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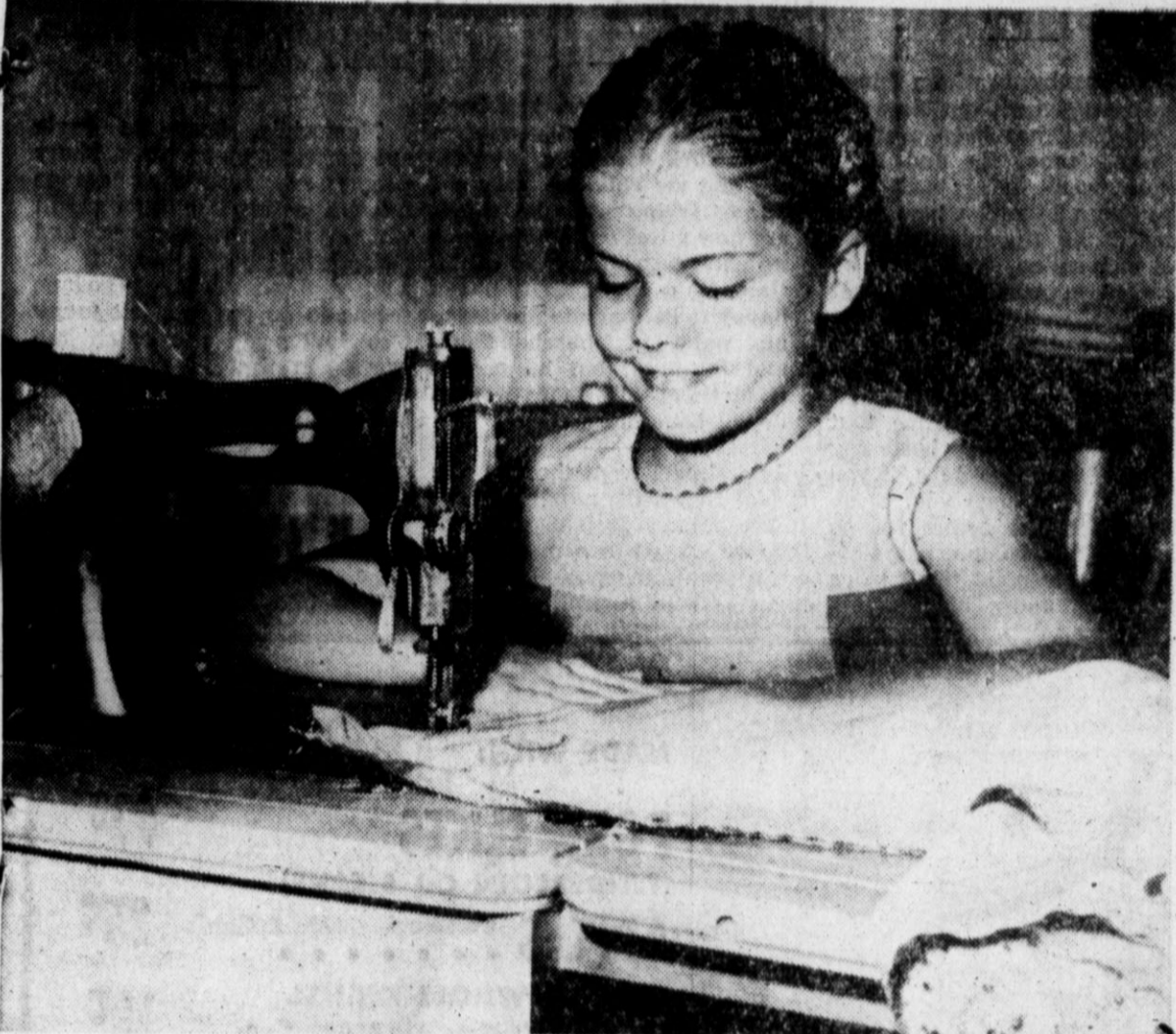

They received cost estimates on proposed shelving for the county library when it is moved back to the courthouse. They plan to make a decision on the purchase at their regular meeting on Monday, July 11.

Architect and contractor for the courthouse renovation and new jail made reports of work progress. It is expected the units will be completed and ready for occupancy the last week in July.

A letter was read by the court from D. C. Greer, Texas Highway Engineer. Greer advised the county that registration of 51 vehicles here were not in the county of use or owners' residence.

The law, Greer's letter pointed out, provides that such license funds will be diverted to the state and reapportioned to the proper county.

The total licensing fee for the vehicles amounts to \$6,422.40. Since the county received more than \$50,000 in license fees, only half the total fee would be refunded. This would amount to \$3,211.20.

Space Is Used As A Medium

NEW YORK — If you're a

modern artists in search of a medium, how about trying space?

You won't be the first, though. Already in orbit is pioneering — could he be called an astro-artist? — Stuyvesant Van Veen. The 50-year-old New Yorker, descendant of two of this country's earliest Dutch families, has done an abstract painting on both sides of a 3 by 5 foot panel of clear plastic.

It is mounted in a light aluminum frame to show its possibilities as use for a room divider or partition.

"I've removed painting from the wall and call it color in space," Van Veen explains. "It's part of the violent desire among artists these days to try new materials."

Traditionalists may deplore the use of an unconventional glass-like background for painting. But Van Veen counters:

"I feel that the whole achievement of the space age, with man conceivably going a million miles into space, clears away any and all restrictions on artistic concepts. Discipline in craftsmanship is needed but ideas should have no limit."

For his "space painting," Van Veen worked in mainly rectangular shapes formed with a continuous line. Colors are soft tones of blue and green with rose accents. Some sections are opaque and some almost transparent, with texture done in irregular brush strokes.

"I wanted a light hearted feeling to go with the medium," the artist says. "Light coming through the panel also gives a third dimension. And of course the background against which it is placed can change the effect."

Noting that people often key color schemes in their homes to a favorite painting, Van Veen feels space paintings could be used in the same way but as an integral part of furnishings. The plastic panels can be mounted in both movable screens and stationary dividers.

Van Veen has worked with plastics before, as long ago as 1937 when he used laminated plastic for a mural at the Chicago World's Fair.

Widely known as a muralist, he used ordinary barto or kitchen tile for recent school and industrial mural commissions.

For a mural at a Bronx elementary school, he says: "The superintendent advised me to use some impervious medium because youngsters can be rough on anything decorative. Plastic was ideal because it can take a lot of punishment." On that job, Van Veen ordered special colors at a plastic tile factory and relates: "The custom work cost the plant an extra \$5,000 and now they won't do business with me." However, he found a wide enough color range in commercial plastics for his latest murals in a large New York housing development.

As evidence that he feels no limit to a muralist's artistic expression, Van Veen has done commissions on such unacademic topics as "The Romance of the Doughnut" and "Progress in Soap."

Farmers are warned to pen up their livestock and keep them penned, or be subject to a \$200 fine and impoundment of the animals.

Each day the animals roam at large will be considered a separate offense.

The new law relates to horses, mules, donkeys, cows, bulls, steers, hogs, sheep and goats loose on state and federal highways. Farm and ranch roads are not included.

An increasing number of deaths and injuries due to auto collisions with stray animals necessitated the law.

Heretofore the motorist was liable.

At the instigation of Texas Commissioner of Education, J. W. Edgar, Brownsboro school officials, both board and superintendent, are resigning en masse.

Decision was reached after an involved and rather heated hearing in Austin to review school conflicts that had resulted in a killing at a Brownsboro school board meeting.

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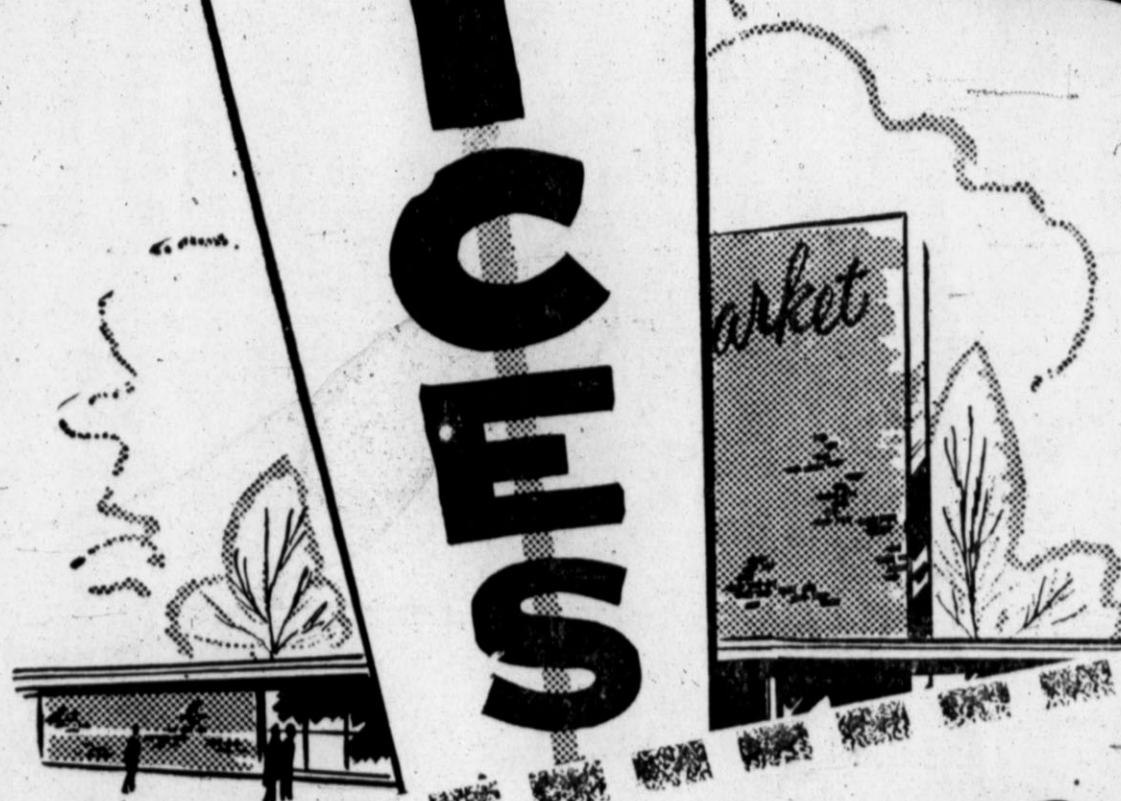

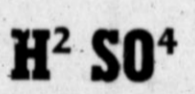

'Deaf' Smith Says

TO: THE SPIRIT OF GENERAL SAM HOUSTON FROM: THE SPIRIT OF 'DEAF' SMITH SUBJECT: THE ACTIVITIES OF MY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE Sam, I noticed a letter from Dwight Havens, Manager of the Local Chamber of Commerce Service Department of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, on the desk of my Chamber manager. I'd like to pass it on to you because you'll hear this type of thinking in other places - but NOT IN DEAF SMITH COUNTY!

The heading on the letter was DON'T LET IT HAPPEN TO YOU! - and, in the words of Dwight Havens, goes on to say - 'It happened to me a short time ago so I can talk about it. At the annual meeting of a local chamber of commerce, a businessman, successful in terms of dollars accumulated,

and a past officer and director of the chamber of commerce, said to me, 'The substantial members of this business community do not want it to grow'. He clearly stated that they wanted it to stay exactly as it was. Without hesitation, he described his efforts and the efforts of some of his business associates to keep new business and industry out of their community.

'Later in our conversation he complained that there were no jobs in his community to attract and hold the younger generation. I am astonished that a businessman who is so faulty in his reasoning can be successful in business.

'This experience causes me to ask; How many other communities and chambers of commerce are suffering from the same influence? It is instances like this which leads to barbs such as the one in the Sunday May 8 issue of the Family Weekly. I'm sure it will bring loud protests from many chamber of commerce managers.

'The story related that a government agency sent a request to all cities asking for information on what was being done to protect the community against H-bomb attack. An angry young mayor sat down and wrote this reply: 'Re atomic protection request - not worried here - we have a chamber of commerce which has repelled everything new in the past fifty years.'

'Perhaps this was the mayor of the community which I visited. Be that as it may, there is constant need to examine our chamber of commerce goals. Do we stand for growth and development? Is there action to prove and justify the existence of the organization? Are we getting positive results? Do our people, including governmental officials, know what we stand for? Are our members participating in the growth and development program?

'Stories like the ones related here are told because they are true. But, don't let it be said of the chamber of commerce in your community' Sam, that's my report for this week. It can't be truthfully said about my Chamber of

Commerce since 1945, but it could happen if the leadership of the organization should fall to those who are satisfied, completely, with thing as they are. The fact that the Chamber of Commerce directors voted recently to move into new larger and brighter quarters, to purchase badly needed new equipment, and to expand their services to their membership and to the community is a good sign that the present leadership is not satisfied with things as they have been.

At the same meeting Oliver Streu was appointed to head up a committee whose sole purpose is to look ten years ahead. They are to come up with a list of things that Hereford and Deaf Smith County must accomplish or provide for if the future economic and cultural growth is to be assured. They were specifically instructed not to consider whose toes might be stepped on, not to consider the problem of financing, nor attempt to set any time schedule; they were instructed to give their imaginations free play and to come up with a set of long range objectives for the Chamber of Commerce.

Sam, that's my report for this week.

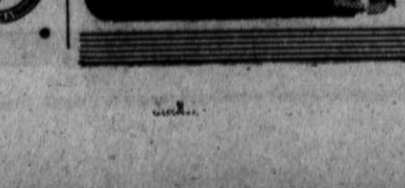
