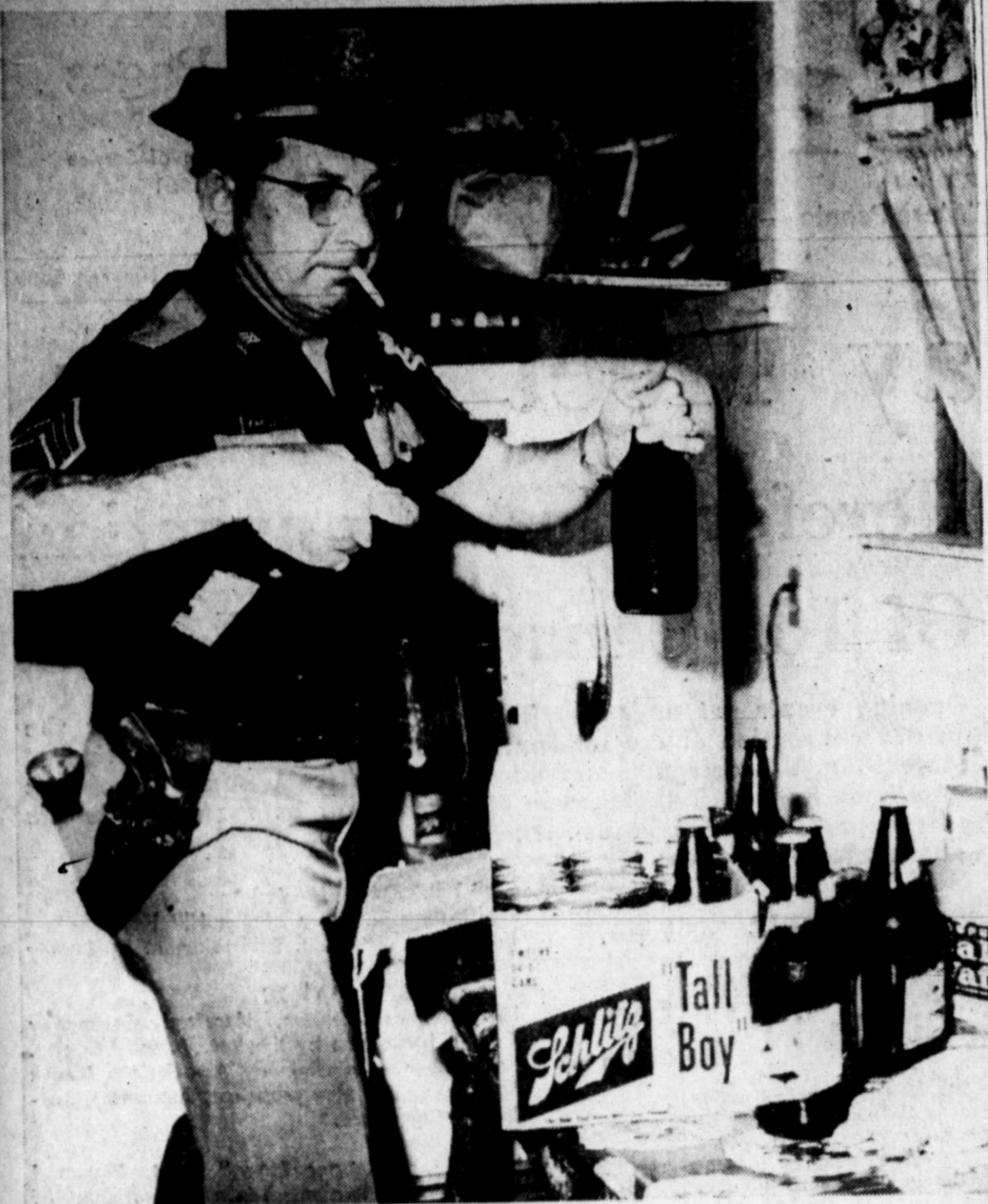

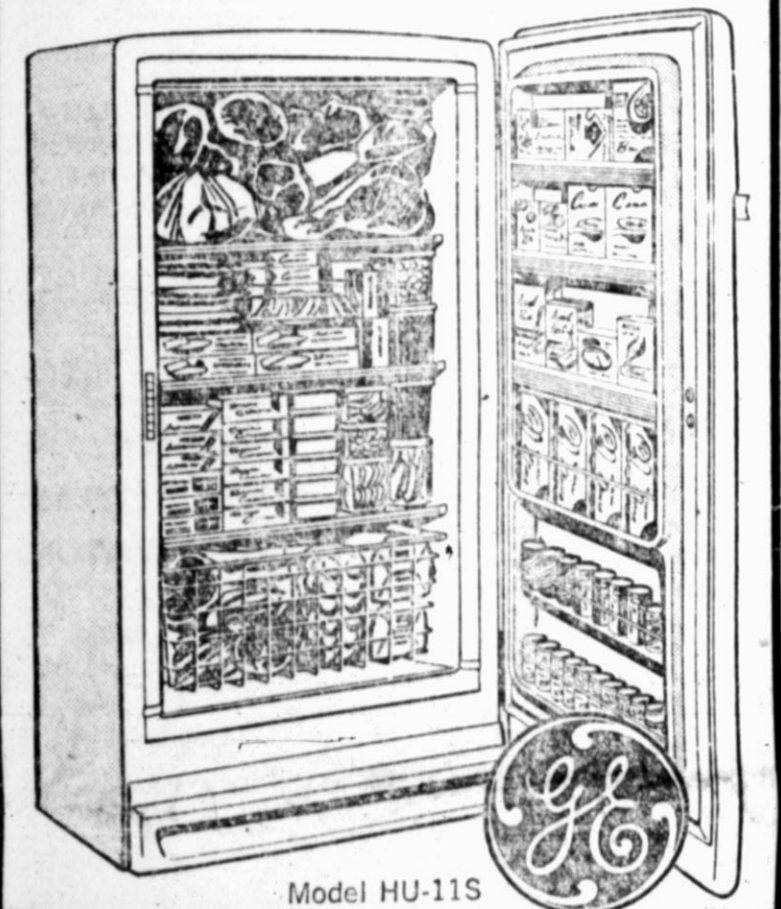

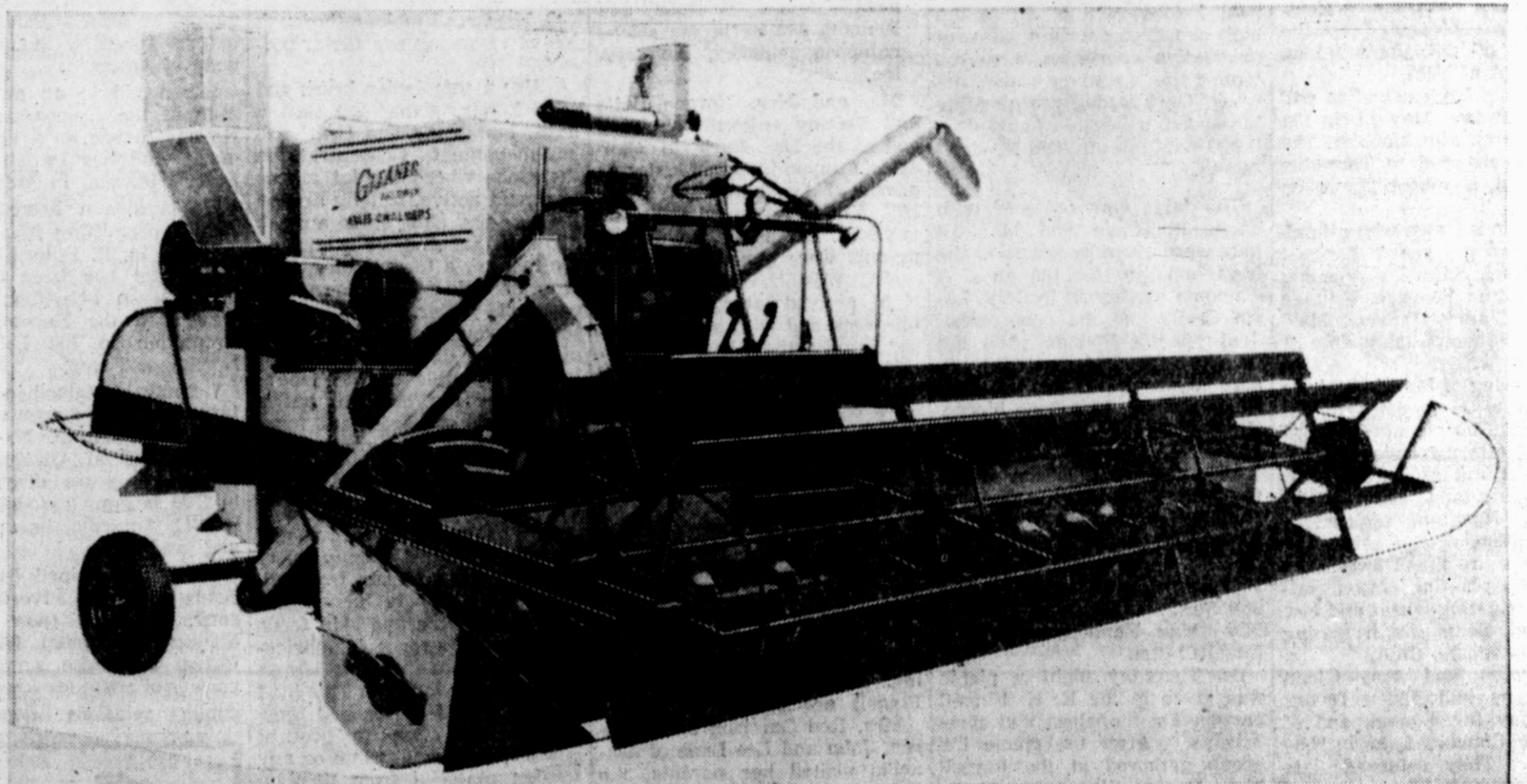

Rotary Ladies Night Hears Ali Ghetto On Communism

A very real threat to the United States from the Communists was explained to a Hereford Rotary Club Ladies Night crowd Monday night by Madame Ali Ghetto of Amarillo.

The former German actress stressed the importance of face-to-face contacts and a change in American attitudes which must be made to forestall the Red tide.

More than 100 Rotarians, their wives and guests attended the affair in the First Christian Church fellowship hall, celebrating the 55th anniversary of Rotary International and the 15th of the Hereford club.

Entertainment was provided by a group from Canyon. A male quartet, including Bob Alford, Dr. Dudley Moore, Bill Davis and Bill Knight, sang six numbers accompanied by Jenny Lynn Alford.

Master of ceremonies was the Rev. Gilbert Davis. Ben Childers announced that four charter members of the Hereford Rotary Club were changing their classification to "Senior Active" after 15 years of membership. They are Henry Benson, John Patton, Leo Forrest and James W. Witherspoon.

"There will not be a unification of East and West Germany," Madame Ghetto declared. "The East German masses will not revolt again against Communism."

"All the intelligent leaders have left, or are leaving, East Germany."

She said that the university at Jena has lost 48 technical leaders and Dresden has lost more than 60.

"There is only escape or the bitter fruit," she said. She stated that the Red leaders were allowing many to escape to eliminate any possible revolution, while the masses are getting what they want: their work, their bread and their uniform.

Foreign aid programs, as operated by the communists, are brilliant in execution with intelligent underground operators working in all economic and social circles in borderline countries.

"We must give up our ig-

... our arrogance and our apathy in dealing with foreign lands", she said. "We must put our hearts, souls and ideals to work, rather than just our money."

Madame Ghetto explained the operation of the Cosmopolitan

Club she has organized through the YMCA in Amarillo for foreign students at Amarillo Air Force Base.

"By showing them how Americans really live and work and play, we are changing their attitudes about the United States . . . we are trying to build a bridge of friendship and understanding."

The summit talks are having their effect all over the world, and in this area the reaction appears uniform. The people I see are not in favor of knocking down another iota; they want to uphold American self respect - regardless of the consequence - and they feel that further U. S. concessions would be out of line. Instead of splitting this country, Mr. Khrushchev seems to have cemented all factions together in the strongest fashion we have seen since Pearl Harbor. Mr. K just doesn't understand the American people and what makes them tick. His applied psychology always seems to backfire.

No doubt he expected to have some influence on our presidential nominations - and he did. People have forgotten allotments, quotas and big contracts; they are putting personal interests to one side and stand ready to nominate the man most capable of matching or out-dealing Mr. Khrushchev and the Russians. After all, a \$10-a-bushel wheat support with unlimited acreage wouldn't be worth much if the Russians take over this country as they have declared, from time to time, that they will do. This could and will continue to be the No. 1 basis for selecting our national party nominees.

Personally, I think it boosts the chances of Mr. Nixon and Senator Johnson, both of whom have had extensive experience and have carried themselves well under fire.

You hear plenty of people complaining about the way our high school graduates spell or, if you like, do not spell. This is a pet hobby in many places and, unfortunately, is pretty well based on reliable findings. This week it was a "case of 'man bites dog'" when Mrs. Olean Leggett, teacher and librarian, turned tables and took me to task concerning a picture of the Hereford Garden Club marker at the main entrance of Hereford High school. The sign in the picture reads "In Memoriam" and, as Mrs. Leggett puts it,

"Anybody who ever studied Latin or spelling, or both, knows that the correct spelling is 'In Memoriam'!"

I tried to convince her that I took Latin in her class back when she was teaching at Wellington High School and, consequently, that it was really her fault. Instead, she convinced me that I had another teacher. I still can't understand why she would get peeved at me and at The Brand because someone else misspelled a sign. I told her that we don't get all the drivers drunk who appear in the paper on DWI any more than we convert all of the evangelists who hold revival meetings. It didn't work, though.
