Complaints In Cattle Thefts Are Filed Here

Complaint of cattle theft has been filed here by Sheriff J. O. Newell against W. R. and Mike Bussell, 39 and 24 years old, respectively of near Friona, as the result of several weeks investigation by officers here, at Clovis and at Tucumcari. The complaint filed here specifically alleges theft of cattle from Mrs. C. M. Brown of Friona. State police officers, Roy Vermillion and Bill Speight, of New Mexico, have charged W. R. Bussell with theft of cattle in Curry county. Mike Bussell is jailed at Lubbock in connection with the cases. Officers believe that numerous cattle thefts have been solved by the arrests. Fifteen head of 200 alleged stolen, have been recovered. Many of the animals were sold through sales rings, officers said. Traces of the missing cattle were picked up in Oklahoma, Kansas, California, Iowa, and Texas. Cattle thefts apparently began last September. Plans to arraign W. R. Bussell on three charges at 2 o'clock this afternoon in Clovis were announced yesterday, unless some unforeseen development occurred. The New Mexico State Police offered special appreciation to Sheriff Newell, Sheriff Earl Booth of Parmer county, Sheriff Claude Moncus and Deputy Herbert Beasley of Quay county and Texas Rangers Pat Talliaferro and Zeno Smith at Lubbock.

\$240 Is Quota Of Local Red Cross Chapter

The Deaf Smith county chapter of American Red Cross has received a call for \$240 as its quota of \$10,000,000 which the Red Cross is asking for European War relief. E. C. Eubanks, treasurer, and John Olson, president of the local chapter, have announced. Invasion of the lowland countries of Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg by Germany has created a tremendous amount of suffering and privation which must be relieved. National Chairman Norman A. Davis stated in making the call. First State Bank, First National Bank, and the Hereford Brand are authorized to receive contributions, or they may be made direct to Mr. Olson or Mr. Eubanks. William M. Baxter, Jr., of St. Louis, Red Cross mid-western manager, said \$200,000 had already been cabled to Belgium and the Netherlands and that orders for 150 ambulances, 100 auxiliary hospital trucks, and medical supplies had been placed.

While refusing to make a forecast of the wheat crop this year, due to lack of representation from some key counties, grain men were told that conditions are "below normal" and there won't be much of a wheat crop in the Panhandle unless soaking rains are received soon. However, some wheat in the area is reported already dead. Farms where dry land wheat is still holding out in Deaf Smith county are comparatively few, except in the area which received rain week before last.

CHDA NOTES By Sadie Lee Oliver

Poultry diseases and parasites will be studied in a special meeting open to the public to be held at 2:30 p. m. on Saturday, May 18 at the West Texas Feed and Seed Store.

Come and bring your sick birds to be posted by the men in charge.

It is estimated that each 75 families secured an average of two hundred everbearing strawberry plants at the N. B. Ellisston home in Wyche. 15,000 plants if well cared for should supply many a serving of strawberries and cream, and shortcake. From such a first small planting in the spring of 1938 Mrs. Ellisston reported picking a gallon of berries every day for more than two months. After each picking the berries were well watered in a furrow between the ridges on which the plants had been set in the spring.

It is possible to can strawberry juice which retains the flavor, color and aroma of the fresh fruit.

"For one of the meetings during the Short Course we are anxious to be able to have some bearing strawberry plants to use as illustrative material. Do you suppose one of your demonstrators could get some of the everbearing ones transplanted now to some kind of container that you could bring to College with you in your car so that we could have a strawberry plant that would show blossoms, green fruit and ripe fruit on it?" writes Miss Jennie Camp, Extension Specialist in Home Production Planning. Plants from the Ellisston garden will be used.

Speaking of bugs—Cameron Siddall, "Bug Doctor" says, to lay out harlequin bugs, squash bugs, cucumber beetles and tomato fruit worms, use rotenone as a dust or spray. The rotenone should be in combination with sulphur and the

the mixture should contain at least 3-4 of 1 per cent of rotenone. Commercial rotenone mixtures are available in seed stores or drug stores and may be used as a dust or spray.

Where vine crops, such as cucumbers, squash, cantaloupes or watermelons are to be sprayed or dusted with rotenone, sulphur as the "carrier" should not be used (those plants are not tolerant to sulphur) but a mixture of rotenone and talc or fuller's earth should be used. This combination is available as a ready mixed "Bugicide."

So writes J. F. Rosborough in the May copy of his letter, "Vegeterials" and this up-to-now information was requested that same week by Mrs. Alex Thompson. The red soft bodied crawling nymphs of the squash bug had been doing serious damage to trees and flowers at her home on Eleventh street.

**Farmers Should Take Steps Now
To Check Next Year's Dust Storms**

Amarillo.—"Steps to check dust storms next year can and should be taken now," declares E. R. Henson, land use coordinator of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in the Southern Great Plains. "Prolonged drouth and resultant crop failures last year left thousands of acres in condition to blow this spring. Emergency tillage is about the only weapon farmers have to check soil blowing on these barren acres at this time of the year. Vegetation is necessary to check erosion and framers now can take steps to produce crops that will help to prevent dust storms next winter and spring," the coordinator points out.

Contour tillage operations, strengthened by terraces where necessary, will catch and hold moisture from spring rains evenly over the field, it is explained. This even distribution of moisture tends to insure an even crop stand and better yields.

Experimental data in the wind erosion area show that crop yields may be increased as much as one-third by the use of soil and water conservation practices.

With maximum assurance of producing crops through conservation of all available rainfall this year, farmers will have crop stubble and residues to furnish protection against soil blowing next year, Henson says. During the severe blowing periods this spring, farmers have observed that where a crop was produced last year and sufficient protective stubble left on the field, there has been little soil lost. On the other hand, fields that produced no crop or that were left without a protective stubble have been subject to severe losses in many instances.

"It must be remembered that emergency tillage operations are costly and that their effectiveness in checking wind erosion is only temporary," the coordinator declares. "Agriculture cannot be placed on a long-time, safe and sound basis in the Southern Great Plains until the necessity for emergency operations to control wind erosion each year has been eliminated."

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup butter or oleomargarine
- 3 cups cake flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1/2 cup hot water
- 1 level teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 teaspoon red cake coloring
- 1/2 cake unsweetened chocolate or 2-3 cup cocoa moistened with boiling water to consistency of melted chocolate.
- 4 whole eggs (well beaten).

First assemble all materials, sift flour before measuring, cream sugar and butter and add melted chocolate (or cocoa). Add coloring and flavoring and beat well. Add flour, (which has been sifted 3 times after measuring) alternately with milk, a small amount at a time beginning and ending with flour. Add soda which has been dissolved in the half cup of water and last, fold in the well beaten eggs. Bake in three greased 8-inch layer pans in moderate oven (375 F.) about 30 minutes or until done. Three minutes after removing from the oven remove pans and spread chocolate frosting between layers and on top and sides of cake. Last of all cover the entire cake with Seven Minute Frosting.

CHOCOLATE FROSTING

- 3 cups powdered sugar (sifted)
- 6 tablespoons melted butter
- 3 tablespoons milk, added slowly
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup cocoa

Beat until smooth and creamy. Be sure that measurements are accurate and that you use a good cake flour to insure a moist product.

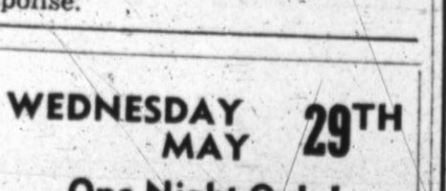

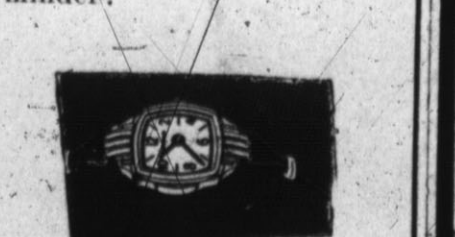
