J.L. Woodford, R. L. Dowell Sr., O.E. Easley, H. W. Melton, Charles Burk, Tom J. Fields, C. H. Hammock, J. W. Adrian, and Travis Dameron.

Dameron was named foreman of the Grand Jury.

Spud Harvest Is Nearly Complete; Prices Are Up

Spud harvest was nearly complete this week and most potato houses were closing down operations as the total carloadings shipped from local Santa Fe yards reached 1128 on Thursday morning.

Sunday night's rain, measuring 23 of an inch in Hereford, slowed the digging briefly.

Price of spuds was up slightly during the past week above support levels, with No. 1 potatoes bringing between \$2.40 and \$2.45 per hundred. Support price is \$2.25.

Between fifty and sixty percent of the local 1946 crop was sold to the government at support levels, local shippers estimate, but due to the high quality of Deaf Smith spuds, shippers were able to place a relatively high percentage on the private market at premium prices.

Best potato record for the year, according to available reports, was hung up by Joe Ballinger who had an almost unbelievable high percentage of No. 1's. In one run of spuds from the Ballinger farms, according to Jack Connell of the Associated Growers, Ballinger's spuds tested 2214 sacks of U. S. No. 1's to only 43 sacks of No. 2's. Another earlier run tested 784 sacks of No. 1's to 7 sacks of No. 2's. Ballinger's entire crop tested in this proportion, according to Connell.

A special election to vote on the consolidation of four county school districts with the Hereford Independent Schools has been ordered by the County Commissioners court to be held on Wednesday, August 21, County Judge Fred W. Baird announced Monday.

Notice of election was filed this week. Included in the proposed consolidation are three common school districts, Wyche, Westway, and Ward, and one county-line district, Summerfield, and the Hereford Independent School District.

The election was ordered on petition from the required number of qualified voters in each district. The consolidation, if it is put into effect, must be carried in each district, Judge Baird pointed out. If the voters of one of the five school districts involved vote against the proposed consolidation, then the election is automatically voted down in all.

In such case, another election could be called immediately by the voters of the favoring districts, omitting the district which voted against the consolidation.

Twenty petitioners, or in cases of districts having a fewer number of voters, a majority of the qualified voters in a district, can call the election.

Herman Ford has been appointed presiding officer for the election in the Hereford Independent School district, and polls will be set up at the county courthouse.

In Wyche Common School district, Mrs. N. G. Elliston will be the presiding officer, and the election will be held at the Hutson home.

In Westway, Mrs. Bess Werner will be the presiding officer, and the election will be held at Summerfield schoolhouse.

At Ward, Mrs. Bill Hutson has been appointed presiding officer, and the election will be held at the Hutson home.

All residents of the individual school districts who are legally qualified voters in the state and county will be eligible to vote in the consolidation election.

Post Office Will Add 175 Boxes Within 90 Days

One hundred and 75 new post office boxes are to be added at the local Post Office within the next 90 days, Postmaster Jim Lipscomb has announced.

Bids for the new construction were to be opened yesterday afternoon (Wednesday) at the Dallas office of the Post Office Department, and contracts call for work to start within 30 days after contract is awarded.

The project is scheduled for completion, according to the advertised contracts, within 90 days.

The new sections will be added at the rear of the present box sections.

"This extension is absolutely all that can be added unless the Post Office Building is enlarged," Postmaster Lipscomb said. The additions will extend the box sections all the way to the rear of the present building.

Veterans and Farmers Tied For Second Place in League

Hereford Fire Department still held a whopping lead in the Munny Softball League this week, and if a game lost under protest by the Summerfield Farmers to the VFW nine is allowed to stand, the Veterans have jumped from fourth place into a second-place tie with the Farmers.

The Farmers, who played a make-up game with the Veterans on Wednesday of last week under protest, and lost 7, had not officially filed their protest with High Commissioner Homer Fox up to last night, and if the rule of limitations on protested games is in force, the decision will probably stand.

Reese Is Winner in Sheriff's Race Over Three Opponents

One county and one precinct office were slated to be contested in the Democratic run-off election on August 24, after all returns were in last Saturday night in the Democratic Primary.

A run-off in the race for County Judge is scheduled between Leonard Foster and W. H. Russell, survivors of a field of four in Saturday's primary.

Foster led the voting with 704, and Russell was second with 493. County Judge Fred W. Baird, whose name did not appear on the ticket, received 448 write-in votes for re-election, and Mrs. Bess Werner trailed the field with 333.

Only other county run-off is in precinct 4 where County Commissioner Dick Allred trailed John Morris in the primary returns. Morris polled 90 votes, Allred 72, and Hardy Benson 35.

Former state highway patrolman J. C. Reese ran roughshod over three opponents in the Sheriff's race, nearly doubling the score of his trio of rivals, to win the nomination without a run-off. Reese polled 1219 votes. Joe Bishop, his nearest rival, trailed with 489, and two veterans were far behind, Horace Baize in third place with 215, and Leland Robbs last with 79.

In other races, County Commissioner Troy Moore was reelected as Commissioner from Precinct 1 with 348 votes to 255 for his only opponent, Verne Witherspoon; and H. D. Culpepper, commissioner from precinct 3, was defeated for re-election by J. T. Guinn. Guinn polled 64 votes to 43 for Culpepper.

County Attorney Carl Gilliland, unopposed for re-election, was re-nominated with 1879 votes.

County Clerk R. L. Thompson won re-election with 1956.

County Treasurer Velma Hodges was re-elected with 1957.

County Surveyor A. O. Thompson was re-elected with 1956.

County Commissioner Jeff Roberson was unopposed for re-election in Precinct 2.

A total of 2,002 ballots were cast in the election, a record number for this county.

Telephone Chief Offers No Hopes For Improvement

A. O. Thomas, district manager of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, of Amarillo, spoke Monday night at a meeting of the board of directors of the Hereford Chamber of Commerce in answer to an invitation from Secretary-Manager E. B. Posey to discuss the local telephone service situation.

Thomas held out little hope for improved service until material shortages can be overcome. Recognizing that there has been a vast increase in telephone traffic in Hereford, he insisted that there is nothing the company can do at the present time, due to inability to secure installations.

County Voters Back Winners In State Races

Deaf Smith county voters backed the winners in most state races, according to unofficial but complete county election returns.

In the Governor's race, Benford Jester led at the local poll by approximately the same margin which he holds over the state, rolling up nearly half the Deaf Smith vote. Jester received 971, Rainey 236, Eads 217, Smith 144, and Sellers 121. The remaining eight candidates counted ballots in this county, ranging from 2 for Brinkley to 31 for Burks. None was skunked.

On the basis of state returns, Jester, with a commanding lead, will go into the run-off election on August 24 with Dr. Homer P. Rainey.

Senator Tom Connally swept the senate race in this county by a big majority, polling 1431 of the 1762 ballots polled for that office.

Boyce Bruce, apparently a close second to Allen Shivers in the race for Lieutenant Governor, polled a heavy majority in this county, with 1095 votes to 443 for Shivers. 124 for Mills, 111 for Walker, and 53 for Withers. House and Shivers will be in the run-off.

Pat M. Neff carried the county by a big margin in the attorney general's race, polling 1285 to 492 for Price Daniels.

Olin Culbertson, who seemed a cinch to return to his job with the Railroad Commission with a majority over his two opponents, carried this county by a wide margin with 1319 votes. Coker was second with 747 and Lyons third with 230.

In other state races: J. McDonald, Commissioner of Agriculture, led 3 opponents in the county with 854 votes. Chambers was second with 414, Hill third with 244, and R. McDonald fourth with 231.

The two McDonalds will come to the run-off. Comptroller George H. Shattler piled up 1988 to 214 for Butler.

Treasurer Jesse James polled 1336 to 534 for Williams. Justice John H. Sharp polled 924 to 924 for Rowland in the race for Supreme Court (Place) and James B. Hubbard led with 968 to 631 for Smedley in race for place 2.

Jesse Owens was top man in the race for the Court of Civil Appeals with 899. DeLoach was next with 363, Johnson third with 284, and the fourth with 242.

Personal Cleanliness Is Important In Prevention of Polio Spreading

Fourth of a series of articles on the scientific background of the safeguards against polio.

"Pay careful attention to personal cleanliness such as thorough hand washing before eating," warns The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in its lists of precautions against serious attacks of the disease now threatening many communities in the United States. Scientific authorities agree on one thing about polio—the virus causing the disease is widespread during epidemics. How the virus gets into the body is a point upon which they do not entirely agree, but the bulk of the evidence thus far indicates that one frequent way the organism can enter the body is through the mouth. Dirty hands might readily carry the infecting virus into the body.

How widespread this virus may be, has been indicated by many scientists. Some of the early polio fighters knew that the virus of infantile paralysis could be found in the bowel eliminations of many patients. What they did not know was how long the virus could be excreted from the human body and whether there might be chronic carriers of the disease similar to "Typhoid Mary" who innocently spread typhoid to hundreds of victims.

Resolved to try to answer these important questions, three scientists from Yale University, Doctors Robert Ward, Joseph L. Melnick and Dorothy M. Horstmann began their studies. It was during the summer of 1943 and the New Haven Hospital had many cases of infantile paralysis in its wards. The three polio scientists selected sixty-one of the patients for their study. At weekly intervals stool specimens of the selected groups were collected and brought to Yale University's laboratory for preparation and inoculation into monkeys. If the monkeys developed infantile paralysis from stool specimen, it meant that the virus was still present in the patient's body.

Workers continued their tedious monkey studies which were made possible by the financial support of the National Foundation. Finally at the end of were finished. The results were worth while, for they gave added evidence as to how widespread the virus of infantile paralysis can be. The workers reported that many patients continued to excrete virus from their bodies for as long as two months. Fortunately, they added, there was no evidence of the existence of a "Polio Mary"—a persistent carrier of the disease.

Other scientists following a similar trail demonstrated that virus was excreted in the stools

of persons who had merely been in contact with patients and had no symptoms themselves. They estimated that for every person actually ill with the disease there might be ten or more healthy contacts who, despite the lack of spreading infection to others.

At the Poliomyelitis Research Center established by The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis at Johns Hopkins University, a group of investigators recently determined that the virus was frequently present also in the throat discharges of patients in the first few days of their illness. The scientists—Doctors Kenneth F. Maxcy, A. Howe, Robert A. Wenner and David Bodian—rubbed cotton swabs against the walls of the throat and tonsillar areas of many patients acutely ill with polio. Next they washed the swabs in a special solution and then injected the fluid into monkeys who promptly became ill with infantile paralysis.

It can be realized from these scientific facts the many ways infantile paralysis can spread throughout a community. The virus may pass from one person to another in droplets of throat secretions loosed in the air by the coughing, sneezing and spitting of polio victims. It may lurk in the dust of the air or of a room.

Contamination of food, drink, objects and hands with the intestinal eliminations not only from those frankly sick with infantile paralysis but also from the many more persons without signs of illness may be the means of spreading infection. Realization of these possibilities means that rigid maintenance of high standards of community sanitation is a "must" for the community's safety.

Although it is agreed that it is well-nigh impossible for an individual to avoid contact entirely with the virus of infantile paralysis during epidemics, scientists emphasize that strict attention to personal health habits such as washing hands before eating will eliminate some of the dangers of contact and will mean added protection against serious attacks of infantile paralysis.

Second party agrees to plant _____ acres of land situated at _____ County, Texas, to blackeyed peas, and to cultivate the same in a good and farmerlike manner, and to sell to first party said blackeyed peas grown by him under conditions hereinafter set out, and first party agrees to purchase all blackeyed peas so grown by second party at a price hereinafter designated.

First party agrees to guarantee second party a minimum price of 3 1/4 cents per pound to be delivered to a designated receiving point in the vicinity of said lands, which receiving point shall be designated by first party.

If the market price is such that the second party is able to market his peas at a price higher than 3 1/4 cents per pound, then he is not obligated to sell to first party unless first party is willing to pay the higher market price.

The blackeyed peas are to be picked at the canner pea stage of maturity; that is, they are not to be picked until pods have reached full maturity and have turned white. Of course, a reasonable amount of green pods will be permitted, as well as a reasonable amount of partially dried peas.

This agreement is to serve as a minimum price guarantee by the first party to the second party, and is not to be construed in any way other than such. The second party is in no way obligated to sell to the first party unless the first party meets market price; however, the first party is obligated to purchase the above described blackeyed peas at a price not less than 3 1/4 cents.

H. J. R. NO. 10 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the

State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for

such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirements funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

"(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to determine by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof*) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto. *According to an opinion by the Attorney General of Texas. 31-46

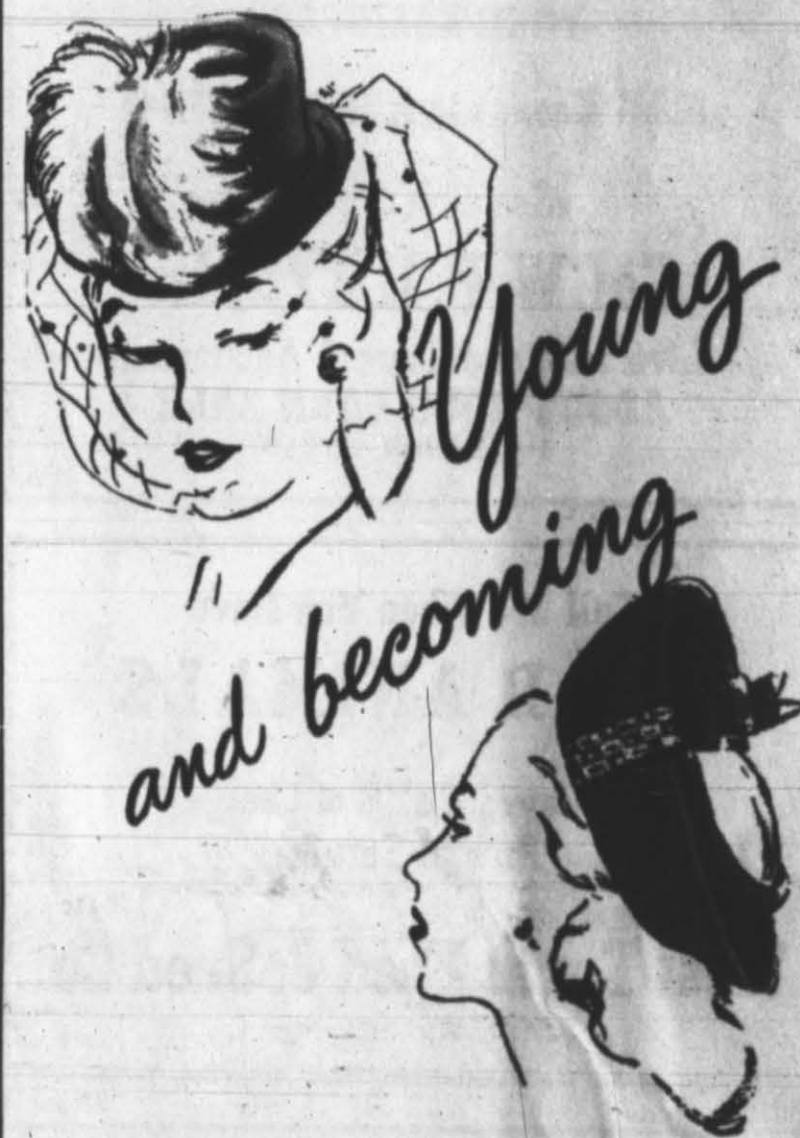

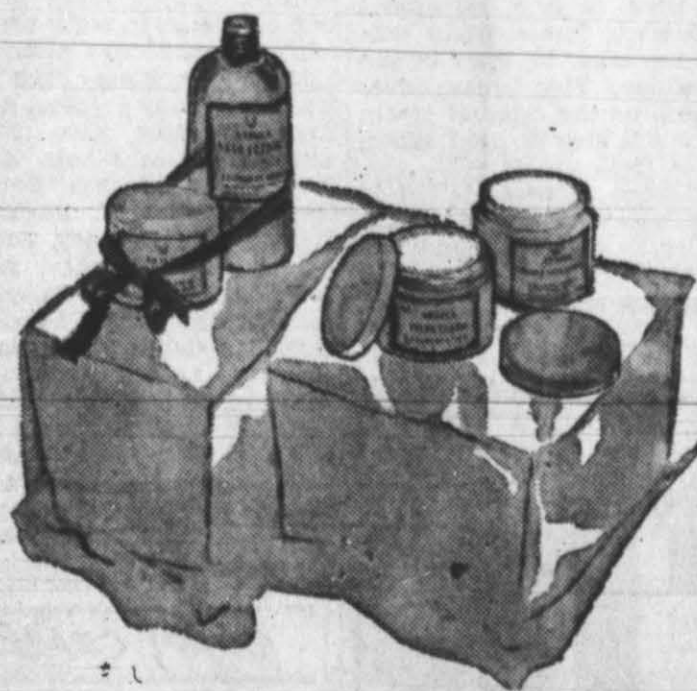

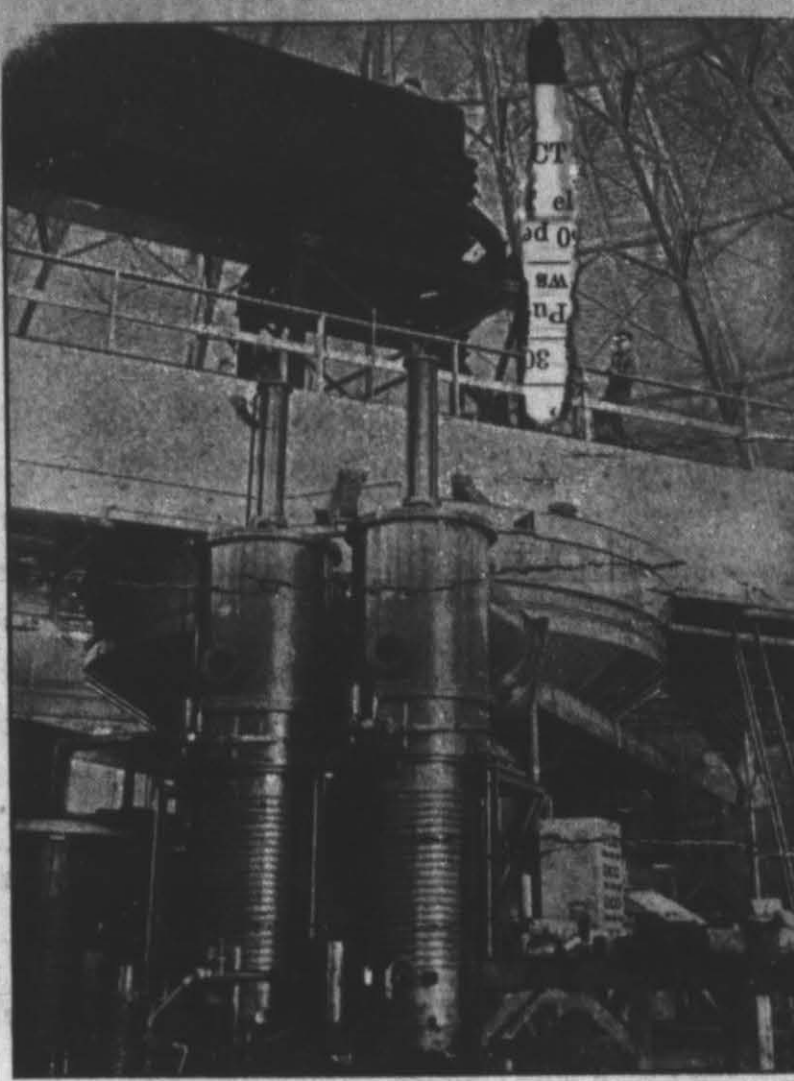

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS.

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D., 1946, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE"; and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."

Each voter shall mark out one

of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

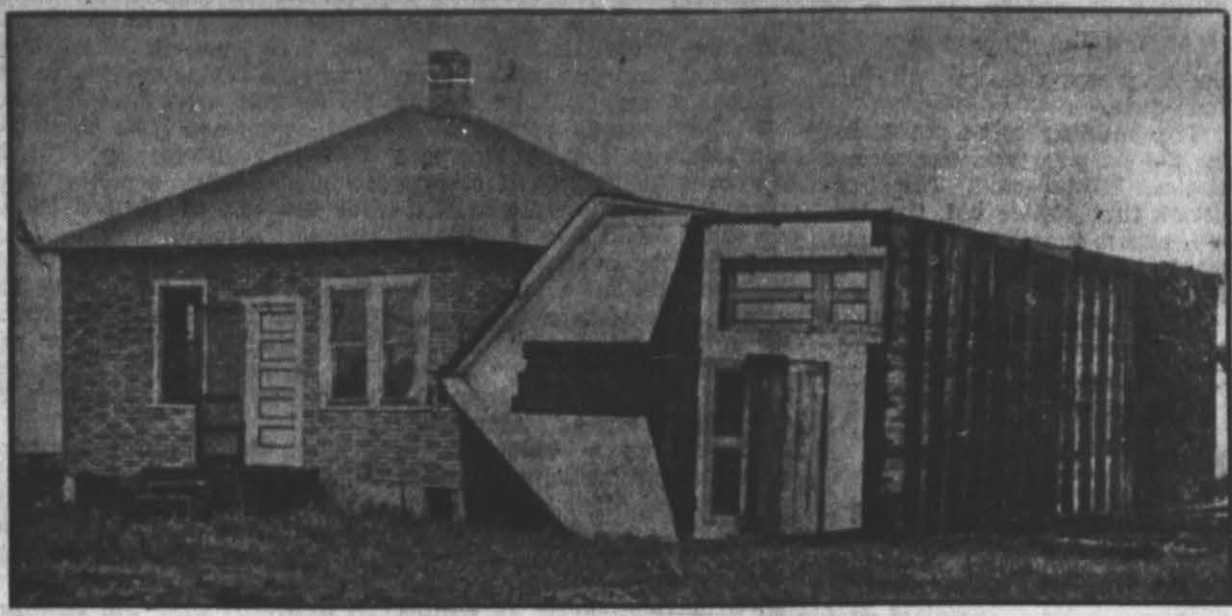

1946 Rainfall Is One-Third Normal First Six Months

A rainfall and moisture penetration study being conducted by the Soil Conservation Service, in cooperation with the Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion district, reveals that the average rainfall in the county for the first six months of the year was only 2.79 inches.

This is 5.15 inches below the normal rainfall for this period of 7.94 inches. In other words, rainfall over the county this year has been only one-third of normal.

Heaviest rainfall reported was in the vicinity of Dawn, where between 3.8 and 4.5 inches of moisture have been recorded.

The lightest rainfall recorded in the county was in the north and northwest, where the total is between 1.47 and 2.17 inches.

Except for a small area along the west end of Harrison Highway, the west part of the county has received little more than in the north.

For this study, 13 rain gauges are located throughout the county, and records are sent in each month by the farmers at whose farms they are placed. Additional reports will be made at later dates.

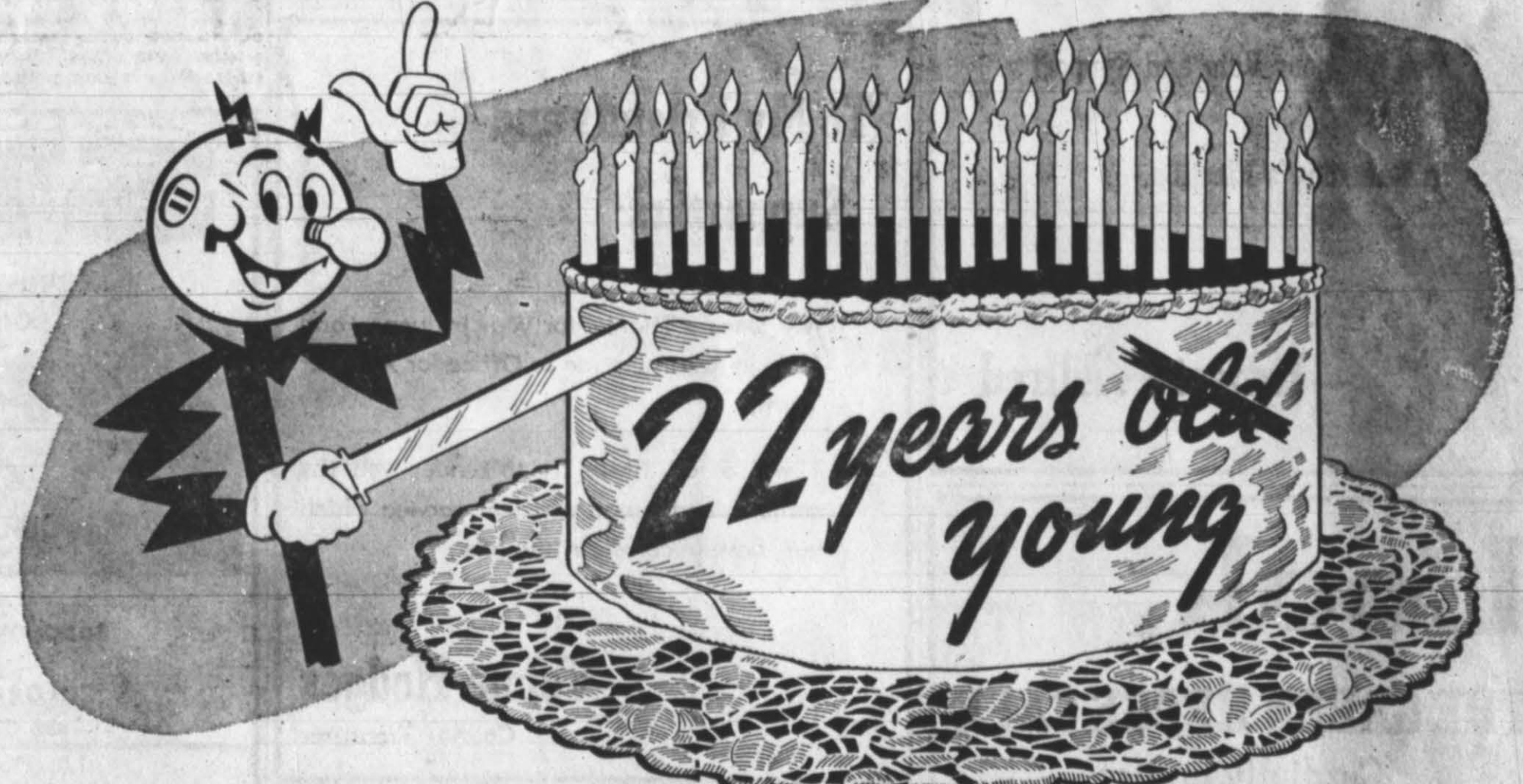

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes,

Congressman Worley Reports Trip To Philippines and Pacific Zone

By GENE WORLEY

Late in June Congress passed a Resolution providing for official representatives of that body to participate along with representatives of other nations attending the independence ceremonies of the Philippine Islands. Pursuant to that Resolution an official Committee, including myself, was appointed to represent the Congress of the United States.

In the belief the more you and I know as to what goes on in other parts of the world the more intelligent action we can take, I am preparing a series of weekly reports covering this trip which I hope you as a reader of this newspaper and as an American citizen who has a tremendous stake in our relations with foreign countries will find informative. If these reports appear in your newspaper, it is through the kindness and cooperation of your editor.

I might say in the beginning that while all of the trip was most interesting and informative, the highlights were the Bikini Atomic explosion, the ceremonies attending the granting of independence to the Philippines, conferences with General Marshall in China, General MacArthur in Japan and other military and State Department officials.

The Committee traveled between twenty and twenty five thousand miles in a period of two weeks. More time of course would have been desirable but the press of legislative duties in Washington demanded our early return. All of this travel was done by air.

The Congressional Delegation left Washington late on June 25 flying over-night to the West Coast, a distance of approximately 2400 miles. After conferring with State Department and military officials in San Francisco, we left the Coast about ten o'clock the following night by C-54 plane. From San Francisco to Hickam Field, Honolulu, is approximately 2400 miles, which was made in about twelve hours. Since there were only four bunks aboard the plane and since the House Members felt the Senators were entitled to consideration mainly on account of their age, most of us slept sitting up, on the floor, on anywhere we could.

We arrived at Hickam Field next morning which is the same field the Japs virtually ripped apart on that black day of December 7, 1941, but today practically all evidence of their attack has disappeared again there were conferences with

State Department and War and Navy officials and local citizens interested in state-hood.

Quite a change had come over the Island since I was stationed there in 1942. At that time, a strict curfew was in order, military law reigned supreme, glass windows were taped with adhesive for fear of breakage from bomb concussion, all Japanese, which represents a considerable portion of the Hawaiian population, were off the streets before dark, no one was allowed on the streets after ten o'clock without a pass, and the black-out was strictly enforced. All of these precautions were taken because an attack and invasion was expected to be launched by the enemy at any time. These expectations were confirmed when the Japanese sent the mightiest naval armada they had ever launched to take Midway, but where they were successfully turned back with heavy losses.

But now the Hawaiian Islands are back to normal and most people there are clamoring for admission as the 49th State of the Union, which proposition is now under consideration in Congress.

Pearl Harbor itself presents quite a different picture from the first time I saw it. At that time our ships were still sunk and desperate efforts were being made to raise them and get them back into operation because they were sorely needed. Just a short distance from the submarine base is a neat and well kept American cemetery where lie the bodies of nearly all men who were killed when the Japs attacked that fateful Sunday.

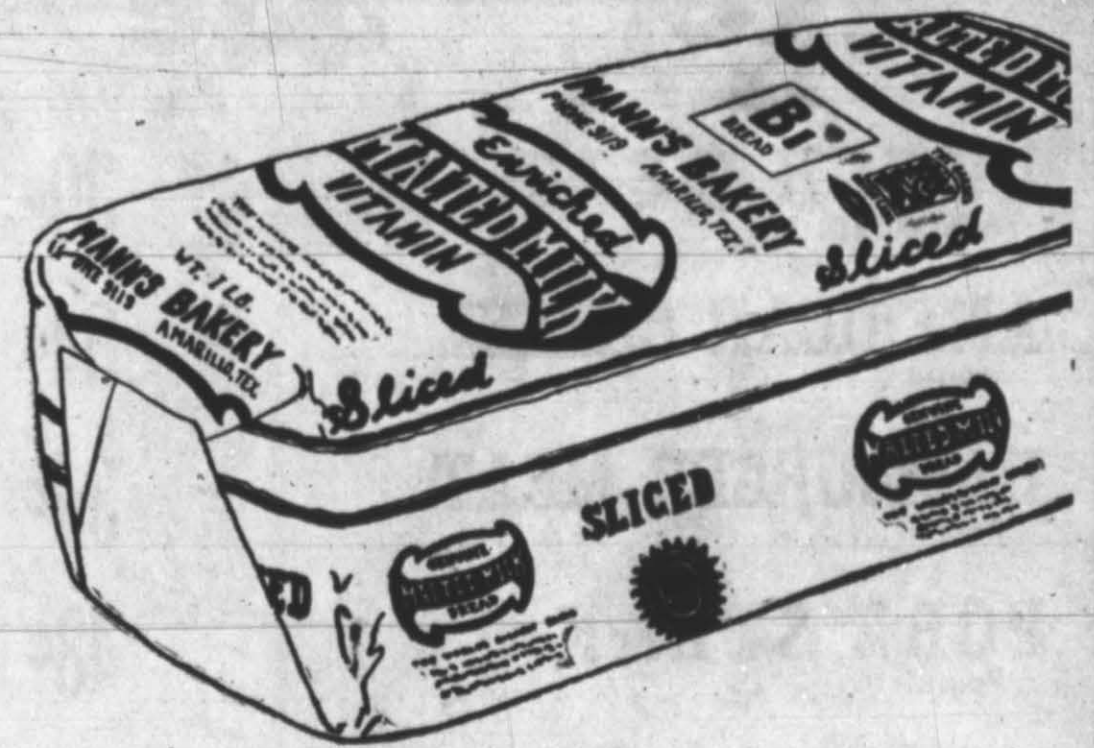

COMMUNITY BUILDERS: Minnie L. Walker

First Family, First Wedding, And First Girl Baby Is Her Record

A Hereford resident who literally has known Deaf Smith county from the first is Mrs. Minnie L. Walker. Hers was the first family in this county; her little brother, the first baby born here; hers, the first wedding performed here and her daughter, the first girl born in Deaf Smith county.



Minnie Lamorah Cox was born the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph C. Cox in November, 1870, near Collinsville, Grayson county, Texas. Her father had served in the Confederate army during the Civil War before being sent as a Scout to fight Indians, his headquarters being at Fort Belknap. Mrs. Walker still prizes an iron skillet taken by her father from the scene of the Indian massacre of a pioneer family.

She says, "Daddy was always roving," explaining that he moved his family to Wise county near Decatur for one and one-half years, back to the old home place in Grayson county for three years, then to Stephens county near Caddo where they lived for five years.

April, 1887, found the Coxes and their relatives moving to the Plains with 17-year-old Minnie driving one of the six horse-drawn wagons in the little caravan. Minnie's greatest concern in leaving her home was that she had to go without a dark walnut chest which contained her doll clothes.

The little group encountered no trouble until they reached the Spur Ranch fence. This was closely guarded by men who refused to let the caravan cross the ranch. The distance around being 25 miles, Minnie's father and the other men with him decided to cross the ranch anyway. Accordingly, one man held the guard while the Cox Wagons drove through. The result—a \$300 suit won by the Spur Ranch against Minnie's caravan.

One of the most vivid memories Mrs. Walker has of the trip to the Plains concerns "the ladies I saw parading with their parasols on the far sides of the lakes—and they were plentiful. But we kept on going, and I never did find the lakes or the ladies. Later I found that I had merely seen mirages."

Near the middle of May, Minnie's family arrived at Blanco canyon, where they built a dug-out and camped for the next two months. They were at that time 30 miles east of where Plainview now stands.

July saw the family taking up the journey again. They traveled across the Matador Ranch, crossing the South and North Pease rivers to Childress.

"We did not see another house after leaving the Matador Ranch," Mrs. Walker says, "until we reached Childress, three days later." From there they

followed the Fort Worth and Denver railroad to Washburn, cutting across to the T-Anchor Ranch near where Canyon is now.

There were on the T-Anchor at that time about 25,000 head of cattle which, had they been sold, would have brought \$7.50 for each cow and calf together. Approximately 35 cowboys, the bookkeeper, Charles J.E. Lownds and the boss, Jim Moore, made up the ranch force. Among these boys was Cal V. Walker, later to be Minnie's husband.

Minnie's family camped near Big Springs in an 18 x 20 dug-out until they could build a two-room house on what they thought was their land. When the land was surveyed, it was found that their house was standing one-half mile east of their claim on railroad territory.

"The dugout had a fireplace and walkout—no steps. The roof was made with a big, long cedar ridge pole, covered with brush; two sacks were sewed and spread over, and then covered with dirt. We had a tow-sack carpet and cloth partition. We never had a door, but we thought it mighty fine after living in a wagon for so long."

Minnie Cox and Calvin Walker were married in January, 1890, the ceremony being performed by circuit rider, the Rev. B. F. Jackson, now of Miami. The marriage license was secured, as all mail was received, at Old Tascosa.

Mr. Walker remained with the T-Anchor for several years. Mrs. Walker lived with her parents during the summer, moving into the old dugout, which had been the family's first home here in the winter.

In 1902, the couple filed on three sections near the old home place and the beginning of the town two years later. As it grew and every house was accompanied by a windmill, Hereford became known throughout the Panhandle as "The Windmill City of the Plains."

Mrs. Walker has two children, a daughter, Mrs. Alice Lamorah Swigart, Hereford, and a son, Cecil Rome Walker, Cleveland, New Mexico, and three grand-

Have Children Vaccinated for Smallpox Early

AUSTIN, Texas, July 30.—"From a health standpoint children are not ready to enter school until they have been successfully vaccinated against smallpox," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, reminds parents who expect to enroll their youngsters in September. "Many school districts make vaccination an entrance requirement, and children who have never been vaccinated, and also those vaccinated in babyhood, should be taken to the physician for vaccination now, so that the scar will be well healed before school opens."

Immunization against diphtheria is also strongly recommended for further protection. Parents are urged to have their children protected from diphtheria by immunization with toxoid. Children who had this protection in infancy should receive a booster dose before entering school in order to maintain immunity at a high level.

"These two types of protection against disease should be considered 'musts' for preschool children," Dr. Cox declared. "Any other immunization that the physician may recommend will, of course, provide additional health security."

In addition to this protection against specific communicable diseases each child getting ready to enter school should also receive a complete physical examination by his private physician or at the nearest clinic. Any treatment or correction of defects advised by the doctor should be undertaken immediately in order that the child may enter school in the best possible physical condition.

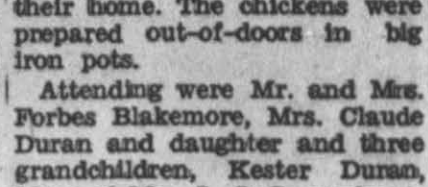
