



Just to prove that peaches really ripen in November in Deaf Smith County, Mr. Kuper brought a bushel of samples, in-cluding a number of fruit-laden limbs, in to the Chamber of Commerce office Monday morning.

The peaches were of a cling variety which Kuper could not identify. There is only one tree of this late-bearing type in the Kuper orchard, but the Kupers, who have a prosperous farm 4 miles west of Hereford, have reaped a plentiful harvest from ten other peach trees during the past summer.

Untroubled by rumors of food shortages, the Kupers have canned nearly a thousand jars of fruit and vegetables produced on their own farm this year. And, Kuper adds, he supplied two married daughters with all the peaches they could use.
