In the seventh inning a costly error by the Canyon short-stop let in a score for the college boys. Then they began to ginger up, and with a bunch of hits netted several more scores. The Canyon pitcher

began to show weakness and was batted all over the field. In the eighth Parks, of the college, wielded the big stick for a home run, and unfortunately for the home team there were no men on bases. His was the only home run made. Sairley landed a three-bagger and several two-baggers were made on both sides. The Canyon team was shut out six times. When the game was completed the score was 9 to 7 in favor of the visiting team.

Hereford has not organized a team for this year and consequently had to pick a team from whomsoever they could find to play and without having had any practice. The first part of the game, however, was favorable to the home team, but they lost out in the sixth inning and the Canyon boys run in a sufficient number of scores to make it stand 13 to 7 in favor of the visitors.

Cemetery Enlarged.

G. W. Barcus, who has charge of 167 acres west of town, known as the Ross addition, has cut off 16 acres of the west end adjoining the cemetery, to be added to the present cemetery. A street has been opened up and is being graded from J. H. Williams' place West to the cemetery and the main entrance will be from the south instead of the north. A new woven wire fence will be placed around the entire block including the present four acres, making twenty acres within the enclosure.

Surveyors are at work now platting off the new ground into lots and streets and they will be ready within a very short time. It is the purpose of the management, as soon as suitable arrangements can be made, to turn the cemetery over to any institution or private individual who wants to take charge of it. It will be so arranged that the profits derived from it will revert back to the cemetery and will be used for improving it. In the present burial ground, consisting of only four acres, the lots have all been taken, hence the great need of this new addition. A cemetery association should be formed to take charge of this and

beautify it and keep it in proper shape.

Warning.

All parties are hereby notified not to haul rubbish of any kind nor dead animals of any kind and leave same on the dumping ground east of Hereford, on either the north or south side of the creek. And those who have recently left dead animals on said dumping ground are requested to burn the same immediately and avoid penalty of the law. For the Statute provides a heavy penalty for any one leaving dead animals within fifty yards of the public road, which statute will be rigidly enforced. April 16, 1907.

J. T. Jewell has bought 100 acres adjoining the peice of ground he bought last week and will also put this additional tract in apple trees. The contract has been let to L. P. Landrum, proprietor of the Hereford nursery, to furnish the trees and to plant them. This makes 200 acres of land in his apple orchard and it will be the largest of its kind in the Panhandle. With a few more hundred acre orchards, it will only be a short time until Hereford will be the most prosperous fruit growing and largest shipping point in the West. ORDINANCE NO. 11.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Hereford;

SEC. 1. That in order to clean the city and keep the same in good sanitary condition, there shall be elected by a majority of the city council present at the first meeting in April of each year, or as soon thereafter as practicable, one or more scavengers for said city.

SEC. 2. Such scavenger, or scavengers, shall hold his position or office for the term of one year, unless removed by the city council.

SEC. 3. The city scavenger is required to keep the city clean of rubbish, paper and refuse matter of every kind that may be found upon the streets, alleys and sidewalks of the city, and upon all public grounds belonging to the city, or upon unoccupied lots within the corporate limits of the city.

SEC. 4. That it shall be the duty of the city scavenger to clean and disinfect all privies within the city as often as may be necessary; provided that all privies within the city shall be cleaned and disinfected at least twice in each month, except privies of private families, which shall be cleaned at least once in each month; the lime for disinfecting said privies to be furnished by the owners thereof; the cleaning of said privies shall be done between the hours of nine o'clock p. m. and five o'clock a. m.; the scavenger shall also remove all urine barrels as often as necessary.

SEC. 5. It shall be the duty of the scavenger to remove the carcasses of all dead animals of every description, filth, rubbish and refuse matter and substances of every kind to the dumping ground provided by the city for such purpose, and there bury or burn the same as may be directed by the mayor, or as may hereafter be provided by

ordinances.

SEC. 6. The scavenger's fees shall be as follows, to-wit:

Family privies, per month	\$0 25
Store privies, each time	25
Hotel privies, per hole, per month	25
Boarding house privies, per hole, per month	25
Restaurant privies, per hole, per month	25
Wagon yard and livery stable privies per month	50
Urine barrels, each	50
Public free schools, during school months, per week	50
Carcasses of horses, mules cows, steers or bulls over one year old	3 50
Colt or calf	1 00
Hog, goat, sheep or dog	75
All small animals or fowls	15

SEC. 7. That the scavenger shall collect all fees herein fixed from the owner or owners of animals hauled off by him, and all fees for cleaning and disinfecting privies shall be paid by the occupants of the property.

SEC. 8. That any person who shall fail or refuse to pay the fees herein allowed the scavenger by this ordinance within ten days after services have been rendered and within ten days of demand thereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than one nor more than five dollars; provided if fees are deposited with the mayor before complaint is filed it shall be a full payment thereof.

SEC. 9. That the city shall pay all fees due the scavenger under this ordinance when the party complained of has been convicted as herein provided, also the city shall pay the scavenger fee for hauling off animals to the dumping ground upon the affidavit of the scavenger that he has performed the service and that the owner of the animal

is unknown to him.

SEC. 10. That it shall be the duty of the scavenger to remove from the streets, sidewalks and alleys of the city, all boxes and barrels containing slops, rinds, peelings, offal, paper and rubbish of all kinds within a reasonable time after the same has been placed for him to haul off, and after notice of same; for hauling slop he shall receive for each barrel, 50 cents, for each barrel or box of dry rubbish, melon rinds, etc., 15 cents; by reasonable time is meant not more than five hours after daylight.

SEC. 11. That any scavenger who shall fail or refuse to perform the services herein required of him shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not less than one nor more than five dollars; provided that each failure shall be a separate offense, and it is further provided that a failure of the scavenger to well and faithfully perform the duties herein required of him shall be sufficient cause for his removal by the mayor and city council, from whose action in the matter of removal there shall be no appeal and the action of the mayor and city council in the removal of any scavenger shall be final.

SEC. 12. That any person accepting the office of scavenger shall accept it upon the terms and conditions herein specified, of which his acceptance shall be conclusive evidence.

A Landable Enterprise.

Through the kindness of Judge L. Gough, the city editor was permitted to see the beginning of what promises to be one of the greatest enterprises ever known to this country. S. L. Boone, as was mentioned in last week's Brand, has purchased 120 acres of ground from Judge Gough and is putting it out in an apple orchard. The work of planting was begun Wednesday afternoon. The

ground was broken in November and December and the plow was followed by a packer putting the ground in such condition that the moisture has been retained through this long dry spell and it is moist enough four inches from the surface to pack the soil into a ball. This illustrates the value of dry farming or the Campbell system of soil culture for this country.

On the west side of his orchard,

Mr. Boone has planted 50,000 forest trees of different varieties. Black Locust, Walnut, Elm and Ash, as a protection and wind break. In the main body of his orchard will be planted 20,000 apple trees of all varieties. He is putting out yearling trees and he says some of them will be bearing within two years and others later. When this orchard begins to bear fruit and yields large returns, others will follow with like orchards and Hereford will be one of the largest apple shipping points in the West. This means great things for this country. Apples can be cultivated here profitable as well as in any other country of the same altitude and of like conditions. It has been shown, as has been stated several times before, that such fruit can be grown here and that this country is well adapted to that particular kind of tree culture.

Hard on Automobiles.

Gov. Campbell this week signed the bill regulating the use of automobiles in the state of Texas. The bill fixes eighteen miles an hour as the maximum rate of speed at which automobiles may be run in the country, and eight miles in towns, unless the rate should be made different by municipal ordinance. Every owner of an automobile shall register with the clerk of the county in which he resides, and the automobile must be numbered, the figures to be six inches tall. A registration fee of 50 cents is to be charged. Racing is prohibited on a highway. The bill requires every driver of an automobile to stop when the driver of a horse vehicle signals for him to do so. The penalty for any violation of the law is a fine of from \$5 to \$100. It becomes effective ninety days after the adjournment of the regular session.

THE entire state of Texas seems to be undergoing rather a severe drought this spring. Reports from all parts of the state bring the same complaint from farmers that rain is badly needed, yet here in the Panhandle the farmers are perhaps faring better in this respect than in many other sections. 'Tis true that some of our small grain is needing moisture badly and must have it soon if anything like a good crop is to be had; but in numerous instances it is found that wheat has a dark rich color and is as fine as can be found in any country at any season. For instance the 200 acre model farm near Frio promises the greatest yield this year that it has ever yet produced. Not only is this true, but in each and every instance in which the land has had the proper care in the way of preparation and cultivation, there has been no cause for anxiety on account of a few weeks dry weather. The fact of the matter is that the copious rains of the past three years have brought too great a degree of indifference to most of our farmers. The crops have been spontaneous, requiring but little attention in the way of cultivation; but right here the Brand wishes to impress upon the minds of each and all of our farmers that whether it is wet or whether it is dry the best results are always had by a close observance of scientific cultural methods. If the rainfall is abundant, the crops will only be the better; if the annual precipitation falls below the normal, the crop yield

depends wholly upon the amount of intelligent labor expended in conserving the moisture. The Brand yet has its first crop failure to witness where the principles of the Campbell system were observed to even a reasonable extent. When our farmers give up the idea of butchering 300 or 400 acres each year and become impressed with the importance of expending the same labor on fewer acres, then our Panhandle country will know no such word as "fail", but on the other hand we will find ourselves in possession of the very best agricultural portion of the entire country. It is not so much a question of "How much rain will we have" as "How willing am I to work."

THE city ordinances found elsewhere in these columns will afford interesting reading for all our local people. There of course can be no one who will object to those relating to the standing of horses, and the appointment of city health officers and city scavenger. As to the one relating to the construction of sidewalks, the Brand realizes there are a few objectionable features. The council itself doubtless realized this. But when a measure is to be decided it should first be thoroughly analyzed, laying the bad features over against the good ones and let the decision be governed by preponderance of evidence on either side. Now, we admit that a sweeping proclamation requiring everybody to build sidewalks will prove a hardship upon some few, but the American government was not founded upon the principle of crushing many to protect a few, but rather to do that which will result in the greatest good to the greatest number of people. This is the exact precept which the city council has followed up in making it mandatory for property owners to build sidewalks. Of course it is to be expected that the move will meet with some opposition. There will be some who will not see the benefits to be derived from so radical a transformation; but if we will be obedient to the law enacted by our council and be faithful in its observance, it will only be a short time till we will realize that that body only acted in wisdom and good judgment in urging upon us the necessity of adding to our city this line of improvement which no community can afford to be without. Let's co-operate in this enterprise and thus show that we are susceptible to the wholesome influences which civilization always carries in its wake.

ROOM FOR 100,000.

WE frequently hear the question asked, "do you think you have a water supply which would support a city, in the event you secure sufficient rail road interests and other enterprises to make one?" Do we? Think a moment. No mechanical power has yet been applied which would in any degree lessen our underground supply. It is the candid opinion of nearly everyone that our present supply, which is only about fifty feet beneath the surface, is adequate to furnish water to a city of 100,000 people. But granting that this should prove not to be the case, we only have to turn our attention to the Tierra Blanco River which glides gently by our door. Here is a never failing stream which, if all its waters were conserved, would supply all the Santa Fe shops from Kansas City to Roswell, with plenty to loan Amarillo for all purposes. The water question is one which has held Ft. Worth and Dallas back in their growth and there is scarcely a city in the whole country which has not had to grapple long and hard in its solution. Here at Hereford the question is already solved. In the event we should be compelled to look to the Terra Blanco for a portion of our supply, a few

Civic League Organized.

A very enthusiastic mass meeting was held at the court house Tuesday afternoon, according to previous announcement, to discuss the different phases of civic improvement. On account of conflicts of different kinds the meeting was not as well attended as would otherwise have been but those present entered heartily into the meeting and caught the spirit of improvement which will be permeated throughout the length and breadth of our town. The meeting was called to order by Mayor Gough who explained the object of the meeting and who was also on the program for a ten minutes talk on parks. Judge Gough showed the great necessity for a large park in our town, and how the small triangular pieces of ground where the streets come together could be made to look beautiful by planting them out in trees and making parks small out of them. He was followed on the program by Mrs. P. W. Price on the subject of flowers and trees. "The Women can agitate the subject of planting flowers and trees", she said, "but they will have to call on the men for financial assistance." She also showed how the country

could be made beautiful and so near like our former homes by having flowers and trees. The subject of beautifying the school grounds was discussed in an intelligent and interesting manner by Hon. G. W. Barcus.

Mrs. Talaferro, matron of the college, read an interesting paper on beautifying the home and making it attractive. She showed the importance of such a home and the influence it had upon a town and its citizenship.

The work elsewhere was discussed by W. G. Ross, an old time citizen of the plains.

Rev. A. C. Smith showed the great benefits of civic improvement to the children. We would be rid of the loafers and idlers among the small boys if they could be made to take an interest in a beautiful home, he said. Children are greatly influenced by their surroundings. Civic improvement would have a great uplifting influence on our citizenship both morally and physically, said Rev. Wm. G. Keiry. The subject of sanitary conditions was ably discussed by Drs. Johnson and Price.

The cause of so much sickness in our town, is due to the unsanitary conditions that exist. Until our

back alleys are cleaned out, cess pools drained and the city is cleaned up from center to circumference, disease germs will be propagated and loathsome diseases will be the result. It is impossible to keep away sickness without observing sanitary measures.

A great many good things were said but the lack of space forbids us to mention them. At the close of these discussions a motion was made to enter into a Civic League organization and to elect officers.

Mrs. Talaferro was elected president with Mrs. S. J. Dodson as secretary. A constitutional committee of G. W. Barcus, Judge Baker, Dr. Johnson, and Judge Gough was appointed by the president.

Before adjournment, A. H. Elliston made a very short speech but one that will be far reaching in its results in which he offered the sum of \$25 to aid in work of improvement.

The meeting adjourned to meet again at the court house on next Tuesday night at 8:15 o'clock.

ORDINANCE NO. 10.

Be it ordained by the city council of the City of Hereford:

Sac. 1. The Mayor of this city is hereby authorized, with the consent and approval of a majority of the city council, to appoint a health officer, who shall hold his office until the expiration of the term of the Mayor so appointing him.

Sac. 2. Said health officer shall be a regular practicing physician and a bona fide citizen of the city of Hereford, and a man of good moral character.

Sac. 3. Said officer shall receive such compensation as the city council may determine.

Sac. 4. It shall be the duty of said health officer to take a general supervision of the sanitary condition of the city.

Sac. 5. It shall be the duty of said health officer to guard the city against the entrance of any contagious or infectious diseases, and to suggest to the city council, whenever he deems it necessary, the adoption of such measures to prevent the same.

Sac. 6. It shall be the duty of said health officer to make a personal inspection of the city as often as may be determined by the city council, and such other times as may be practicable.

Sac. 7. That under the direction of the mayor, city council or health officer, the marshal shall, by written notice, require all nuisances calculated to effect the health of the city to be abated by the owner or occupant of the premises upon which such nuisances may be.

Sac. 8. That, upon the direction of the city council, the health officer shall have power to order and enforce the drainage and filling up any lot, ground or yard in the city, the condition of which he may deem unwholesome; and he shall also see that the

repairing, altering and removal of all vaults of privies and sinks, as well as the cleaning and disinfecting of the same, is done in the proper manner.

Sac. 9. The city health officer shall have power, and it is hereby made his duty, to issue all orders and notices that he may deem necessary or conducive to the health of the city, and to perform such other duties appertaining to the health as the city council may direct.

Sac. 10. It shall be the duty of the health officer to attend all sick city prisoners and any person who may be sick or wounded upon the streets, and who is taken in charge by the city marshal or police officers.

Sac. 11. The word nuisance, as used in the ordinances of this city, shall be construed to mean anything whatever that may effect the health, morals or comfort of this city.

Sac. 12. Any person who shall fail or refuse to remove or abate any nuisance or discharge or perform any order that may be issued by the city council or health officer, as provided in this ordinance, after notice has been given him by the said health officer or by the marshal under the directions of said health officer, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than five nor more than fifty dollars. ORDINANCE NO. 8.

Be it ordained by the city council of Hereford:

That all persons owning a lot or lots within the corporate limits of the City of Hereford shall construct sidewalks in front thereof in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Any person, persons or corporation owning a lot or lots on Dewey Avenue within the fire limits shall construct sidewalks in front of the same, of the grade established by the city, ten feet in width, and shall construct the said sidewalk of sand, gravel and Portland cement of a standard quality.

Any person, persons or corporation owning a business lot or lots in any other part of the city shall construct sidewalks in front of the same in accordance with the above specifications.

The owner or owners of a residence lot or lots shall construct sidewalks in front thereof that shall be of the grade established by the city, of four feet in width and may be composed of cement, brick, lumber or of cinders and gravel; provided that when lumber is used, it shall be of dimensions of not less than 2x4 inches for the sleepers and of not less than 1x6 inches for the top of sidewalk; and provided that when gravel or cinders are used it shall be over the ground designated to a depth of not less than three inches, and shall be securely bounded by lumber of suitable dimensions.

The owner or owners of a corner lot or lots shall construct sidewalks in front thereof of the description ordained to be constructed in the portion of the city where said lot or lots are located, and shall also construct sidewalks as specified above on the adjoining street running parallel with the length of said lot or lots.

All sidewalks above mentioned shall be constructed so that the outer edge of the sidewalks ten feet in width shall be ten feet from the boundary line of the lot abutting against said sidewalk; and all sidewalks of four feet in width shall be constructed so that the outer edge of the sidewalk shall be four feet from the boundary line of the lot abutting against the said sidewalk.

All sidewalks required by this ordinance to be constructed shall be constructed so that they will be safe and substantial, and are subject to the acceptance or the rejection of the city council.

It is the duty of the owner or owners of the above mentioned lot or lots to construct the sidewalks in front thereof, and if they shall fail or refuse to build the sidewalks above provided for, within thirty days after written notice notifying them to build said sidewalk is delivered to the said owner, owners, their agent or lessee, by the city marshal, they shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than ten dollars nor more than fifty dollars.

Upon the failure or refusal of the owner or owners of any lot or lots mentioned in this ordinance to construct the sidewalks herein provided for, within thirty days after receiving the notice mentioned in the preceding section, the city shall proceed to construct the said sidewalk in the manner above provided and all cost incident to excavating, filling in and constructing the same shall be a tax lien upon the lot or lots abutting or adjoining said sidewalk. The said tax lien upon the said lot or lots shall be foreclosed in the manner prescribed for the foreclosing of tax lien by Municipal Corporation, in Title 104, Chapter 5a, of the Statutes of the State of Texas.

The rule requiring that bills shall be read at three separate meetings of the council is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from this date.
