Spirit of optimism prevails in both farm and business circles, with the prospects for heavy yields of wheat and row crops at the highest level. Conditions were never better for wheat production the history of the territory nce this grain has become the main crop, according to one who has been here for more than 20

An idea of what to expect in the way of wheat yield was presented by R. O. Dunkle before the chamber of commerce when he compared the acreage of 1929 with 1931. In 1929 there were 189,000 acres of wheat for the district and 1300 cars were shipped to market. This year there are 300,000 acres in wheat. Two years ago the crop was rated as a bumper one, and market at least 2,000 carloads.

John Gilbreath Sends News of Nicaragua War

A communication, fresh from a warring storm center on the east coast of Nicaragua, has arrived here in the form of a mimeographed weekly newspaper, published by the crew of the U. S. S. Asheville. John Gilbreath, member of the quartermaster's department on the Asheville, sent the paper which was published April 18, at Cape Gracias a' Dios, Nicaragua. John is the son of W. H. Gilbreath, Bellvew, N. M., and a nephew of Jeff T. Gilbreath, this city.

The Asheville Skyline, which oarries some drawings made by artists of the crew, is a newsy paper and interesting as it originated in the midst of the present trouble which the noted bandit, Sandino. has stirred up in killing and mutilating Americans.

The Asheville was dispatched to Puerto Cabezas to protect lives of foreigners and Americans. The population was in a state of panic. fearing an attack from a bandit leader, Blandon, and his men. The Skyline explains the strife as being raids by Sandino along the coast to intimidate foreign interests and to loot food and clothing in preparation for the coming rainy season.

The American forces have orders to protect the cities but not to send armed men into the surrounding county.

question it should be clearly unwise, Too many parents are disappointed when they find that their boy does not climb very fast after four years of indifferent, or even careful work in college. It is customary to blame the college regardless of the type of boy sent or the kind of work done by him. The student should certainly have a definite aim in going to college. If he has ability and a sufficient amount of preparation. knows what he wants to get at college, and then works at the job, he is likely to profit by the follows the path of least resist- twin rails". nce in going to college and continues to follow that path after his arrival, he will probably not get very far. The person who simply drifts may accidentally drift into something worth while, but the chances are decidedly against him.

The student's school career should indicate his probable success in college. Investigations have shown that those who do well in high school usually do well in college. In fact, many colleges do not care to admit high school graduates who stand near the bottom of their class. Last year at the University of Texas, 90 per cent of the freshmen in the first quarter of their high school graduating classes met the minimum scholastic standards, while only 27 per cent of those in the fourth quarter satisfied these standards. "It is quite evident that it pays students to do their work well in high school. We believe that the weaker high school graduates are vasting their time and money in toing to college," writes the Registrar of the University.

There are exceptions to all rules and the student who has plenty of intelligence may loaf through high school with poor grades to his credit. He may wake up and do creditable work at college, out. though it is highly probable that he will continue to loaf at college. ROXING may be flat on its back and cheking for breath and you may have your own ideas about what floored it, but did you ever have William F. Facts On Library. Miss Hostetler was introduced as probably the most exicient librarian in Texas. 


