White Blasts Clements' Call for Special Session

'Example of Incompetence'

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -For any Texan who doesn't think Gov. Bill Clements' call for a Sept. 7 special legislative session will provide fuel for autumn political campaigns, there's this from Attorney General Mark White, Democratic candidate

'This is a crystal-clear example of Clements' incompetence and inability to manage the affairs of the state of Texas."

Clements on Thursday called the Legislature back for the third special session in 14 months. This time the problem is the state's unemployment fund, which, as a result of increasing joblessness, is being drained.

The governor wants legislators to approve a

federal government loan to pump up the fund. He also wants lawmakers to change the state formula that could spark a massive Oct. 1 increase in employers' tax

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, Speaker Bill Clayton and Comptroller Bob Bullock met with Clements at the mansion on Thursday and came out nodding agreement with Clements' plans.

But it took only a few hours for White's campaign head-

quarters to crank out a release blasting Clements for not reacting sooner to the problem.

The Texas Employment Commission and Rep. Lloyd Criss, D-La Marque, say they had warned Clements of the problem. But Clements said there was no such warning.

White said Clements' handling of the matter "is highly reminiscent of the way he reacted to the Campeche Bay oil spill" in 1979.

"In both instances, Clements said the experts were 'Chicken Littles' going around saying that the sky is falling," said White. "Once again, Bill Clements has waited for the oil to roll up on the beach."

Hobby said there is a "very real possibility" the fund would be broke in November or December. He called the situation a "very real cash flow problem."

Criss said Thursday he was pleased that Clements had called the session, "but I am still not certain that the governor completely understands this complicated program."

Clements told reporters that neither Criss or the TEC had warned him about the problem.

"Those people have far, far better memories than I do," said Clements. "We can't find any record of the so-called 'I advised you' kind of 20-20 hindsight."

Criss said, "I can see where

Doctor Relates Details Of Nun's Strangulation

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) -As jurors and spectators fidgeted uncomfortably, a pathologist recounted in graphic detail his autopsy findings in the rape, stabbing and strangulation of a 76-year-old nun.

Johnny Frank Garrett, 18, is charged with murder in the Oct. 31 death of Sister Tadea Benz, a near-invalid who had lived at Amarillo's St. Francis convent for more than 20 years.

Dr. Ralph Erdmann of Childress, who serves as Amarillo's medical examiner on a contract basis, used large color photographs of the nun's body Thursday to explain his findings to the

Many of the courtroom spectators were nuns from the convent who frequently gasped audibly during Erdmann's recitation.

cibly raped and "passed out

before she died," Erdmann told the court.

He said there were bruises on the woman's head and face caused by a blunt object, probably a fist. A cut on her throat and bruises on her neck could have been caused by a sharp object pressed against her neck, Erdmann

The administration quickly issued a temporary order Thursday forbidding the export of all U.S. goods and services to the French companies after three compressors for the controversial Siberian natural gas pipeline were loaded on a freighter bound for the Soviet Union.

Reagan imposed the em-Bishop Calls For Anniversary Calm

WARSAW, Poland (AP) -Archbishop Jozef Glemp, speaking before 300,000 Poles honoring the nation's holiest icon, appealed today for calm in the streets next Tuesday on the second anniversary of Solidarity - a day the suspended union has called for nationwide protests.

The martial law regime accused Solidarity supporters of planning a bloody uprising on the anniversary, and warned it would use force to put down any unrest.

"Anger is a bad adviser. The streets should not be territory for dialogue," said Glemp, Poland's Roman Catholic primate, in a speech from the balustrade of the Jasna Gora monastery in the southern shrine city of Czestochowa.

In one of his strongest sermons since the imposition of martial law last Dec. 13, Glemp repeated church calls for revival of Solidarity and an easing of the martial rule under which the union was suspended. "Release Lech Walesa, or

make it possible to speak as a free man," Glemp said, adding that freeing the interned union leader would have a calming effect on Poland. "Begin preparations for an amnesty and release of interned unionists."

The crowd, thought to be the largest gathering in Poland under martial law. was assembled at the Czestochowa monastery to honor the 600th anniversary of the date in 1382 that Paulite monks brought to Poland the icon known as the Black Madonna.

Pope John Paul II, whose planned visit to attend the celebrations has been delayed by the government until at least next year, marked the religious festival at his

Elderly Victim of Burglar Has 'Given Up on Life'

HOUSTON (AP) - An 89-year-old woman attacked by a teen-ager now sentenced to 99 years in prison is slowly recuperating in a nursing home after the beating, the second such occurrence in three years, a prosecutor

"She's given up on life," assistant district attorney Don Smyth said Thursday after Darren Dean Keimig, 17, was sentenced on a burglary charge in the June 18 crime.

Mary C. Gober suffered a broken jaw, a crushed cheekbone, a fractured pelvis and a broken hand, police said. Authorities said another burglar assaulted Mrs. Gober in August 1979.

Keimig said he "wanted to kill somebody" because he had been attacked by a gang.

"I had a black eye," he said. "I don't know why I did it. I never done nothing like that before, but I can't take it back now."

Jurors on Thursday convicted Dickenson in the shotgun killings of his daughter, Mary Ann, 7, and his 62-year-old sister, Annabelle Starke, on Aug. 23, 1980.

Dickenson was confined to the Rusk State Hospital four days later and remained there until state officials decided he was able to assist in his own defense. His trial began Wednesday and ended late Thursday after three hours of jury deliberations.

According to testimony, Dickenson fired at police officers who went to his house the afternoon of the shootings. After firing 13 tear gas canisters into the residence, police entered to find the victims dead and Dickenson hiding in the bathtub.

Dickenson was an Army combat infantryman and won a Silver Star during the 36th Division's Italian campaign in World War II.

mother might be scrapped. The 19-year-old hotel desk clerk is among scores of Alaskans, both newcomers and "sourdoughs," wondering about the fate of various benefits and regulations following a U.S. Supreme Court decision June 14.

The court tossed out a state plan to distribute part of its oil wealth to citizens based on how long they had lived in Alaska. The court said the plan discriminated against newcomers.

Dozens of other programs and rules, governing everything from licensing of morticians to who gets lowinterest student loans, also have residency requirements, ranging from a year to 30 years, and could be vulnerable to the precedent-

setting decision. "Which will survive legal challenge?" Attorney General Wilson Condon asks. "I don't hold out much hope for those programs and regulations that clearly reward people for length of residence."

Many Alaskans do view themselves as special if they have lived in the state for a long time, Condon says. Maybe it has something to do "with the years of natural resource exploitation from outside, by people who came for only the resources and left

with the money," he adds. "It's definitely a status thing to have lived here a long time," says Elaine Wurster, an Anchorage stockbroker who moved to the state four years ago from Worcester, Mass. "At cocktail parties, the first question you're asked is 'How long have you been here?' Anywhere else, you're asked what you do for a liv-

'The idea doesn't seem that outrageous," given the inflation and difficult living conditions Alaskans have endured over the years, he says. "Obviously, if you open these programs to everyone, you would dilute them, and make them unaffordable."

Many of these programs are jeopardized by the high court's decision. That decision said Anchorage attorneys Ron and Patricia Zobel were correct in arguing that it would be discriminatory to distribute oil money from the state's permanent fund in amounts of \$50 for each year recipients had lived in Alaska since

fairs Commission. Condon's staff is busy recording the legal ripples. and has prepared a list of programs and regulations it believes are vulnerable to constitutional challenge.

The major programs threatened by the high court decision include:

-The two-year residency requirement for those seeking student loans of 5 percent. That program is being challenged by Judith Andress, a third-year law student who has lived in the state 14 months and wants a loan in time for enrollment this fall at the University of California-Davis. The loans can be as high as \$6,000 a year for undergraduates and \$7,000 for graduate students.

-The longevity bonus program. Rodney Vest, 67, has filed suit against the bonus program, which gives Alaskans 65 or older \$250 a month if they have lived in Alaska 25 years and since statehood. Vest recently agreed to shelve the suit in exchange for an agreement from lawmakers that they make an effort to discuss the issue during the next legislative session.

-The Pioneers' Home program. With six homes around the state, it provides virtually free residential care, regardless of need, to senior citizens who have lived 15

consecutive years in the state or 30 years cumulatively.

The list of programs with constitutional problems includes the homesite entry program, which offers land virtually cost-free to applicants who have lived in the state at least three years. The program gives priority to applicants who have lived in the state the longest, Condon says



"You might as well outlaw baseball. You can't spit on the ground. You can't spit on your glove. People in the stands won't even be able to spit. I know some managers who would choke to death if they couldn't spit out that tobacco juice."

Eighty-nine years old last week, a Hall of Famer, winner of 270 big league games, former coach, scout and manager, Grimes was the last of baseball's legal spitballers, so he has more than a casual interest in the latest furor involving one of his ilk.

Although long suspected of applying wet or greasy substances to the ball and making it do funny tricks at the plate, the 43-year-old Gaylord Perry of the Seattle Mariners got nailed for the first time for the offense last Monday night in a game against the Boston Red Sox.

Plate Umpire Dave Phillips, who had warned the veteran right-hander earlier, gave Perry the thumb. American League President Lee MacPhail added insult to injury by fining Perry \$250 and suspending him for 10

outraged Perry

threatened "so many appeals MacPhail will have to hire 10 assistants."

He has an equally outraged supporter in his corner.

"I think they just wanted to lean on him because of all the years he's supposed to have been throwing it," said Grimes. "They were trying to make up for what they hadn't been able to do in the past.

"There's no way to prove it. It's no more of an illegal pitch than the knuckleball, the screwball or forkball, no more dangerous. This "unsanitary" thing they bring up, as I said, is pretty stupid.

"I've always contended that the spitball was the same as any other pitch - even the fast ball and the breaking ball and like all these other pitches ought to have a name and be allowed."

Grimes was one of the game's all-time greats whose career spanned two decades with the Pirates, Dodgers, Giants, Cubs, Cardinals and finally the Yankees. A rugged son of a Wisconsin lumberman, he often refused to shave, earning the nickname, "Old Stubblebeard."

It was a ploy to intimidate pitchers. But nothing intimidated them more than Burleigh's wicked spitball.

When the pitch was outlawed in 1920, Grimes was one of some 20 pitchers utilizing the tricky delivery. Baseball permitted them to continue, thus applying the rule only to newcomers. Burleigh was the only known spitballer still throwing when he retired after the 1934 season.

The only two men to win more than 40 games a season

Jack Chesbro of the Yankees and Ed Walsh of the White Sox - were spitball specialists. The Yankees' Whitey Ford was frequently accused of dampening the ball a bit but was never caught and convicted.

Jim Bunning, who pitched for the Tigers, Phils and Pirates in the 1960s, was thrown out of a game when the umpire said he rubbed up the ball with his belt buckle. Rick Honeycutt of the Texas Rangers nabbed for allegedly using a thumb tack to scuff a ball when he was with the Seattle Mariners.

The charge has been hurled at a number of recent and still active pitchers, including Don Drysdale, Don Sutton and Tommy John. Some foes say Oakland Manager Billy Martin encourages the art with all his pitchers.

Joe Cronin, Hall of Fame player, and former manager and league president, has tried unsuccessfully for years to have the spitball relegalized, realizing the futility of trying to prevent it. You can't give a baseball a saliva

Umpire Phillips' action was impetuous and a grandstand stunt. For MacPhail to uphold him and invoke penalties was a ludicrous reflection on the integrity of the game.

"It was always just a special pitch," said Grimes, who wet his fingers with saliva and sweat. "You have fastball pitchers and breaking ball pitchers. I was a spitball pitcher and never broke a law."



Henderson Ties Brock's Record

MILWAUKEE (AP) -Rickey Henderson's 118th stolen base of the season was unique - and not just because it tied the Oakland A's outfielder with Lou Brock for the major league singleseason base-stealing record.

For the first time all season, Henderson stole a base after he had been picked off first base.

Puzzled by what he said was a different motion and delivery by Milwaukee pitcher Mike Caldwell, Henderson was trapped about 10 feet off first by the left-hander's snap throw in the first inning of the Brewers' 10-3 victory Thursday night.

But instead of retreating to first, into what surely would have been a tag by first baseman Cecil Cooper, Henderson broke for second. He made it safely, sliding head-first under the tag of shortstop Robin Yount, who took the throw from Cooper.

"I was surprised I got picked off and surprised I got to second base," said Henderson, adding his other reaction was "joy at being in the same category with Lou Brock."

Henderson, 23, stole his 118th base in his 126th game of the season. He has been caught stealing a major league record 39 times, but his success ratio is 75 per-

Brock, the long-time St. Louis Cardinals' star who was here to witness Henderson's historic theft, had only 88 stolen bases by his 127th game when he set the record in 1974.

"Too many countdowns, too many countdowns," a weary Henderson muttered as he faced reporters after the game. He obviously wished he could have broken the record the same night he tied

Henderson, who singled to center leading off the game, said Caldwell used a different motion and delivery than he had shown in previous games.

HEALTH

Lawrence E. Lamb, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - Dur-

ing a routine checkup three months ago, slides from my stools showed blood. I have always been in good health and didn't have any symptoms. I have had this test for blood in the stools before plood in the stools before and it was always negative.

My doctor took X-rays and they found a tumor in my colon. It was removed and I was only in the hospital a week. There was no cancer in any of the lymph nodes or liver. The rest of my colon was completely free of cancer. The doctor said he got it all.
Now I have been wonder-

ing if I also need chemotherapy. What do you think? The surgeon says he rarely recommends chemotherapy after successful surgery.

DEAR READER — I will

not try to second guess your doctor but if you are con-cerned about it, ask for a consultation with a cancer center near your home. You are near New York City and there are two national cancer centers there.

Your story should be of interest to other readers, as it shows that cancer of the colon can and does occur without any symptoms. It is the second most common cause of cancer deaths in both men and women. The use of slides for detection of blood is one of the best methods to find cases early. The earlier a case is found the better the outlook after the cancer has been removed.

Whether to use chemotherapy or not depends a lot on the extent of the cancer and the type of cells it contains. Some cells are very malignant and more prone to spread while others are more benign.

Many cancers can be controlled or cured these days if found early enough. Our knowledge of what diet and environment does in cancer is growing. It is probably

best to avoid a high fat diet, and to include plenty of bulk in the diet and get some vitamin C with each meal in the form of fresh fruits and vegetables. DEAR DR. LAMB - My

tist will probably want to clean his teeth. Is it necessary to have your teeth cleaned? I read somewhere that once you have your teeth cleaned professionally you need to do so periodically, and that your teeth lose their hard plaque, become more porous and conse-quently absorb substances

DEAR READER - That is one of the worst examples of medical misinformation that I have received for some time.

The plaque that removed around the roots of the teeth is the substance that causes gum disease that leads to pyorrhea. The rea-son for periodic cleaning is because this substance accumulates on people's teeth and it is something we cannot remove ourselves. Good home dental hygiene helps to limit it or prevent it but professional cleaning is an important part of having healthy teeth and healthy

The loss of teeth most often results from pyorrhea or gum disease, in part caused by inadequate clean-ing. For heaven's sake, let your dentist do what needs to be done for your son.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I just became a hypoglycemia patient. I was never interested in reading about it as it didn't concern me. Now that it has hit me I never see anything about it.

> People who have "reactive" hypoglycemia have low blood glucose levels that occur like a rebound after absorbing too much glucose as in sweets. Starches are glucose molecules bound together. The usual treatment includes avoiding these foods so you won't have a peak glucose level followed by too much insulin and a low glucose level.

in diabetes the lack of insulin prevents glucose from entering your cells to be used for energy. This results in an increase of blood glucose levels and symptoms. Treatment often includes avoiding glucose and starches to avoid a further increase in blood glucose levels. The end result is that the diets, for different reasons, are the same in

many respects. In recent years diabetic specialists have increased the amount of carbohydrate in the diet and decreased fat and cholesterol to avoid
