Soviets regain role as top arms exporter

WASHINGTON (AP) - After trailing the United States in 1983, the Soviet Union regained its role as the world's leading arms exporter last year with sales of \$9.4 billion, the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency says.

U.S. sales for 1984 totaled \$7.7 billion, according to a new report, "World Military Expenditures and Arms Transfers."

The report, released Thursday, also said the U.S.-Soviet share of arms sales worldwide dropped below 50 percent for the first time ever, with the United States accounting for 22 percent and the Soviets 26.9 per-

The declining share of the two superpowers reflects the increased arms-selling role of Soviet allies in Eastern Europe as well as France, Great Britain and Italy. Although the report did not provide figures, it said France for the first time sold more weaponry to developing countries last year than did the United States.

For many years, the United States ranked at the top of the list of arms exporters. But the Soviets have outstripped the United States in five of the past seven years, according to the study.

The report also said:

-The Soviet Union, with 4.4 million, and China, with 4.1 million, had by far the largest number of

military personnel worldwide in 1983. The United States was third with 2.2 million. The global total was 28.4 million.

-The countries that earmarked more than 30 percent of their respective gross national products on military spending in 1983 were concentrated in the Middle East. In this (See SOVIETS, Page 2)

Spy's defection may cost much information

LONDON (AP) - The defection of a top Soviet agent enabled British authorities to unmask 25 other Russian spies, but may cost the West its most important source of information inside the KGB, British and Danish officials said.

The British government announced on Thursday the defection of Oleg A. Gordievski, identified as the chief British operative of the KGB, the Soviet secret police and espionage agency.

Simultaneously, it said 25 Soviet nationals identified by Gordievski were being expelled for alleged espionage activities.

Officially the political counselor at the Soviet Embassy, Gordievski had served at the Soviet Embassy in Copenhagen in the 1970s. Danish officials revealed Thursday that he had established contacts with their counter-espionage at that time.

Minister of Justice Erik Ninn-Hansen said in a television interview the Soviet diplomat had been "an extremely important source of information to our security."

"I moved to Hereford and taught school. It was during this time that my mother became a housemother at WT. McCaslin Hall is named after her," she added. "She served as housemother in the cooperative ome for over 18 years.

"You have to remember that at that time were living in the depression and many young people school.

"The girls lived in the dorm and worked for part or most of their school tuition. They cooked and cleaned, too.

"Other expenses they incurred at school were covered if they could bring produce from home. It was definitely a different era," Gililland recalled.

While teaching at Hereford High School, she met her future husband Jack, who was than a practicing veterinarian.

"My roommate and I rented a duplex from his mother so it was more or less inevitable that we meet. Besides the young men in town always checked out the new school teachers," she laughed.

"After we married, I quit teaching and didn't have a paid job again until I became museum director," she

The years between 1943 and 1975

were spent helping her husband at his clinic, doing volunteer work and raising her family.

The couple have two children, a daughter, Mary Beth Johnson, who lives in Waterford, Wis., and a son, B.J., who is a partner with Gililland-Nieman Associates, Inc., in Hereford.

"I made the usual rounds of PTA meetings, served as roommother for both children, attended Camp Fire

functions and watched ball games," Gililland said.

She was also actively involved in the First Baptist Church where she taught Sunday School and was a volunteer with the American Cancer Society, and the Red Cross and helped with numerous fund drives.

Chain store to test seat belts for carts

DALLAS (AP) - Just as Texas motorists are getting accustomed to a new mandatory seatbelt law, the Kroger supermarket chain is trying out seatbelts in shopping carts for

The grocery chain said three of its Dallas stores are putting seatbelts in 50 carts at each store.

Kroger spokesman Peter Larkin said the company would test the belts for several months before deciding whether to put some seatbelts in each of its 68 area stores.

He said the cost of doing that would be about \$10,000.

"First we want to test the belts to measure customer reaction, see how they hold up and test the design of the belts," he said.

Larkin said there wasn't any particular incident that caused the company to try out the kiddle safety belts, but children do "get rambunctious and do fall over in the cart or fall out occasionally.

"This should help keep those minor accidents from happening," he said.

Lockdown prevents prison violence

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) - About 10,500 inmates remain confined to their cells today but 10,500 other prisoners remain confined in their cells at 13 units, said Charles Brown, spokesman for the Texas Department of Corrections.

About 4,500 low-risk convicts were unlocked Wednesday, Brown

Prison Director O. Lane McCotter ordered 17,000 inmates locked in their cells Monday after four prisoners were stabbed to death within a 24-hour period.

Brown said there have been no incidents of violence since the lockdown began, but guards have confiscated about 100 weapons, mostly knives made by inmates.

Prison officials say the entire system, which includes some 38,000 inmates housed at 27 separate units, is very tense.

Most of the recent violence has been attributed to a recruiting war between two Hispanic gangs known as the Texas Syndicate and the Texas Mafia.

Officials estimated about 800 inmates belong to gangs, but say the number is very conservative.

'Freedom Fighter' award presented

ADDISON, Texas (AP) - The World Anti-Communist League has presented its "Freedom Fighter of the Year" award to two men who led guerrilla attacks this summer in Afghanistan and Nicaragua.

At a banquet Thursday night that wrapped up the organization's four-day, 18th international conference, retired Army Maj. Gen. John K. Singlaub lauded the efforts of Wali Khan in Afghanistan and Hubert Rodriguez — also known as "Sierra Tres" — in Nicaragua.

Singlaub, chairman of the league, said Khan organized and trained guerrillas who went in and cut power lines that blacked out Kabul, the capital of Afghanistan, in July. Rodriguez launched an attack last July 19 that knocked out a

50-caliber machine gun that had stopped his unit, Singlaub said. He was wounded, and doctors had to amputate one of his legs after A special citation was given to Ellen Garwood of Austin, Texas,

who purchased a helicopter for use by guerrillas in Central America. The conference drew 470 delegates, observers and newsmen from 74 countries and territories throughout the world.

Thursday night's banquet was billed as an "International Freedom Fighters Dinner," with leaders of guerrilla efforts around the globe seated at the head table.

A letter from President Reagan, which urged those favoring democracy to "persevere and never falter," was read at the start of the dinner. Singlaub read the letter in its entirety, saving the name of the sender for last, and delegates stood and cheered when they learned it was from the president.

Athlete was in student vigilante group

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - A Paschal High School football player entering his senior season says he is concerned about more than just playing games, completing term papers and attending the homecoming dance.

David Dorris, 17, faces a possible prison sentence for his alleged involvement in the Legion of Doom, a student vigilante group, authorities said. The group's alleged activities include threatening another student with a gun, bombing cars and other proppoerty and killing a cat.

The starting defensive tackle, in a recent interview, declined to talk about Legion activities or the upcoming trial. But he said he is anxious to put the past behind him.

"If you want to live a normal life, you have to do that," said Dorris. "And that's what I intend to do. I just want to play football, go to school and get ready for college.'

Legion members, many of whom were honor students, athletes and sons of prominent members of the community, allegedly resorted to violence in a misguided attempt to rid Paschal of crime and drugs, police said.

Dorris, the only defendant still attending Paschal, faces trial Oct. 28. He's charged with arson, possesion of a prohibited weapon, a felony count of criminal mischief, misdemeanor criminal mischief and cruelty to animals.

Nuclear war aftermath study released

WASHINGTON (AP) - The aftermath of nuclear war would look a lot more like today's famine-blasted Ethiopia than a picture of devastated buildings and radiation-scarred humans, says a scientist who believes starvation would be the No. 1 killer in post-World War

The study, released Thursday by a committee of the International Council of Scientific Unions, supports the theory that even a limited nuclear exchange would create great spreading clouds of black smoke that could shield the Earth from the sun and plunge the world into a crop-destroying "nuclear winter."

The report estimates famine could kill as many as 1 billion to 4 billion of the world's 5 billion people after much smaller numbers were wiped out in the explosion and radiation of direct attacks, said Dr. Mark Harwell of Cornell University, one of the study's co-

"The main mechanism by which people would die after a largescale nuclear war would not be blast effect, would not be burns, would not be radiation but rather would be mass starvation," Harwell told a news conference.

"We are left with images of Ethiopia and the Sudan as being more representative of what the world would look like after a nuclear war for most of the people than the sorts of images we have of Hiroshima and Nagasaki," he said.

The report, produced by scientists from 30 nations including the Soviet Union and United States, says a huge nuclear attack would be

Even selected targeting of urban areas and burning of fuel sources - something the authors assume would happen - would create enough smoke and other chemical effects to lower temperatures and drastically reduce light in many parts of the world, even in nations far from the main combatants, the report suggests. Rain patterns

also could be interrupted, causing severe agricultural problems.

A temperature drop that sounds relatively minor — perhaps 5 degrees to 10 degrees Fahrenheit over several months — could "essentially eliminate agriculture production in the Northern Hemisphere," Harwell said.

And he and others said such a temperature decline was at the op-timistic end of most estimates, some of which say summer could actually be turned into winter in some locations.

In general, the findings support the conclusions of other groups, including the National Academy of Sciences, which have used atmospheric models to back up nuclear winter theories.

Christians, Jews take opposing sides

WASHINGTON (AP) - Christian and Jewish groups are taking opposing sides in a case now before the U.S. Supreme Court over whether student religious groups can meet in non-class periods in public schools.

Congress recently passed an equalaccess law saying student religious groups had the same right to meet in public schools as other special groups and clubs, but a case from

category were Iraq, Israel, Oman, Libya and Saudi Arabia. At the other extreme, Finland, Switzerland, Austria and Japan spent less than 2 percent.

Proceeds will support students in the Hereford Olympic karate com-petition. The students are hoping to compete in the national olympics to be held in Korea.



to lessen the hardships of the people of his parish by bringing in new Inspired by the ideals of the French Revolution-liberty, fraternity

and equality- he joined a secret society formed to work for Mexican independence from Spain. Hidalgo's group was forced by the Spanish into an uprising. Hundreds of thousands of oppressed Mexicans followed Hidalgo's leader-

nce Hidalgo was more a reformer than a soldier, he was

defeated by the better trained Spanish forces and executed. Although Mexico did not gain its freedom until 1821, the date of Hidalgo's revolt, Sept. 16, 1810, is still celebrated as Mexican In-

Hidalgo's fight for freedom was carried on by another humble priest Jose Maria Morelos, who had been one of Hidalgo's

Morelos went on fighting and captured most of the important towns south of Mexico City.

In the Mexican congress, formed to declare independence in 1913, Morelos, as head of the government, called for such reforms as racial equality, distribution of wealth, and the dividing of the large estates for the good of all.

Morelos was captured and shot by the royalists in 1815.

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
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

I am a professional woman in my mid-40s and have been married over 20 years. My daughter is a freshman in high school and the boys are just discovering her. She is not allowed to go with boys in their cars. I drive them in mine or they come to the house to visit.

One particular boy is a senior in high school, over 6 feet tall, very tan, blue eyes and blonde hair. His mother is remarried and he lives in a trailer with his father who works the third shift. At various times when he has come to the house he seemed very troubled and needed someone to talk to.

As we chatted I often patted his arm or shoulder as a consoling gesture. He is a shy person but responded in a positive way. Soon he was putting an arm around me and hugging hello and goodbye.

Last week he stopped over when my daughter was at a slumber party. We had a soft drink, he was telling me about summer school, how he had fixed his car, described a video he had seen - all kid stuff - light conversation. When we reached the door he said, "I'm going to do something that I've been wanting to do for a long time, but I don't want you to get mad." With that he kissed me full on the lips! I was shocked and just stood there. I made no effort to stop him. I have to admit I enjoyed it a great deal, but I made light of the incident and said, "No more sugar tonight shoo, shoo, be on your way."

But the truth is I have been unable to think of anything but having that kid's arms around me and kissing me. I realize this sounds absolutely crazy. I don't know what has come

I have avoided him when he comes to see my daughter because I don't know how to deal with my feelings. I don't blame the young man. I feel as if I have lost control and don't know what to do. There is no way I can talk about this with anyone. I'd sound like a mental case. What can I do? I am absolutely obsessed with this kid. He is in my thoughts constantly. I can't believe this is happening. Have you ever herad of anything so bizarre?

Here I am, a woman who has never cheated on my husband, and I've gone bonkers over an 18-year-old. Please be there for me as you have been there for so many others.-OFF THE WALL IN WASHINGTON

DEAR WASHINGTON: First, stop thinking of your situation as unique. I have received similar letters from women who found themselves in the same spot.


Certainly this is nothing that can be discussed with a relative or friend. You need a professional to unload on - someone who can listen and explain the extent of damage that would result if you should give in



The Buffaloes of West Texas State University will attempt to rebound from a 25-18 loss to Abilene Christian last week when they play their 1985 home opener against Angelo State

Game time if 7:30 p.m. at Kimbrough Memorial Stadium. Angelo State is coming off a 35-23 win over UT-Arlington.

Angelo State has won only one game ever played against West Texas State, a 10-3 decision at Kimbrough Memorial Stadium in 1983. The 1985 showdown will begin a yearly rivalry since both schools will compete in the Lone Star Conference

About the loss to Abilene Christian. WTSU Coach Bill Kelly said, "One of the key factors was our inability to put the ball in the end zone when we had good field position.

"Also, we didn't stop Abilene on that last drive (in which the Wildcats regained the lead for good with 40 seconds left). Other than that last drive, we held them to 20 yards and two first downs in the second half.

"I think Abilene is a decent football team. I think we could be decent, too, after looking at the films. We

base a season on one game.

"You can't base turning around a program on one game. People have told me this is the best West Texas State football team they've seen in a long time."

About Angelo State, Kelly said, 'Angelo State could be as good as any team we will play. They're a typical ASU team-tough and hard nosed. They have big linemen, big linebackers, good wide-outs, good quarterbacks.

"There's no reason for us to be anything but positive. The key is the kids' attitude.'

WTSU had no players injured in last week's game. The Buffs had 252 yards passing compared to 215 for Abilene Christian. Abilene Christian outgained WTSU in rushing yardage, 101 yards to 60 yards.

Tickets for Saturday's contest against Angelo State are avilable at the WTSU athletic ticket office, at 23rd Street and 2nd Avenue in Canyon. The ticket office is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on weekdays, and will be open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. this Saturday. Stadium ticket windows will open at 6 p.m. Saturday.

WTSU is 14-11 in home openers at Kimbrough Memorial Stadium, and needed the win badly, but you can't is 73-54-3 overall at the stadium.





Now You're Cookin'

If you're looking for an experienced cook, look to Ramona Torres - the oldest cook at San Jose Catholic Church - and her authentic Mexican recipes she's using this week for the Fiesta Patrias.

Being taught by her mother, Torres says when it comes to cooking she likes everything - and she's good at it too!

Torres also cooks for weddings.

When cooking for weddings, Torres cooks according to what the family prefers, usually a meat, two vegetables, and a salad.

Torres suggests brisket, chicken mole, or carne asada as the meat to serve at a wedding.

A choice of mashed potatoes, potato salad, lettuce salad, and beans and rice are served to complimment the celebratory dinner.

Torres, experienced in cooking large-quantities, charges \$25 for each course.

Torres also enjoys cooking tamales and is well-known for her menudo, too.

Because Torres is the oldest cook at San Jose Catholic Church she is in charge of the kitchen when preparing the church fund-raising meals that are served every Sunday.

First, the menudo is prepared.

Since the menudo (minute pieces of stomach lining) is cut and cleaned the day before, Torres instructs the women to add spices such as garlic, cummins, and chili powder to the

Pigs feet are boiled the day before to add with hominy to complete the

At San Jose Catholic Church there are three different groups of women who volunteer their time and effort every week to open the San Jose Kit-

"Most of the ladies who prepare the food each week are members of the Guadalupana Organization," said Gervacia Gaiten, vice president of the Guadalupanas. "The G.O. is an organization that raises funds for the church through 'Our Lady of Guadalupa'."

The menu at the San Jose kitchen consists of Menudo which is \$2.50 for a rather large bowl, and mexican plates featuring carne guisada, rice, beans, and salad and costs \$2.75 a plate. Children's plates and take out plates are also offered.

CARNE GUISADA

Carne guisada is steak cut into pieces with gravy. According to Torres, the same

spices as in menudo are added along with bell pepper and tomato season-

RAMONA'S RICE

41 pounds of rice are prepared each week at the San Jose Kitchen.

Ramona Torres's rice is always thoroughly browned before cooking. To brown the rice she uses a little bit of lard in the skillet.

Three garlic cloves are added, along with a 1/2 cup of chopped bell peppers, a large can of peeled tomatoes and "enough water" says Torres. "One thing not too do when making rice," said Consuelo Castaneda, president of the Guadalupana Society, "is not to ever stir the rice when it's boiling.'

"The rice is turned off just before it is done and leave it covered to finish cooking by itself," said Torres.

CHICKEN MOLE

Cooking chicken mole for a wedding, Torres boils 24 chickens (cut into chunks) just to softening point. Add two cans of mole bueno (chili powder and other Mexican spices),

garlic, and cummins. Torres then browns some flour to thicken into gravy. The same amount of water is used for both the chicken and the gravy.

On Sundays, the women are at the church by seven a.m. to get the meal rolling. The food is prepared and the serving line starts getting longer.

The San Jose Kitchen serves it's purpose in raising funds for the

The money raised will presently fund a new sunday school building at the San Jose mission.

In keeping the Fiestas Patrias theme, the public is welcome to try the authentic cooking as the San Jose Kitchen is open as early as seven a.m. every Sunday.

VA changing income reporting procedures

Approximately 1.5 million period beginning October 1985. Veterans Administration pensioners and recipients of parent's Dependency and Indemnity Compensation will receive notices with their September checks informing them of changes in VA's income reporting procedures.

VA Administrator Harry N. Walters said the notice explains the new Eligibility Verification Report which replaces the old Annual Income Questionnaire.

Walters pointed out the new system does not relieve pension recipients of their responsibility for reporting income changes when they occur.

In implementing recommendations made by a task force last year. VA will not cycle income reports throughout the year and will decentralize processing to regional offices throughout the country. The agency will also replace punch cards with full page forms since more than income information is requested.

The first eligiblity verification reports will be mailed on Oct. 1, 1985, to those receiving protected pension and Dependency and Indemnity Compensation benefits and to Improved Pension recipients who have a foreign mailing address.

Beginning Dec. 1, 1985, and running through Sept. 1, 1986, the income report forms will be mailed to the remaining pensioneres nationwide at a rate of approximately 70,000 each

Waco VA Regional Office Director Stephen Lemons indicated that approximately 109,000 will be released in Texas during the twelve-month

Completion of the questionnaire is required by law and failure to return it by the date shown on the form may result in interruption of benefits.

Help in completing the new forms is available from the VA Regional Office in Waco or from any of the major veterans' service organizations. Assistance is also available by calling the VA toll-free number listed in local telephone directories or by calling 1-800-792-3271.

ESTIMATED TAX PAYMENT DUE


The third installment of 1985 estimated federal income tax payments by individuals, except farmers and fishermen, should be made by September 15, 1985, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

Generally, taxpayers who have estimated tax of \$500 or more, must complete Form 1040-ES, "Estimated Tax for Individuals," and make estimated tax payments. Single social security and

tier 1 railroad retirement recipients whose total income for 1985 is expected to be more than \$25,000 (including tax-exempt interest and onehalf of their social security and tier 1 railroad benefits) may have to pay tax on part of their benefits. Similarly, married recipients who expect to file a joint return, and who expect their joint income, including tax-exempt interest and one-half of their social security and tier 1 railroad retirement benefits, to exceed \$32,000 may also have to pay tax on part of their benefits. Therefore, these taxpayer may need to pay estimated tax.

The IRS has a free Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax," which provides information about paying estimated tax.


