Every housewife experiences a thrill of genuine pleasure in baking a festive cake for a spectal occasion or in creating the simplest product which she knows will be greeted with appreciation. The following recipe for Perfect Devil's Food Cake is delicious and is built upon safe proportions, level measurements and proper mixing and baking. It's simple enough that you'll want to make it often and festive enough for any special oc-casion. It's Mrs. Cooper Morgan's pet recipe and when it comes to cake-making she is an expert. Here's what she says about the cake; "After baking for years, always reaching out for better and newer recipes. always searching for a perfect



devil's food cake that would please the most exacting taste, I reverted back to the first recipe used in my mother's family. Every time I'd make it I would change it a little, add something to it or take some ingredient away from it until at long last I call it

PERFECT DEVIL'S FOOD CAKE 2 cups sugar 1 cup butter or oleomargerine 3 cups cake flour

½ teaspoon salt 1 cup buttermilk 2 cup hot water level teaspoon soda teaspoon vanilla l teaspoon red cake coloring

ened with boiling water to consistency of melted chocolate. 4 whole eggs (well beaten.)

First assemble all materials, sift flour before measuring, cream sugar and butter and add melted chocolate (or cocoa). Add Hereford Friday. coloring and flavoring and beat well. Add flour, (which has been M. L. Carter wa sifted 3 times after measuring) alternately with milk, a small amount at a time beginning and ending with flour. Add soda which has been dissolved in the half cup of water and last, fold in the well beaten eggs. Bake in three greased 8-inch layer pans in moderate oven (375 F.) about 30 minutes or until done. Three minutes after removing from the oven remove pans and spread chocolate frosting between layers and on top and sides of cake.

Last of all cover the entire cake with Seven Minute Frosting.

CHOCOLATE FROSTING

3 cups powdered sugar (sifted)
6 tablespoons melted butter
3 tablespoons milk, added slowly ½ teaspoon vanilla ½ cup cocoa Beat until smooth and creamy.

Be sure that measurements are accurate and that you use a good cake flour to insure a moist product.
