A FULL VOTE REQUIRED

Stamford Sends Out Appeal for West Texas and the Panhandle Vote and Pay Poll Taxes

Homer D. Wade, Secretary of the Stamford Commercial Club, has prepared an article calling attention to the necessity of securing a full vote at the election to be held, November 8th, and also urges that all pay their poll tax, if this section of the state wished to be fairly represented in the legislature.

"The general election in Texas will be held November 8th, which is a little more than a week hence.

"This election is of more importance than the average election, from the fact that in the redistricting process which will be gone thru by the Thirty-second Legislature, the number of qualified electors will be taken into consideration in the re-arrangement of Senatorial Districts. The Constitution of the State of Texas, section 25 of article 3, provides that the redistricting of the state senate shall be made on the basis of the number of qualified electors in the state. Just how the provision, "qualified electors," will be construed by the next legislature is an undetermined question and one left entirely to the will of the legislature. Up to the present time, the only rule followed in determining the number of qualified electors was the vote cast at the general election preceding the redistricting of the senate.

"When the senate was redistricted ten years ago there was no poll tax requirements for suffrage in Texas, but since then this requirement has been made. It is possible therefore, that the Thirty-second legislature may take the poll tax payments as qualified electors in the rearrangement of the senatorial districts.

In this event, it will be necessary in order for West Texas to have her share of the senatorial districts for a full showing to be made in the payment of poll taxes.

"If the old method of determining the qualified electors is followed, as indicated above, then it is necessary for a full vote to be cast at the general election on November 8th, 1910 in order for West Texas to get her full representation in senatorial districts.

"If the legislature should adopt the poll tax provision as its guide for qualified voters, as the basis for senate redistricting, then it is important that there should be a full payment of poll taxes. There is no way of knowing which plan will be adopted by the thirty-second legislature and therefore every voter in West Texas in particular, and the entire state in general is confronted with two important and sacred duties.

"1. To vote at the coming general election regardless of party affiliations.

"2. To pay his poll tax or, if exempted, to secure a certificate of exemption both of which must be secured before February 1, 1911.

"The few senatorial districts in West Texas makes it imperative that action should be taken, as above indicated, and with this opportunity afforded, it is therefore up to the voters of West Texas to bear these facts in mind and to vote in the general election and then pay their

poll tax in order that the representation from West Texas in the senate may be materially increased."

WOULD TRADE WITH TEXAS FOR EL PASO

Isidoro Armijo Wants to Settle Boundry Dispute on East Side of New Mexico by Accepting El Paso County as Part of New Mexico State.

Santa Fe, N. M.—New Mexico may make an effort to get Texas to trade El Paso county in lieu of the strip of territory in dispute west of the 203rd parallel.

Isidoro Armijo, chairman of the committee on boundaries of the constitutional convention, who proposed that the convention make claim to the territory in dispute, announced that he would, when the proper time comes, make the proposal that New Mexico accept El Paso county in lieu of the disputed territory.

Speaking of the matter, he said that El Paso had been talking of rebelling from the state of Texas and that this would give the El Pasoans a chance to become a part of the new state of New Mexico, with which territory the people of El Paso have more common ideas than with Texas. He said that he believed the rest of the state would be glad to surrender El Paso county in settlement of a boundry dispute of long standing and that he believed El Pasoans would be glad to come into New Mexico instead of remaining in Texas.

The constitutional convention has no power in the matter, but Armijo says he intends to press his suggestion when the matter comes before the national congress for final adjudication.

KAFFIR-CORN FED HOGS BEST

It Is Superior to Either Milo Maize or Indian Corn As An Ideal Food For Hogs

The statement recently issued by Swift & Co., as to the relative values of various foods for hogs, resulted in the findings in favor of Kaffir Corn for various reasons. Inasmuch as conditions are most favorable for the cultivation of a first-class quality of Kaffir Corn, but also the fact that conditions are also more than ordinary here in this county for the breeding and grading up to a high standard of excellence the various breeds of hogs, this should interest many of our farmer citizens. Adverting to the statement as issued by Swift & Co., it carries one thru a series of successive experiments, says the Daily Panhandle in a recent issue, proving conclusively that the Kaffir and Milo grain rightly ground and soaked, is of greater food value in the production of hogs than is Indian corn. This applies with special reference to the quality and quantity of fat placed, and also to the shortening of time involved in the process. The feed was ground and afterward soaked for twelve hours prior to feeding, and the results given in tabular form. To continue: "This shows a daily gain of 1.8 pounds for the Kaffir and milo hogs and 1.57 pounds for corn hogs. These hogs were not sold on the market, but on the day that they were weighed the tops sold at \$5.27 1-2, and they were better than the tops, so it is safe to say that they would have brought \$5.30. At this price the kaffir and milo hogs put on 9.54 cents worth of meat daily, and the corn fed hogs 8.32 cents worth. The hogs ate more kaffir and milo than Indian corn, and a little more of the tankage, but the net advantage in the matter of profitable feeding was with the kaffir hogs.

"The farmer of West Texas where kaffir and milo grow to best advantage, can figure out from this test whether he can afford to raise hogs.

"It took in this instance to produce 100 pounds of pork, 320 lbs. of Kaffir corn and milo maize combined, and 51 pounds of Swift's digester tankage.

"Figuring the pork to be worth \$5.30 per cwt., and deducting the cost of the tankage, viz. 90c, making the producing value of Kaffir corn and milo maize 69c per bushel of 50 pounds. So clear are the deductions in the foregoing that no reasoning is required to find its application and value in this matchless portion of the country. Kaffir and milo grow in this part of the state in the greatest profusion, and that with but little effort at cultivation. The hog enjoys complete immunity from disease here."—Tulia Herald.

Hereford College Takes First Trip.
The Hereford College football team took its first trip to Clarendon and Goodnight but only played one game as the one at Clarendon was forfeited to Clarendon. There is generally a cause when a game is forfeited but of this we did not intend to say much for as a rule each team can see but one side and that is its own side and its own side is always in the right. However the writeup that appeared in the Clarendon Times can hardly be passed by without some kind of a reply. 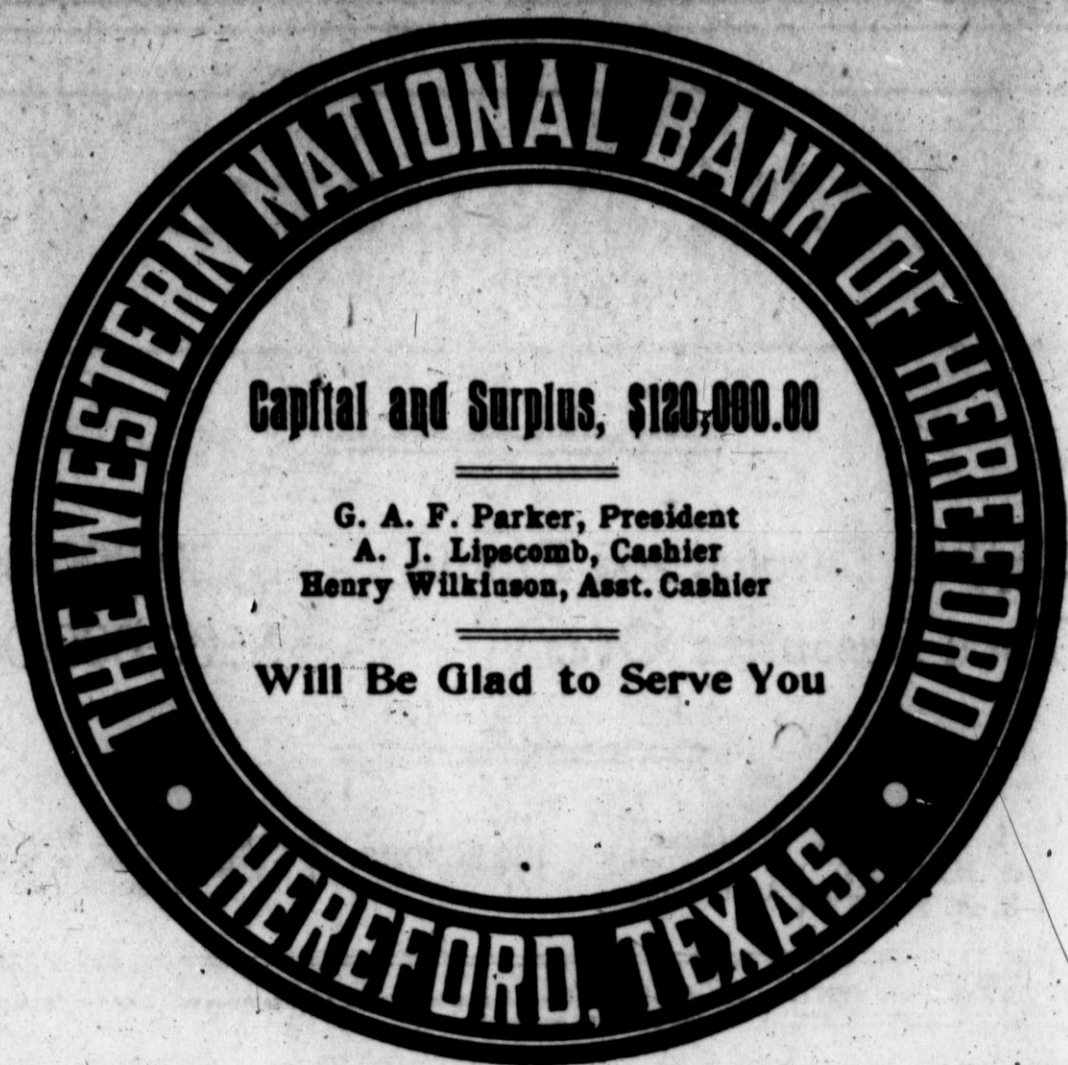

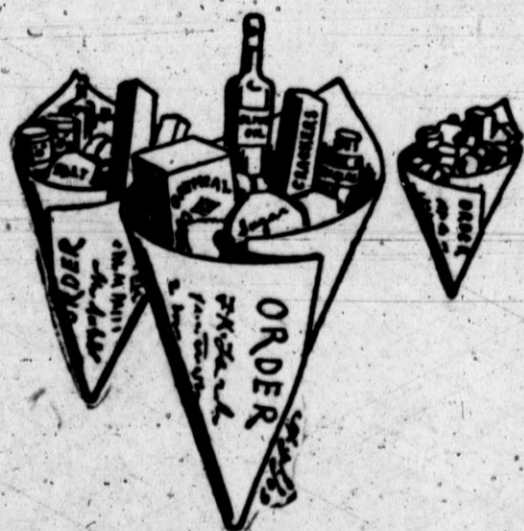

Great Mineral Wealth in Texas.

"The greatness of Texas is a burden", said J. A. Happer of El Paso in discussing the varied natural resources and commercial advantages of Texas. "The rugged mountains that surround El Paso on the east are capable of pouring into the channels of trade a stream of mineral wealth that will surpass the total agricultural production of the state and I want to say there is as much prosperity in a dollar taken from the mine as there is in a dollar taken from the farm. The state has given away 78,970,440 acres of its best farm land to settlers and a prospector of mineral wealth is as much a developer as a settler of farm lands and is entitled to the same encouragement, but about the only legislation on our statute books affecting mineral production at present is special taxes laid upon the output, altho the products of the farm are exempt from all forms of taxation. The state owns millions of acres of mineral lands which, in their undeveloped state, are worthless and the law gives a prospector who locates the minerals no equity for his labor;

we need liberal mining laws such as apply to government lands and then you will see the El Paso section bloom like a rose. The state very properly appropriates funds to maintain our Agricultural Department, Experimental and Demonstration farms and we also have a Department of Fisheries, but what has the state ever done towards encouraging the development of its mineral resources?"

"Our representatives in the Legislature from this section of the state have repeatedly introduced laws that encourage mineral development but have never been able to get them on the statute books. We are strictly a mining country and the apparent indifference of the state to our welfare sometimes makes us wish that the Rio Grande River would change its course and cut us out of Texas, but patience is one of the cardinal virtues and we El Pasoans possess our share of it. and we know that if the members of our Legislature would only study Texas diligently, they would give us needed relief. Texas is a big state and its interests so varied it takes a big

man in the Legislature to fulfill the responsibilities of the position. I rather like the lineup in the 32nd Legislature and I believe they are going to do something for Texas."

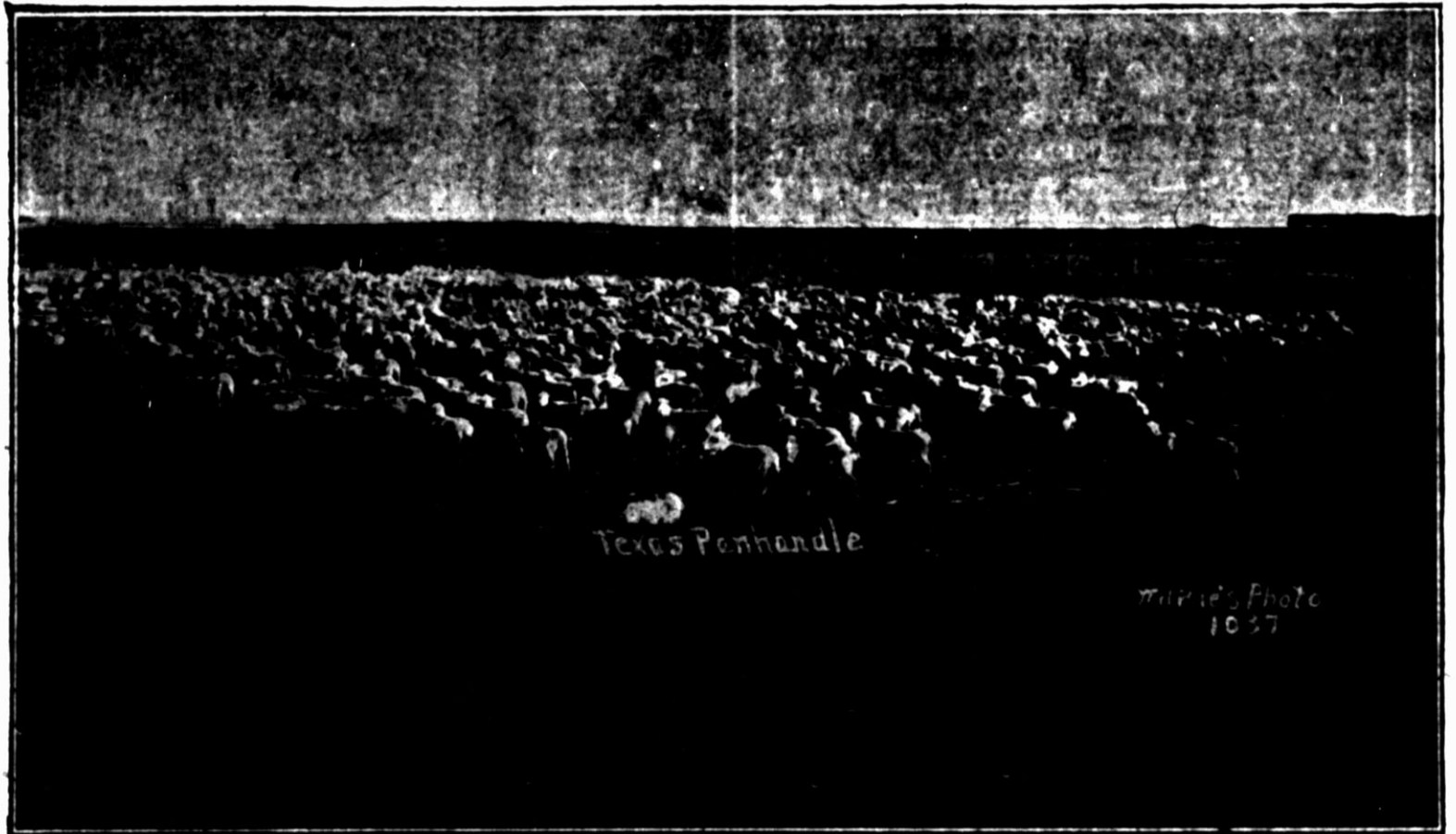

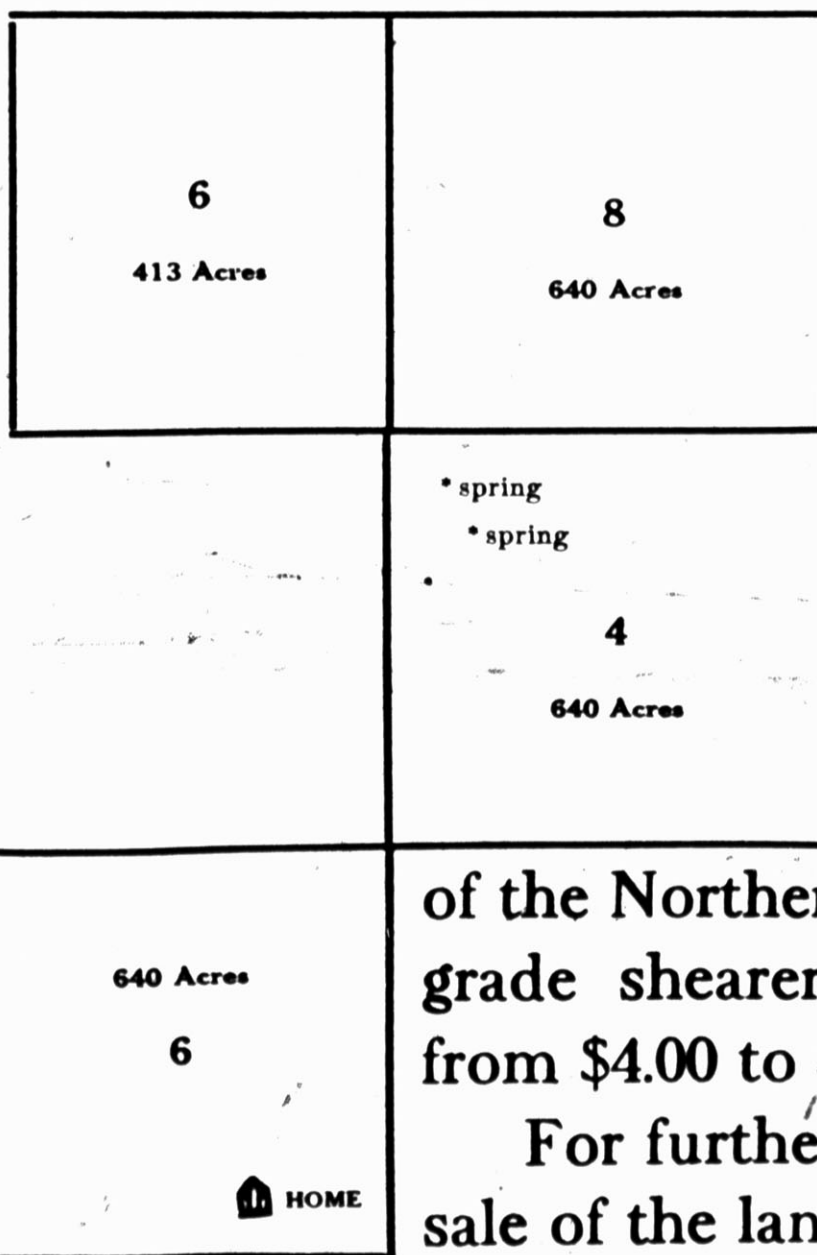
