DOES IT PAY?

There is a merchant in West, Texas, who has established the custom of giving away one day's sales of each month. Before the month, he selects a date, seals it in an envelope and deposits same in the bank. He goes right along advertising his goods just like all other successful merchants, but adds that he will refund in cash the amount of all cash purchases made on the day named in what he calls "The Lucky Day" envelope. No one except himself knows what day is named. At the end of the month, he appoints a committee who goes to the bank and opens the envelope in the presence of the cashier. They make a certificate announcing "The Lucky Day" and the merchant asks all who hold cash ticket duplicates to bring them in and he will refund every dollar spent with him on that day. Does it pay? Ask yourself the question, business man. Would you be willing to give away one day's cash sales each month for a year? Would it pay?

Every successful merchant figures on the expense of advertising just as he would clerk-hire, insurance, rent, etc., it is a legitimate expense and sidered. Does it pay this West being in posession of testimony merchant to give away one day's cash receipts? Count it. Suppose he should sell in cash for the month in writing for the use of the State \$2600. The average would be \$100 per day. Suppose "The Lucky Dallas at the Governor's banquet Day" sales were \$91. To give this away would be 31 per cent of all your cash sales, besides paying for a big ad in the local paper each week?

It is not a question of how much a merchant spends for advertising but the amount returns in proportion to his expenditures that must be considered. If a merchant was selling \$1200 worth of goods per month with little or no publicity and could double his sales by judicious newspaper advertising, would it pay to give away 1-26th of his sales and also pay for the ad?

BIG SUIT FOR DAMAGES.

A. R. Letts of Clarendon Sues J. K. Zimmerman of Hall County for \$162,000.

The Letts-Zimmerman land matter has again presented itself in the Federal court at Fort Worth for \$162,000 damages against Mr. Zimmerman. The features of the case are somewhat familiar to local readers, Letts' claim being that he contracted to buy a large body of land from Zimmerman in Hall county, and afterwards the land was sold to other parties and his contract ignored. The Ft. Worth Record prints the following notice of the

J. K. Zimmerman, a wealthy land owner and ranchman of the Panhandle section and a temporary resident of this county, is made the defendant in a damage suit for \$162,000 which was filed Thursday afternoon in the United States district court.

The plaintiff in the suit is Arthur R. Letts of Clarendon and the suit grows out of the alleged failure of Zimmerman to carry out a contract for the sale of certain ranch lands in the Panhandle section.

Zimmerman is one of the most prominent ranch and cattle owners of the Panhandle, his holdings being principally in the counties of Hall and Briscoe. Several years ago he sold one of his ranches in the Panhandle section to Swift & Co., the price being something like \$1,000,-000.—Banner-Stockman.





Be it ordained by the City Council of the city of Hereford, Texas.

That Chapter 96, of the General Laws of the State of Texas, passed by the Thirtieth Legislature, entitled.

"An Act, to regulate the running of automobiles and motor vehicles, and to require the owners of such machines to register his name and the number of his machine with the County Clerk, in the county in which he resides, for the violation of which a penalty is provided."

Sec. L. Be, and the same is hereby, in so far as such Act applies, adopted as an ordinance of the city of Hereford. And that the built up portion of the city of Hereford, be, and is hereby declared to be co-extensive with the city limits, as follows, to wit:

Beginning where the Tierra Blanco Creek crosses the east line of section 61, thence north on east line of section 61 and 62 to a point in section 62 which is opposite the north line of the Panhandle Christian College property, which is 2177 feet from the southeast corner of said section 62, and which is the southeast corner of Block 22, Evants Addition to Hereford; thence west crossing the west line of section 62, to a point 1070 feet from the east line of section 79; thence south to the south line of an 80 acre tract owned by John W. DeAtley, in section 80, Block K-3, and commonly called Norton's Lane; thence east to the Tierra Blanco Creek; thence in an easterly direction with the meanderings of said creek to the place of beginning.

Sec. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance, be, ware Co. and the same is hereby repealed.


