Choose a standard pattern for a jacket that may be adapted for either a boy or a girl, and make your own pattern for the shamrocks.

LESS THAN % yard of 72-inch felt is needed to make the jacket. The inch rulers printed on the pattern piece make sleeve and length And a felt jacket is a breeze to make, since it needs no seam fin-

When appliqueing the shamrocks, use a close satin stitch on your automatic swing-needle ewing machine or your automatie zigzagger attachment. Remember to leave a generous margin when cutting the applique, and apply the shamrocks on the pockets before stitching pockets to jacket. In the case of the elbow patches, applique these before sewing up the seam on the sleeyes.

If you don't want to go all-out on the Irish motif, you can use other decorations for the blazer; transfer patterns in the pattern envelope offer a choice of a fleur-delis, a pine tree or a heart-all decorative applique designs to brighten up a smart and practical jac-

AUSTIN - The fresh water lake with the worst rough fish infestation in Texas will be renovated if Federal authorities approve a proposed joint Federal-state project; It is Lake Walk in the Del Rio area on the Mexican border.

The chief aquatic biologist for the Game and Fish Commission said Lake Walk would be treated with rotenone, a -paralyzing chemical which Texas technicians have found can be applied so that only the undesirable fish species are affected.

Aquatic biologist Elgin Dietz that Lake Walk has the lowest proportionate game fish population in Texas. He referred to it as "su-


cream and cookies? Use a shamrock cookie cutter to shape the ice cream appropriately, then make up a pineapple sauce with mint-flavored green maraschino cherries. Here's the recipe:

SHAMROCK SUNDAES

Ingredients: 1 quart vanilla ice cream, 1 can (1 pound and 4 ounces) crushed pineapple, 1 tablespoon cornstarch, 1/8 teaspoon of salt, 1/3 cup (about 15) chopped mint - flavored green maraschino cherries. 14 cup broken walnut meats (if desired).

Method: Slice ice cream about 11/2 inches thick. Cut ice cream slices with 3-inch shamrock cookie cutter. Place on waxed paper. Now freeze until firm. Drain pineapple and reserve syrup. Stir cornstarch and salt together in a mediumsized saucepan; gradually add the pineapple syrup, stirring until very smooth after each addition. Cook and stir constantly over low heat until thickened and clear. Add well-drained pineapple and chopped cherries; mix well. Chill. Add walnuts to sauce before serving. Serve sauce over ice-cream sham rocks. Makes 8 to 10 servings. RECIPE NOTE

If you haven't a shamrock cookie cutter, you may use the regulation club cookie cutter for a similar effect. Green maraschino cherries, cut into halves, may be used for an extra shamrock garnish on each ice cream shape. For the stem on this decoration cut a very thin slice from one of the cherries. 




