Whitefaces to Meet Canyon On Saturday At Buffalo Stadium

Crucial District Game May Settle Championship

Canyon's Eagles and Hereford's Whitefaces, the only undefeated teams in District 1-A competition, will clash on the gridiron at Buffalo Stadium in Canyon Saturday night.

Date of the game has been shifted to Saturday night, since the college stadium will be occupied Friday night by a Border Conference clash between West Texas State College and the Lumberjacks of Flagstaff (Arizona) Teachers College.

Game time will be eight o'clock Saturday night, Coach Stanton announced yesterday. The Herd will be in top shape for the contest, barring injuries during work-outs before game-time.

John Dyer, the Whiteface's regular center, has been working out with the squad this week for the first time since he was knocked out with a knee injury in the Panhandle game.

Contrary to rumors, there were no academic casualties on the team as a result of the first six week term examinations last week, and the squad will be intact Friday night.

The Eagles, after losing their season's opener to Muleshoe in a non-conference game, have been steadily on the up-grade and have rolled up an impressive list of victories.

The Eagles co-captains, Charles Wright and Billy Abbott, are rated as potent offensive threats, and the Eagles have not been scored on in their last two starts against Friona and Dalhart.

Blood Bank For Hospital Being Organized Now

A campaign to enlist volunteer blood donors to implement a "blood bank" at the Deaf Smith County Hospital has been launched under auspices of the La Plata Study Club.

Henry Stahl, laboratory technician at the hospital, has volunteered his services in determining blood types, and the first group of volunteers will be called to the hospital tomorrow night for testing and typing.

A card index will be maintained at the hospital with the names of volunteer donors, their addresses and telephone numbers, and their blood type; so that in any case of emergency when blood transfusions are required, a blood donor can be secured with a minimum of delay.

Local service clubs, veterans organizations, and social clubs are cooperating in the campaign, which has been selected as a project by the La Plata Study Club in cooperation with hospital authorities.

The test to determine blood type is simple and requires only a few minutes. Ex-servicemen who wish to volunteer as prospective donors will not be required to have blood types taken if they can produce "dog tags" showing blood type as determined by the army.

Former Friona Boy Killed in Pulaski Gin

M. M. Shirley Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. M. M. Shirley of Friona, was killed last Friday in an accident at a cotton gin at Pulaski, where he was working.

Details of the accident were not available. Reports stated that Shirley was caught in the cotton press at the gin.

Funeral services were held Sunday at Lakeview, with Rev. Clayton Day, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Friona, in charge of the rites.

Shirley served more than two years in the U. S. Army during World War II, and was discharged last year with the rank of sergeant. After his discharge, he was married to Miss Bobbie Nell Barnett of Memphis.

\$35,000 School Bond Election Set for Saturday, November 9

Voters in Deaf Smith County will go to the polls three times next week to ballot on important state and local issues. The general election of state, district and county officials is slated for Tuesday, a special election on an amendment to the State Constitution is set for Thursday, and the local school district bond election will be held on Saturday.

Of three elections facing voters next week, the most important locally will be the election slated Saturday, November 9, on the issuance of \$35,000 bonds by the Hereford Independent School District.

The bond issue is necessary according to members of the Board of Trustees, to cover costs of moving, equipping, repacking and remodeling two buildings to house a temporary Junior High school, and necessary repairs and additions to the present school buildings.

Plans will be at the County Courthouse, opening at 8 a. m. Saturday morning, November 9, and closing at 7 p. m. C. C. Acker will be presiding judge, with J. C. Ricketts and R. P. Coneway as clerks.

All resident qualified property tax-paying voters, living within the Hereford Independent School district, who have duly rendered property for taxation, are eligible to vote in the election.

The election was ordered by the Board of Trustees on October 17, on receipt of a petition, signed by 48 qualified voters, asking that such election be called.

Work is already in progress on the new Junior High School buildings. The two buildings purchased from the Hereford Prison of War Camp are being moved to the site on school property north of the present

General Election is Tuesday; Special Election Thursday

Next Tuesday, November 5, is the date set for the state general elections. Voters will be presented fifth a lengthy ballot, with candidates for all state, district, and county offices, in addition to three proposed constitutional amendments, listed.

A special election to vote on a fourth amendment, the Veterans Land Bill amendment, will be held on Thursday. The same election officials will preside at the polls in each election, according to County Judge Fred W. Baird.

Democratic nominees for county offices will be unopposed in the general election, but the Republican party has nominated a full slate of candidates for state and district offices this year.

In this area, however, only one serious campaign is being fought by a Republican Candidate. Frank T. O'Brien, Amarillo lawyer and ex-serviceman, the Republican nominee for Congressman from the 8th District, is making an active campaign over the district in the interest of his candidacy against Democratic Congressman Gene Worley.

Election officials have been appointed, and polling places designated, for both the general election on Tuesday and the Special Constitutional Amendment balloting Thursday, Judge Baird announced this week. Officials and polls will be the same in each case.

In Precinct 1, Sylvester Slagle is presiding judge, and polls will be at the County Courthouse. In Precinct 2, Herman Ford has been appointed presiding judge,

and the polling place will be the county courthouse. Rural election precincts, their presiding judges, and location of polling places, follow: Precinct 3: J. A. Roe, presiding, at the J. A. Roe home.

Precinct 4: J. G. Fortenberry presiding, at the H. C. Hammock residence. Precinct 5: R. L. Campbell presiding, at the Fairview schoolhouse.

Precinct 6: W. M. Stewart presiding, at Ford schoolhouse. Precinct 7: H. H. Miller presiding, at Dawn.

Precinct 8: Ben Bates presiding, at the Lewis Smith residence. Precinct 9: C. F. Ricketts presiding, at Bippus Community House.

Precinct 10: C. L. McBroom presiding, at Daniel schoolhouse. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. Absentee balloting, which will close tomorrow midnight in the case of the general election, and Sunday midnight in the case of the Thursday special election, has been extremely light to date, according to County Clerk Robert Thompson.

Only seven ballots had been requested at mid-week for the General Election, and none had been filed. No absentee ballots had been requested for the special election.

The widely heralded Fall Clean-up Campaign, sponsored by the Hereford Civic Improvement Committee, which closed last week-end didn't exactly fall flat on its face but hasn't been an outstanding success. 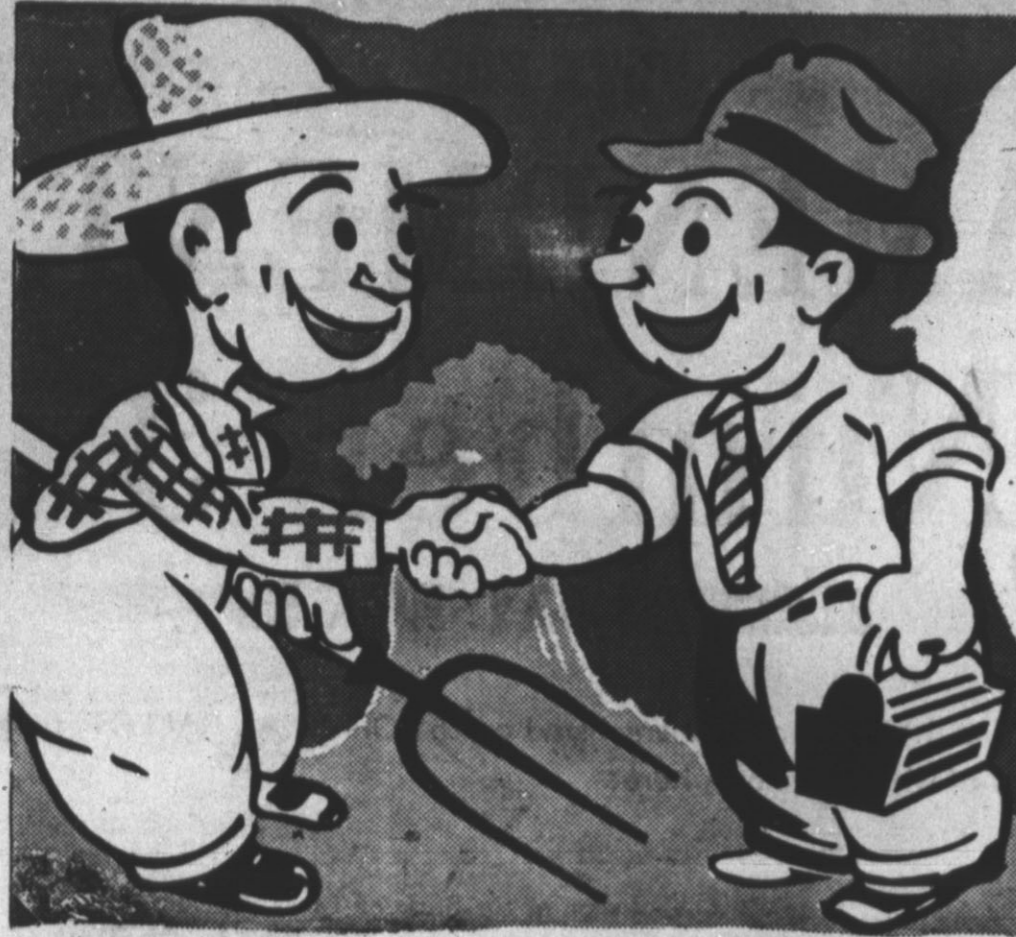

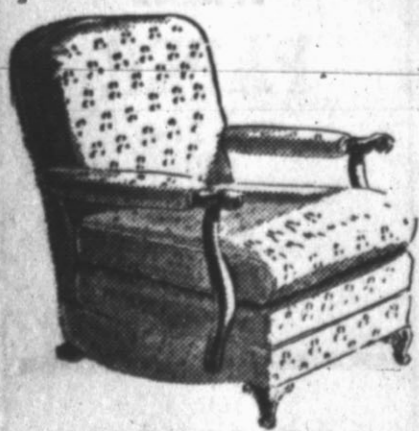

This is the last Amendment listed on the OFFICIAL BALLOT, a brief of which is shown here:

The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

This Amendment is endorsed by leading State officials, including Governor Coke R. Stevenson, and the Democratic Nominee for Governor, Beauford H. Jester. Also by leading school officials throughout the state, and by members of the State Highway Commission. It also has the whole hearted support of your local county and school officials.
