be jacked up. A forecast of the hubbub that can be expected in the political year of 1960 was seen as the Legislature debated election law changes.

Both House and Senate gave final approval to a bill that would allow a candidate's name to appear twice on the same ballot. It is designed to allow U. S. Sen. Lyndon Johnson run for another Senate term and accept a presidential nomination at the same time, if opportunity should arise. Senate approved unanimously; House, by a 129-to-15 vote. Liberal members, mostly from Houston, obrected.

A bill to move forward two months the dates of state primaries and conventions also drew liberal protests. It would move primaries up to the first Saturdays in May and June. State convention to name delegates to the national presidential nominating convention would be the last Tuesday in

Opponents claimed it was intended to let Senator Johnson get his state politicking out of the way before national convention time.

Changing parties in midstream would be outlawed under a bill that has received final approval of both houses. Each poll tax would be stamped "Democrat" or "Republican" the first time a person voted in a primary. For the period he used that poll tax, the holder would have to stick with the party of his stamp, in the primaries and party conventions.


