Worley Speaks In Hereford

On his first swing into this territory since entering the August run-off primary, Gene Worley of Shamrock, candidate for congress, spoke to a large crowd in Hereford Tuesday night after spending the entire day visiting in Deaf Smith county where he has hundreds of enthusiastic supporters.

That Deaf Smith county should take an exhibit to both the Amarillo and Dallas fairs this fall was the opinion of over 30 persons attending a call meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Monday night at City Hall.

Possibility of holding a county fair here was discussed but general opinion was that, in case of cramped finances, it might be better to spend the money for exhibits at Amarillo, or Dallas.

Glenn Boardman, president of the Hereford Potato Growers' Association, Inc., discussed potato developments.

Jim Williams pointed out that a local fair would be worth more in publicity, interest and attendance if it were called an Irish potato festival, than if just a fair.

Cost of sending an exhibit to both Amarillo and Dallas fairs was placed at approximately \$750 by E. B. Posey, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce.

Such an exhibit would give prominence to Hereford's newest industry, growing potatoes, but the county's nationally known industries of pure-blood Hereford cattle, and wheat growing would not be slighted.

Red Cedars Grow Well At Werner Home

Red cedars are expected to grow a foot a year in windbreaks in this area but at least one of the one hundred at the Al Werner home in Westway will measure five feet at the end of its second growing season. Equally good growth has been made by the Chinese Elm and Flowering Willow which are much taller and these will give real protection next spring.

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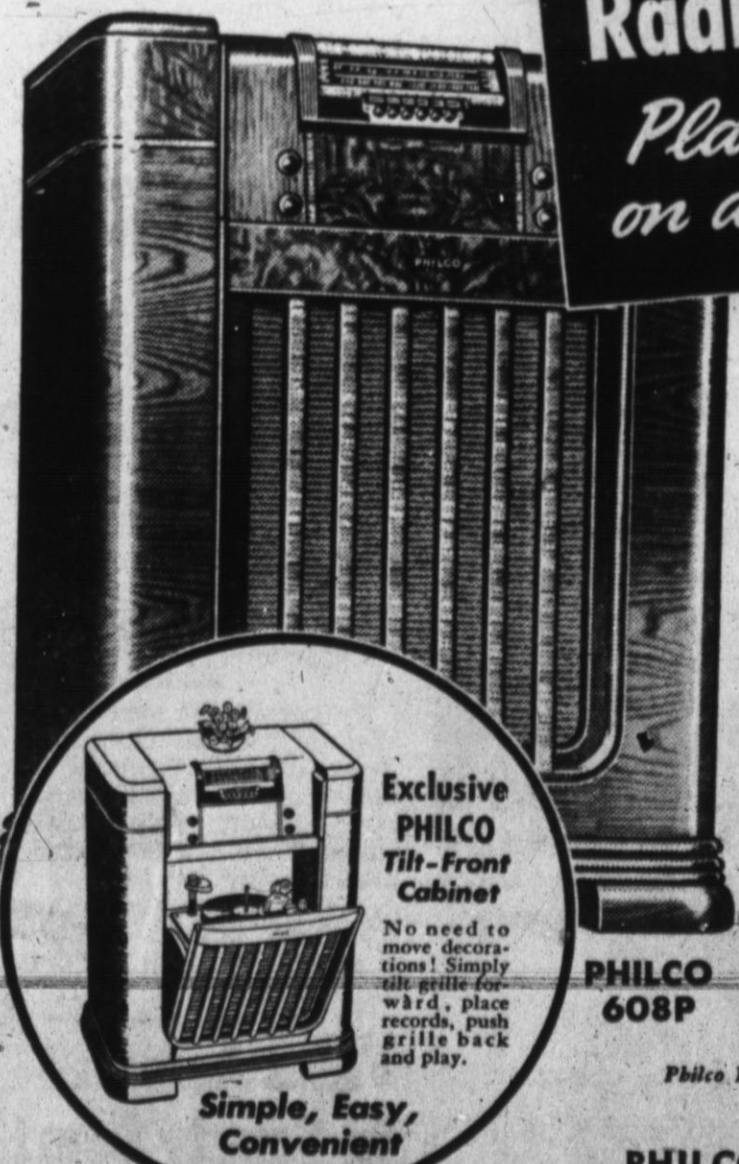

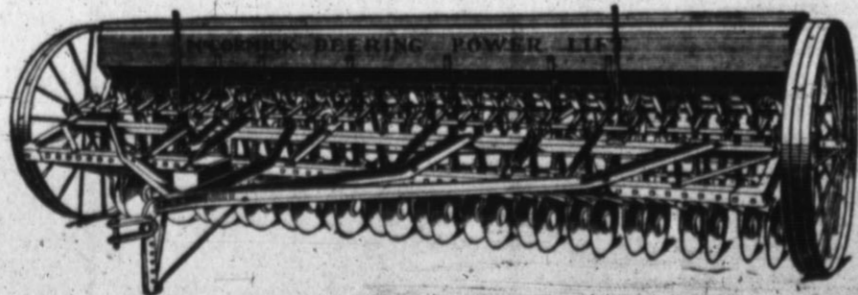

Watermelon Sweet Pickle Recipe Given

The newest bulletin received from the Extension Service, B-118, "Pickles and Relishes" contains a watermelon sweet pickle recipe. Mrs. Frank Wilde of the North Hereford club reports that this pickle is exceptionally good. The recipe follows:

7 pounds or 1 gallon watermelon rind, 5 pounds or 10 cups sugar, 1 quart white vinegar, 1 stick cinnamon, Few whole cloves.

Select a thick-rind, firm melon. Cut green skin and pink flesh from rind of melon. Cut into cubes or desired shapes and sizes.

Soak several hours or overnight in cold water—better in the ice box. Boil in water 10 minutes, pour off water and drain. Boil vinegar, sugar, and spices tied loosely in cheesecloth, to form a thick syrup. Drop rind into the thick syrup and cook until clear. Let cool and pack into hot sterilized containers. If syrup is not thick when rind is clear drain off syrup and boil until thick. Add rind and cool as above.

Why let it cool? This plumps the pickles which absorb the syrup as they cool.

Try the same trick on preserves.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments

S. J. R. NO. 6

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Section 26 of Article IV so as to provide that Notaries Public be appointed by the Secretary of State of the State of Texas; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 26 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 26. (a) The Secretary of State shall appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for each county who shall perform such duties as now are or may be prescribed by law. The qualifications of Notaries Public shall be prescribed by law.

(b) nothing herein shall affect the terms of office of Notaries Public who have qualified for the present term prior to the taking effect of this amendment.

(c) Should the Legislature enact an enabling law hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT NOTARIES PUBLIC BE APPOINTED BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS."

and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT NOTARIES PUBLIC BE APPOINTED BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

"Section 9-A. Upon the vote of a majority of the resident qualified electors owning rendered taxable property therein so authorizing, the Commissioners Court of Red River County, Texas, may levy an annual tax not to exceed Twenty-five (25) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for a period not to exceed fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding all the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County and issue bonds under the provisions of the General Law regulating the issuance of bonds to refund said indebtedness.

"At such election, the Commissioners Court shall submit for adoption the proposition of whether such outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County shall be refunded into bonds, the amount of special tax to be levied, and the number of years said tax is to be levied. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters.

"The provisions of this Section 9-A shall apply only to Red River County; and the provisions hereof shall be self-enacting without the necessity of an enabling act of the Legislature of the State of Texas, but shall become effective immediately after the official canvass of the result has been made and it is determined that this Amendment has been adopted by a majority of the voters of the State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution providing that the Commissioners Court of Red River County may, upon a vote of the qualified electors therein, levy a tax and issue bonds to refund the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County;"

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election, which shall be refunded to the State of Texas by Red River County out of its General Fund or any other available fund. Provided that no election shall be held until Red River County shall first deposit

with the State Treasurer the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) with which to pay such expenses of said election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 30b of Article 16; providing that the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution limiting the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years, shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipalities that are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service Law applicable thereto; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment; making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto a new Section to Article 16 to be known as Section 30b which shall read as follows:

"Section 30b. Wherever by virtue of Statute or charter provisions appointive offices of any municipality are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service and rules are set up governing appointment to and removal from such offices, the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution of two (2) years shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service law or charter provisions applicable thereto."

Sec. 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at the general election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that Article 16, Section 30, of the Constitution shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipality placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service."

Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that Article 16, Section 30, of the Constitution shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipality placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast is in favor of the Amendment the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published, as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

CHDA NOTES

A bushel of large plums has been canned in a light syrup by Mrs. H. M. Benson of Ford. These can be served as a dessert or made into jelly, jam, or pies as wanted next winter.

The onion crop has been harvested and stored and a fall garden planted.

We need to get "Storage minded" because practically every Texas farm has been able to produce a good supply of valuable food. Such crops as Irish Potatoes, sweet potatoes, peas, beans, onions, cushaws and pumpkin must be stored properly if they are to be available over a long period.

In the western part of the state, cellars that are common on most farms may be used for storage, but even here losses may occur unless products are properly handled and ample ventilation is provided. An Extension Service blue print shows six ways to ventilate a cellar which has been built without satisfactory ventilation.

Extension Service Bulletin B-11 "Storage and Home Storage of Vegetables and Fruits" gives useful information in connection with storage problems.

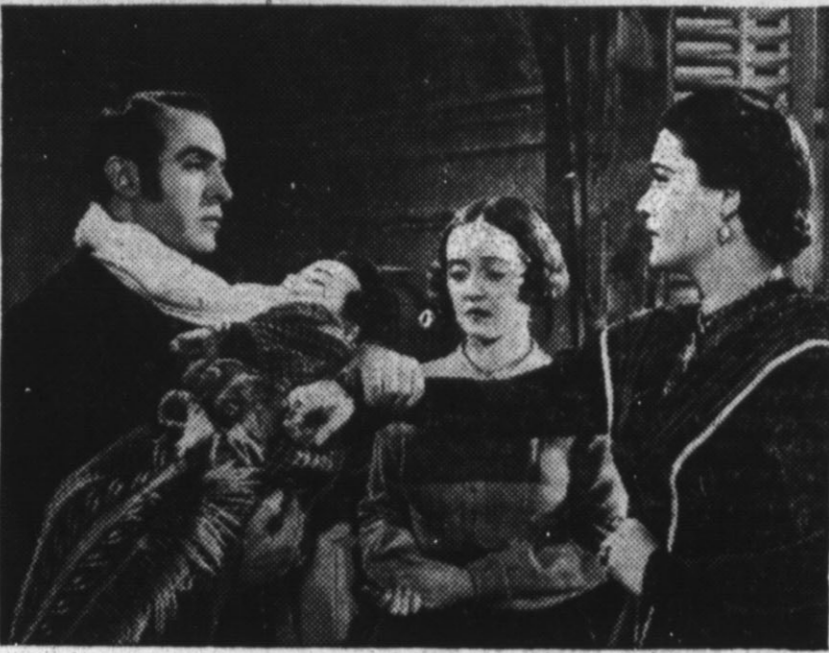

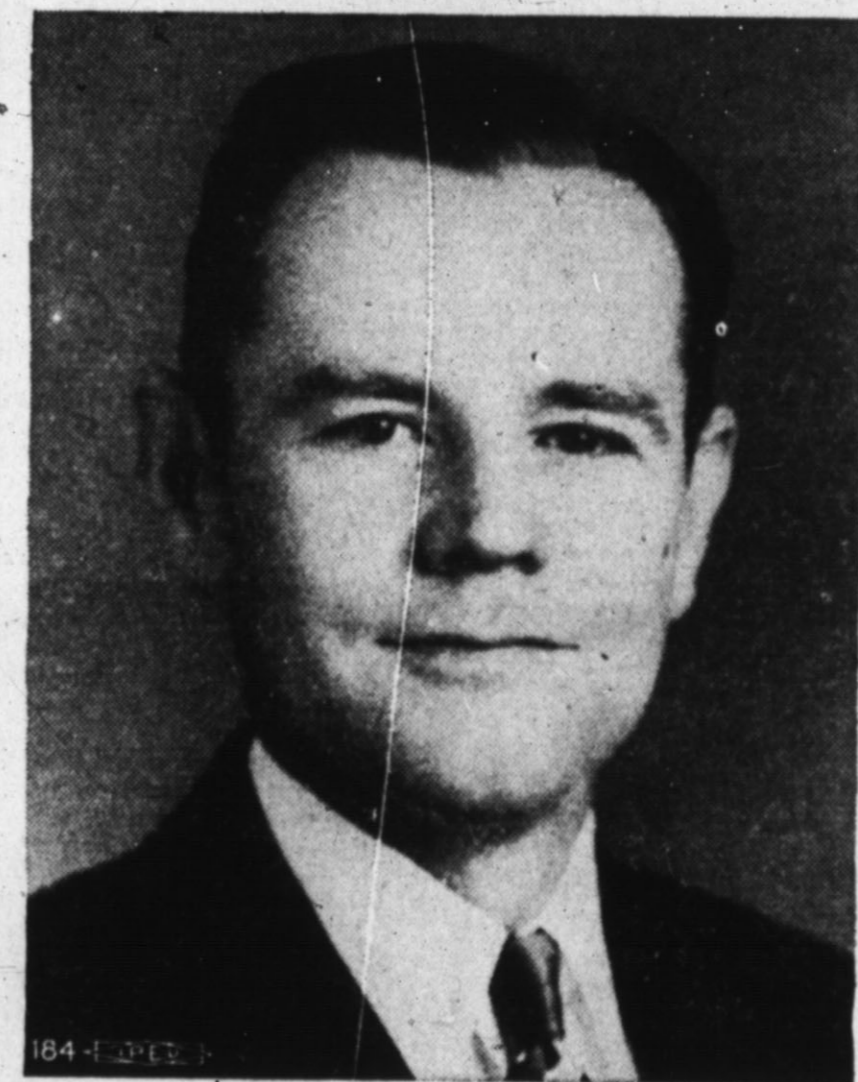

Let's Cook Something

Pickles and spicy mixtures are often what your guests remember longest. Right now is the time to be making them for winter use, and no matter how simple your tastes, you'll find that ginger has what it takes to make a plain pickle into something you write home about. At least one woman thought enough of Mrs. L. R. Brady about 35 years ago to write her about Watermelon-Rind Sweet Pickles, made with ginger, and to send her a jar of the pickles so that she could see for herself how good they were. Mrs. Brady has been making them ever since and every one who tastes them wants the recipe. Because of so many requests for the recipe we print it for you.

WATERMELON-RIND SWEET PICKLES

Peel and cut into strips, 1 by 3 inches, cutting out all the red meat and cutting off all the green rind, enough melon-rind to make seven pounds after it has been prepared. Line a large preserving kettle with green grape leaves and place melon-rind in kettle, add a piece of alum the size of a walnut and cover with grape leaves. Cover with cold water and cook with lid on kettle until tender enough to pierce with broom straw, (about 90 minutes).

Make a strong ginger tea of crushed ginger root, tied in thin cloth bags and boiled for several minutes. Remove rind from grape-leaf water and place in the ginger tea, let remain over night.

The next morning remove rind from the ginger tea and place on racks to drain.

MAKE SYRUP OF:

- 5 pounds of sugar
- 1 quart apple cider vinegar
- peel of half of orange (boiled for a few minutes)
- small piece of ginger-root
- 1 dozen whole all-spice
- 1 dozen spice cloves
- a few pieces whole mace (if unable to get mace, use the ground).

Bring all these ingredients to a boil and drop in the rinds. Cook all together, uncovered, over medium flame until clear and about thick (about 90 minutes).

Place in jars while hot and seal.

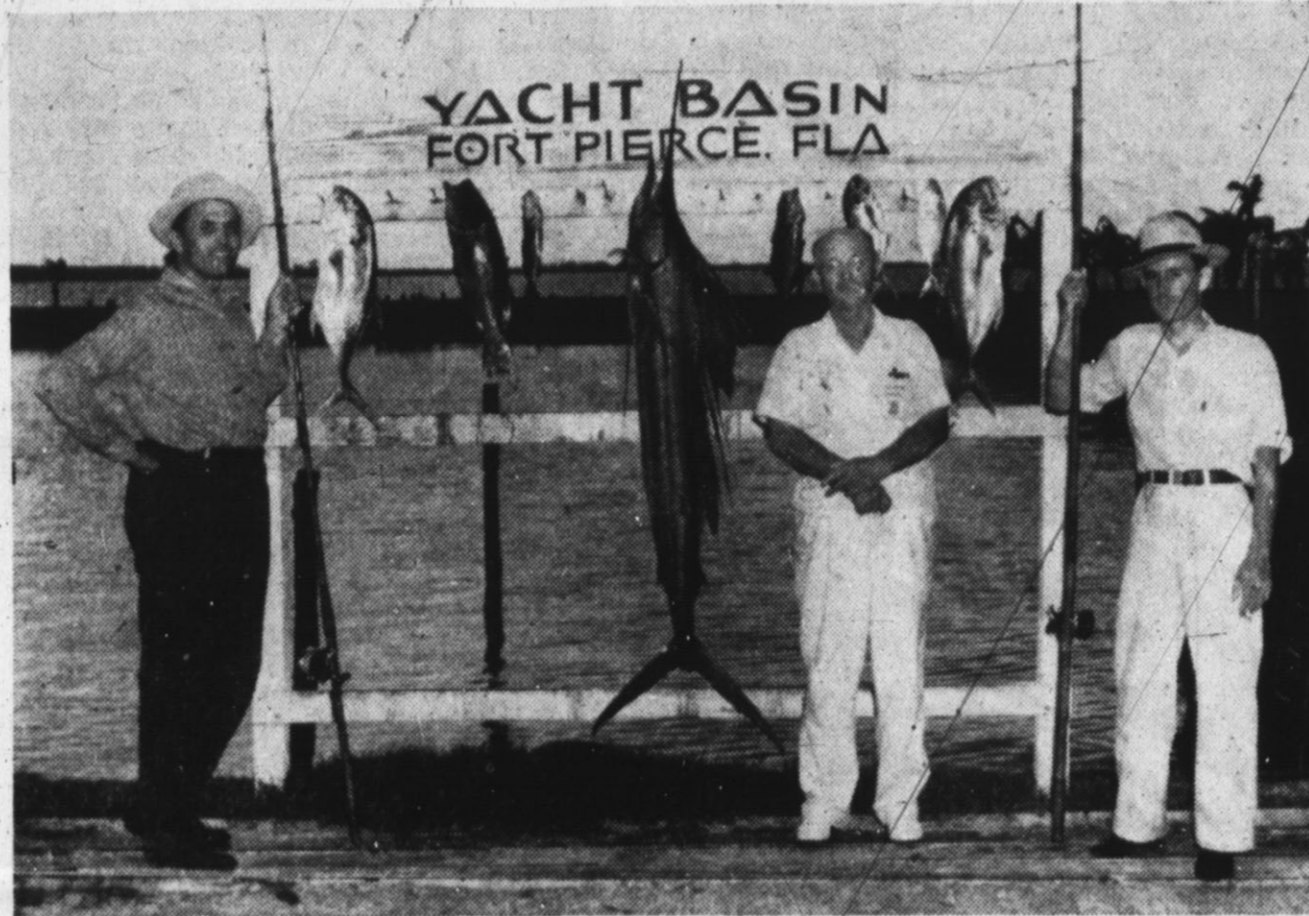

Boyer Hits Panhandle Political Machine

dering just what is going to happen to their financial obligations if they are forced to give a year to the army or navy. How are house payments, car payments, loans, etc. which they contracted on their present salaries, to be met on a pay of \$21 a month while in the army?

Enrollees selected for service would spend a year's active training at a pay of \$21 a month and allowances, plus opportunities for promotion. This training period could be extended only by action of Congress.

One year voluntary enlistment

in the army of men 18 to 34, inclusive, instead of the regular three-year enlistment is also provided by the bill. Men who take this course are excused from conscription.

Private employers would be required to re-hire trainees after they were released, unless it was "impossible or unreasonable" to do so.

Employers engaged in interstate commerce would be liable to action by the National Labor Relations Board, if they refused to give his job back to a conscript.

Maximum penalty for violation of the conscription bill would be five years imprisonment and \$10,000 fine.
