Four of the Whiteface starters will top the six-foot mark. James Ellis Higgins, who will hold down the pivot spot, measures 6 feet, 2 inches. Ray Lueb and Fugene Fangman, the forwards, and Homer Harvey, guard, all top the tape at six feet, one inch.

Biggest handicap faced by the local basketball team is the inadequate size of their own gymnasium. The Whiteface gymn doesn't quite measure up to the standards set for junior high basketball courts, and will be dwarfed by standard high school and college courts on which the squad will play this season. Hereford's cracker-box gymnasium, with the walls within inches of the court boundaries, is not only a handicap but an actual hazard.

The performance of Phillips Tulia last Thursday left no doubt about the quality of teams turned out by the oil capitol. The criticism that can be directed at them is that they are paying in the wrong league. This year's edition of the Hawks eleven could hold its own against most Class AA teams in the state, and should be a top heavy faworite to repeat for the Regional title, regardless of who wins the Floydada-Wellington bi-district game tomorrow.





During the month of October 1,104 veterans made purchases through the Fort Worth WAA for a dollar total acquisition value of \$1,435,559.84, Gish said.


