A. J. Schroeter, county superintendent, this week announced plans for the rural schools' observance of "School Defense Week," Nov. 3-8, stating that the subject of defense will be integrated in the content of every subject in the rural curriculum.

Bus Company To Have Separate Depot Here

Hereford is to have a regular bus station, separate from any other business, say officials of the New Mexico Transportation Company, who were in town this week completing arrangements for moving the bus station from the Corner Drug Store to the Oberthier Building, one block west of Main, on Third Street.

General alarm spread among potato growers of this territory this week as it became learned that government allotments have been made on this area, and that a marketing quota is being considered by Washington law makers.

"The potato quota for Hereford has been set at 1,968 acres for Deaf Smith County," said Jas. Eiland, ACA secretary.

General alarm followed the announcement of the 1968 acreage allotment in view of the fact that 7,500 acres had been estimated for this area by growers. However, much of this acreage is located in Castro county, and only approximately 2,500 acres of potatoes were reported by farmers in this county.

"The greatest hazard, however, would be enactment of a Marketing Quota set-up, similar to that voted this year on wheat marketing," AAA leaders said.

Gov't. Agencies Represented At Amarillo Meet

AAA employees are in Amarillo today receiving detailed instructions for use with the plan sheets to be used in the new farm program. The plan sheets, in addition to information which has formerly been filled in for the AAA program, will this year feature a special division on the USDA Food For Freedom campaign, in which farmers will be asked to increase their production of certain vital foods to aid in civilian defense and to release more food for the use of hard-pressed Britain.

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NEWS IN THE WORLD OF RELIGION

Dr. Wallace Crawford, professor of public health in West China Union University, Chengtu, China—an institution supported by a group of Canadian and United States mission agencies—has been "drafted" by the Chinese government to organize health services in cities along the trunk highways leading out from Szechuan Province. These are lines along which Free China is now receiving its supplies of food and of war material. A number of new hospitals have been erected by the Red Cross and the government in these cities now overflowing with refugee populations, but there has been a lack of trained medical personnel. Eighty per cent of the medical graduates of West China Union University School and of Chee-loo University Medical School this year have been called into army and government health service.

The Hubbard Bible Class of the Central Presbyterian Church, Rochester, N. Y., is believed to be the oldest Bible class for men in the world. It has been in continuous existence since January 3, 1869, meeting every Sunday morning since that time. The Rev. E. P. Westphall, Presbyterian director of religious work among men (1132 Witherspoon Building, Philadelphia, Pa.) is seeking to learn if there is an older class in existence anywhere.

"Religious persons should attempt to improve human life instead of withdrawing from worldly reality," said Rabbi David de Sola Pool recently at the Spanish and Portuguese Syna-

gogue, New York. "The truly religious man will not reject the flesh, and flee the world and mundane interests, but will try to mould human life to more beautiful forms."

Finding that the enrollment of its colleges, schools and theological seminaries is down this year while the cost of maintenance has risen steadily, the Board of Education of the Northern Baptist Convention has launched a campaign to raise an emergency fund to assist these institutions. They are stretched across the continent—from a classical institute in Maine to a divinity school in California.

Perhaps there are few men in America more interested in the morning's news about Singapore and the Malay Peninsula and their defenses than is Captain-Doctor William G. Shellabear, now living in retirement in Hartford, Conn., in his eightieth year. Fifty-five years ago, as a young engineering officer of the British Army, he was sent to Singapore to help build its defenses. A brilliant linguist in college, he found it helpful to study the Malay language and later the Chinese to carry on his work with native soldiers and the Chinese immigrant residents. But, as he carried on his defense building, he realized the need of the Malays and other peoples for education for Christianity, for modern medical care. So he resigned his military commission and joined the Methodist Mission then extending its work in the Peninsula. For fifty years—and even today in his retirement—he has been producing a vast Christian literature, principally in Malay, but also in Chinese and related tongues. He has translated the Bible, composed and translated hymns, written hundreds of books and tracts. He is still a "best seller" in Malay and colporteurs carry his publications through this

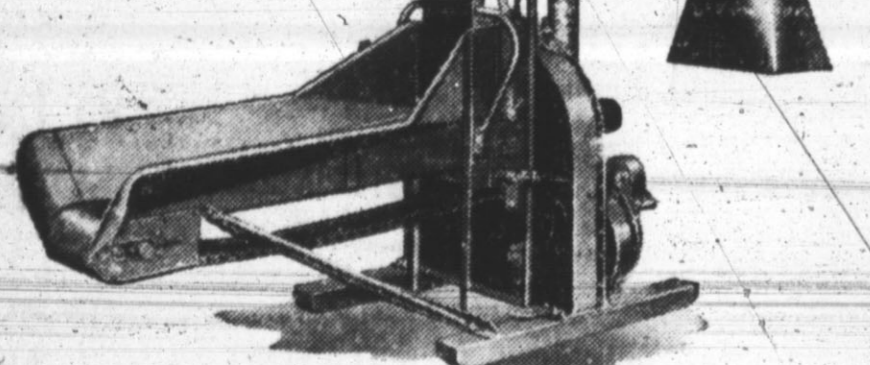

Flood Causes Damage At Matthews Home

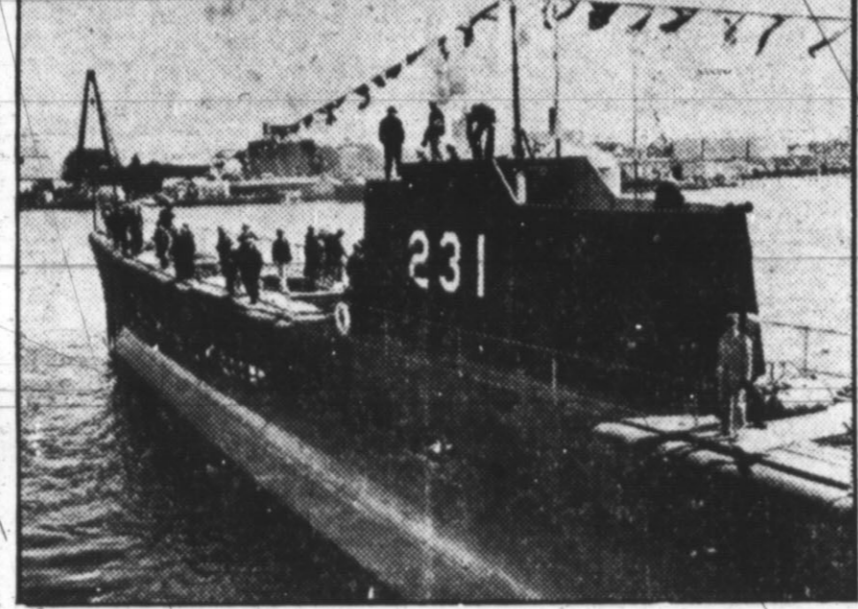
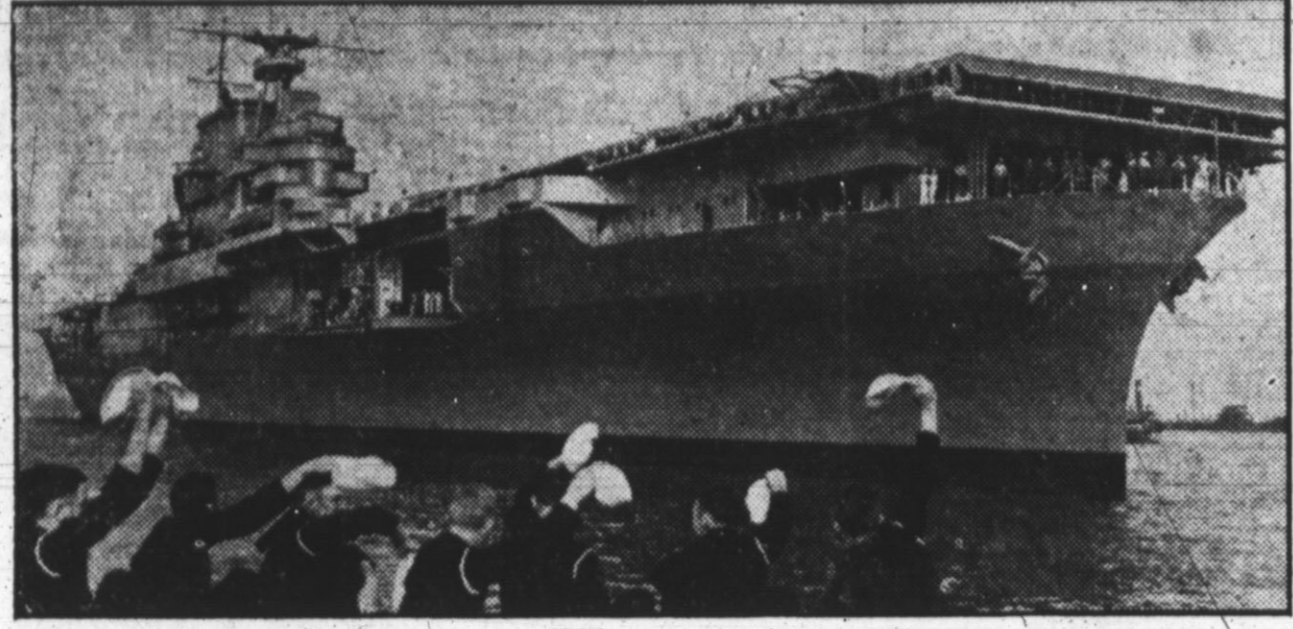
Last week's rains, according to reports received from rural correspondents this week, reached flood proportions in some parts of the county, with rising lakes causing severe property damage in addition to making roads impassible nearly everywhere.

In the Jumbo community, the L. A. Matthews family were forced to move from their home, where water reached a depth of several feet. Most of the furniture was moved, but a kitchen range, refrigerator and piano were left in the house, and water rose to the keyboard on the piano.

The well house, barns and lots were covered, and a cellar containing about 500 quarts of canned fruits and vegetables is under water. Matthews estimates that he has lost about 36 hogs, but other stock was rescued.

Neighbors helped the family make a hurried move to another house in the community.

try err on the side of understatement. He added that this was inevitable since the worst tortures devised by jailers can not be filmed or put on the stage. Paradoxically, according to Blum, the Jews—who enjoy no advantage in any other way, find it easier to get out of Germany than do the Gentiles. This is so, he says, because Jews are not liable for military service, and because a well-oiled machine has been developed for handling their emigration.

Asked about the effect of the current undercover campaign against Germany being carried on in the occupied countries

Blum said, "Until England has an army on the continent and can arm the Europeans against Hitler, the discontent will not do serious damage to the Nazis for the simple reason that they have the guns, and the people they rule are—relatively—unarmed."
