

Rabbit poison may be secured at the Courthouse from Jasper Cockrell, janitor, Mr. Bate-

Persons with prairie dogs they would like to exterminate may avail themselves of a trained man, who is an expert in use of prairie dog poison, at the county agent's office. However, only a few prairie dogs remain in the county, and persons must furnish transportation to and from the office for the expert.
