



Household Scrapbook

To make an attractive fire screen form the frame work out of heavy picture molding, into which is placed a sheet of glass for the panel. This will afford protection from the heat and at the same time will give the pleasure of seeing

Whiter Woolens

If the white woolens begin to acquire a vellowish tinge, use three ounces of peroxide to two gallons of water in washing them, and dry them in direct sunlight.

A Disinfectant Use chloride of lime as a disinfectant. It is cheap, clean, and will kill all germs. Faucets

Try using lemon rinks, after squeezing out the juice, for polishing nickel faucets. Rub thoroughly, then wash, and polisn with a dry cloth. The faucets will shine like new.

Warts can be removed by washing in water, in which a quantity of washing soda has been dissolved. Let the hands dry without wiping. Repeat this bathing frequently, or until the warts disappear

If it is found that cocoa is not sufficiently digestible, it can be made so by allowing it to cool, removing the globules of fat, and then reheating it.

Irons will not rust when they are packed away for any length of time if they are rubbed with a little fat that contains no salt. such as mutton fat. Then wrap them in brown paper.

The sewing machine cover has a gay appliqued daisy which ubles as a pin cushion, matching e one that hangs on the wall and the smaller one that fastens on the wrist, for fitting sessions.



Notaries Public Must Re-Qualify

Secretary of State Zollie Steakley has announced that he will reappoint persons now holding notary public commissions but that such persons must re-qualify by the filing of a new oath and bond with County Clerk Ralph Smith of his residence between June 1 and

Steakley emphasized that notaries public should not send requests for reappointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires the county clerks to approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a notary public who desires appointment should apply to Smith by Monday: Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of reappointing present notaries.

Secretary of State Steakley further pointed out each person applying for a commission as a notary public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the county clerk.
