## Carolina Man, Former XIT Cowhand, Remembers Early Days of This County

A man who remembers the organization of Deaf Smith County in 1890 is still living in Summerville, S. C., and still interested in the county and some of the friends he made here. However, he is evidently rather poorly informed about conditions in the county which he helped to organize because he writes that Ford Coupe, Hereford Motor Co. he "understands La Plata is not / Ethyl Robinson, Dodge Sedan, much of a town now...and that Ireland Motor Co. the county seat has been moved to Hereford." Was Homesick In a long, rambling letter, Mr. Kenyon tells something of his work for the XIT—he had charge of windmills and water works divided 1-2 interest in E 1-2 of on the Escarbada Division during most of his years on the ranch in addition to giving some names in connection with the organization of Deaf Smith County and telling a good deal about what it was to be a homesick young man in the Panhandle during the last years of the century. He says, "I had become homesick or maybe 'Girl Crazy'. which as you know is the same as crazy," and goes on to add that there were very few women or girls in that section from "Abilene, Colorado City all the way on up to No Man's Land or the western end of Oklahoma." And it is needless to say that there was no myriad of uplift organizations worrying about the poor cowboy's womanless existence. We have them now, in profusion, trying to take care of the soldiers, but in Mr. Kenyon's day the men on the frontier saw so few women it is no wonder that the cowboys thought it a disgrace to their fraternity if a school teacher was allowed to stay more than one term before one of them married her. 

For cream style corn, cut the kernels by running a sharp knife lightly over the ear to cut off the tops of the kernels. Then scrape lut the pulp with the back of the knife. For wholegrain, cut the kernels deeply enough to take off most of the kernel without objectionable hulls and do not scrape the cob.







Ed Bishop, editor of The Dalhart Texan, recently published a column in which he has some very interesting material from a Texas Almanac. He borrowed the alamanac from George Lider of Amarillo, who makes a hoppy of collecting" historical books. The almanac, dated 1869, was produced by W. D. Richardson and Co., Galveston. Texas. The following items are taken from his column, which in turn came from the almanac.

The Texas immigrant will find the following prevailing prices for food that he will need here: Bacon, 12 to 15 cents per pound; beef, fresh, two to three cents per pound; pork, fresh, 5 to 6 cents per pound; chickens, \$1 to \$3 per dozen; eggs, 10 to 12 cents per dozen; butter, 10 to 15 cents per pound; common cows, including young calves, each giving two three gallons of milk per day, fed on grass alone, \$10 to \$15 each; oxen, well broke and of large size, \$30 to \$40 per yoke; mules, \$30 to \$40 each; horses, \$30 to \$150 each; stock cattle, \$2 to \$6 per head. Sheep usually command about \$1 apiece.

Texas Prairies: The prairies of Texas differ materially from those of the Northwestern states; and the most obvious difference is the fact that we have in Texas no vast expanses of prairie without any visible timber. Nowhere does the country present those vast, monotonous plains without an object to relieve the eye, that are seen in Illinois and some states west of the Mississ-

Indians: The Comanches roam over the whole extent of the Staked Plains, between the Canadian and the Rio Grande, During the summer season they follow the buffalo farther north. A vigorous campaign should be made into the Indian country. Troops should be started from Texas, from Kansas, from New Mexico and from the Indian Territory, all at the same time and should converge upon their




