SUNDAY'S SERMON.

The Faith and Genius of George Washington, by Elder Wooten, Pastor of Christian Church.

Quality is the best of all value. A man's real worth and true greatness is determined not so much by what he has and does as by what he is. This fact cannot be emphasized too strongly. Science, philosophy, and revelation are in perfect accord here, and with one voice they would all make this the basis of all true progress and development. Man, therefore, is more than a "creature of environment." He is not only the architect, but the builder and maker of his own fortune. This remarkable fact is written large on every page of human history. The great Gladstone, reviewing the progress of the race, said: "History carries on its face the proof, that it is in man and not in his circumstances that the secret of his destiny resides."

We often describe the characteristics of the great man in such terms as ability, sagacity, industry, courage, heroism, devotion etc; but when we go beyond and seek to discover those qualities of soul which make him truly great, we find ourselves dealing with principles which elude definition and baffle description. Yet certain elements appear on the very surface which limit achievements, and invariably distinguish the great man whether he be hero, artist, saint, or sage. Of the more basic elements that might be mentioned faith, and genius are certainly among the most potent; and history furnishes no better illustration of this fact than the life and achievements of George Washington.

We have looked upon Washington, possibly, as a man who exercised the principles of faith to an appreciable degree, but we seldom if ever think of him as a genius. The term, genius, is not Biblical in origin or usage, was little used during the pro-

lific Elizabethan period, but as expressing the inward mysterious power and aptitude of the soul, it has become in recent years almost as indispensable as the word faith. The two words form an interesting contrast. Both are of the soul. Without genius there is no intuition, no inspiration; without faith there is no execution or realization. Genius has insight; faith out-sight; the one gives impulse and aim, the other illumination and assurance. Genius is an intellectual gift, creative and productive; "Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." As a synonym for genius our psychologists employ the term "variation," by which is meant that power of preception, attention, and observation which enables one to see things in their larger and more complete relationships, and gives firmness, fulness, and completeness of organization. Hegel said that, "Talent cannot do its part fully without animation of genius;" and Goethe defined the term as "that power of man which by thought and action gives laws and rules."

Invariably we point to Abraham as a man of faith, and to a man like Edison as a genius; and we make no mistake in this. But we do err in supposing that men like Abraham and Moses were not geniuses, or in not regarding men like Michael Angelo or Edison as men of faith. The man who founds a nation, or discovers the higher laws and principles which govern society, and effects a fuller and more complete civil organization, is no less a genius than the man who discovers physical laws, constructs useful inventions, or creates master peices in art. Genius and faith go hand in hand, the one the inspiration, the other the assurance, and both working together is the dynamic of true greatness.

The great man is the inspiration of all progress. Every advance in human history is tracable to some

great name. This does not mean, however, that all great worthies have been originators and creators. It does not mean that there was no faith in the world before Abraham; no law or government before Moses; no cities before Cecrops and Cadmus; no geometry, physics, or astronomy, before Euclid, Newton, and Kepler; no history before Heroditus, or literature before Homer; no music before Bach or Beethoven; no education before Socrates or Plato; or no invention before the nineteenth century. It simply means that these men made an enviable impress upon history, by taking up what was left to them by preceding generations, and by patience, toil, and sacrifice made the most of it under the light, inspiration, and opportunity of the age, thus stamping it with their individuality and transmitting it in turn to posterity. Gladstone emphasizes this thought in these very significant words: "It is not in possessions available for use, enjoyment, and security; it is not only in language, laws, institutions, arts and religions; it is not only in what we have but what we are. For as character is framed by the action and reaction of human beings and the circumstances in which he lives, it follows that as those circumstances vary he alters too, and transmits a modified—it ought to be also an enlarged and expanding—nature onward in turn to posterity, under that mysterious law which establishes between every generation and its predecessor a moral as well as a physical association."

A man's greatness, therefore, must be measured by the material he has to begin with, the conditions under which he lives and works, the achievements wrought, and the influence he leaves after him.

Reviewing from this standpoint the name of Washington does not suffer in comparison with the mightiest names of earth. He lived during a

period fraught with memorable events and sprinkled with a galaxy of illustrious names. It was the age of Pitt and Wilberforce; of Burk and Fox; of Watt and Arkwright; of Col-bridge, Wordsworth and Burns; of Adam Smith, Hastings and Clive; of Lafayette and Lomartine; of Franklin and Hamilton; of Adams and Jefferson. The period saw despotism dethroned, and liberty enthroned, the rise of achievements great and good; but among names and events so many and great as these the name and influence of Washington stands like some great mountain towering above so many lofty hills.

We look upon Moses as one of the great lights that have illumed the pathway of human advancement, but we regard his work as super human in many respects. But robbed of all the enchantment which distance lends, the task which Washington accomplished was little less miraculous than the work of Moses. To give independence to a dozen colonies of adventurers and refugees from religious oppression and intolerance—these without organization, form, or order, scattered over a strip of undeveloped coastland for a distance of two thousand miles, beset with, all the privations of pioneer life, wrestling with that "three-headed Og" of wilderness, climate, and savages, fenced in on every side by foreign powers, with party strife and sectional jealousy working out their deadly results—to wrest these colonies under such conditions from the enemy in the face of all odds, and to organize them into a government that is at once the administration of the world, was a burden and a task as great as ever fell upon the shoulders of hero, statesman, or ruler.

With genius and faith rarely displayed in history, Washington set himself to this Herculean task. Political confusion and intrigue gave him self possession and reliance; defeat and disappointment imparted

hope and courage; the frost-joturs and hunger-giants of Valley Forge only strenghtened his faith; and when the talented and influential Arnold turned traitor because he considered the struggle hopeless it only gave him determination. Through the darkness and the gloom, the disappointment, distraction and confusion from first to last his genius worked tirelessly on, and his faith never wavered. His presence inspired hope, his name insured destiny. An old Quaker expressed his confidence by confessing that he "placed his

FLOCKING TO THE PANHANDLE.

Fort Worth & Denver Handles 175 Carloads of Immigrant Outfits in Month.

Fort Worth, Texas, Feb. 18, 07.

The great influx of people to the Panhandle country, instead of decreasing, is establishing new records, according to figures given out by the railroads handling the immigrants into that section of Texas.

During the past month the Fort Worth & Denver City alone handled over 175 solid carloads of immigrant outfits to points along its line in the Panhandle section, while probably half as many were diverted to other lines, especially to the Wichita Valley road. Calculating upon the recognized basis that one car represents one family and that five persons average the family, it will be seen that during four weeks the Denver has carried over 1,300 people to those sections, prepared to settle and make their permanent abode.

The other roads having Panhandle inlets, notably the Rock Island and the Santa Fe, have carried car after car of passengers, but the figures are not obtainable. Considering the fact that the Santa Fe and Rock Island have inlets to the North, it is figured that these two roads carried at least 3,000 into the Panhandle sections during the past thirty days, and that practically all of this number made their homes there. The continued increase shown in the flocking of people to the Panhandle is indicative of the fact that interest in that section has not waned, but is constantly on the up grade.

The passenger department of the Denver has compiled figures showing the number of passengers carried to the Panhandle section during 1906. These figures show that 3,375 were received from foreign (non Texas) lines and that slightly over that number were received from local lines. In 1905 less than half that number were handled to points along the Denver, Atchafalaya, Vernon, Quanah and Dalhart got the bulk of the new settlers during the past year.

Freight department figures show that during the last six months of '05 as many as 418 cars were handled to the Panhandle. For the first six months in 1906 a total of 395 cars were handled, while during the latter six months the number of cars of immigrant outfits totaled 637.

The People's Lobby.

Washington is watching with much interest the working out of a distinctly new idea in public affairs. This is the People's Lobby,—a non-partisan organization designed to foster a wider knowledge of national legislation, and to indorse or oppose such bills as affect the general welfare of the people.

The basic idea is that, if the people know the facts on legislative matters, public opinion will find such wide expression that it cannot be disregarded. Channels of publicity are not lacking. The Peoples Lobby has the support of a large number of leading newspapers and of such publications as "Success," "Collier's" and "Ridgway's."

An important branch of the work of the organization is the careful compiling of the public record of every senator and representative. The people have a right to know from an unprejudiced source, what their legislators are doing. The influence brought to bear on members of Congress will also be examined into; this means a history of the "third House"—the secret lobbyists, who are so successful in influencing legislation for the benefit of the "special interests" which employ them.

The plan seems broad enough and practical enough to augur great public good if intelligently carried into effect. The personnel of the Governing Committee and of the men in charge of the bureau in Washington would seem to promise this result, and the willingness of the people to indorse the project and to support it with their subscriptions is attested by hundreds of communications received from every state in the Union and from Panama, Hawaii and the Philippine Islands. Enthusiastic letters are still being received daily, and the organization continues to make its appeal for subscriptions for any amount from \$1.00 upward.

Henry Beach Needham, whose experience as a journalist in Washington led him to suggest the formation of the People's Lobby, is the secretary in charge of the Washington bureau, located in the Munsey Building.

...and George Washington. In the midst of political strife John Randolph said, "There is but one name that can awe them." The frightened Hamilton said, "Fear is folly since Washington is to be President." After the battle of Yorktown the matchless Patrick Henry exclaimed "I am no longer a Virginian, I am an American." A man who could thus command the entire confidence and respect of his people, bring victory from the very jaws of defeat, and at the same time hold the confidence and esteem of all foreign nations; and that amidst the wreck of Empires and wars of nations, certainly was something more than a "child of circumstances." His faith was indomitable, and his genius invincible and irresistible. By these he triumphed over all opposition, and made his way to the highest pinnacle of fame.

Washington is not a creation of the myth-maker. His work and influence is with us; and it is not the gushing of the hero-worshiper to say, that in it we have our greatest intellectual and moral treasure. Mr. Everett spoke truly when he said: "But for the sacrifice of human life that would be occasioned by it, one would rather that half the continent would sink than that we should lose his memory and character—a character to be held up to the imitation of our children, to be pointed out to the admiration of the stranger, to be recommended to the applause of all human kind, and handed down to the latest posterity."

As a matter of fact we do not appreciate the legacy we have in the name of Washington as we ought. He is probably appreciated more abroad than at home, "Until time shall be no more," said Lord Burgham, "Will the test of the progress which our race has made in wisdom and virtue be derived from the veneration paid to the immortal name of Washington." Green, the great historian, paid his tribute thus: "No nobler figure ever stood in front of a

nations life. The first in war, the first in peace, and the first in the hearts of his countrymen." With rhetoric as true as beautiful the eloquent Fox said: "Illustrious man! Deserving honor less from the splendor of the situation than from the dignity of his mind! It has been reserved for him to run the race of glory without experiencing the smallest interruption to the brilliancy of his career. Such has been the transcendent merit, and unparalleled fate of this illustrious man."

These tributes are not misplaced or over-drawn, and that literary realism which would rob our great chieftain of a single virtue, or in any way weaken the faith imposed in him as an ideal is a traitor to the best interests of the race, and plays false to those principles which give it license. With becoming modesty then every American may, and every legal patriot ought to land the name of Washington in poem, song, and speech. For, with Webster we certainly "cannot wish better for our country nor for the world than that the same spirit which influenced Washington may influence all who succeed him." Nor let any one suppose there is danger of going over-bounds in this respect. The limit is well drawn by the great Lincoln in the following words: "Washington is the mightiest man of earth—long since the mightiest in the cause of civil liberty, still mightiest in moral transformation. On that man a eulogy is expected. That cannot be. To add brightness to the sun or glory to the name of Washington is alike impossibility. Let none attempt it. In solemn awe pronounce the name and in its naked deathless splendor leave it shining on."

May you ever "feel the glory of the presence and bow the head to the blessing of the ever-living and immortal Washington."
