MEXICO CITY (AP) - Results from the July 7 elections show the ruling Institutional Revolutionary Party received 11.6 million votes to 2.7 million for the opposition Na-

tional Action Party. The ruling party, known as the PRI, won 292 of the 300 seats directly elected to the lower house of Congress. National Action, or PAN, won six and the remaining two went to the tiny Authentic Party of the Mexican

Federal Electoral Commission show that 17.8 million of the eligible 35.2 million voters cast ballots in the congressional vote.

They show PRI with 65 percent of the total and PAN with 15 percent.

They were trailed by the communist-led coalition Mexican United Socialist Party, 3.2 percent; the conservative Mexican Democratic Party, 2.7 percent; the Socialist Workers Party, 2.4 percent; The results released by the cent; the Authentic Party, 1.6 per-

cent; the Mexican Workers Party, 1.5 percent, and the Revolutionary Workers Party, 1.25 percent.

Parties need 1.5 percent of the popular vote to keep their official registry, but the Revolutionary Workers Party still may top that figure once the figures are released for the remaining 100 congressional seats reserved for minority parties in a separate ballot.

### Budget talks collapse

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congress' effort to enact a major deficitreduction package this year is in shambles after the acrimonious collapse of bsdget tallks between the House and Senate.

"We'll call you back as soon as we have something to talk about," Sen. Pete V. Domenici, R-N.M., chairman of the Senate Budget Committee, told House conferees Wednesday as he adjourned what may have been the year's final bargaining session.

Neither side called an end to the talks, but it was unclear how they could resume. "Do I know a way?" Domenici said. "No, I don't."

Congressional leaders have said that if no budget is passed this year. they will simply abide by the separate budgets each chamber has passed as they enact money bills this

The House on Tuesday voted 239-181 to waive congressional rules that prevent consideration of money bills before a budget accepted by both houses is in place.

However, such piecemeal action will do nothing to achieve long-term savings or meet the goal set earlier this year by the administration and congressional leaders to enact a plan that could slash the annual budget deficit to \$100 billion by 1988 - about half the current tide of red ink.

Wednesday's testy meeting disintegrated after the senators rejected a bottom-line offer from the Democratic-led House, saying it did not go far enough toward making serious domestic spending cuts and violated an agreement with President Reagan by providing too little for military spending.

The House had offered to make an additional \$24 billion in domestic spending cuts as part of a three-year, \$272.6 billion deficit-reduction plan.

#### Last offer rejected

However, the package did not meet demands from the Senate and the White House for the elimination of a variety of domestic spending pro-

Senators also said some of the new savings in the House package were not likley to pass Congress, including a new user fee on electric utilities that generate nuclear power, the impositio of grazing fees for federal lands and the termination of a program that shares mineral royalties with states - items that would hurt Western states such as the one Domenici represents.

Domenici and other senators also said the House had not lived up to an agreement with the president on military spending. The House proposal provides \$298 billion for military spending authority next year, but Domenici said that was \$4.5 billion short of what would be needed to keep pace with inflation, which he said was part of the agreement.

Some House members also said part of the problem was a White House meeting last week during which congressional leaders and the president agreed to a framework that put a Social Security freeze and tax increases out of bounds for a deficit-reduction package.

Republican senators later expressed anger, saying that when the president walked away from the Social Security freeze, GOP senators facing re-election next year were left in a politically vulnerable position.

The applications can be obtained at the pre-hearings or at the appraisal district office, located in the old Central Elementary School building. Appraisers will assist in filling out the applications if the taxpayer desires.

The pre-hearings will continue today, Friday and Monday. With home owners being imposed with a big burden of the tax load, a large number of these taxpayers are expected at the pre-hearings.

#### Mini-machine saves baby's life

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - Air Force physicians saved the life of a lung-injured Killeen baby by using a new, miniature children's heart-lung machine developed in San Antonio, officials said.

The device, called an extracorporeal membrane oxygenation unit, is the first one made small enough for treating a baby during emergency air transport, Wilford Hall Air Force Medical Center of-

"This baby would not have survived without ECMO," said Col. Robert F. deLemos, head of maternal and child care at the hospital. Derrick Barlow, 20 days old, became the first child last week to be placed on the device, the San Antonio Light reported. Wilford Hall and the Southwest Foundation for Biomedical Research in San Antonio developed the device.

Derrick suffered chemical pneumonia at birth at Fort Hood on June 29, after swallowing fecal material in the womb, a common birth accident, deLemos said.

He was moved by air ambulance to Wilford Hall on July 4 and connected on July 7 to the machine, which takes blood from the body through major neck blood vessels, infuses it with oxygen and then pumps it back into the body.

#### DA to review murder case

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - Tarrant County District Attorney Tim Curry is expected to review paperwork filed by police seeking to try a teen-ager as an adult in the death of a 4-year-old girl.

Prosecutors said evidence in the case would be reviewed today, and a decision could be made by week's end whether to accept capital murder charges against a 16-year-old neighbor of Melody

Juvenile court officials on Wednesday released the boy's 12-yearold brother after police questioned him in connection with the girl's asphyxiation death.

Detective Curt Brannan said he spent most of Wednesday questioning the 12-year-old and administering a polygraph examination because "we were anxious to eliminate him from our investigation if he wasn't involved in any way."

The boy was detained with his brother but "further investigation failed to provide any evidence that the 12-year-old was involved in the murder," said Brannan.

The older boy has been ordered held in the county juvenile detention home until juvenile proceedings are complete, authorities said. Senior staff attorney Steve Chaney said Curry wants to review the case before it is filed.

Police said the girl disappeared Saturday when she went to return a toy to a friend down the street. Her body was found Monday in a plastic bag at an alley behind the neighbor's house.

#### Amateurs warned about wrestling

BOSTON (AP) - Amateur muscle men should leave body slams and other wrestling throws to the professionals, because these spectacular moves "can have a potentially catastrophic outcome," doctors warn today.

Dr. Peter Wilton and three Veterans Administration colleagues from Minneapolis described a case in which a 58-year-old man underwent emergency surgery for a ruptured gallbladder.

"We learned later that his son had 'body slammed' him into the lawn 'doing some wrestling moves' four days before admission," they wrote in a letter in the New England Journal of Medicine.

They noted that professional wrestlers are in top physical condition, know how to fall without hurting themselves and tangle in a ring that has a springy floor like a trampoline. They calculated that the man they treated slammed into "the unyielding turf" at a velocity of almost 23 miles an hour when thrown by his son.

#### Ana drifting north now

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) - Tropical Storm Ana was drifting northward in the Atlantic Ocean today, its winds gusting up to 55 mph but posing no threat to North American land, the National Hurricane Center said.

The first named storm of the the 1985 hurricane season, Ana was about 300 miles south of Halifax, Nova Scotia, the hurricane center said in a 6 a.m. EDT advisory.

The storm's center was near latitude 40.3 north and longitude 64.9 west and was traveling north-northeast at 22 mph, the center said. Little change in motion was expected today, and the colder nor-

thern waters will sap her energy, the hurricane center said. Ana had dumped rains over Bermuda Tuesday night, but as it migrated north the storm left only haze over the island, forecaster

#### Reagan seeing more visitors

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan is seeing more visitors and expanding his workload as doctors report steady progress from cancer surgery, but the White House is clearly irritated about what it regards as ill-founded second-guessing by some experts about his care.

The 74-year-old Reagan was described as being in such high spirits that he joked about reports circulating in financial markets in Singapore and Europe that he had died. "Somebody must be trying

to make a buck," the president was quoted as saying Wednesday.

A White House medical bulletin this morning quoted the president as saying, "I'm feeling great." The statement said he remains on his liquid diet and is continuing to recover "extremely well."

National security adviser Robert McFarlane was added to the president's list of visitors today as Reagan regains his strength and is able to spend more time seeing people and discussing events.

White House Chief of Staff Donald Regan, addressing a U.S.

Chamber of Commerce breakfast today, said Reagan had a restful night after watching the latest in a series of Humphrey Bogart movies being shown on a Washington area television station this week. Wednesday night's movie was "The Big Sleep."

#### Investigators discover PCBs

WASHINGTON (AP) - City fire investigators recently discovered PCBs leaking from a number of high-voltage transformers in Smithsonian Institution buildings, according to a published report.

Sources familiar with the institution's electrical system said circuit breakers designed to provide protection are themselves fire hazards, according to a report in today's editions of The Washington

A PCB blaze would produce cancer-causing chemicals and could forever contaminate some of the irreplaceable national heirlooms housed in the Smithsonian buildings, officials said.

"The people at the Smithsonian can't possibly recognize the danger or they wouldn't leave it (the PCBs) there," said Lt. Pat

Walsh, a member of the District of Columbia Fire Department's

The danger to firefighters would be so great that they might not go inside to battle an electrical blaze, Walsh said.
"Only for the immediate rescue of people would I send someone in-

to the smoke," he said.

### Dallas City Council members approve noise ordinance

DALLAS (AP) - City Council tended to limit free speech," Mayor members have approved a controversial ordinance restricting the use of bullhorns outside abortion clinics, rejecting arguments by right-to-life groups that their right to free speech would be hampered.

Council members voted 8-3 on Wednesday to approve the ordinance, saying it is designed to protect the health of clinic patients, not to restrict protests by abortion op-

Starke Taylor said amid tightened security that included a police tactical squad standing by in a nearby room. "It's to protect the public health."

The ordinance prohibits abortion opponents from using bullhorns or loudspeakers within 150 feet of an abortion clinic, said officials.

Council member Lori Palmer proposed the ordinance in response to recent complaints from abortion "This ordinance is in no way in- clinic managers that Dallas police

have been lax in preventing the harassment of patients at the clinics. Violations of the ordinance can be punishable by fines of up to \$200.

Council members John Evans, Jerry Rucker and Jim Richards, who failed in an attempt to table the proposal for further study, voted against

Leaders of groups opposed to abortion, who said the ordinance will restrict their free speech rights, added they probably will file suit against the city.

"This pro-abortion stand taken by the council is an obvious attempt to choke our voice," Winston Wilder, president of the Abortion Abolition Society, said. "What it's going to do is get more people than ever out on the streets and it's going to create more problems for everybody."

He said his group has not decided whether it will obey the new or-

"We're studying the pros and cons of carrying out certain acts of civil disobedience," said Wilder. "If it serves our purpose, we will disobey

Abortion rights advocates praised the council's action.

A taxpayer can understand that the state has mandated property be put on the tax rolls at market value so that values will be uniform throughout the state. Theoretically, however, all values would go up and tax rates would come down to equalize the tax picture.

However, exemptions approved by state voters resulted in a revenue loss of \$780 million last year. These included farm machinery and cattle. Locally, some homes were devalued and business equipment and inventories remained at the same value because they were already being assessed at about 90 percent of market value. With the tax rate lower, these two classes resulted in revenue losses for taxing entities.

In order to balance budgets with those tax revenue losses, other taxpayers were imposed with a heavier burden. If a taxpayer feels his taxes are unfair or unjust, he can appeal to the appraisers at the pre-hearings, and he can protest to the Board of

He may have already missed the vital first step in the taxing process: the budget hearings held by each taxing entitiy. The city and county have already had theirs; the school district will hold budget hearings in August. In order to keep budgets down, thus holding taxes down, enough taxpayers must show up at these hearings and get their elected

There may be more folks attending future budget hearings. Usually, only news representatives are at the

### Now You're Cookin'

Driving seven miles out on Harrison Highway, hanging a right going one-and-a-quarter more miles, one would think he was heading for the 'boonies'. Instead, up over a hill stands a house surrounded withlife in every corner of every field.

Selling fresh country eggs and fresh vegetables when in season, Margaret Betzen can usually be found in the hen house or the garden, gathering eggs or picking 'veggies' for the next day's business.

Betzen is in full control of what goes on around her farm. She had been selling eggs, goats' milk, and freshly picked vegetables only parttime while being employed as a secretary-bookkeeper at Lawrence Ward Trucking.

"I decided I wasn't ever going to get to be president of the corporation," Betzen joked. "So, I decided to go into the egg business fulltime. That decision was made in February when my goats started kidding."

At one time, Betzen had 20 baby goats, which meant feeding 10 at a time on bottles. "By the time I got the first 10 weaned, the other 10 were ready!" she laughed.

Now, Betzen is milking nine goats. "Goats' milk is more easily digested than cow's milk," explained Betzen.

She said that the reason goat's milk is more easily digested is that in goats' milk, the globules are smaller than the globules found in regular cows' milk.

"You can use goats' milk to replace all cows' milk," Betzen explained once again, "and it makes a great gravy because it so rich."

One can hardly tell her homemade ice cream is made from goats' milk. Being married to Robert Betzen for 14 years, the couple has 12

children and 20 grandchildren (including a granddaughter that just recently arrived). Robert is a part-time home-fix-it

and repairman. He is also an agent for American General selling life and accident insurance.

The Betzens both enjoy country living as they raise their garden, feed the chickens and milk the goats.

To exemplify their country living, they also use a wood-burning stove to heat the house. "Our highest gas bill Betzen with a smile

The couple also has a windmill that pumps their water. Both the stove and windmill are supplemented with

Getting back to the basics of living, the Betzens raise nearly all of the food they eat. "The snow peas are harvesting now, the broccoli is almost ready to pick and Robert is going to plant cabbage this weekend," Betzen said proudly, and with good reason.

A vegetarian could have a hey-day in her enormous garden. She has rows of cauliflower, squash, cucumbers, tomatoes, green beans, okra, blackeyed peas, cantaloupe, and watermelon

The homemaker also has a green thumb when it comes to trees. In her orchard she has apple and apricot trees; "The peaches didn't make it this year," explained Betzen, "they froze.

Cherry trees line the west side of the Betzens' home for a windbreak, with a row of pines for extra protec-

"I'm kinda proud of my pines," Betzen said, "most pines are slow growers but I have Afghanistan pines that I planted in '77. They are eight years old now and some of them are 30 feet tall!"

Along with the orchard and pines, the Betzens' have three-and-a-half acres of nothing but pecan trees. "This is their fourth year," said Betzen. "Hopefull this year we'll

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have some pecans to pick."

The couple has resided on their homestead for 12 years now and seem to have adjusted rather well to country living. "To enjoy country living," Betzen stressed, "doesn't mean you have give up the modern conviences." This means Betzen has a dishwasher, a microwave and even a microwave in the dairy to heat milk for her baby goats.

Betzen is well-known around town for her country eggs. By the time the sun is up, Betzen is in the chicken house gathering freshly laid eggs for her delivery routes, going to town every Monday, Wednesday, and Fri-

She has 100 laying hens, 25 pullets (baby hens), and 75 being raised for broillers 'that will eventually end up in the freezer,' and one baby pea fowl.

When speaking of baby pea fowls, males are referred to as peacocks and females are pea hens," explained Betzen. "The one we have is just a chick, so we won't know (its' gender) until about six months from now."

Betzen has customer that call on her only when they need eggs and some "regulars" that have standing orders for a specified amount.



Most of the vegetables raised by Betzen will be frozen for 'that just picked quality' this fall. She can even spice up those veggies with her homegrown herbs such as sage, oregano, borage, garlic, and onions.

Betzen also has a flower garden encirled with brick she layed herself. Eventually, Betzen plans to build the garden to surround the house.

In the yard, one will be greeted by a couple of "mutts" named Jack and Jill that came from the same litter. Other pets include her cats. "We have six cats that always seem to know when it's milking time,"Betzen

When the Betzens first moved to the country, the cats were dying off and they didn't know why. "I put them on goat's milk," she explained, "and they finally began to show signs of improvement."

The country woman also rents out pasture for horses and calves.

Spare time for Betzen is spent sewing and cooking. Betzen sews all of her granddaughters' Easter dresses every year and makes other garments for her family on special occasions.

Betzen shares some goats' milk recipes that she says "you can't tell the difference!"

**FETA CHEESE** 

Add 21/2 Rennett tablets dissolved in 1T lukewarm water- to ½ gal. raw milk. Mix and heat together over medium heat about 8 to 10 minutes or until milk coagualates and whey separates, stirring frequently - do NOT boil.

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

#### Survey shows athletes choosing easier courses

WACO, Texas (AP) - Schoolboy football players who will have to punt, pass and kick this fall also face another requirement of making the grade, and are choosing easier courses as a result, according to Dave Campbell's Texas Football magazine.

The magazine's preseason poll of 205 players showed 38.4 percent are changing class schedules to avoid more difficult courses, reducing their chances of failure and suspension because of the no-pass, no-play

The magazine, which also interviewed 78 coaches around the state, reported 94.4 percent said some of their players were staying away from hard coursework.

All the coaches surveyed opposed the state's no-play rule, which stems from last year's legislative education reforms and has been upheld by the Texas Supreme Court.

Any student who fails to make passing grades of 70 in every class will be suspended from extracurricular activities for six weeks under the rule.

"Some students say that if you are not passing, you should not be playing," Dave Campbell, magazine editor-in-chief, said Wednesday. "But their coaches are making interesting plans to make sure their

students keep playing."
Klein High School coach George Kirk last year began an earlymorning study hall for football players making below 72 in any

class, Campbell said.

"It's been pretty tough to get those kids up to school at 6:30 a.m. to study, but it's been worth it," Kirk told the magazine in its July issue. "We had problems with parents complaining about having to get their kids up that early, but when they realized we were trying to help them, the opposition stopped."

"Somebody is going to be killed because of that rule," new Highland Park Head Coach Randy Emery told the magazine. "If a kid drops out of school because he can't play football, and he robs a 7-Eleven and shoots somebody, that's a direct result of no-pass, no-play. And don't tell me that isn't going to happen somewhere.'

The survey questionnaire was sent in late April and responses were received through May, Campbell

"It is such a hot topic," he said.



### oviets hire firm to distribute press releases

WASHINGTON (AP) - Soviet Embassy officials, normally secretive sorts, have paid a New York firm to distribute press releases written like news stories to newspapers and radio stations around the country.

So far this year, North American Precis Syndicate Inc. has shipped out three Soviet governmentinspired releases to 3,800 newspapers and 5,000 radio stations.

Justice Department officials said there is nothing illegal about the practice so long as the syndicate files under the Foreign Agents Registration Act, which it has done.

The Soviet stories generally stress the strong bonds between the two countries and the need for more cooperation.

There's a glowing account of a July 1975 U.S.-Soviet space effort, Apollo-Soyuz, in which Soviet cosmonaut Alexei Leonov remembers Americans and Soviet astronauts meeting as friends.

Leonov is quoted as saying he joins others "who stand for international peaceful cooperation in space."

Then there's a story, with picture, about the close bonds and friendships formed by U.S. and Russian soldiers who met on the banks of the Elbe River in Germany in April 1945 at the end of World War II.

Ronald N. Levy, the syndicate's president, said the Soviet news releases, sent out in printable form, are accompanied by a separate piece of paper noting that the syndicate is paid by the embassy.

That procedure is required by the Justice Department, but agency spokesman Robert Sharp said there was no way to ensure adherence to that policy because the department doesn't check the cover letters.

It's unclear how many of the stories have found their way into print, but Soviet Embassy official Yuri Subbotin said he has been pleased with the results.

He said he was unable to provide the names of the papers using the Soviet material. Besides, "the names mean nothing to me ... they are not big like the New York Times," he said.

Subbotin said that when North American Precis Syndicate approached him about joining its business, he figured, "Yes, why

Levy said the syndicate sends out regular packages of material to 3,800 newspapers, predominantly weeklies, and 5,000 radio stations.

Media outlets can use the material for free, with Levy promising between 100 and 400 clippings per release and 200 radio placements.

The syndicate's clients, including the Soviet, Canadian and South African embassies and the Caribbean and Romanian tourist organizations, pay between \$1,750 and \$2,950 for a newspaper release. A radio spot costs \$1,450.

The newspaper material, including features such as recipes and travel and home tips, is ready to be inserted into the paper without editing changes. Radio spots are written so they can be read on the air.

"It's a nice package — very slick," said Eddie Dodd, editor of the 2,000-circulation Abbeville Herald in Abbeville, Ala. Nonetheless, Dodd said, "I generally just throw it away."

Dodd said he didn't remember any Soviet material, but he "wouldn't be exactly happy" if the stories were not clearly marked.

There he became acquainted with a Jew named Aquila, born in Pontus, who had recently arrived from Italy with his wife, Priscilla They had been expelled from Italy as a result of Claudius Caesar's order to deport all Jews from Rome. Paul lived and worked with them, for they were tentmakers just as he was.

Each Sabbath found Paul at the synagogue trying to convince the Jews and Greeks alike. And after the arrival of Silas and Timothy from Macedonia, Paul spent his full time preaching and testifying to the Jews that Jesus is the Messiah

But when the Jews opposed him and blasphemed. hurling abuse at Jesus. Paul shook off the dust from his robe and said. "Your blood be upon your own heads -- I am innocent -- from now on I will preach to the Gentiles."

After that he stayed with Titus Justus, a Gentile who worshiped God and lived next to the Crispus, the leader of the synagogue, and all his

household believed in the Lord and were baptized as were many others in Corinth. Acts 18:1-8






