With the United States congress passing a peace-time compulsory military service bill for the first time in the nation's history, with the grim possibility of a savage economic warfare against America if Germany smashes Britein, with Japan deliberately provoking U.S. Marines in China, the United States of America is facing crises which, however met, will effect every man, woman and child in Hereford and Deaf Smith county as well as the rest of the nation.

Ordinarily, a lot of voters in this county feel that it makes no difference to them who wins in the election. One candidete is ts good as another. They're all alike. Who cares?

But now if ever, is a time when indifference could kill a democracy. Totalitarian states for years have been belittling the "decadent" democracies. One democracy, France, fell because its people were indifferent. They let their nation's gov-rnment decay from within. The fate of Great Britain, another

democracy, remains to be seen. Saturday is a time when every voter in every precinct in this county should go to the polls and vote with extreme deliberation. 



Both lettuce and cabbage kraut were made at a demonstration in kraut making at the club house in the Hereford State Park on the afternoon of July 20 given by Miss Sadie Lee Oliver County Home Demonstration Agent assisted by Mrs. Ozora Clark Matthews, Farm Security Home Supervisor.
For generations people have

enjoyed crisp, tart sauerkraut, More recently saurruben made from turnips and sauer lettuce have come into their own.

The tart flavor makes these foods palatable and appetizing. The lactic acid and fiber content aids digestion and regulates the removal of waste materials from the body. The normal action of the intestines is stimulated and growth of auto-intoxicating bacteria is prevented.

The best temperature for curing is between 75 and 85 degrees F., and this will require from ten days to three weeks. Too low temperature retards fermentation, and too high temperature during the curing periold may cause ropy brine and spoilage of the product.

crispness, a greater degree of translucency, and a characteristic acid flavor. It should be fairly firm in texture, without being tough, and it must never be mushy. The flavor indicative of a properly fermented product is never bitter, sweet or rancid. Brine should show a salometer reading of not more than 20.
