Second Potato Warehouse To Be Ready By End Of Week

Pending completion of the second potato warehouse to be built in Hereford, C. M. Carpenter has announced location of his washing and grading machinery in the Fraser Building across from the City Hall. The plant will be ready for handling spurs tomorrow (Friday) he said. Meanwhile, a delay in receiving Ponderosa Pine poles from New Mexico is holding up construction on the warehouse which is located east of the City Water Works.

The structure is 50 feet wide by 300 feet long and is located just south of the Phillips Wholesale Agency and east of the city water works. Ponderosa pine will be used throughout the warehouse for uprights, ridgepoles and braces. Net wire will be rolled across the ridge poles and bales of straw will then be laid on top. The straw will be covered by a layer of dirt.

Funeral services were held at 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon for William Harvey Nunn, Sr., who died Tuesday following an illness of about three years. Services were held at Black Church in charge of Rev. James Aiken, Jr., pastor of the First Presbyterian Church. Interment was in West Park Cemetery.

Mr. Nunn is survived by his wife, two sons: William Harvey, Jr., and Elmore, and one daughter, Rosa Lee, all of whom are at home; his father, R. T. Nunn; three brothers, Roy of Enid, Okla., Earl of Panhandle, Ind., and Ray of Hereford; one sister, Mrs. H. J. Henden of Glendive, Mont. Mrs. Henden was the only immediate relative who could not attend the services. A large number of other relatives survived.

Mr. Nunn was born July 17, 1895 at Sidney, Ark. His family moved to Wellington in April, 1905. On July 17, 1916, Mr. Nunn married Miss Viola Armentrout at Jacksboro. The two families moved to Hereford in 1918. Mr. Nunn had made his home here since that time. He farmed until 1927 and after that engaged in the drayage business, his occupation until shortly before his death.

He was a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows. Pallbearers were Dave Alexander, Grant Fuller, Carl Caslin, Orville Houser, Jack Grady and John Olson. The simple funeral rites emphasized the deep respect and affection which this community had for Mr. Nunn.

Grand Jury Returns Twelve Indictments As Court Opens

Tatum And Honts In D. A. Run-Off

District wide results in the District Attorney's race gave Milton Tatum, the incumbent, who is now filling out Jas. W. Witherspoon's unexpired term, 3,443 votes to John Hont's 3,257, and J. D. Thomas' 2,354. Tatum led in this county with 771; Honts had 367, and Thomas 569 votes. District Judge Jas. W. Witherspoon was unopposed for election to the office he received last winter by appointment from Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel.

The July term of 69th District Court began here Monday morning and the grand jury has returned 12 additional indictments in cases which will come up this term, Milton Tatum, District Attorney, has announced. The Grand Jury was to have adjourned this afternoon. Six indictments were found against persons charged with driving while intoxicated, one for burglary, one for assault with intent to murder, two for cattle theft, one for forgery and one for embezzlement. Judgement has been rendered in one civil suit. Members of the Grand Jury include W. M. Stewart, foreman; R. H. Beavers, Berry Orr, J. W. Adrian, Will S. Kerr, R. L. Campbell, J. C. Ricketts, Alfred May, G. E. Thiele, Vernon H. Baker, Geo. Messenger and J. C. (Continued on Page 12)

Ernest T. Allred won a clear majority over his two opponents in Precinct 4. Final tabulations gave him 111 votes, Fortenberry 93 and Stocker seven votes.

## CHDA NOTES

By Sadie Lee Oliver

Bearded Iris, called German Iris and Flags should be divided and reset in August. The woody roots, called rhizomes should be barely covered to prevent rot. The tops should be cut back to a point which included the bud. Plants moved in August will flower in the following spring.

A study of current Iris specialists catalogues will show that dwarf, intermediate and tall varieties come in hundreds of colors that flower from earliest spring until late fall.

H. L. Rice of B Street, has twenty named varieties, fifteen of which flowered this spring. The April freeze destroyed the flower buds of the earlier tall varieties.

The Bison tomato is being grown at the Rice Greenhouse on B Street along with a tomato selected by Mr. Rice several years ago. This plant was more productive and vigorous than others in the same planting. To date this season it continues to be the best one of the four varieties planted under identical conditions.

Short season tomatoes such as the Bison may be planted in August and will produce a crop before frost.

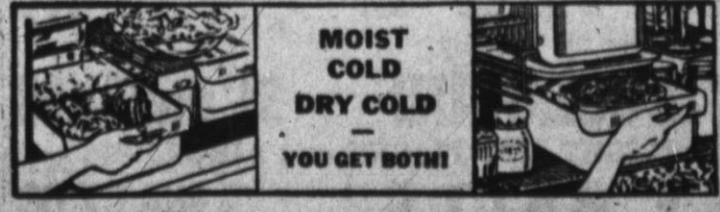

Let's Cook Something

For August, Mrs. J. E. Beyer gives you a happy combination that is a sure cure for that all-in feeling at any time of the day. If you are afraid your family is becoming bored with monotonous meals and still you hesitate to try new dishes, here are two basic recipes, each of which may be easily varied in the fruit combinations used. Mrs. Beyer travels around a great deal visiting her children, and other relatives in different parts of the United States and usually when she returns she'll have two or three really appetizing recipes tucked away somewhere in her luggage for her own future reference. From her sister-in-law in Wichita, Kan., comes these two attractive and flavorful frozen desserts that are particularly luscious made with fresh fruits—and particularly lovely, too.

### FRESH APRICOT CREAM

- 2 whole eggs (well beaten)
- 1 scant cup sugar
- 1-3 cup karo syrup
- pinch of salt
- 1 cup top milk
- 2 cups whipping cream
- 2 teaspoons vanilla

Combine all the ingredients in the order given, except the whipping cream, beat well with a Dover egg beater and pour into freezing tray. When almost frozen remove to bowl and whip with electric or hand beater until mixture becomes creamy. Whip the cream and carefully fold into the mixture. Add

- 1 cup mashed and sweetened fresh apricots (canned may be used)
- 12 maraschino cherries (chopped)
- ½ cup chopped pecans

Return quickly to freezing tray and allow to finish freezing. Here is a recipe for pineapple sherbet that appeals equally to guest and hostess.

### PINEAPPLE SHERBET

- 1 small can crushed pineapple
- 2 cups granulated sugar
- 3 cups water
- 2 lemons
- 3 egg whites
- ½ cup whipping cream

Cook sugar and water together for ten minutes, or until syrupy. When syrup is cool, add the lemon juice and pineapple and pour into tray. Allow to partially freeze. Remove to cold bowl and beat with egg beater and add the stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into tray and freeze. Remove to cold bowl again and add the whipped cream. Return to tray and allow to freeze firm.

Egg whites and cream are both added to sherbets after the beating process, so having them prepared and kept cold aids in keeping the mixture as cold as possible, for sherbet and ice mixtures melt very quickly when subjected to a warm temperature.

If mixture separates or settles, it should be given another beating or should be agitated several times at half-hour intervals until mixture has frozen enough to hold.

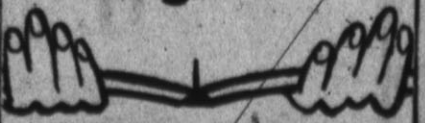

Proposed Constitutional Amendments

S. J. R. NO. 6 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Section 26 of Article IV so as to provide that Notaries Public be appointed by the Secretary of State of the State of Texas; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 26 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 26. (a) The Secretary of State shall appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for each county who shall perform such duties as now are or may be prescribed by law. The qualifications of Notaries Public shall be prescribed by law.

(b) nothing herein shall affect the terms of office of Notaries Public who have qualified for the present term prior to the taking effect of this amendment.

(c) Should the Legislature enact an enabling law hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such law shall

not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT NOTARIES PUBLIC BE APPOINTED BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS."

and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT NOTARIES PUBLIC BE APPOINTED BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

S. J. R. NO. 4 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature authority to provide for appeal direct to the Supreme Court in cases involving injunctions granted or denied on the grounds of constitutionality or unconstitutionality of any statute or on validity or invalidity of administrative orders; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and expenses of publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 3-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 3-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law, for an appeal direct to the Supreme Court of this State from an order of any trial court granting or denying an interlocutory or permanent injunction on the grounds of the constitutionality or unconstitutionality of any statute of this state, or on the validity or invalidity of any administrative order issued by any state agency under any statute of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters

of the State of Texas at the general election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR APPEALS DIRECT TO THE SUPREME COURT IN INSTANCES INVOLVING THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF CERTAIN LAWS AND ORDERS."

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR APPEALS DIRECT TO THE SUPREME COURT IN INSTANCES INVOLVING THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF CERTAIN LAWS AND ORDERS."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

H. J. R. NO. 45 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article 8, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 9-A; providing that the Commissioners Court of Red River County, after a majority vote of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein, shall have the authority to levy a tax not to exceed Twenty-five (25) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for a period not exceeding fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of the County by the issuance of bonds under the provisions of the General Laws regulating the refunding of outstanding debts of the County; providing for the necessary proclamation; and appropriating funds to defray expenses of the proclamation, publication and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 8, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto another Section to be known as Section 9-A, which shall read as follows:

"Section 9-A. Upon the vote of a majority of the resident qualified electors owning rendered taxable property therein so authorizing, the Commissioners Court of Red River County, Texas, may levy an annual tax not to exceed Twenty-five (25) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for a period not to exceed fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding all the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County and issue bonds under the provisions of the General Law regulating the issuance of bonds to refund said indebtedness.

"At such election, the Commissioners Court shall submit for adoption the proposition of whether such outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County shall be refunded into bonds, the amount of special tax to be levied, and the number of years said tax is to be levied. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters.

"The provisions of this Section 9-A shall apply only to Red River County; and the provisions hereof shall be self-enacting without the necessity of an enabling act of the Legislature of the State of Texas, but shall become effective immediately after the official canvass of the result has been made and it is determined that this Amendment has been adopted by a majority of the voters of the State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution providing that the Commissioners Court of Red

River County may, upon a vote of the qualified electors therein, levy a tax and issue bonds to refund the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County"; those voters opposing such Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution providing that the Commissioners Court of Red River County may, upon a vote of the qualified electors therein, levy a tax and issue bonds to refund the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation and to have necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election, which shall be refunded to the State of Texas by Red River County out of its General Fund or any other available fund. Provided that no election shall be held until Red River County shall first deposit with the State Treasurer the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) with which to pay such expenses of said election.

H. J. R. NO. 8 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 30b of Article 16; providing that the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution limiting the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years, shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipalities that are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service Law applicable thereto; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment; making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto a new Section to Article 16 to be known as Section 30b which shall read as follows:

"Section 30b. Wherever by virtue of Statute or charter provi-

sions appointive offices of any municipality are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service and rules are set up governing appointment to and removal from such offices, the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution of two (2) years shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service law or charter provisions applicable thereto."

Sec. 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at the general election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that Article 16, Section 30, of the Constitution shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipality placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service."

Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that Article 16, Section 30, of the Constitution shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipality placed under the terms

and provisions of Civil Service." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast is in favor of the Amendment the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published, as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

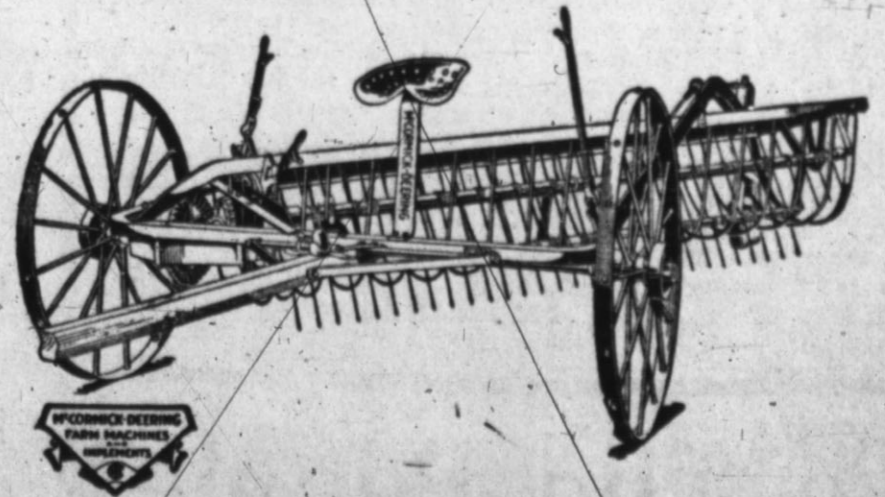

can just about pay their expenses on both hauls. In other words, for every ton trucked into Hereford, a ton of spuds might be hauled out.

## Poisons For Rabbits, Grasshoppers And Prairie Dogs Ready

Poison for grass hoppers, rabbits and prairie dogs is now available to farmers of this county, according to County Agent A. R. Bateman. Grasshopper poison may be had at the Bull Barn daily, from 7 a. m. to 6 p. m., he said. The poison is furnished without cost to the farmer. Ten to 15 tons daily are being mixed. Rabbit poison may be secured at the Courthouse from Jasper Cockrell, janitor, Mr. Bateman said. Persons with prairie dogs they would like to exterminate may avail themselves of a trained man, who is an expert in use of prairie dog poison, at the county agent's office. However, only a few prairie dogs remain in the county, and persons must furnish transportation to and from the office for the expert.
